ROLL CALL

Frank G. McCartney, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present- there being five members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and four members present from the State New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

A primary item on today's meeting agenda is the 2010 Traffic Engineering Report compiled by Pennoni Associates. This report contains the final 2010 toll traffic volumes and it further projects the 2011 traffic volumes and toll revenues for our seven toll bridges. According to the report, this year's toll traffic volumes will increase by 2.9 percent and toll revenue will increase by 1.8

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percent. These figures are further evidence of an improving economy, while the projections are positive and encouraging, the projected increases in commercial vehicles – our primary revenue generator – are still low, only a 1.28 percent increase in this category. As a result, truck traffic volumes are projected to remain below the pre-recession volumes of 2007 for a fourth consecutive year in 2011. The report further projects that, based on these projections, we should surpass the minimum 1.30 debt service coverage ratio required under the Commission's Bond Indenture, but the projected ratio is estimated to be only 1.33, a precariously thin margin over what our bond indenture requires. We are going to keep a close eye on this as the year progresses, especially in light of the recent oil price spikes in the wake of the continuing unrest in Libya and other Middle East countries. As you may recall, the last time oil prices spiked to \$100-a-barrel levels in 2008, the result was a precipitous drop in traffic volumes and toll revenues, granted there are differences between the current economic climate and our 2008 experience, but the level of uncertainty in the international oil markets bears watching especially in light of the projected low debt service coverage ratio.

Coinciding with the recent arrival of improving weather, work is ramping up on several of our current capital projects. This includes the Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge Rehabilitation Project where construction crews are getting close to completing the installation of an extensive work platform/containment structure beneath the bridge. They are now making preparations for the installation of new bearings beneath the road deck. This project, which involves repainting of the bridge's steelwork, remains on track for completion in November, also at the I-80 Bridge, work has resumed on the final elements of the Express E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling Project that was initiated last September. A 17-foot shoulder will be added to the three-month-old Express E-ZPass lane once asphalt plants reopen in mid-March for this year's construction season. Farther down the river, work is stepping up on the rehabilitation project at the Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll-Supported Bridge. Painters are expected to complete work on the first span of the three-span bridge later this week, this will enable the contractor to start using double shifts beginning next week. As you may remember, the bridge was shut down to vehicular and pedestrian traffic on January 11, the closure is set to remain in effect for 126 days -- until May 17, the shutdown will reach the halfway point on March 15. The Ides of March is a significant date for another current project, the revised deadline for completion of the District 1 contract for the Scour Remediation and Substructure Repair Project. The bulk of remaining work for this contract is at the Calhoun Street and Lower Trenton bridges, if the weather and river water levels cooperate, this phase of the scour remediation project will reach closure two weeks from tomorrow.

It looks like we can finally put the cold and snowy winter behind us. For the first time since mid-December, there is no foreseeable snow or ice storms in the 10-day forecast. This is good news because this has been one of our most challenging winters ever. To date, costs add up to \$344,336 for employee overtime, salt, equipment repairs and parts. I want to commend our employees for their dedication and perseverance in the face of the many snow and ice storms we encountered this winter, once again, they have managed to keep our record of preventing snowrelated facility closures intact.

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Bonds through a direct Purchase Transaction with a Financial Institution (The "Direct Purchase Transaction" and together with the Credit Facility substitution Transaction, the" Authorized Transactions") which may be structured Generally by means of (I) the addition of a new index mode to the 2007B Bonds in connection with the mandatory Purchase thereof and related Bond document amendments and mode conversion or (II) the refunding of the 2007B Bonds through the issuance of Multi-Modal Refunding Bonds or other obligations to the direct purchaser financial institution including a new index mode, with a customary series designation, in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$139,650,000; authorizing the full or partial termination of any interest rate exchange agreements related to such Series 20007B Bonds in connection with the direct purchase transactions; authorizing financing documents (including amended documents) to be executed in connection with the authorized transactions; and authorizing such further actions and making such determinations as may be necessary or appropriate to effectuate the authorized transactions; and

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION, as follows:

ARTICLE I DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS

- **Section 1.01.** Short Title. This resolution may hereafter be cited by the Commission, and is hereinafter sometimes referred to as, the "*Resolution*" or this "*Resolution*".
- **Section 1.02.** <u>Definitions</u>. The following terms that are used as defined terms herein shall, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, have the meanings set forth below:
- "Authorized Transactions" means a Credit Facility Substitution Transaction and/or a Direct Purchase Transaction.
- "Co-Bond Counsel" or "Bond Counsel" means, collectively, Parker McCay P.A., Marlton, New Jersey, and Dilworth Paxson, LLP, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and either such firm in their individual capacity as Bond Counsel.
- "Commission" means the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission, a body corporate and politic created and existing under and by virtue of the Compact, or, if said Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission shall be abolished, the board, body or commission succeeding to the functions thereof or to whom the powers given by the Compact to the Commission shall be given by law.
- "Commission Officer" means the Chairman, the Vice Chairman, the Secretary-Treasurer, the Executive Director or a Deputy Executive Director of the Commission, the Chief Financial Officer or any other commissioner, officer or employee of the Commission authorized to perform specific acts or duties by a resolution duly adopted by the Commission, a certified copy of which shall be on file with the Trustee.

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"Compact" means the Agreement Between the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania creating the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission as a Body Corporate and Politic and Defining Its Powers and Duties, dated December 19, 1934, between the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as such Agreement has been heretofore or may hereafter be amended and supplemented, which Agreement has heretofore been authorized by certain Acts of the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey and certain Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and heretofore consented to by certain Acts of the Congress of the United States.

"Contracts of Purchase" means each bond purchase contract to be executed by the Commission and a Financial Institution in connection with a Direct Purchase Transaction.

"Counsel" means an attorney who may be counsel for the Commission.

"Credit Facility Substitution Transaction" means a transaction to replace an existing letter of credit supporting the Series 2007B Bonds with a new credit facility provided by a Financial Institution pursuant to the Indenture as authorized pursuant to Article II below.

"Direct Purchase Transaction" means a transaction to convert or refund the Series 2007B Bonds through a direct purchase by a Financial Institution of the applicable obligations under the Indenture to bear interest at an Index Mode as authorized pursuant to Article III below.

"Fiduciary" means the Trustee, a Paying Agent or the Registrar, or any or all of them, as the case may be.

"Financial Institution" means any qualified firm to serve as the provider of a credit facility in connection with a Credit Facility Substitution Transaction and/or any qualified firm that will be the initial purchaser of the Series 2007B Bonds or Refunding Obligations in a Direct Purchase Transaction, as the same may be determined by a Commission Officer in accordance with the appointment provisions set forth in Section 4.01 below.

"Financial Printer" means a qualified firm authorized and appointed by a Commission Officer pursuant hereto to provide services with respect to the printing, electronic and/or physical dissemination of any disclosure document in connection with an Authorized Transaction.

"Supplement" means each Supplemental Trust Indenture relating to one or more Authorized Transactions, to be dated as of a customary date, by and between the Commission and the Trustee.

"Indenture" means the Trust Indenture, dated as of January 1, 2003, by and between the Commission and the Trustee, as amended and supplemented, including by any Supplement, and as it may be further amended and supplemented from time to time.

"Index Mode" has the meaning set forth in Section 3.03 below.

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"Refunding Obligations" mean the Commission's Bridge System Revenue Refunding Bonds, with a customary series designation for one or more series, authorized hereby or other obligations issued in accordance with the Indenture to refund Series 2007B Bonds.

"Series 2007B Bonds" means the Commission's Bridge System Revenue Bonds, Series 2007B, issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$146,650,000, consisting of \$73,325,000 Bridge System Revenue Bonds, Series 2007B-1 and \$73,325,000 Bridge System Revenue Bonds, Series 2007B-2.

"Trustee" means TD Bank, National Association and any other banking institution that may at any time be substituted in its place pursuant to the terms of the Indenture.

Section 1.03. <u>Article and Sections.</u> Articles and Sections mentioned herein by number only are the respective Articles and Sections of this Resolution so numbered.

Section 1.04. Certain Terms. As used in this Resolution, the terms "herein", "hereunder", "hereby", "hereto", "hereof" and any similar terms refer to this Resolution; the term "heretofore" means before the time of adoption of this Resolution; and the term "hereafter" means after the time of adoption of this Resolution.

Section 1.05. Certain Other Words. As used in this Resolution, words importing persons include firms, associations and corporations, and words importing the singular number include the plural number and vice versa.

Section 1.06. Successors and Assigns. Whenever the Commission is named or referred to in this Resolution, such reference shall be deemed to include its successors and assigns, whether so expressed or not. All of the covenants, stipulations, obligations and agreements by or on behalf of, and other provisions for the benefit of, the Commission contained in this Resolution shall bind and inure to the benefit of such successors and assigns, and shall bind and inure to the benefit of any officer, board, commission, agent or instrumentality to whom or to which there shall be transferred by or in accordance with law, or who or which is empowered to exercise or perform, any right, power or duty of the Commission, or of its successors or assigns, the possession of which is necessary or appropriate in order to comply with or perform any of the covenants, stipulations, obligations, agreements or other provisions of this Resolution or to comply with or fulfill any conditions set forth in this Resolution.

Section 1.07. Severability. If any one or more of the provisions, covenants or agreements contained in this Resolution to be performed by the Commission or by any Fiduciary or agent should be contrary to law, then such provision or provisions, covenant or covenants or agreement or agreements shall be deemed separable from the remaining provisions, covenants and agreements and shall in no way affect the validity of the other provisions of this Resolution or of the Authorized Transactions.

Section 1.08. Applicable Law. This Resolution is adopted pursuant to the Compact.

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ARTICLE II AUTHORIZATION OF CREDIT FACILITY SUBSTITUTION TRANSACTION; AUTHORIZATION OF RELATED FINANCING DOCUMENTS

Section 2.01. <u>Authorization of Credit Facility Substitution Transaction.</u> The Commission hereby declares any Credit Facility Substitution Transaction to be an authorized undertaking of the Commission.

Section 2.02. <u>Selection of Financial Institution; Minimum Ratings.</u> Any Financial Institution selected to provide a letter of credit or other facility pursuant to a Credit Facility Substitution Transaction shall (i) be selected in accordance with the provisions set forth in Section 4.01 below, and (ii) have underlying ratings of at least "A-" (S&P), "A3 (Moody's) or "A-" (Fitch).

Section 2.03. <u>Authorization of Related Financing Documents</u>. In addition to the authorizations set forth in Article IV below, the Commission hereby authorizes the Commission Officers, after consultation with the Commission's Financial Advisor and Counsel, to execute and deliver all documents necessary or customary to enable the Commission to accomplish the Credit Facility Substitution Transaction, including, without limitation, any reimbursement agreements, standby bond purchase agreements, pledge agreements, fee agreements or other agreements with a Financial Institution providing enhancement for the Series 2007B Bonds and any amendments or supplements to remarketing agreements.

ARTICLE III

AUTHORIZATION OF DIRECT PURCHASE TRANSACTION; CREATION OF INDEX RATE MODE AND PRIVATE SALE ALTERNATE STRUCTURE, AUTHORIZATION OF RELATED FINANCING DOCUMENTS

Section 3.01. <u>Authorization of Direct Purchase Transaction.</u> The Commission hereby declares any Direct Purchase Transaction to be an authorized undertaking of the Commission.

Section 3.02. <u>Selection of Financial Institution</u>. Any Financial Institution selected to provide financing in a Direct Purchase Transaction shall be selected in accordance with the provisions set forth in Section 4.01 below.

Section 3.03. <u>Authorization of Interest Rate Mode Change to Series 2007B Bonds.</u> The Commission Officers and the Commission's agents are authorized to take such necessary and appropriate actions, including the termination of existing letters of credit and the execution of an amendment to the Indenture (including amendments to supplements thereto), to facilitate the creation of a SIFMA-based index interest rate mode (the "Index Mode") and the conversion of all or a portion of the outstanding Series 2007B Bonds into such Index Mode subject to the following parameters: (i) the initial term for the new mode shall not extend beyond a period of 4 and ½ years; and (ii) the interest rate for the Series 2007B Bonds in the new mode shall not exceed the SIFMA index rate plus 115 basis points. In connection with such conversion the

Commission Officers, in consultation with the Commission's financial advisor and co-bond counsel, among other necessary or appropriate actions, are authorized to (i) prepare and execute and deliver any amendments and supplements to the Indenture in order to implement the Index Mode; (ii) obtain any approvals or consents from the existing letter of credit bank for the Series 2007B Bonds and terminate each related letter of credit; (iii) call the Series 2007B Bonds for mandatory purchase; (iv) negotiate any purchase contracts or similar agreements with one or more Financial Institution with respect to the Series 2007B Bonds; (v) prepare, execute and deliver any related notices and disclosure documents; (vi) prepare, execute and deliver any required documents related to the full or partial termination of any interest rate exchange agreements related to the Series 2007B Bonds; and (vii) prepare, execute and deliver any tax certificates or other tax documents.

Section 3.04. <u>Authorization of Refunding Obligations</u>. As an alternative means of achieving the savings desired by the Commission, the Commission may issue Refunding Obligations to redeem the Series 2007B Bonds and sell such Refunding Obligations to a Financial Institution, as the initial purchaser, in a direct placement, and authorizes the Commission Officers to execute and deliver all documents necessary to enable the Commission to finance the costs of such refunding, including the funding of any necessary reserves and costs of issuance. Any such Refunding Obligations may be structured to be substantially identical to the Series 2007B Bonds but shall also include the Index Mode and be issued initially in the Index Mode subject to the parameters set forth in the preceding Section.

The Commission, subject to the foregoing conditions, hereby authorizes the issuance of Refunding Obligations in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$139,650,000. The Series 2007B Bonds selected for refunding, in the aggregate (and not on a bond-by-bond basis), taking into account the costs or savings attributable to the termination in whole or in part of any interest rate exchange agreements and letters of credit related to the Series 2007B Bonds selected for refunding, shall result, as determined by the Commission's Financial Advisor, on a present value basis, in neutral or positive debt service savings to the Commission. Any Commission Officer, after consultation with the Commission's Financial Advisor, Co-Bond Counsel and Counsel, is hereby authorized to determine that a portion of the Refunding Obligations may be issued on a taxable basis for federal income tax purposes. The terms and details of Refunding Obligations shall be set as provided in the Indenture and a Supplement.

The Refunding Obligations shall mature or be subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption on the dates and in the year(s) and in the amounts as shall be set forth in the Supplement; *provided*, *however*, that the final maturity date of the Refunding Obligations will be no later than the latest maturity date of the Series 2007B Bonds selected for refunding. The Refunding Obligations shall be subject to optional and mandatory sinking fund redemption and tender, as applicable, as provided in the Indenture and in the Supplement; and the Commission Officer executing the same may approve, such approval to be evidenced conclusively by such Commission Officer's execution thereof.

The Refunding Obligations shall be issued in substantially the form to be set forth in the Supplement, with such insertions, omissions or variations as may be necessary or appropriate; shall be dated and bear interest; shall be executed and shall be authenticated as provided in the

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Indenture and in the Supplement. Following execution of the Refunding Obligations, any Commission Officer is hereby authorized to deliver them to the Trustee for authentication and, after authentication, to deliver them to a Financial Institution or its agent against receipt of the purchase price or unpaid balance thereof.

Section 3.05. <u>Appointment of Trustee and Escrow Agent.</u> TD Bank, National Association, is hereby appointed to act as the Trustee for any Refunding Obligations under the Indenture and the Supplement. TD Bank, National Association, is hereby appointed to act as escrow agent, if necessary, in connection with any refunding of the Series 2007B Bonds.

Section 3.06. <u>Authorization of Contracts of Purchase</u>. In connection with any Direct <u>Purchase Transaction</u>, any Commission Officer is hereby authorized to execute and deliver on behalf of the Commission one or more Contracts of Purchase by and between the Commission and a Financial Institution in substantially the forms as shall be approved by a Commission Officer with the advice of the Commission's Financial Advisor, Co-Bond Counsel and the Commission's Counsel (such approval to be evidenced by such Commission Officer's execution thereof), for the purchase of the Series 2007B Bonds or Refunding Obligations at the price or prices to be agreed upon. Copies of any Contract of Purchase as executed shall be filed with the records of the Commission.

Section 3.07. <u>Authorization to Terminate Interest Rate Exchange Agreements</u>. The Commission Officers, subject to the advice of the Commission's Financial Advisor, are authorized to terminate, in full or part, any interest rate exchange agreement related to the Series 2007B Bonds in connection with any refunding or interest rate mode change thereof, including an agreement providing for a future termination (full or partial). This authorization shall not preclude a full termination of each related interest rate exchange agreement in connection with the refunding or interest rate mode change of less than all of the Series 2007B Bonds.

Section 3.08. <u>Authorization of Related Financing Documents</u>. In addition to the authorizations set forth above in this Article III and in Article IV below, the Commission hereby authorizes the Commission Officers, after consultation with the Commission's Financial Advisor and Counsel, to execute and deliver all documents necessary or customary to enable the Commission to accomplish any Direct Purchase Transaction, including, without limitation, any escrow agreements, subscriptions for escrow securities, tax compliance agreements, tax certificates, IRS Form 8038-G, and any arbitrage rebate filings related to the Series 2007B Bonds.

ARTICLE IV GENERALLY APPLICABLE AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Section 4.01. <u>Delegation to Appoint Financial Institutions</u>. The Commission hereby authorizes the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Executive Director of the Commission, after consultation with the Commission's Financial Advisor, to appoint one or more Financial Institutions for the Authorized Transactions, all such appointments to be evidenced by the execution of a certificate or certificates by the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Executive Director.

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Section 4.02. <u>Authorization of Supplements to Indenture</u>. One or more Supplements (a copy of each of which shall be filed with the records of the Commission) is hereby authorized in connection with the Authorized Transactions. Any Commission Officer is hereby authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver, and any other Commission Officer is hereby authorized and directed to affix and attest the seal of the Commission to, each such Supplement in substantially such form, with such insertions and changes therein and any supplements thereto as Co-Bond Counsel and the Commission's Counsel may advise and the Commission Officer executing the same may approve, such approval to be evidenced conclusively by such Commission Officer's execution thereof.

Section 4.03. <u>Authorization of Disclosure Documents, Supplements and Notices.</u> Any offering or disclosure document or supplement, notice of mandatory purchase, redemption or other secondary market notice contemplated by the Indenture, market custom or the securities law in connection with the Authorized Transactions (a copy of which shall be filed with the records of the Commission) is hereby authorized in substantially such form, with such insertions, deletions and changes therein as the Commission's Financial Advisor, Co-Bond Counsel and the Commission's Counsel may advise and a Commission Officer executing the same may approve, such approval to be evidenced conclusively by such Commission Officer's execution thereof which is hereby authorized. Without limitation, the foregoing authorizations shall extend to authorizing any Commission Officer to take actions or make undertakings as may be necessary under Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission in connection with the Authorized Transactions. Any Commission Officer is hereby authorized to approve the contents and the form of the foregoing disclosure or notice documents with respect to the Authorized Transactions.

Any Commission Officer is hereby authorized to solicit proposals for, and to engage the services of, a qualified financial printing firm with respect to the printing, electronic posting, and electronic and/or physical dissemination of any disclosure documents related to the Authorized Transactions.

- Section 4.04. <u>Appointment of Financial Advisor.</u> NW Financial Group, LLC, Jersey City, New Jersey, is hereby appointed to act as Financial Advisor to the Commission in connection with the Authorized Transactions and all matters related thereto.
- Section 4.05. <u>Appointment of Co-Bond Counsel</u>. Parker McCay P.A., Marlton, New Jersey, and Dilworth Paxson LLP, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, are hereby appointed to act as Co-Bond Counsel to the Commission in connection with the Authorized Transactions and all matters related thereto.
- **Section 4.06.** Ratification and Prior Actions. All actions heretofore taken and all documents and instruments heretofore prepared or executed by or on behalf of the Commission in connection with the Authorized Transactions and any matters related thereto are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Section 4.07. <u>Authorized Act of Officers</u>. The Chairman, the Vice Chairman, the Executive Director, the Chief Financial Officer, the Treasurer and the Secretary of the Commission are, and each of them hereby is, to the full extent permitted in accordance with the Commission's by-laws, authorized and directed to do and perform all things, to execute all certificates, documents, contracts, forms and instruments in the name of the Commission and to make all payments necessary or, in their opinion, convenient so that the Commission may carry out its obligations under the particular Authorized Transaction(s) determined to be implemented pursuant to the delegations set forth in this Resolution.

Section 4.08. Filing. A copy of this Resolution shall be filed for public inspection in the office of the Commission.

Section 4.09. Repeals. All resolutions and parts of resolutions, to the extent the same are inconsistent herewith, are hereby rescinded and repealed.

Section 4.10. Effective Date. This Resolution shall be effective immediately.

# DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of February 28, 2011 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (January, 2011)

**Summary:** The Commission experienced a decrease in total toll revenue for January 2011 in comparison to the January 2010 traffic and revenue statistics. In addition, total toll traffic also reflected a decrease for the first month of the year. It should be noted that two snow/ice events during January contributed to the decrease in toll traffic for the month.

# Analysis of January 2011/January 2010 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue decrease of 1.11 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 0.80 percent decrease.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 1.93 percent decrease.

# Analysis of January 2011/January 2010 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic decreased by 103,654 vehicles, or 3.65 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 819 vehicles, or 0.23 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic decreased by 104,473 vehicles, or 4.19 percent.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for January 2011 decreased by 236,593 vehicles, or 9.61 percent as compared to January 2010.

# **Traffic analysis for 2011 YTD:**

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for January 2011 was 88,337 total vehicles as compared to 91,680 total vehicles in January 2010, a decrease of 3.65 percent.
- Average daily traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for January 2011 was 71,762 vehicles as compared to 79,394 vehicles for January 2010, a decrease of 7,632 vehicles.

### District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for January 2011 reflected a 1.90 percent increase as the result of increases of 10,087 cars and 494 trucks when compared to January 2010. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 9,638 cars and an increase of 185 trucks combined to generate an overall decrease in total toll traffic of 6.62 percent for January 2011 as compared to January 2010.

### District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an overall increase of 6.95 percent in total toll traffic for the month of January 2011 compared to January 2010 as the result of combined increases of 37,968 cars and 10,806 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, decreases of 80,268 passenger vehicles and 9,208 trucks combined to generate a 16.98 percent decrease in total toll traffic for January 2011.

# **District III**

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced an 11.59 percent increase in total toll traffic during January 2011 as a result of increases of 10,874 automobiles and 218 trucks compared to January 2010. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, the decreases of 67,848 passenger vehicles and 1,970 trucks generated an overall 9.57 percent decrease in total toll traffic for January 2011 as compared to January 2010. It should be noted that DWG's *E-ZPass* ORT lane opened on November 20, 2010. At Milford-Montague (MM), a decrease of 5,648 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 294 trucks to produce a 6.05 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of January 2011.

### **<u>E-ZPass</u>** Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of January, 2011 and January, 2010, and the year-to-date periods ending January 31, 2011 and January 31, 2010.

### STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

There follows reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of January 2011, the first month of operations of fiscal year 2011 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$3,513,937 for the month. This expense represents 77.0% of the 2011 year-to-date operating budget or 7.4% of the full 2011 operating budget. All line items were at or below their year-to-date operating budget except Overtime expense which was \$47,000 over budget. Due to the significant number of snow events, overtime for plowing was much higher than anticipated in the operating budget. This line item is expected to come back in line with budget during the operating year.

There were a number of heavy snow events during the month that resulted in traffic disruption, higher overtime expense and higher use of operating supplies.

### • COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Archaeological Dig on New Jersey Side of Scudder Falls Bridge: Worked with AECOM Design Management Consultant staff and Scudder Falls project team in providing accurate information and site access for archaeological excavation near I-95 off-ramp for Route 29 in vicinity of the Scudder Falls Bridge. The archaeological dig is part of the cultural resources mitigation work associated with the Environmental Assessment for the proposed I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. News coverage arose as a result of an inquiry made by *The Times* of Trenton. The resulting article in the paper was subsequently distributed by Associated Press to other newspapers in the region, including the Philadelphia Inquirer. One blogger called the Commission "enlightened" for its rehabilitation and preservation efforts.

Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll Supported Bridge Rehabilitation Project: Issued a series of communications to raise public awareness of the four-month Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll Supported Bridge shutdown that began January 11. Advanced publicity on radio stations, in local newspapers and on various websites helped to mitigate traffic issue and potential public backlash.

During the month of January, 2011 the Director of Policy and Planning participated in a number of communications and meetings that explored the following:

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee viewed and heard a presentation by Gerald Fry, Senior Associate, Johnson, Mirmiran, & Thompson Engineering, and Jon Wichner, Principal, Traffic Planning & Design, Inc., representing the Keystone Funding Coalition whose interest is multimodal transportation funding. #### ELECTRONIC TOLL COLLECTION PROGRAM MONTH OF JANUARY 2011

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

- 1. Participated in weekly CSC/VPC Operations Calls and Monthly In-Lane Toll System progress meetings.
- 2. We have developed a plan to contact the top violators that are ready to be sent to collections. This includes the Commission's in-house customer service representatives contacting the violator and providing an opportunity for them to pay the violations. If not, they will be turned over to a collection agency.
- 3. Commission Staff is coordinating with ACS for the In-Lane Toll Contract to add functionality to the existing electronic toll collection system. The existing electronic toll collection system maintains up to 90 days of transaction data, as designed and implemented in 2002. There is now a need to maintain up to 18 months of data locally (Morrisville Administration Building) to support the annual audit review.
- 4. The 2011 Capital Budget includes \$1.978M for the replacement of the existing Lane Controllers and Treadles (9 years old) at all conventional toll lanes. We have a proposal from ACS for the Lane Controllers and would like to meet with them to discuss feasibility, how this impacts lane peripherals, etc. Should we find the approach acceptable, then we will begin moving forward with these replacements.
- 5. The Violation Processing System charges assessed in January 2011 were lower than normal. The Finance Department is working with ETC to determine if this is an anomaly or a new trend.
- 6. Aon approved the insurance certificate and we issued the agreement for the Review of the Commission's Toll Revenue Reporting Processes (C-587A) to Clifton Gunderson LLP, Inc. of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania for execution.
- 7. Participated in the January 2011 E-ZPass Interagency Group Policy Committee Meeting. Also participated in the Strategic Plan Outline development meeting and conference call.

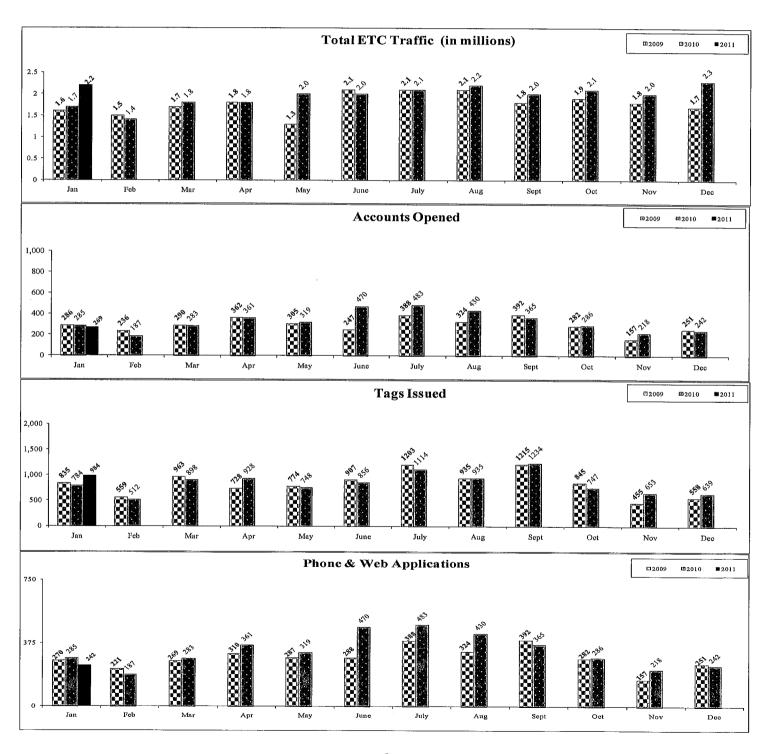

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving Electronic Security and Surveillance:

#### Radio System

- On January 6, 2011, ESS personnel responded to a motor vehicle accident at the Scudder Falls Toll Supported Bridge involving a Commission vehicle. Radio interoperability was established with NJDOT for traffic control.
- On January 27, 2011, ESS personnel acquired permission from the Monroe County, PA Department of Public Safety to place radio equipment on the Foxtown Hill Communications Tower located at the Delaware Water Gap. To enable radio communications, a T-1 line is needed and Service Electric has volunteered to supply the T-1 line free of charge. ESS personnel will continue to pursue the installation and activation of the radio equipment on the tower. Once activated, the tower will vastly improve radio communications in and around the Delaware Water Gap.
- ESS arranged for various radio installations throughout the Commission.
- ESS personnel investigated various other DRJTBC radio issues both during, and after normal working hours.

#### Access Control System

- On January 20, 2011, ESS personnel arranged a meeting with District II Maintenance personnel and MEC for the installation of an intercom and camera system affiliated with the main entrance at the Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge Facility. The system will enable the secretary to view and speak with visitors prior to allowing them ingress. On January 31, 2011, the same meeting was arranged for an intercom and camera system at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Facility.
- During the month of January 2011, ESS personnel completed updating and modifying the Access Control System door maps so they can be utilized as evacuation plans at each toll bridge facility.
- ESS personnel created ID badges for new employees, and consultants. The ACS database was audited to purge the system of invalid employee and contractor cards. Various other employee ACS rights were updated and/or changed at the

request of supervisors and upon the approval of the Deputy Executive Director of Operations.

• Various door alarms and ACS issues were addressed both during, and after normal working hours.

#### **ESS**

- On January 10, 2011, ESS personnel met regarding MEC's performance of the ESS maintenance.
- On January 17, 2011, (Holiday) ESS personnel prepared a report for the Chief Engineer regarding various operational issues associated with the ESS Primary Control Center. The report contained information concerning ESS final acceptance and settlement negotiations with MEC.
- On January 25, 2011, ESS personnel met with members of DVTEL's research and development team to discuss various operational issues surrounding the ESS Primary Control Center. Additionally, on this date ESS Personnel met with representatives from FluidMesh, to discuss the performance of the I-78 wireless camera system.
- After much negotiation during the month of January, the Commission and MEC have reached a settlement agreement regarding the acquisition and installation portion of the ESS Contract. Currently, the Commission is prepared to grant MEC final acceptance of the ESS system.
- Throughout the month of January, ESS personnel have worked with MEC, Engineering, and various consultants regarding the removal of the ESS equipment from the Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll Supported Bridge to facilitate the rehabilitation project.
- ESS personnel continue to work with MEC, Engineering, and various consultants regarding the replacement of the two traffic cameras and two pedestrian walkway cameras at the Calhoun Street Toll Supported Bridge. Installation of the replacement cameras commenced the week of January 24 and is pending completion.
- On January 31, 2011, ESS personnel met with MEC to discuss the ESS maintenance program and outstanding issues.

- ESS personnel reviewed and purged the ESS video storage database that contains copies of duplicated videos requested by outside agencies.

- The ESS Primary Control Center continues to operate 24/7 and detected, documented, and assisted the District bridges with various traffic and security related incidents.
- ESS Personnel researched and investigated 86 video requests during 2010. The requests were made primarily by law enforcement agencies and Commission personnel. Various crimes and incidents were depicted on the videos, including vehicles used in homicides. The following seven video requests were researched and investigated during the month of January 2011:
  - 1. On 1/4/11, the Solebury Township, PA Police Department requested a video search from the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge regarding a criminal investigation.
  - 2. On 1/6/11, for training purposes, Director J. P. Stettner requested a video of a SWAT operation captured on the Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge cameras. Commission personnel were involved in traffic control during the incident.
  - 3. On 1/13/11, Morrisville, PA Police Department requested a video search from the Calhoun Street Toll Supported Bridge regarding a criminal investigation
  - 4. On 1/16/11, the PA State Police requested a video search from the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Facility regarding a criminal investigation.
  - 5. On 1/21/11, the Trenton, NJ Police Department requested a video search from the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Facility regarding a homicide investigation.
  - 6. On 1/25/11, the PA State Police requested a video search from the Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Facility regarding a criminal investigation.

- On January 13, 2011, ESS personnel arranged for a working review of the security and fire alarm systems at the I-78 Toll Bridge Facility. Thereafter, both systems were placed back in operation without trouble.
- During the month of January, ESS personnel received a request from NJDOT to supply them with a list of snow emergency personnel and telephone numbers.
- ESS personnel prepared the ESS Monitor's daily work schedule for the year of 2011.

## PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

#### STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Environmental Assessment (EA)/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation for the project was circulated for public comment on 12/9/09 and was made available for public review on the Commission's project website and at a number of publicized locations. Public comments were accepted until 2/4/2010, the end of the requisite public comment period.

In conjunction with the EA review process, a Public Hearing was conducted in compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Act of 1970, and Section 128 Title 23 of the United States Code, Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as well as New Jersey Department of Transportation policies and procedures. The design consultant AECOM, with HNTB as their Environmental Team Sub-consultant, has prepared responses to the comments received during the public comment period, which have been reviewed by the Commission. To initiate the process of requesting a NEPA Decision (FONSI) from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), these responses have been submitted to PennDOT, NJDOT, and FHWA for review.

At a meeting held with FHWA and PennDOT representatives on June 11, 2010 the Commission was informed that tolling will have to be made part of the proposed action for the project and the impacts from tolling the bridge will have to be addressed as part of the current EA process. The FHWA will not issue a NEPA decision (FONSI) for the project until the impacts from tolling have been assessed. A subsequent meeting/conference call on August 25, 2010 with FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT representatives confirmed that an addendum to the current EA document will have to be prepared to address the tolling impacts to the project, and make tolling of the SFB part of the proposed action for the project. The re-evaluation of the EA and the addendum thereto, has been prepared by AECOM under the C-502A I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project DMC Services contract, Task Order Assignment C-502A-2C.

The EA/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation Document was also distributed to each of the involved transportation agencies (FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT) and the Cooperating Agencies (US Army Corps of Engineers, US EPA, PA DEP and the National Marine Fisheries Service) for their review. The Section 4(f) Evaluation, which is part of the EA, was forwarded by FHWA to their Washington D.C. Office for the Conditional Legal Sufficiency Review. This review has been completed by FHWA, and the request for the final executed Programmatic Agreement has been made by FHWA to issue Legal Sufficiency. The EA/Draft 4(f) Document will now need to address all comments received from the review agencies and to reflect tolling of the SFB as part of the proposed action. The final EA/4(f) Document will then be submitted to FHWA's Washington D.C. Office along with a fully executed copy of the Programmatic Agreement for a final Legal Sufficiency review.

#### Meeting of February 28, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Both NJ and PA State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) have issued determinations of effects for project effects on historic and archaeological resources. A **Programmatic Agreement** to stipulate future actions required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act has been executed for this project. This document identifies the mitigation measures to be taken as a result of the finding of Adverse Effect to the Delaware & Raritan Canal cultural resource in NJ; and potential for adverse effect to archaeological resources in PA and NJ. These mitigation measures have been coordinated, and agreed upon by, the environmental regulatory agencies and transportation agencies on the project.

The PA has been fully executed with the receipt of FHWA's signature on January 6, 2011. The PA bears executing signatures from FHWA, New Jersey Historic Preservation Officer, and Pennsylvania Historic Preservation Officer; and concurring signatures from the Commission, NJDOT, and PennDOT. The PA will now be incorporated into the Final Section 4(f) Evaluation Document for final Legal Sufficiency review by FHWA.

The FHWA recommended additional consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) on the EA. Accordingly, a **Biological Assessment Report** (BA) was prepared for threatened and endangered (T&E) species impacts and was submitted to the NMFS in September 2008. On June 11, 2010 the Commission received the final Biological Opinion from NMFS, which includes a determination of 'No Jeopardy' from NMFS. This completes Section 7 consultation.

## FINANCIAL/LEGAL ADVISORY SERVICES FOR A P3 FOR SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

#### STUDY Contract No. C-393G-1R

At the Commission's special meeting on August 17, 2010 the Commission announced the issuance of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Financial/Legal Advisory Services for a P3 for Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge project. This RFP was posted on the Commissions web site on August 20, 2010.

On August 27, 2010 a Non-mandatory Pre-proposal conference call with interested financial/legal firms was held at the Commission's New Hope Facility. Twenty-two (22) firms participated in the conference call. An additional 38 firms listened to a digital replay of the conference call which was available through September 3, 2010.

And, should it make a "GO" decision its recommendation as to form of a P3 which is most feasible from an economic/legal perspective. The revised proposals are currently under review.

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2C

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 Meeting authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the *Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project*. This Statement of Intent, amongst other things, included the development of a strategy to implement All Electronic Cashless tolling (AECT) on the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

AECOM received a Limited Notice-to-Proceed letter was issued on May 14, 2010 effective April 26, 2010. The Limited NTP allowed work on the following tasks;

- Establishing a timeline for tolling implementation;
- Preparation of tolling applications and/or agreements with FHWA;
- Commencing the Toll/Traffic Diversion Study;
- Preparation of the RFLOI for the Traffic and Revenue Study.

On July 26, 2010 the Commission's New Jersey Counsel, Florio Perrucci Steinhardt & Fader, L.L.C. and Pennsylvania Counsel, Fox Rothschild LLP, after review of the Commission's Compact, each provided a favorable opinion as to the Commission's authority to toll the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge. These letters of opinion from each counsel were sent to FHWA. FHWA provided a response to these letters on January 26, 2011. FHWA concurs that the Commission has the authority to toll the bridge, but a Tolling Agreement will be required. FHWA's response was forwarded to the Commission's Pennsylvania and New Jersey Counsel offices for review. AECOM will commence with the preparation of the draft Tolling Agreement in parallel with the efforts required to obtain the NEPA decision (FONSI) from FHWA.

In June 2010 FHWA directed that tolling will have to be made part of the proposed action for the project, and the impacts from tolling the bridge will have to be addressed as part of the current Environmental Assessment (EA) process. The FHWA will not issue a NEPA decision (FONSI) for the project until the impacts from tolling have been assessed. The inclusion of tolling into the proposed action requires reassessing the EA, the Section 4(f) Evaluation, and the Project Point-of-Access (POA) Study. This re-assessment will result in an addendum to the EA, which must meet the approval of the transportation agencies - FHWA, PennDOT, and NJDOT, and the cooperating agencies – USEPA, USACE, NMFS, and PADEP.

### Meeting of February 28, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

As the initial step in re-assessing the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project EA a Traffic Diversion Study was prepared by the AECOM team. The final draft of this report was submitted on August 25, 2010. AECOM briefed the Commissioners at the September 2010 Commission Committee Meeting as to the findings of the study. On December 10, 2010 the Scudder Falls Bridge Final Traffic Diversion Study, dated September 8, 2010 was sent out to the transportation agencies reviewing the EA Addendum. Subsequent to the submittal of the Traffic Diversion Study, the following documents were submitted to the transportation agencies on the noted date, for review:

• EA Addendum

January 7, 2011

• Final Section 4(f) Evaluation January 7, 2011

• POA Study Addendum

January 27, 2011

On January 31, 2011 Commission and AECOM staff met with the transportation agencies FHWA, PennDOT, and NJDOT to 1) discuss comments from each agency to the EA Addendum, Section 4(f) Evaluation, and Traffic Diversion Study; and 2) Review the schedule for obtaining the NEPA decision (FONSI) on the environmental documentation. Details of the schedule were discussed, and input from the agencies received. The target date for receipt of the FONSI remains at August 4, 2011. Comment responses to Agency review comments on the POA study will be prepared upon receipt of comments.

AECOM completed their effort associated with the Level 3 Traffic and Revenue Study consultant procurement activities in January 2011.

### DMC ADVANCED ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR PRIORITY ITEMS OF WORK

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2D

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 meeting authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the *Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project*. This Statement of Intent, amongst other things, included the advancement of schedule-critical engineering/permitting activities to meet the objectives outlined in the Statement of Intent.

This TOA was fully executed by the Commission on July 1, 2010 and includes the necessary professional services to complete certain priority items of work that are critical to the overall schedule of the project. These priority tasks include environmental permitting; right-of-way (ROW) acquisition; archeological work necessary to obtain cultural resource clearance for the project; Stormwater Management design and permit plan preparation; and transition of key public involvement tasks from the Environmental Assessment Phase (Commission Contract C-393A) to the Design Management Consultant (DMC Contract C-502A).

In addition, this TOA includes DMC Services to support the Commission's two-step Professional Services procurement process. This process includes the preparation of a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) document and a Request for Proposal (RFP) document for Final Design and Construction Services for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project using the traditional design bid build method of project delivery. A Draft RFQ has been prepared and is ready if/when needed. AECOM continues preparing the draft RFP, and developing the project work scope with Commission staff.

Permit Pre-application Meetings have been held with the Pennsylvania DEP, USACE, NJDEP, the D&R Canal Commission, NJDEP Green Acres, the Bucks County Soil Conservation District, and the Delaware River Basin Commission, to date. A review meeting was also held with Lower Makefield Township to discuss their stormwater design requirements. Requirements of these entities will be addressed in the development of the Permit Plans, which will be submitted back to them for review and approval. AECOM submitted is preparing the DRAFT 'Pre-Application for Parkland Diversion', which includes Commission review comments. This document will ultimately be submitted to NJDEP – Green Acres Program as a result of project impacts to NJ State Park Lands for review and approval.

Field work for property surveys associated with impacted properties has been completed. Impacts to properties are being refined, along with the progression of the roadway design, and will be reflected in right-of-way plans. AECOM has prepared information outlining protocols for the right-of-way taking process. These documents are based upon the PennDOT and NJDOT processes for each respective state, and are being submitted to Commission counsel for review.

### Meeting of February 28, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The Phase III data recovery for the NJ site began in early October, and the field work was completed in January. AECOM is performing data analysis and documentation on the findings at this time. Phase III data recovery work for the Pennsylvania site requires a permit from the Bucks County Soil Conservation District, due to the amount of excavation and soil storage that will be performed on site. AECOM prepared the permit application for submittal in February.

Work continues on the storm water design. Supplemental field survey work for natural drainage features to support the storm water drainage design and permit plan preparation has been completed. In mid-December the AECOM team received bids for drilling and testing services for the sub-surface exploration. This 'Boring Program' consists of test pits and geotechnical borings to obtain sub-surface data necessary to support the storm water management design. A NTP was issued to Converse Consultants for this work that will be managed by KSE, a sub-consultant to AECOM. Converse cannot start work until highway occupancy permits (HOPs) are received from PennDOT and NJDOT. AECOM has prepared responses and revised plans in response to comments from the DOT's on their respective applications submitted in December 2010. The revised documents were submitted in January to the DOT's. The anticipated response from the DOT's will be issuance of the HOP from each state.

AECOM continues to perform Public Involvement activities, which consist of responding to questions from the public on the project Hot Line.

### STAFF AUGMENTATION – P3 SUPPORT SERVICES

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2E

AECOM was issued Notice to Proceed on the Task Order Agreement (TOA) on November 16, 2010. Under this TOA, AECOM will be providing professional services, in a staff augmentation format, to support the administration of the upcoming P3 Financial/Legal Advisory Services contract C-393G-1R. Startup of AECOMs services is on hold pending award of the C-393G-1R contract.

This Task is for an independent review of the Commission's current General Provisions based on the 2003 version of PennDOT's Publication 408. Update the Commission's General Provisions to incorporate the changes in the 2011 initial version (effective April 1, 2011) of PennDOT's Publication 408. This task also includes an independent review and recommendations for improvement to the Commission's current scheduling specification as written in current construction projects.

On December 20, 2010 the Commission held a kick-off meeting with Hill & Urban to discuss the subject assignment. Existing general provisions and scheduling specifications are currently being reviewed. Meetings to discuss proposed changes are anticipated with Commission Staff and Counsel in February and March 2011.

### General

During the month of January the Commissioners approved the requests changes of scope of work for one municipality in Pennsylvania and two in New Jersey. In Delaware Water Gap, Pennsylvania the Commissioners approved a resolution to change a previously awarded traffic signal installation on Route 611 in the Borough to repaving six local roads within the Borough. In New Jersey, the Commissioners approved the change of scope of work from the previously awarded construction of Village Green Park project to a new project of resurfacing Bridge Street, South Harrison Street and pedestrian improvements in the Borough of Frenchtown. Lastly, the Commissioners approved a resolution for the Town of Phillipsburg to expand the scope of work for South Main Street Phase III to include the Sitgreaves Street and Jersey Street to complete the triangular loop around Shappell Park in the business district of South Main Street Phillipsburg. No additional fund was awarded to the above municipalities with these resolutions.

The CAI department continues processing grantees reimbursement requests, and monitoring the status of the projects under construction, as well as reviewing plans, change orders and contract agreements specifications, and managing CAI projects coordination with the municipalities and other stake holders of the CAI program.

### Pennsylvania

- 1. **Milford Borough, PA** In December 2010 the Borough awarded the construction contact for the *Storm Water Restoration Project* to Leeward Construction in the amount of \$127,725.00. The Borough is currently in the process of executing the construction contract with Leeward and it is anticipated that the notice to proceed will be issued during the month of February. However, due to the closing of the asphalt plants, the Borough has indicated that the contractor will not proceed with construction until there are warmer weather conditions for the asphalt work to be completed. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed by late Spring 2011.
- 2. **Smithfield Township, PA** The Township continues to make progress on completing the plans and specifications for the *Intermunicipal Trail Project* in order to obtain the necessary permits from the County Conservation District, the Pennsylvania Historical Museum Commission (PHMC) and the PA Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) to complete the project. Due to the blanket extension that was granted for the CAI projects, the Township's extension request was approved. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed in the Spring of 2011.

The Township has indicated that the construction of the original *Pedestrian Improvements Project* is complete and a final inspection has been completed by PennDOT. However, written documentation from PennDOT indicating that they have accepted the modified work is still forthcoming from the Township.

3. **Delaware Water Gap Borough, PA** – The Borough's application to revise the scope of the traffic signal grant to include the repaving of six (6) streets within the Borough was approved at the January 2011 Commissioners meeting. The streets that were repaved included Waring Drive,

Oak Street, Parkway Drive, Croasdale Drive, Walnut Lane and Shepard Avenue. The project was completed in December 2010 by Bracalente Construction, Inc. for a total construction cost of \$115,831.60.

The Borough has indicated that the *Broad Street Sidewalk Improvements Project* is complete, but closeout of the Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) by PennDOT still remains to be completed. As previously mentioned, the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project* was completed in August 2009.

- 4. **Portland Borough, PA** The Borough submitted a revised application, in the amount of \$153,782.66 for *Streetscape Improvements on State Street and Delaware Avenue*, in the hope that the project will be reconsidered by the Commissioners for funding. The revised application is a scaled-down version of their original application, which was submitted in the amount of \$515,701.40. The revised application meets the CAI criteria, but has not been awarded to date. The two other CAI funded projects have been completed. Closeout of the *Park & Walk* grant is currently in process by the CAI department.
- 5. **Lower Mount Bethel, PA** The *Park & Ride Trail Project* is substantially complete. However, due to the closing of the asphalt plants, the Township has indicated that the final paving work for the project will be completed in the Spring when there are warmer weather conditions. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in early Spring 2011.
- 6. **Easton, PA** In January the City of Easton submitted a letter requesting an expansion of work for four additional decorative streetlight fixtures for roughly \$58,000 of funds unspent from its current North 3rd Street Corridor Improvements project. On January 10, 2011 the City held a preconstruction meeting for the Street Corridor Improvements Project. Coordination of the scope of this project was discussed with the City, the contractor and Med Ed. The project was schedule to start during the third week of January weather permitted, however, due to the inclement weather conditions, the start of the project has been postponed pending better weather. This project includes replacement of street lights and associated work on Bushkill Street from Larry Holmes Drive to 4th Street, N. Third Street from Church Street to College Avenue, and all of College Avenue. This is part of the CAI downtown Streetscape Project which involves sidewalk, curb and ADA ramp installations.

The Larry Holmes Drive Streetscape Improvement, which extended improvements to the 3rd Street intersection, and the Decorative Streetlight Improvement Project, and involves replacing existing streetlights in the downtown area, rebuilding Riverside Park and Scott Park, a "road diet" for Larry Holmes Drive, high visibility pedestrian crosswalks, intersection improvements at Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive to improve pedestrian accommodation These projects are substantially completed and just have some punchlist items that will be addressed as weather permits.

The construction contracts of the ADA Curb Ramps and Decorative Crosswalks, which are part of the *Pedestrian Pathways/Intersection Enhancements and Northampton St. Bridge Bike Path* grant, were completed in September 2009. The City also purchased and installed the materials for the Bike Path Extension. The curbs and sidewalks abutting the Northampton Street Bridge have been reconstructed and new lighting poles in the Scott Park area of the project was completed.

7. **Williams Township, PA** – The *I-78 & Morgan Hill Road Interchange Traffic Signalization Project* was completed in January 2010. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township. The Township is currently in the process of preparing their final reimbursement request submission to the CAI department for the project.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted six (6) applications that were discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but have not been awarded to date. We would also note that it was previously determined that the Belmont Street Reconstruction and the Hilton Street Improvements projects did not satisfy the required characteristics of the CAI program as they could not be completed by the December 31, 2010 deadline; however, since an extension has been granted, these projects can be reevaluated.

- 8. **Riegelsville Borough, PA** During the month of January, the contractor for the *Delaware Canal Footbridge Lighting Project*, Yates Electrical Service, continued construction on the project. It is currently anticipated that project construction will be completed in March 2011.
- 9. **Solebury Township, PA** The construction of the *Walton Drive Bridge Replacement Project* is complete. As previously discussed, project construction included the alternate #2 paving work, which was a change of scope approved at the September 2010 Commissioners meeting, to repave the entire length of Walton Drive. The Township's engineer has indicated that there have been several construction change orders on the project. Back-up documentation for the change orders has recently been received and is currently under review by the CAI department to determine if the change orders are eligible for reimbursement under the grant.

Construction of the *Route 202 Trail and Park* project began on August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and was completed in September 2009. To date, \$1,485,432.04 of \$1,755,150.00 has been reimbursed by the CAI Department (85%).

10. **New Hope Borough, PA** – The Borough has purchased the lighting fixtures and poles through the COSTARS program for the *Main St. Bridge Lighting Project*. The contractor for the installation of the lighting fixtures, Armour & Sons Electric, continues to work on the project. It is currently anticipated that the project construction will be completed in March 2011.

The construction of the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals Project* by Armour & Sons Electric is substantially complete. However, the construction of the ADA compliant pedestrian facilities

required by PennDOT still remains to be completed. The Borough has indicated that construction of the ADA ramps will begin once final approval of the ramp designs has been received by

PennDOT. To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$412,798.75 of \$446,404.00 (92% of total grant amount).

11. **Falls Township, PA** – The original traffic signal installation and modernization project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted another application for the *Tyburn Road & New Falls Road Traffic Signal Upgrade Project*, in the amount of \$108,140.00. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but has not been awarded to date.

12. **Upper Makefield Township, PA** – The Township continues to make progress on preparing the bid package required to complete *Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 Project*. It is currently anticipated that the project will be advertised for bids this month and be completed in March 2011.

The Washington Crossing Gateway Project was completed in the Spring of 2010. To date the Township has been reimbursed \$1,447,000.00 of \$1,447,000.00 (100% of total grant amount).

13. **Lower Makefield, PA** – The *Black Rock Pedestrian Trail Project* is substantially complete. The contractor, S&H Landscaping, will complete the remaining contract items when there are warmer weather conditions in early Spring 2011. The Township's engineer has indicated that there have been several change orders on the project. The CAI department is currently reviewing the change orders to determine if they are eligible for reimbursement under the grant.

The Traffic Signal project at the intersection of Yardley-Newtown Rd & Creamery Rd is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission and the original grant is closed out.

14. **Bristol Borough, PA** – The construction of the *Traffic Signals Revitalization Project* was completed by Armour & Sons Electric in July 2009 and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$1,333,843.28 of \$1,334,450.00 grant (99.9% of total grant amount).

In the Spring of 2010, the Borough submitted another application for the *Decorative Crosswalks Project*, in the amount of \$423,126.12. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but has not been awarded to date.

15. **Yardley, PA** – The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough for its *Yardley Borough Road Improvements Project* and the project has been closed out.

The Borough of Yardley in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization submitted an application to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, and Morrisville Borough in the amount of \$872,969.00. This application has been discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but was not awarded.

16. **Morrisville, PA** – The construction work in Morrisville Municipal Authority CAI project on the Moreau Street Rehabilitation project is progressing well in spite of inclement weather. Recently, the MMA representatives have indicated that the project is under budget by nearly \$70,000 and requested an extension of work to install 8" water main in Bank Street, which adjoins Moreau Street.

The Bridge Street Curb and Sidewalk replacement project is still completing its engineering design work. However, the four originally funded projects in Morrisville are completed. The additional street lighting project that was granted last year for a remaining amount of \$31,896 is still under construction.

### New Jersey

- 1. **Montague, NJ** The relocation of the emergency heliport from the Park & Ride location has been completed. The construction of the Park & Ride was to begin the week of October 25 and is scheduled to be completed by the end of November 2010. The projects have been completed and only a few punchlist items are pending.
- 2. **Knowlton, NJ** The Township is proud to announce that The Paulinskill Trail extension has been completed! The underpass is a wonderful addition to the community. Hikers and bikers from New Jersey and Pennsylvania will now be able to link the Paulinskill Trail to the Columbia/Portland pedestrian bridge and enjoy the beautiful scenery along the Delaware and Paulinskill Rivers.
- 3. **Belvidere**, **NJ** The Water Street Improvements project was completed and closed out in May of 2010. In May the final reimbursement request has been processed and the project is in the process of being closed out.
- 4. **Phillipsburg, NJ** During the January 2011 meeting the Commissioners approved the expansion of the South Main Street Improvements project Phase III. This phase is still completing its final plans. The second phase of South Main Street Improvements project started construction in May. The sidewalk, road reconstruction, and lighting part of the project was completed, only pending part of this job are the trees planting and few punch list items. This

project was awarded a grant for \$997,962 at the Commissioners' February meeting. The CAI department continues to process the reimbursement requests for this project.

The original, Phase I project, was completed and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008.

- 5. **Pohatcong NJ** A new application was received by the CAI Department for *Resurfacing of River Road*. This application was presented to the Commissioners at their February 2010 meeting. This request was not awarded. The two granted projects to Pohatcong Township have been completed.
- 6. **Holland, NJ** Holland was awarded a CAI grant for the resurfacing of Mt. Joy Road and has requested an extension for the work to be completed by the spring of 2011. The Township is ready to advertise the project in February.

Holland completed and was fully paid for its previous CAI project. This project is in the process of being closed out.

7. **Milford, NJ** –The Borough was awarded a grant for the repair and resurfacing of Honeysuckle Lane off Bridge Street. Van Cleef Engineering Associates, the Borough's engineer, completed the final designs and send it out to bids. The bids came in lower than anticipated by the engineers. The municipality has requested an extension until the Spring 2011 to complete this project.

The Bridge Street Improvements project is complete.

8. **Frenchtown, NJ** – In January, the commissioners approved a resolution to change the original scope of work of the grant from the construction of Green Village Park to improvements of three roadways in the Borough. The new project includes resurfacing and pedestrian improvements of Bridge St., Race St. and South Harrison Street.

The Park and Ride project is complete.

9. **Lambertville, NJ** – The CAI department is working with members of the City's staff to gather the needed information to close out several completed projects, such as the *Swan Street Traffic Signal, Quarry Street, Ferry Street, Kline's Court, Jefferson Street, Blair Tract* and *Mount Hope Street*.

In November the CAI department also received a City's request for \$12,000 to complete a preliminary design of the South Franklin Street Drainage project. The City indicated that, if approved by DRJTBC, the funds will be drawn from excess funds available from other completed CAI funded projects. This request has not been approved by the commissioners.

The City also requested an extension for the Perry St. Road Reconstruction project until the Spring of 2011. The completion of the other outstanding projects: Delevan Street Rd. Reconstruction project, McGreary's Alley Reconstruction project, and South Franklin Street Traffic calming project have also been delayed.

The City of Lambertville has completed eight projects since the beginning of the CAI program.

- 10. **Stockton, NJ** The funded CAI projects for the Bridge Street Improvements project is completed. The municipality received a transportation construction project award for its CAI project.
- 11. **West Amwell, NJ** The Township submitted two additional applications: The reconstruction of Old York Road Section I for \$85,000, and the reconstruction of Old York Road Section II for \$285,000. These applications have not been funded by the commissioners. The application for *Rocktown Hill Road Improvement Project* to the approach to the intersection of Route 31 was approved for \$100,000 by the Commissioners at their January 25, 2010 meeting. This project is in construction and progressing well. Due to inclement weather the Township requested an extension to complete this project in the Spring of 2011.

The Section 11 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project is now completed. The Section 12 and Section 13 Road Reconstruction project are also completed. Reimbursement requests continue to be processed for sections 12, and 13 of the completed projects.

12. **Delaware Twp, NJ** – The Township received a new grant for the Improvements and Resurfacing of Federal Twist Rd. and to install drainage improvements and erosion control within the existing road right of way. Maser Consulting Engineering is working on the design of this project.

The Previous CAI projects were completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out the projects. The municipality has made a request to utilize the remainder of their grant to chip seal the grant project and the Due Diligent engineer is still working with the municipality to ascertain the CAI qualification of this additional project cost.

13. **Hopewell, NJ** – The Township was approved for a grant application for the design and construction of sidewalk replacement in the Village of Titusville. This application was awarded a grant by the Commissioners at their April 2010 meeting. The Township requested an extension until the spring of 2011 to complete this project. No major progress was made in this project during this month.

The ADA Ramps and Walkway project was complete. The CAI department is in the process of closing out of the project.

- 14. **Ewing, NJ** The Township was awarded a grant Wilburtha Rd. Improvement project. The project was awarded in October 2010 and requested an extension to complete it by the Spring of 2011. The Township also requested permission to extend the limits of the project contract to include additional road resurfacing work.
- 15. **Trenton, NJ**—The CAI Director and Mr. Frank Tolotta sent a letter requesting a meeting to discuss the status of this project with the City of Trenton's Mayor Tony Mack. A conference call was held on December 13, 2010 and an update of the project status was given by the new person in charged, Henrietta Owusu, director of Housing and Economic Development. It appears that the project is still on schedule to be completed by October 2011. EACOM engineers are prepared to advertise the project by January and start construction soon after. A reimbursement request for design work in the amount of \$464,971.85 was received by the CAI department on December 14th and the due diligence engineer is reviewing it.
- 16. **Alpha NJ** The Alpha's and Pohatcong's Reconstruction of Edge Rd. project has been completed and is in the process of being closed out.
- 17. **Kingwood, NJ** The Township's Reconstruction of Tumble Falls Road was awarded a grant for \$373,000.00 and the contract agreement has been executed. The designed was completed and the project awarded. The project construction is nearly completed. Most of the construction work especially the roadway repaving, is being done by municipal forces.
