#### ROLL CALL

Frank G. McCartney, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being five members present from Pennsylvania and four members present from New Jersey.

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

#### Meeting of March 31, 2008

#### INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public or Press on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

#### EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Just as today is opening day for this year's baseball season (Go Phillies!), this meeting marks the first Commission voting session of the spring season.

In the spirit of this day, I am pleased to report that we are off and running on a wide array of exciting projects and initiatives.

Of particular note is the Trenton-Morrisville (Route 1) Toll Bridge rehabilitation project.

This Thursday, April 3<sup>rd</sup>, the project will begin its transition from Stage 1 to Stage 2 – which is right on schedule.

Motorists will soon experience the fruits of the past 15 months of construction work.

- The northbound side of the bridge has been widened.
- The northbound approach roadway has been reconstructed.
- A new toll plaza and canopy is in place, with an employee access tunnel to three new toll booths.
- There are new northbound off- and on-ramps for Pennsylvania Avenue in Morrisville.
- There is a newly relocated ramp from Route 1 north to Route 29 in Trenton.
- And there is a widened southbound Route 1 approach roadway on the New Jersey side.

Once the transition from Stage 1 to Stage 2 is complete next week, northbound motorists will encounter smoother pavement and southbound motorists will encounter a fully improved toll plaza.

This is a significant milestone in a \$100-million-plus, three-stage project that is slated for completion next year.

Since the Commission's last regular meeting in February, the more substantial elements of the Milford-Montague Toll Bridge project have begun in earnest.

This project includes replacement of the existing bridge deck, the blast cleaning and repainting of the bridge, and replacement of the approach roadway pavements and the current toll plaza.

To facilitate this work, alternating lane closures have been taking place on the bridge since March 10<sup>th</sup>.

These lane closures will be suspended shortly before Memorial Day when a lane-closure moratorium takes effect. This will accommodate vacation travelers and local businesses during the summer months, when bridge traffic increases nearly 50 percent.

In addition to the bridge deck rehabilitation, painting-related work is about to begin on the bridge's trusses.

Significant efforts are being undertaken to shield the river environment below of any dust or debris from this work.

In an effort to achieve the ends of protecting the environment and the general public, the planned closure of the bridge's walkway has been put into effect.

Consequently, a number of bicyclists have asked the Commission to find some means of providing bicycle access on the bridge during the rehabilitation project this summer.

We certainly are sensitive to the bicycling community's concerns and some bicyclists have offered to provide suggestions for how bicycle access may be provided during the rehabilitation project.

Our door remains open to all constructive suggestions. We welcome this dialogue.

If someone were to conceive of a workable solution that does not compromise public safety, impede vehicular traffic, or egregiously escalate costs for the toll-paying community, our staff of engineers and project consultants are at the ready to examine it.

#### I-80 Bridge

Today's agenda includes a vote on a resolution ratifying a design contract for repairs on the Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge.

As part of this contract, engineers will assess the conditions of the bridge's bearings, pier caps and seats, providing a recommended course of action for repairs.

The need for repairs on this bridge was identified in the Commission's 2007 bridge inspection report.

#### **ESS & Radios**

It's my privilege to report that some of the installation work on the Commission's Electronic Surveillance/Detection System has begun.

Over a year from now, video surveillance equipment is to be fully operational at our bridges and facilities.

This will increase security capabilities and improve the Commission's ability to respond to accidents and other incidents.

#### Meeting of March 31, 2008

Executive staff recently made a site visit to the contractor's offices, where we were given a thorough explanation of the installation process and timelines for this work.

In concert with this initiative, the Commission is poised to upgrade its radio system.

Today, you will vote to approve the purchase of portable and mobile radio equipment that will be compatible with the New Jersey State Police 800 megahertz system.

The equipment also will enable the Commission to better communicate with the Pennsylvania State Police once its 800 MHz system is installed.

This purchase calls for 106 mobile radios, 199 portable radios, 67 base stations and other upgrades.

The new equipment will give the Commission intra-district and inter-district communications.

It also will afford us interoperability, meaning we will be able to talk to other agencies responding to accidents and emergencies.

The video and radio upgrades will enable the Commission to have immediate detection, dispatch and response on all of its bridges.

The overall effort will promote public safety, improve response times, and ultimately save lives.

#### INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

John Boyle, representative of the Bicycle Coalition of Greater Philadelphia, addressed the meeting and said:

"My name is John Boyle from Edgewater Park, New Jersey. I'm the advocacy director for the Bicycle Coalition of Greater Philadelphia. Mr. Chairman, the Bicycle Coalition is dismayed that the Commission will not commit to a bicyclepedestrian pathway, this in despite of the fact that there are over 100 people from the Bicycle Coalition and other bicycle supporters. A resolution supporting the pathway has been passed by Union Township and Lower Makefield Township. A letter of support from the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission has been sent and a pending letter of support is being worked on by New Jersey Bicycle Advisory Council, and there is a call for bicycle access upon all the bicycle pedestrian access -- excuse me -- on all bridges on all river crossings in the bicycle pedestrian plan adopted by New Jersey DOT, PennDOT and DVRPC. We understand that the bridge walkway is estimated at \$14.5 million. And that is, according to my calculation, seven percent of the total estimated \$200 million, plus cost, of the Scudder Falls Bridge project. The Federal Highway Administration issued a policy stating in 1999 stating that bicycle and pedestrian pathways need to be included in all projects provided that the cost is not excessive. I understand that the Toll Bridge Commission has a feeling that the seven percent is an excessive cost, but the Federal Highway Administration defines excessive cost as 20 percent, and that's basically one of the ADA guidelines, so they adopted it that way."

"There is concern about oil prices, transportation equity, public health, climate change, limited highway funds. All these are helping to shift public sentiment towards the combination of bicycle and pedestrian. We are going to be living with this bridge for the next 50 to 75 years, and we think that including a bicycle pathway is the smartest thing to do"

pedestrian walkway on the bridge. It's part of the decision to be made during the final design. We are in the process now of finishing the preliminary design and the necessary environmental permitting for it.

At this time the Commission has not made a decision not to put it on, but has not made the final decision to put it on pending the final design.

He further stated that the Commission has been working with the bicycle coalition through this entire process, and we will continue to do so.

Chairman DeGerolamo invited any further comments for the public.

Greg Caiola, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Lower Makefield addressed the meeting and said:

"There are a couple reasons I am here today, Number one, I would like to thank Mr. Sumners for responding to my letter and to thank Mr. McCartney for meeting with some of our residents who are concerned about expanding the soundwalls so that their properties are protected. I would just say I appreciate your response on this, and I am thankful that this is moving forward a little bit, and hopefully we will have some resolution by the time we get to this. I know you are working on some pricing issues with regard to this, and we look forward to your report."

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any further comments from the Public or Press. No further comments were requested.

#### SCHEDULING OF THE APRIL 2008 MEETING

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the Meeting and stated that the Commission's next meeting will be held April 28, 2008.

## STATISTICS OF TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE MONTH AND YEAR-TO-DATE PERIOD ENDING FEBRUARY 29, 2008 COMPARED WITH MONTH AND YEAR-TO-DATE PERIOD ENDING FEBRUARY 28, 2007

The following provides a comparison of toll direction traffic volumes for the month and year-to-date periods ending February 29, 2008, as compared with the month and year-to-date periods ending February 28, 2007.

### <u>Traffic Volume Comparisons - February 2008 versus February 2007</u>

In the month of February, total vehicular toll traffic for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges increased by 86,400 vehicles or 3.3%, as compared to February 2007. Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges increased by 120,500 vehicles or 5.7% as compared to the previous year. It is noted that the month of February 2008 had one (1) additional day then the month of February 2008.

In District I, toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for February 2008 increased by 3,400 cars and increased by 2,300 trucks as compared to February 2007, resulting in a 1.1% increase in total toll traffic. It is noted that roadway construction work for the Trenton – Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehabilitation and One Auxiliary Northbound Lane (T-380B) began in January 2007. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 11,800 cars combined with an increase of 200 trucks generated an overall decrease in total toll traffic of 8.12% for February 2008 as compared to February 2007. Beginning on November 16, 2007, the outer (right) lanes in each direction of the New Hope – Lambertville Toll Bridge were closed pending the completion of repair work.

In District Π, a 30,200 increase in cars combined with an increase of 16,000 trucks resulted in a 7.0% increase in total toll traffic at I-78 for the month of February 2008 as compared to February 2007. The Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge experienced an increase in traffic volume. An increase of 24,100 passenger vehicles and an increase of 2,900 trucks generated an overall increase of 6.1% in total toll traffic for February 2008.

In District III, total toll traffic at Portland-Columbia (PC) reflected a decrease of 1.7% for the month of February 2008 as a result of a decrease of 2,100 automobiles and an increase of 500 trucks. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, an increase of 14,000 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 6,000 trucks generated a 3.0% increase in total toll traffic for the month as compared to February 2007. Milford-Montague (MM) experienced an increase of approximately 700 passenger vehicles and an increase of 200 trucks, resulting overall in a 1.0% increase in toll traffic for the month.

## E-Z Pass Penetration Rates

The following table provides a summary of E-Z Pass penetration rates experienced at the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges during February 2008, February 2007, 2008 year-to-date (YTD), and 2007 year-to-date. E-Z Pass penetration rates for all of the Commission's toll bridges was 58.8% for the month of February 2008 and is 58.8% 2008 year-to-date. Overall E-Z Pass penetration rates increased by 2.2% in February 2008 as compared February 2007; including an increase of 2.0% in autos and an increase of 2.7% in trucks.

### Meeting of March 31, 2008

### STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of February 2008 and the two month year-to-date operations of fiscal year 2008 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,449,405 for the month of February. For the fiscal year-to-date 2007, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$8,372,026 or 92.5% of the year-to-date operating budget. The positive variance between the operating budget and actual expenses is due to normal operating activity.

Several line items are currently running ahead of budget on a year-to-date basis. Unemployment Compensation is currently over its year-to-date budget and will likely exceed the annual budget before year end. Regular Salaries are also running ahead of the year-to-date budget but will likely come into line with the annual budget before year end. Temporary Salaries are currently running ahead of their year-to-date budget but much of this overage is offset by surplus in the Overtime budget.

February was a three payroll month and as such, had higher than usual Regular Salary, Overtime and Temporary Salary expense for the month. There are usually two months a year where payroll hits three times in the month. The budget takes this cycle into account.

Milford-Montague Toll Bridge Rehabilitation: The Communications Department has been actively engaged in working to keep the press and public updated on the status of the project, including the issuance of a press release on the commencement of single lane closures and responding to press inquiries. Communications has also been actively engaged in discussions with reporters and local residents on safety issues underlying the Commission's decision to prohibit bicycle traffic on the bridge during construction.

- Community Affairs staff participated in ongoing progress meetings for T424A I-78 roadway resurfacing.
- Community Affairs staff participated in a series of progress meetings for the T-380B Trenton Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehab.
- Community Affairs staff represented the Commission at monthly meeting of the Lower Bucks Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee.
- ❖ The Community Affairs Department participated in the progress meetings for the T-430A Milford Montague Toll Bridge Rehab. Community Affairs Staff led the team presentations to public officials and local residents from Milford Twp. (Pa.), Milford Borough (Pa.), and Montague Twp. (N.J.) in separate meetings held during the month of February.
- ❖ Staff assisted in preparation of briefing materials on bike and pedestrian access to the bridge during construction; the bridges walkway will be closed for safety reasons during the project. - Staff assumed lead status on implementing a meeting between National Park Officials and the Commission to improve communications and identify issues of mutual interest with the goal of facilitating the smooth execution of the M-MTB rehabilitation project.

By connecting existing and planned trails, a continuous, safe, green route 3,000 miles long is being formed linking Calais, Maine at the Canadian border with Key West, Florida.

#### February 2008

During the month of February, 2008 the Director of Policy and Planning participated in a number of communications and meetings that explored the following:

The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission's Planning Coordinating Committee and Regional Transportation Committee were presented with information by the Delaware River Port Authority (DRPA) and Port Authority Transit Corporation (PATCO) concerning their current expansion alternatives analysis projects in Philadelphia and South New Jersey to expand transit services in the region. Also, the Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA) presented their planning phase for their electronic payment and fare collection modernization project.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce (GLVCC) Transportation Committee reviewed current and pending transportation legislation from Harrisburg in an effort to create an official GLVCC Transportation Policy.

The Director attended the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission's I-78 Roadway Rehabilitation Progress and Schedule Update Meeting.

The Central Jersey Transportation Forum had presentations and discussions that included the following: Route 1 Planning through Partnerships, Route 1 Bus Rapid Transit Updates, the status of the Lawrence Hopewell Trail, and an overview of the comprehensive New Jersey Statewide Freight Plan.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Public Policy Committee was given a Harrisburg update by State Senator Lisa Boscola (D-18) concerning the issue of deregulation of electricity due to become effective in 2010.

The Northeastern Pennsylvania Rural Transportation Planning Organization discussed PennDOT District 4 and PennDOT District 5 Administrative Actions for the 2007-2009 Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) and the proposed Accelerated Bridge Program for the 2009-2012 TIP.

The Lehigh Valley Economic Development Corporation Executive Committee heard and viewed a presentation by Vincent Truncellito, Manager Project Development Capital Planning New Jersey Transit concerning the I-78 Corridor / Central New Jersey Raritan Valley Transit Study.

The Lehigh Valley Transportation Study Coordinating Committee and PennDOT discussed the need to shift nearly twenty-five million dollars in commonwealth and federal highway funding earmarked for the Lehigh Valley to bridge repair in the valley during the next four years.

The Lehigh Valley Economic Development Corporation Legislative and Government Relations Committee featured United States Senator Robert P. Casey Jr.(PA-D); Senator Casey spoke about investing in education and healthcare for children, long-term infrastructure improvements – including roads, bridges, railroad, mass transit, and broad band and fiber optic system expansions, as well as, alternative energy development.

The Pike County Road Task Force was updated by the director concerning our Milford – Montague Toll Bridge Rehabilitation Project; also Penn DOT District 4 gave their projects and winter maintenance updates.

The Lehigh Valley Transportation Study Technical Committee and Penn-DOT District 5 continued their discussion regarding the draft of the 2009-2012 Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) - Bridge Investment.

The Warren County Regional Chamber of Commerce Economic Development / Transportation Council were given an update by the Director concerning our I-78 Roadway Rehabilitation Project and our Warren County Compact Authorized Investment (CAI) Projects. The Council also heard a report on the status of county wide economic development related efforts.

The Warren County Regional Chamber of Commerce Annual Meeting announced several initiatives including that the chamber will be the primary contact and leading advocate for economic development in Warren County, and that the chamber's convention and visitor's bureau will strive to establish itself as number one for tourism services in Northwestern New Jersey.

The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission's Board and Executive Committee's Meetings included a presentation by Select Greater Philadelphia (Select) is a regional, economic development — marketing organization dedicated to building the economy of the Greater Philadelphia region. Select specializes in streamlining corporate expansions and business locations in an eleven county, three state regions. Also included in the Board's Meeting Packets was the Bucks County Courier Times February 25, 2008 article "Paths Could Be Added to Bridge" which discusses the Commission's I-95 / Scudder Falls Toll Supported Bridge Project.

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving Electronic Security and Surveillance:

- On February 1, 2008, attended a meeting with the IT Department to finalize the
  access rights to the various IT and Telcom rooms throughout the Commission.
  Also attended an internal progress meeting on the ESS system with DRJTBC
  Engineering Department.
- During the month, continuous work has been performed on evaluating the existing DRJTBC radio system. An inventory of the current radios has been completed and reduced to one report. On February 6, 2008, a meeting was held with Jim Barsuglia, Radio Engineer, New Jersey State Police, to develop the radio network for the DRJTBC. At the conclusion of the meeting it was agreed that the Commission would be granted three zones or bands of radio channels. Zone A would consist of 16 working channels dedicated to the Commission's operation. Zones B and C are dedicated New Jersey State and international channels utilized for interoperability during times of crisis. These channels are mandated for any agency utilizing the New Jersey State Police radio system. The attached table on the last page of this document synopsizes the channels constituting the proposed DRJTBC radio system. The New Jersey State Police has offered the DRJTBC portable radios to test the radio coverage in and around our bridges.
- On February 8, 2008, attended the DRJTBC Staff Meeting at Trenton-Morrisville and reported on the status of the ESS system progress to date. Thereafter, met with District I Superintendent J. Prior to assign access rights to Commission employees for the Trenton-Morrisville and New Hope-Lambertville facilities. Spreadsheets for same were later finalized.
- On February 13, 2008, the illumination surveys for the ESS cameras commenced at the Milford-Montague Toll Bridge facility. The surveys are continuing into the month of March.
- Furthermore, on February 13, 2008, the access control survey of the seven toll bridge facilities commenced. This survey consists of examining the areas (doors) of ingress and egress that will be controlled in order to determine hardware, locks, placement of card readers, wiring, etc. The survey further determines the direction and method of control corresponding to ingress and egress at a particular

The fire detection system surveys for the Trenton-Morrisville and New Hope-Lambertville facilities were conducted along with the access control surveys. On February 27, 2008, the surveys were basically completed.

 On February 14, 2008, as directed, Harold Neil, NJDOT assigned to the Office of Homeland Security and Protection, was briefed on the ESS system being installed on the DRJTBC bridges. Furthermore, an inquiry was made regarding funding for the ESS system. Currently there are no state funds available to supplement our ESS endeavor.

Moreover, a discussion regarding the DRJTBC primary toll bridges ensued concerning whether or not bridges such as I-80 and I-78 were considered critical infrastructure in the opinion of the Office of Homeland Security and Protection. Thereafter, Mr. Neil was in agreement that many of the DRJTBC bridges should be classified as critical infrastructure and he advised that he would be reaching out for the DRJTBC in the near future to discuss this topic further.

- On February 15, 2008, Mr. Tolotta was presented with the draft proposal for utilizing the New Jersey State Police radio system. Current inventory, proposed inventory, and budget figures were outlined in the report. Furthermore, a draft report of proposed access rights for the Commission was discussed, along with the number of master keys to be utilized by the Commission in the future.
- On February 20, 2008, attended a seminar sponsored by the New Jersey Office of Homeland Security and Protection regarding threats to bridges and tunnels.
   During the evening hours, attended a seminar with the Director of Security, Safety and Training, at the Quakertown Fire Department, Quakertown, PA., regarding the handling of mass causality incidents caused by acts of terrorism.
- On February 21, and 22, research was conducted for Engineering regarding the laws in Pennsylvania and New Jersey pertaining to the operation of bicycles on roadways, limited access highways, and bridges.
- On February 22, 2008, attended an internal status meeting for ESS with the Engineering Department. During the meeting the access system, door locks, and master keys in particular were discussed. All were in agreement to limit the number of master keys utilized by the DRJTBC.

The final count of ESS cameras was also discussed. To date, after moving, adding, and deleting cameras, it appears as though four additional cameras will be proposed for installation. Three of the additional cameras would be utilized at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge. One camera would surveil the abutment and first bridge pier near the Pennsylvania canal, and the other two cameras would surveil the piers between the New Jersey canal and the river, in addition to the storage yard there around. The fourth camera is recommended to surveil the entrance to the toll plaza at the Milford-Montague toll bridge. Since Trenton-Morrisville must be revisited once construction proceeds further, the possibility exists an additional camera or two may be needed at this location.

After consulting with Mr. Tolotta, the recommendation to further the installation of a new radio tower at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge facility was discussed. The new tower if granted, would enhance the new radio system's capabilities and the capabilities of the facility if it were used as a command center for the DRJTBC.

- On February 26, 2008, four portable radios were acquired on loan from the New Jersey State Police to test the radio coverage up and down the river. The radios will be returned the first week of April.
- On February 28, 2008, attended a design/progress meeting for the ESS system at Mass. Electric's office in Frenchtown, N.J.
- On February 29, 2008, attended a meeting with DRJTBC Operation's personnel regarding the new access system and discussed access rights and master locks.
   Furthermore, in conjunction with District I Maintenance, radio testing from Trenton-Morrisville to Easton-Phillipsburg was performed.
- During the month of February, accompanied the ESS contractor(s) on video surveys at the following bridges:
  - New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge
  - New Hope-Lambertville TSB
  - Centre Bridge-Stockton TSB

### DESIGN Contract No. C-380A

The Design Consultant, The Louis Berger Group, continues to provide services through the post-design/construction phase of the project.

# CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-380B

The Construction Management/Construction Inspection Consultant, Hill International, has been coordinating field activities with the contractor, reviewing contractor schedules, conducting bi-weekly progress and scheduling meetings, preparing daily reports, tracking project submittals and developing public involvement and outreach efforts.

Hill's Public Involvement Consultant, Bergmaier Associates, continues to update the project website, answer customer generated questions via the toll free number and updating the quarterly newsletter.

As a result of the initial OSHA Compliance Inspection that took place in July 2007 one of the recommendations moving forward was for the Commission to perform follow-up safety inspections of the Contract T-380B, Rehabilitation of the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge and One Auxiliary Lane, jobsite.

Hill has hired an experienced Safety Professional (Applegate Associates, Inc.) to perform periodic OSHA Compliance Inspections on the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehabilitation construction site. At the conclusion of each site visit, Applegate will be providing the Commission with a report of their findings. The inspections have taken place in October, November and December 2007 as well as January & February 2008. For the remainder of the project inspections will be scheduled bi-monthly.

### Meeting of March 31, 2008 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

### CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-380B

Construction work is progressing on schedule. Stage 1 is underway and expected to last until the spring of 2008. Stage 1 work includes the rebuilding of the toll plaza, construction of the head house that connects the main building to the new toll tunnel, as well as demolition and rebuilding the downstream portions of the main river bridge. Pier cap extensions have been constructed and new structural steel has been set. The contractor has placed new deck in all widened spans of the main river bridge. The toll plaza demolition continues with the removal of portions of the existing canopy and toll booths. New toll islands, booths and canopy sections are currently being installed. New structural steel girders have been placed and new bridge deck placed on the widened portion of the PennDOT viaduct over Conrail & Delaware Canal adjacent to Pennsylvania Avenue. Sound barrier wall has been constructed along Ramp G from Pennsylvania Ave to Route 1 NB. Numerous Commission owned overpass structures are also being reconstructed on both sides of the river.

A progress "Partnering Meeting" was held on January 28, 2008 at the Construction Manager's field office. Representatives from the Commission, Berger, Hill and Conti were in attendance. The session was facilitated by FMI Corporation.

# PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

### STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Environmental Assessment (EA) and the Section 4(f) documents were submitted to the Commission, the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT), the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT), and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) for reviews on February 1, 2008. The reviews by these agencies will be concurrent to shorten the schedule. The agencies are scheduled to meet with the Commission on March 18, 2008 to discuss comments to the EA. Subsequent to the comment resolutions received from these agencies, the EA will be distributed to the public and other interested agencies for review and comment in April. A public hearing/Open House is currently being scheduled for early May. The final decision document is expected by August 2008.

The preliminary Preferred Alternative is the inside widening of I-95 in Pennsylvania, Option 2 at Taylorsville Road and Option 1c. Modified (Roundabout) at Route 29. The Preferred Alternative also includes a total replacement of the Scudder Falls Bridge with the new bridge containing 5 northbound and 4 southbound lanes on an upstream alignment.

### NORTHERLY CROSSINGS CORRIDOR CONGESTION MITIGATION STUDY

STUDY Contract No. C-395A

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has been developed and submitted to the Executive Staff for their review. Upon receiving their concurrence the MOU will be sent to the respective state staffs that attended the workshops for final review and comment. At the Commission's request, the Northerly Crossings Study Consultant is looking at preliminary Open Road Tolling (ORT) concepts for the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge.

### ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE / DETECTION SYSTEM

PROGRAM MANAGER Contract No. C-396A

The Program Manager, Jacobs Edwards & Kelcey (E&K), has been coordinating site survey activities with the DBM Team, reviewing DBM Team schedules, tracking and reviewing project submittals, conducting bi-weekly progress meetings and design review meetings, and coordinating communications with the traveling public.

E&K continues to assist the Commission, together with Counsel, in discussions with Advanced Wireless Services (AWS) license holders who have bought rights to regional wireless frequencies through an FCC auction and determined that their proposed AWS networks will potentially interfere with the Commission's microwave communications system. In accordance with Resolution No. 1472-01-08, the Commission and T-Mobile USA, Inc. have executed a Cash Relocation Agreement to compensate the Commission for vacating its licenses to operate in the affected frequencies.

# DESIGN-BUILD-MAINTAIN PROJECT DB-396A

Mass. Electric Construction Company (MECC) continues to conduct site surveys documenting existing electrical infrastructure and existing utilities at each bridge as well as identifying potential electrical and electronic surveillance equipment locations and proposed electrical and fiber optic conduit routing.

Representatives of MECC and Commission staff met with NJDOT in late February to review traffic control plans for the project.

Access control as well as illumination surveys have been scheduled to be performed beginning in February and concluding in mid March.

Bi-weekly Design Review Meetings are held to review the site surveys in preparation of documenting the results of the same and initiating the preparation of design drawings.

Meetings and activities focused on coordinating the work of MECC together with that of other Commission sponsored projects has occurred and will continue throughout the course of the project.

Additional work activities include the submission of weekly project schedules, coordinating MPT activities associated with site surveys, and preparation of project material submissions.

Milling and repaving of the shoulders in advance of shifting traffic onto the shoulders for Stage I work was completed with the videoing and inspecting and subsequent lining of the drainage laterals nearing completion. Work on the drainage channel stabilization along County Route 519 under I-78 has been completed. Catch basin cover change outs, along with drilling and slurry grouting also continues. The replacement of the median drainage has been completed. A new construction stage near the Still Valley Interchange was recently implemented. HNTB and Commission staff continued meeting to discuss the 60% Plans, Specifications and Estimate (PS&E) engineer's estimate increase as compared to the concept study estimate. HNTB provided an engineer's estimate for an alternative alignment that shifts the roadway as far north as possible without impacting the existing toll plaza. This concept reduces the construction cost of the retaining walls, yet reduces the ORT lanes shoulder widths from 10 feet to 2 feet in the area of the proposed ORT gantry for a distance of approximately 400 feet. This alternate roadway alignment along with the associated pros and cons is currently under consideration by Commission staff.

### <u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Design-Build-Operate-</u> Maintain Project

HNTB finalized the CSC/VPC RFP to address comments discussed during a concentrated page-turn effort to revise the fee structure of the RFP. The RFP was posted on the Commission's web site on February 19, 2008, and advertised in local newspapers, IBBTA's web site, and Toll Road News' web site. A pre-proposal meeting was held on March 4, 2008 at the Elks Lodge in Morrisville. We continue to respond to questions and develop addendums as needed.

### In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project

The Commission and HNTB have met in a concentrated page effort to review the RFP and incorporate TransCore's proposal for the maintenance of the existing ETC software. HNTB is currently addressing the comments and preparing the RFP for final acceptance by the Commission prior to advertisement.

### DESIGN Contract No. C-430A

They have been responding to RFI's and reviewing shop drawing submittals through the use of the FTP site. The site permits rapid response to RFI's and rapid reviews and approvals of shop drawings. M& M has also been attending the biweekly Progress and Schedule Update meetings.

During the 2007 GEC inspection of the New Hope - Lambertville Toll Bridge (NHLTB) in August, several cracks were identified in the cantilever floor beam brackets and floor beam bracket tie-plate/top flange connections. During the November 5, 2007 interim inspection of the floor beam brackets, additional cracks were identified. As a precautionary measure, the right lanes in each direction of the bridge, which are partially supported by the cantilever brackets, were closed to traffic on November 16, 2007.

The purpose of this Task Order Agreement Assignment is to implement the recommendations made by the GEC to inspect and design interim repairs for the superstructure. This assignment will include Interim Inspections focusing on the cantilever floor beam brackets, evaluation and recommendations for repair or retrofit of the existing cracks.

At the February Commission Meeting TranSystems | Lichtenstein presented to the Commissioners, their initial findings from Phase A of their evaluation and presented recommendations for a design approach leading into Phase B of the assignment. Approval was given to begin negotiation for Phase B, including an interim inspection, Load Testing and Finite Element analysis of the floor beam bracket details. Notice to Proceed for this phase of the project is anticipated to commence in mid-March. The completion of the analysis and final recommendations for Phase B are anticipated within four (4) months of the Notice to Proceed.

Services include engineering inspection, design, permitting, and construction for the repair of damage to the apron of Pier 2 to avoid possible significant additional deterioration from a future flood event.

Project kick-off meeting and follow-up progress meetings have been held. Underwater inspection work has been completed; design details prepared and repairs are near completion. Underwater work has been slowed due to unexpected high water throughout the winter. The remaining work is expected to be completed by the end of March.

### COMPACT AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT

### General

During the month of February, 2008 the CAI Department sent out a status report request letter to all the municipalities with CAI grants to ascertain whether they will be able to complete their project(s) by the deadline of December 31, 2008. Most municipalities will be completing their projects within the December 31, 2008 deadline, but a few of them are contemplating asking for an extension of time. A few of the municipalities are starting their construction now during the warmer days, some are in the process of advertising their projects, and there are those, like Lower Makefield, Falls Township and Lambertville (completed two of its 5 projects) that have completed their projects. On the other hand, there are a few municipalities that are still requesting funds for a new project and other requesting additional grants for their existing projects. This construction season is going to be a very busy one for host municipalities along the Commission's jurisdictional region as they work on their CAI projects.

### Update of some of the most significant efforts with the grantees during this month

### Pennsylvania

- Milford Borough, PA Most of this project construction was completed in December, 2007, but it still needs minor punch-list items, such as a final top course and pavement markings that will be completed this spring as soon as the weather gets warmer. The final Penn DOT inspection will have to be completed before a formal closed out of the project. Also, the Borough has alluded that they would need a reallocation of funds from the soft cost of inspection and engineering to construction. It is estimated that it may need to reallocate 34,000.
- 2. Smithfield, PA The Township is now ready to advertise for bids and will do so on March 19th with a bid opening of March 25th; however, it has not yet received its Highway Occupancy Permit from Penn Dot.
- 3. Delaware Water Gap, PA –The Borough is ready to advertise for bids on March 3<sup>rd</sup>. for both projects. However, the Borough has not yet acquired its Highway Occupancy Permit from Penn DOT.
- 4. Portland Borough, PA The Park and Walk project is ready to advertise for bids and the Park and Ride project has a new site that is being considered by the Borough to acquire under eminent domain. According to the mayor and the Borough engineer, both projects are expected to be completed this year. Cost estimates for both projects were submitted to the CAI department and are under review. A meeting will be held with the Mayor and the Borough's engineer in early March.

### Meeting of March 31, 2008

### Pennsylvania (Continued)

- 5. Lower Mount Bethel, PA The projects were bid with several alternatives. The ornamental lights and solar power panel did not make it under the current budget, so the Township is looking for alternative funds to be able to include those items. The township is analyzing the bids as they came in over the Township's cost estimates.
- 6. Williams Township, PA The Township received all its necessary permits and the project has been awarded to TELCO. Although the Township started this project, the CAI department has yet to receive the construction schedule and contract estimates.
- 7. Easton, PA Becky Bradley, who has assumed the duties of the position formerly held by Barb Kowitz, and Dave Hopkins, the City Director of Public Works, indicated that he will be assisting her in completing the DRJTBC grant requirements in as timely a manner as possible. Becky and Dave met with Pat Boyle to develop a plan that will be acceptable for the Bridge commission and one that is capable of being completed by this fall if not sooner. The City indicated that it is waiting for materials costs from their vendor for pedestrian signals. The CAI department is expecting the City to submit a fairly complete scope of work that will include detailed pricing for crosswalks, lighting, and the pedestrian improvements hopefully within in February.

The City of Easton has been granted a total of \$3,120,000 to complete three (3) separate projects. These projects are summarized below:

- A. Riverwalk Intermodal Center (Grant Amount: \$2,700,000, Reimbursement to date: \$600,000). The actual low bid for the project exceeded the budget, and at a meeting with the project stakeholders on November 28<sup>th</sup>, the group decided that a Value Engineering Analysis would be performed to see if there are any design modifications and/or reduction in the anticipated size of the building that would be feasible to reduce the cost to be within the available budget. The latest conversations with the Mayor and representatives of the Parking Authority indicate that the project will go on at a smaller scale, but no details have been presented yet. In any case, this project will not be completed prior to the current December 31, 2008 grant agreement deadline.
- B. <u>Trolley</u> (Grant Amount: \$80,000, Reimbursement to date: \$53,816.66). The grant funding to date has been used to refurbish two (2) trolleys, develop and install signage, and operate the trolleys for the 2007 season. The feedback received from the City has been that the trolley program is successful and has received positive recognition. As previously noted to the City, it is uncertain if the remaining funds in the grant amount will enable the operation of the complete 2008 season and there is no funding plan in place to maintain and operate the trolley beyond the grant funding.

### Meeting of March 31, 2008

### Pennsylvania (Continued)

C. Larry Holmes Drive/Northampton Street Pedestrian & Bicycle Trail Improvements (Grant Amount: \$340,000, Reimbursement to date: \$0). This project was envisioned to provide upgraded pedestrian signals and crosswalks at the signalized intersections along Larry Holmes Drive and provide an improved trail system that will link the existing Riverfront Park trail system to the Bushkill Creek Corridor system. The project was originally awarded as two (2) separate grant projects, but the City has requested that they be combined into one (1) project. The CAI Department is currently awaiting a detailed scope of work and concept plan for the revised project, and for a request for an extension for the RiverWalk project, but to date have not received this information.

No other significant development occurred this month.

- 8. Riegelsville Borough, PA The Borough continues to work out some details with DCNR on the bridge design. DCNR is requiring the bridge to have a specific façade and the Borough is working with the prefab bridge manufacturer to determine if the façade can be provided and what the cost will be. Once that is ironed out, the Borough will be submitting the plans and right-of way application to DCNR for their review. All of the other details have been finalized for the project. In the meantime, the Borough has submitted their Joint Permit application to PA DEP for their review. They met with Verizon and Met Ed on site to review relocating an existing utility pole and wires. The engineer has also prepared preliminary easement drawings and have submitted them to the Borough for their review. A new Reimbursement Request was submitted by the Borough and a letter to formally request a reallocation \$11,000.00 in the budget to the Design and Permitting Category from the Contingency Category. The CAI department did receive the final plans, but not the cost estimates yet.
- 9. Solebury Township, PA The Township is still working on the project and bridge design. However, the Township submitted a letter requesting an additional \$3.14 million to the grant awarded to them of \$1,755,150. The project team attributes the need for additional money to increasing material cost, mandate from the state for storm water management and drainage improvements and landscaping improvement. The project completion date is still very close to the contract agreement due date of December 31, 2008 and the CAI department continues to monitor this project. The Township is also working on a resolution for the right of way transfer/easement of the DRJTBC property where the pedestrian bridge will be placed over the canal. The CAI due diligence engineer and Atty. Kim Freimuth from Fox Rothschild has been assisting with the coordination of this process. On February 4th, the CAI department held a meeting with the Solebury Twp engineering and architectural team to discuss the proposed supplement request that apparently increased the previous cost estimates by \$3.14 million. The Township indicated that they were going to revise their estimates and get back to the CAI director. They also indicated that they will send the deliverables for their reimbursement request that is now over one year old and pending deliverables for invoices.

### Pennsylvania (Continued)

- 8. New Hope Borough, PA –The bids date for the traffic signals replacements is March 12 and a meeting with the Historical Association Program is for March 20th. The projects are targeted to be completed this summer.
- 9. Falls Township, PA No significant changes this month. The CAI department is still waiting for reimbursement request from them to close out the project.
- 10. Upper Makefield Township, PA This project held a preconstruction meeting with Penn DOT on 02/07/08 to discuss the construction details. The project is getting read to start construction in March and a ground breaking ceremony is scheduled for March 13 at 2:00 PM.
- 11. Lower Makefield, PA –The Traffic signal project is completed and the Township is still getting all the necessary paper work together for a close out. The final deliverables have been sent by the Township and are being processed. The Township has alluded that it wants to send another project application, but the CAI department is still to receive it. No change since last month report
- 12. Bristol Borough, PA This project was already started and is currently being constructed. The due diligence engineer is observing the project while the CAI department waits for deliverables from the municipality. The agreement Update for these project grant increment is being prepared. The project consist of upgrading 11 traffic signals starting at every intersection from Pond Street and Jefferson Avenue to Mill Street and including the intersections of Beth and Buckley Streets, Mulberry and Radcliff Streets, and Farragut Street and Green Lane.
- 13. Yardley, PA The Borough provided a summary of the bids received for the project. The lowest responsible bidder was Harris Blacktopping at \$504,423.76. The Commission grant will cover \$234,217 of this cost. The project is now under construction and on schedule, and should be completed on time. The CAI department is awaiting the correct insurance certificate from the Borough. A meeting will be scheduled with the municipality in the near future to review the status of this project.
- 14. Morrisville, PA The West Bridge St. plans are fine and Penn DOT HOP was approved for West Bridge and Street Curb & Sidewalk Replacement. The Pennsylvania Avenue to Cox St. project is also out to bids. DRJTBC engineering department is reviewing the plans for East Bridge St. Traffic Calming and Bridge St. Curve and Side walk project. Municipality continues to move ahead with these projects. The CAI department received the second reimbursement request and it is reviewing it.

### New Jersey

 Montague, NJ – The Township engineer indicated that the plans for the projects are almost completed and will send the CAI department a copy on the second week of March. Once received, the plans are to be reviewed by the CAI department.

### New Jersey (Continued)

- 2. Knowlton, NJ The CAI Department received an additional application from the Township for a Traffic Management Improvement Part II project. This improvement is at the intersections of Route 605 and 94 and it will develop a clearly marked truck turnaround on Route 94. Although this project was submitted by the Township of Knowlton, it is being proposed in coordination with the County of Warren. The initial engineering for this project has already been completed by the County engineering Department. This project is to be completed in approximately 4 months and it would meet the requirements of the CAI characteristics. The other Knowlton projects are also moving forward. No significant change since the last report. This application will be presented at the Commissioners meeting in March.
- 3. Belvidere, NJ The Commissioners decided not to take any action on the current request for additional funding. The Commissioners will repave the portion of Water Street that was in the application for Belvidere and possibly relinquish the roadway Right of Way jurisdiction to Belvidere that has agreed to accept it. A meeting to coordinate the repaving of the Water Street will be held internally and one also with the key stake holders of this project.
- 4. Phillipsburg, NJ All permits for this project have been obtained by Phillipsburg and the Town has awarded the project to Top Line Construction Corp. for \$2,809,665.90. The project is currently under construction. A meeting was held with the Town's engineer and the DRJTBC to determine the resurfacing of the rest of Union Square that is out of the bounds of the CAI project. The DRJTBC will pay for the resurfacing of this portion of Union Square from the Capital project funds. The Town's engineer will complete the design work for this project and the DRJTBC will reimburse the cost.
- 5. Pohatcong, NJ The Township has submitted its bids documents for its project to the CAI department for review. The construction plans were reviewed by the DRJTBC engineer and there were no objections to them. The Township is still planning to award the project for construction during the spring of 2008. The construction work abutting the bridge is going to be done at night and there will be no interruption to the bridge traffic.
- 6. Milford, NJ Since the December 27th meeting there has not been other significant action on this project. The engineering plans are 98% complete. The construction project was to be advertised for bids in February and bids to be opened by mid February. This did not occur. The Utility relocation was to start in mid February, but the CAI department did not receive the final plans from the municipality.
- 7. Frenchtown, NJ There was a reimbursement request submitted for the engineering work done on this project. Bimonthly meetings will be held with the Borough to monitor the projects progress status. No significant progress has been made by the township during this period. The Borough is still awaiting approval from SHPO for the continuation of the project.
- 8. Lambertville, NJ In February, Lambertville submitted a new application for the reconstruction of Jefferson Street in Lambertville. This and the other Lambertville's projects are slated to be completed prior to December 31, 2008. The new application will be presented to the Commissioners for their consideration at their March 2008 meeting.

### New Jersey (Continued)

- 9. Stockton, NJ Stockton has sent a supplemental grant request for \$257,000 due to the requirement made by SHPO to use blue stone material and to acquire it from its only approved quarry and because the bids came in higher than the initial cost estimates. This request will be presented to the Commissioners for consideration.
- 10. Ewing, NJ The CAI department completed the execution of the CAI agreement with the change in the project scope.
- 11. Trenton, NJ Following the executive meeting with representatives of the City of Trenton, of NJDOT, and DRJTBC that was held on December 19th at NHL regarding the projects status and constraints and several possible solutions, two letters were received from Trenton requesting that the Commission amend the existing Rt. 1 contract with Conti to include the CAI South Warren Street relocation project and to extend the completion time for the project. A subsequent meeting of the Commission executive team for this project, the Commission replied with a letter indicating that the Conti contract amendment request was not feasible at this time, and escrow account can be opened to satisfy the NJDOT requirement, and that the extension request will be presented to the Commissioners for their consideration.
- 12. Delaware Twp., NJ The current funded project is still pending close outs as there are still some punchlist items that need to be completed. No further significant progress was made during this period
- 13. Hopewell, NJ Agreement has been sent to Hopewell for completion and the Township is working on having it fully executed. A meeting will be scheduled in the near future to review the project status. Hopewell also submitted a new application for a Swing Pedestrian Bridge over the DC& R Canal. The CAI department will be presenting this application to the Commissioners in their meeting in March.
- 14. West Amwell, N.J. The Agreement was fully executed for the new award to West Amwell for \$365,000 for the reconstruction of section 12 of Rocktown Lambertville Road. Storm drainage will be installed as part of the reconstruction and the storm drainage ditch will be improved. The first project is still under status review for its completion.
- 15. Holland, NJ The CAI department held a meeting with the township engineer to review the project status. The plans are nearly completed and is being submitted to state for permitting approval.
