#### ROLL CALL

Frank G. McCartney, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present- there being four members present from Pennsylvania and four members present from New Jersey.

#### WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

#### INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

#### EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

It is my privilege this month to report that the rehabilitation project at the Milford-Montague Toll Bridge will reach substantial completion at the close of business on Wednesday.

This major project milestone will be officially attained once the construction barriers and corresponding temporary traffic signal are removed from the bridge. As we said from the project's outset in February 2008, our goal was to attain substantial completion by this Memorial Day. We are on the cusp of achieving that objective. In addition to the bridge's completely rehabilitated deck and newly resurfaced approaches, motorists now have the benefit of new three-lane toll plaza on the Pennsylvania side of the bridge. Additionally, pedestrians and bicyclists may again access the bridge's walkway, which has been closed for safety reasons for the duration of the project.

There still are several punch-list items that will need to be completed in coming weeks. Some of these may require temporary lane or walkway closures, but these should be of very short durations -- if closings become necessary at all. We have set July 21 as the date for a rededication ceremony at the bridge. A formal invitation to Commissioners is being prepared and will be sent out shortly.

Other major projects currently underway also are moving toward their scheduled completion deadlines for this year. On the Electronic Surveillance/Detection System project, we are completing camera installations at the Milford-Montague Bridge and conducting final camera focusing throughout the system. The project's access-control-card installation component has been completed at all facilities and a majority of these systems are now fully operational. The project's radio segment is completed and we are now in the process of adding repeater sites to enhance performance. This contract is on schedule to meet its June 7 substantial completion deadline.

Elsewhere, construction crews along our New Jersey segment of 1-78 and at the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge are poised to suspend work activities later this week in anticipation of increased traffic volumes over the Memorial Day weekend.

With all of these projects in their final stages, we are now turning our attention to the next round of projects coming on line.

Community Affairs is moving ahead in performing various public-involvement program activities for the upcoming rehabilitation projects we have scheduled at the Calhoun Street, Washington Crossing, and Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll-Supported Bridges. Each of these projects is scheduled to commence construction in the next 8 to 12 months.

Community Affairs personnel and project consultants have begun alerting elected officials and holding both formal and informal meetings with stakeholders – such as business owners, public safety organizations, and state, county and local transportation officials. Specific Web pages and fact sheets also have been created to help provide accurate information to the public about of these projects. These materials explain why each project is necessary, what work is to be performed, and when work may take place. Open houses are being arranged to provide the public with more project details and to give the public an opportunity to ask questions or provide

comment. All of these outreach strategies are laid out in the new public-involvement guidelines that were put in place last month.

Moving away from capital projects for a moment, I want to call attention to the Operations Department's response to a truck accident and fuel spill that occurred on the Scudder Falls Bridge last Wednesday morning. The accident forced the closure of the bridge's southbound lanes for more than four hours. Thankfully, there were no injuries, but a spill of an estimated 80 gallons of diesel oil created a dual challenge for our maintenance personnel. First, they had to prevent any diesel oil from spilling into the river environment below. Second, they had to clear the bridge for safe travel. I am happy to report that our District 1 personnel achieved both objectives. The bridge's southbound lanes were reopened by mid-afternoon — well in advance of the evening rush hour. Meanwhile, our workers kept all of the oil on the bridge — and out of the river — soaking up the fuel with high-absorbency cloths and granules.

There is one final item: H1N1 influenza, better known as swine flu. We are taking proactive steps should this new virus strain reach the epidemic levels that some are predicting. An in-house committee has been formed to monitor the threat and the panel has prepared an informational memo advising all personnel about the situation as well as matters such as personal hygiene, sick leave, and prioritizing business operations and tasks.

The committee is being headed up by Matt Hartigan. J.P. Stettner and David Burd also have been very active in this effort. Frank Tolotta also is compiling detailed business continuity plans from all districts, directors and supervisors. As of last week, more than 3,000 cases of this new flu had been reported in the United States, with new cases reported in New Jersey and Pennsylvania nearly every day. It's still too early to say whether this will become an issue for us. But if it should, we will certainly be prepared.

#### IMMUNITITES AND INDEMNIFICATION RESOLUTION

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Broughal moved and Commissioner Zikas seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 18<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2009 that the Commission, via this Resolution;

"WHEREAS, statutory immunity is provided by the Compact creating the Commission and the enabling legislation in both Pennsylvania and New Jersey – 36 Pa. Stat. Ann. §3401; N.J.S.A. 32:8-1, et seq. – expressly providing Commissioners with certain immunity from suit for claims based upon their official actions, specifically providing:

"No member of the Commission shall be subject to any personal liability or accountability by reason of any act or omission of the Commission."

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; and

"WHEREAS, the Commissioners also may have certain other immunities under applicable law protecting them from suit and/or liability for certain official actions or conduct; and

"WHEREAS, the Commission seeks to have in place a mechanism to provide indemnification and defense to its Commissioners in legal actions, suits or proceedings to the extent the conduct, actions or omissions of the Commissioners which form the basis for such action, suit or proceeding are subject to immunity under the Compact or other applicable law.

#### "NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

The Commission hereby agrees to indemnify and defend its Commissioners, including present, future and former Commissioners, (collectively, the "Commissioners") who are named as defendants in any legal action, suit or proceeding, against any liability, loss, expense, claim or demand arising out of such action, suit or proceeding to the extent that such Commissioners are entitled to immunity under the Compact or applicable law from liability, suit or accountability for the acts or omissions which form the basis for such claims brought against them.

As a condition precedent to a Commissioner's right to be defended and indemnified, the Commissioner must promptly provide written notice to the Executive Director of the Commission of any claim or the commencement of any action, suit or proceeding. The failure to so notify will relieve the Commission from any obligation which it may have to the Commissioner but only to the extent such failure has materially and irreparably injured the ability of the Commission to defend successfully such action, suit or proceeding, or to minimize the economic exposure resulting therefrom. With respect to each such action, suit or proceeding as to which a Commissioner gives proper notice to the Commission hereunder, the Commission shall be entitled to participate in the defense thereof at its own expense, and/or assume the defense thereof at its own expense. After notice from the Commission to the Commissioner of its election to assume such defense, the Commission will not be liable to the Commissioner under this Resolution or otherwise for any legal fees or other costs or expenses subsequently incurred by the Commissioner in connection with the defense thereof. The Commissioner shall have the right to employ his or her own counsel in such action, suit or proceeding, but the fees and expenses of such counsel incurred after notice from the Commission of its assumption of the defense thereof shall be at the sole expense of the Commissioner, unless (A) the retention of counsel by the Commissioner has been expressly authorized at such time by the Commission or, (B) it shall have been reasonably concluded that there may be a disabling conflict of interest between the Commission and the Commissioner in the conduct of the defense of such action, suit or proceeding. The Commission shall not be required to indemnify the Commissioner under this Resolution for amounts paid in settlement of any action, suit or proceeding effected without the Commission's prior written consent.

In the event that, either during or after the conclusion of any such action, suit or proceeding, it is determined in a final, non-appealable decision, order or judgment of a court having jurisdiction, that there is no immunity under the Compact or other applicable law protecting the Commissioner from liability, suit or accountability for the acts or omissions which form the basis for the action, suit or proceeding, then the Commissioner shall be obligated to repay all such costs and expenses theretofore incurred, advanced or reimbursed by the

Commission on his or her behalf in connection with the defense, settlement or satisfaction of a judgment in such action, suit or proceeding, and the claims asserted against the Commissioner in such action, suit or proceeding shall not be subject to indemnification by the Commission under this Resolution, unless a court having jurisdiction finally determines, after final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding, that the Commissioner is entitled to immunity under the Compact or other applicable law. Notwithstanding the above, nothing in this paragraph shall require a Commissioner to reimburse or repay an insurance carrier which has undertaken the defense of the Commissioner for costs and expenses theretofore incurred, advanced or reimbursed by the insurance carrier in connection with the defense of the Commissioner in such action, suit or proceeding.

We support the inclusion of a bicycle and pedestrian pathway on the new I-95 Scudder Falls Bridge. The ability for bicyclists and pedestrians to cross the Delaware River between Pennsylvania and New Jersey is severely limited. More than half of the bridges crossing the river do not allow bike-ped access.

The Bridge is scheduled to be built within the next few years. The Commission has conducted a significant public outreach program and according to the consultant the top request for the Scudder Falls Bridge project is the inclusion of a bicycle and pedestrian pathway.

A bicycle and pedestrian pathway on the Scudder Falls Bridge would:

- •Connect two major linear trails; the Delaware Canal and the D & R Canal.
- \*Improve equity It would be the first crossing of the Delaware River accessible to persons with disabilities
- •Would encourage bicycle tourists to explore beyond Washington Crossing south to Yardley, Morrisville and West Trenton
- •Would bring the bridge into compliance with Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) guidance for non-motorized transportation access.

Bicycle and pedestrian access to bridges are encouraged in all regional transportation plans including the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission's Long Range Plan as well as the respective New Jersey and Pennsylvania Bicycle and Pedestrian Plans. There have also been resolutions of support passed in the affected communities of Ewing Township, NJ and Lower Makefield Township, PA.

The estimated cost of the pathway is 14 Million Dollars or about 7% of the total cost of the 200+ million dollar project. The FHWA recommends inclusion of such facilities if the cost does not exceed 20% of the total cost.

Concern about oil prices, public health, climate change and dwindling highway funds are helping to shift public sentiment towards simpler energy efficient transportation choices, especially bicycling and walking. The Commission should take into account that transportation priorities may change during the 50 year lifespan of the new bridge and access for all users of our transportation system is the most prudent, economical choice.

#### DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of May 18, 2009 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS

Summary of April data: The Commission experienced an increase in average daily truck and automobile traffic and an overall increase in revenue collections in April compared to March.

April 2009 daily average revenue: \$240,851.58

March 2009 daily average revenue: \$225,146.31

April 2009 daily average automobiles: 88,104

March 2009 daily average automobiles: 81,326

April 2009 daily average trucks: 13,051

March 2009 daily average trucks: 12,220

**Note:** The information above is not adjusted for holidays, weekends or weather-related factors. This marks the third consecutive month of increases reflected in the breakdowns of month-to-month statistics.

April 2009 to April 2008 comparisons: Overall, the Commission experienced less revenue, less daily average automobile traffic and less daily average truck traffic in April 2009 as compared to April 2008; the results are reflective of the continuing economic slowdown.

April 2009 daily average revenue: \$240,851.58

April 2008 daily average revenue: \$250,991.17

April 2009 daily average automobiles: 88,104

April 2008 daily average automobiles: 88,692

April 2009 daily average trucks: 13,051

April 2008 daily average trucks: 14,753

April 2009 total revenue: \$7,225,547.44

April 2008 total revenue: \$7,529,735.24

Overall decline in total toll revenue was 4.04 percent

Passenger vehicles generated 10.4 percent MORE revenue

Commercial vehicles generated 8.42 percent less revenue

- Total traffic volume for April 2009 decreased by 68,730 vehicles, or a 2.21 percent decrease compared to April 2008
  - Passenger vehicles decreased by 17,655 units, or 0.66 percent
  - Commercial vehicles decreased by 51,075 units, or 10.4 percent

**Note:** The new E-ZPass pricing policy instituted in mid-January 2009 largely accounts for the passenger vehicle revenue increase recorded in April 2009.

**Toll-supported bridge traffic:** Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the Commission's 11 toll-supported vehicular bridges for April 2009 increased by 55,566 vehicles – or 2.12 percent – compared to April 2008.

### Four-month DRJTBC trends:

- For the first four months of 2009, the average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges
  was 93,870 total vehicles as compared to 97,288 total vehicles for the same 2008 YTD period, a decrease
  of 3.5 percent.
- Comparisons of toll bridge traffic and revenues in the first four months shows the following:
  - Overall revenue for the first four months is down 5.41 percent compared to the same period in 2008; revenues rose 7.26 percent for cars but dropped 9.31 percent for trucks.
  - The revenue declines for the first four months of the year are 10.6 percent in January, 4.81 percent in February, 2.28 percent decline in March, 4.04 percent in April.
  - April marked the first time this year that the differences in the month/year-to-month/year daily average truck counts did not narrow. This explains why overall revenues declined at a slightly higher level in April compared to March.

### Regional/National trends and outlooks:

- Other multi-state toll agencies in our region are reporting similar percentage declines in overall traffic and truck revenues (Staff discussions and correspondence with various toll agencies)
- Gasoline prices are expected to remain at current five-year lows during the 2009 summer driving season because of the global economic slump (Wall Street Journal MarketWatch)

### District I

April 2009 toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) decreased by 14,654 cars and 10,607 trucks, resulting in a 4.49% decrease in total toll traffic when compared to April 2008. It should be noted that roadway construction work for the Trenton – Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehabilitation and One Auxiliary Northbound Lane (T-380B) began in April 2007. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), an increase of 14,491 cars combined with a decrease of 1,065 trucks generated an overall increase in total toll traffic of 8.59% for April 2009 as compared to April 2008.

### District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced a 2.23% decrease in total toll traffic for April 2009 compared to April 2008 as a result of an 8,000 vehicle decrease in cars and a 26,004 vehicle decrease in trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, a decrease of 47,619 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 1,735 trucks to generate an overall decrease in total toll traffic of 7.97% for April 2009.

### District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) reflected a decrease in total toll traffic of 4.98% for the month of April 2009 as a result of a decrease of 4,509 automobiles and a decrease of 1,149 trucks. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, an increase of 25,479 passenger vehicles combined with a decrease of 13,546 trucks to generate an increase of 1.52% in total toll traffic for April 2009 as compared to April 2008. At Milford-Montague (MM), an increase of 1,157 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 419 trucks combined to produce a modest 0.73% increase in total toll traffic for the month.

### STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of April 2009 and the four month year-to-date operations of fiscal year 2009 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$3,480,836 for the month of April. For the fiscal year-to-date 2009 period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$15,304,882 or 91.7% of the year-to-date operating budget. Most of the expense line items are well within their year-to-date operating budget.

There are several line items that are currently running ahead of budget on a year-to-date basis. Salary expense is currently running about 1.5% over budget. The current operating budget anticipates a 3.5% vacancy rate for all salary classes but currently less than 2% of budgeted positions are vacant. Due to the heavy number of snow incidents in January, Overtime Wages were well in excess (\$19,000) of the year-to-date budget for that line item. Retiree Benefits are running over budget (\$63,000) due to higher than anticipated charges by non NEBCO eligible retirees. The expense for retirees is anticipated to come back in line during the remainder of the operating year. All other expense line items are within their budgets.

There were no unusual items charged to expense in the month of April.

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 71 purchase orders. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 81 price inquiries were sent out for 40 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 2.03 per order ( $81 \div 40$ ).

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

During the month of April, 2009 the Director of Policy and Planning participated in a number of communications and meetings that explored the following:

The Warren County Route 22 Corridor Study Technical Advisory Committee reviewed the daylong Vision Workshop Results. A presentation on the assessment, potential strategies, and recommendations to address transportation conditions, including a potential transit shuttle expansion, filled the committee's corridor discussions.

The Central New Jersey Transportation Forum included the following presentations: Thomas Wospil, Director, Capital Investment Planning and Development, New Jersey Department of Transportation spoke about the state's financial situation and the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009; Somerset County Freeholder Peter Palmer updated the group on the Liberty Corridor; Jack Kanarek, Senior Director, Project Development Capital Planning, New Jersey Transit discussed the Route 1 Corridor Bus Rapid Transit Forecasts; and The Route 1 Regional Growth Strategy Sub-Area Workshops, which are focusing on identifying a range of transportation improvement concepts, reported to the forum.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee discussed the following topics: Lehigh Valley International Airport; Lehigh and Northampton Transportation Authority; the phase two (Lehigh Valley portion) Central New Jersey Raritan Valley Transit Study; the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009; and the Federal Clean Tea Legislation.







The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving Electronic Security and Surveillance:

#### Radio System

- On April 24, 2009, Mr. McCartney, Mr. Tolotta, ESS, and Operations personnel
  met with the New Jersey and Pennsylvania State Police to discuss various radio,
  dispatching, and enforcement issues. Several operational issues were discussed
  and the meeting was mutually beneficial to all agencies. An additional meeting
  concerning radio and dispatching issues will be scheduled by the NJSP in the near
  future at Hamilton Dispatch Center.
- The material for the in-building radio antenna system at the Trenton-Morrisville
   Toll Bridge Facility is currently being installed. Once the system is operational, a
   communications survey will be conducted at the Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge
   Facility to enhance radio communications at that bridge.
- Approval for the start of construction at the new Stockton Intelligent Repeater Site has been granted. Equipment for the site has been requisitioned and ordered. Construction will begin once the equipment is received.
- Various DRJTBC radio issues were investigated during the month by ESS personnel.

#### Access Control System

- ESS personnel created ID badges for new employees and consultants. The ACS
  database was audited to purge the system of invalid employee and contractor cards.
  Additionally, various employee ACS rights were updated and/or changed at the
  request of supervisors and upon the approval of the Deputy Executive Director of
  Operations.
- The Delaware Water Gap Access Control System was placed on-line. Work continues on the Trenton-Morrisville, Portland-Columbia, and Milford-Montague Access Control Systems.
- On April 17, 2009, the Access Control System at the Delaware Water Gap and Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge Facilities failed. The emergency access back-up

system was instituted and allowed for normal business practices to continue. MEC and Siemens responded immediately and the system was brought back online within 2-1/2 hours. Siemens subsequently upgraded the system's software in an attempt to prevent future failures.

#### Electronic Surveillance System

- The Secondary Control Center continues to be staffed by ESS, Security, Safety, &
  Training personnel, and the NJSP liaison Monday through Friday, 8:30 am to 4:00
  pm. During the month various camera issues and problems were documented by
  ESS personnel and provided to MEC. ESS personnel continue to establish
  camera patrols and camera presets to ensure the safety of DRJTBC personnel,
  infrastructure, and assets.
- On April 1, 2009, ESS personnel met with Engineering to discuss the housing costs associated with the Primary Control Center being constructed at an external facility similar to the New Jersey State Police Regional Operations Intelligence Center vs. a Commission facility.
- On April 13, 2009, ESS personnel met with Engineering and Mr. Tolotta to discuss the status of the ESS project and the quality of the video being produced over the Wide Area Network (WAN).
- On April 16, 2009, ESS personnel attended an internal ESS project status meeting at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge Facility with Engineering and JEK.
- On April 20, 2009, Mr. Tolotta and ESS personnel met with the Pennsylvania State Police at their Consolidated Dispatch Center, Norristown, PA., to explore the possibility of the Commission housing the ESS Primary Control Center at this location. Additional issues such as construction costs, salaries, radio capability, etc., must be discussed prior to determining the feasibility of housing the Primary Control Center at Norristown.
- On April 22, 2009, an analysis for housing and staffing the ESS Primary Control Center at an external facility vs. an internal Commission facility was presented to the Commissioners.

- On April 23, 2009, ESS personnel, Engineering, Mr. McCartney, Mr. Tolotta, and Mr. Alexandridis attended a transcoder demonstration presented by MEC at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge Facility. During the demonstration the transcoder produced favorable results and increased the viewing quality and capabilities of the Secondary Control Station.
- On April 28, 2009, ESS personnel and Engineering attended a meeting with upper level management from MEC and Siemens to discuss various ESS project issues.
- On April 30, 2009, ESS personnel attended the ESS project status meeting at MEC, Frenchtown, N.J.
- Throughout the month ESS personnel continued to work several days with the Easton, PA., Police Department to gather video evidence pertaining to a homicide that occurred on March 31, 2009, just west of the Northampton Street Toll Supported Bridge.
- ESS personnel and Siemens also begun developing ESS viewing rights for the various DRJTBC employees who will have access to the electronic surveillance cameras.
- During the month camera views were set by ESS personnel and MEC at the Calhoun and Center Bridge-Stockton Toll Supported Bridges.
- Additionally, ESS personnel and Siemens installed Intelligent Video features/camera analytics at the Lower Trenton, Scudder Falls, Center Bridge-Stockton, and Riegelsville bridges.
- ESS personnel investigated four video requests during the month. One request came from District II and concerned property damage to the grass area west of the Uhlerstown bridge approach. The ESS system revealed the damage was caused when a tractor-trailer crossed the bridge from New Jersey to Pennsylvania and was unable to make the turn onto Rt. 32 South. The second request came from Engineering and concerned property damage on I-78 Eastbound prior to Interchange 3. No cameras cover that area. The third request also came through Engineering and concerned a major tractor-trailer accident that occurred on I-78 Eastbound, milepost 1.2. The accident closed the roadway for approximately five hours and was not captured on video since there is no camera coverage in that

area. The fourth request originated from NJSP Perryville and concerned the theft of equipment from a business on I-78.

Video was also captured depicting an incident at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Facility wherein a driver experienced a medical emergency while approaching Toll Lane 4. The driver stopped his vehicle just prior to the toll and became incoherent. The vehicle was idle while in drive and preventive action had to be taken to secure the vehicle from moving forward. The Pennsylvania State Police and emergency medical personnel responded to the scene to assist Toll personnel.

 ESS personnel reviewed and purged the ESS video storage database which contains copies of duplicated videos requested by outside agencies.

#### Miscellaneous

- On April 2, 2009, ESS personnel assisted District I when \$150.00 was discovered missing from the Trenton-Morrisville Change Fund. The investigation was subsequently turned over to the Pennsylvania State Police.
- On April 3, 2009, ESS personnel assisted District I when Trenton Police
  Department requested the closure of Route 1 Northbound due to a serious motor
  vehicle accident. All traffic was diverted off the Route 29 exit.

## TRENTON-MORRISVILLE (ROUTE 1) TOLL BRIDGE REHABILITATION AND ADDITION OF ONE NB AUXILIARY LANE

#### DESIGN Contract No. C-380A

The Design Consultant, The Louis Berger Group, continues to provide services through the post-design/construction phase of the project.

#### CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-380B

The Construction Management/Construction Inspection Consultant, Hill International, has been coordinating field activities with the Contractor, reviewing Contractor schedules, conducting bi-weekly Progress and Scheduling Meetings, preparing daily reports, tracking project submittals and developing public involvement and outreach efforts.

#### CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-380B

The project has recently switched into the final traffic stage, Stage 3, which is expected to last until substantial completion in late summer 2009. During this stage both northbound and southbound traffic will ride on the newly constructed bridge deck along the outer portions of the main river bridge, while the Contractor occupies the center lanes to perform deck removal and new deck placement. Southbound and Northbound traffic will now drive on areas of the newly reconstructed New Jersey and Pennsylvania approach roadways.

Bridge approach slab construction is ongoing at Ramp N. At the TMTB, deck placement has been completed so work has commenced on the new center median barrier. Deck placement for the final section of the Route 29 Overpass is scheduled to be performed. Work continues at Ramp Y with the completion of new deck joints and parapet transitions. Sandblasting/painting of the existing beams will continue beneath the Washington Street and may also begin beneath the Ramp N Overpass. Crews will also continue with the installation of the new median barrier between Route 1 NB & SB and paving will be performed within areas where the median barrier has been completed and new curb and sidewalk will be installed on the north side of S. Pennsylvania Avenue. Work will again be postponed next week with the installation of the structure mounted sound wall posts and panels along Moreau Street between Washington Street and Delmorr Avenue. Landscape work will resume once weather permits.

## TRENTON-MORRISVILLE TOLL BRIDGE, TOLL PLAZA, CHANGE OF PLAN - CANOPY SIGNAGE

Contract No. C-449A-5

Direction has recently been provided to Conti to move forward with ordering and installing the signs as per the Change-of-Plan documents prepared by The Louis Berger Group's subconsultant, Gannett Fleming. The signs take up to four months to procure with installation commencing once the materials are received and work is scheduled. Shop Drawings of the Daktonics signs are currently under review.

# CODE COMPLIANCE INSPECTION TRENTON-MORRISVILLE TOLL BRIDGE, NEWLY CONSTRUCTED TOLL PLAZA HEADHOUSE AND TUNNEL

Contract No. C-451A-8

Remington, Vernick & Arango (RVA) has executed the Task Order Assignment and has performed the initial field work and document review associated with the Code Compliance Inspections for the Newly Constructed Tunnel and Headhouse at the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Plaza. RVA has prepared their findings and forwarded a deficiencies list to the Commission. Subsequently, this list was forwarded to the Contractor who is in the process of making the necessary corrections. RVA is scheduled to return to the site to perform a final inspection once all corrections have been addressed.

# TRENTON-MORRISVILLE TOLL FACILITY, EMERGENCY GENERATOR NOISE STUDY & ABATEMENT RECOMMENDATION

#### STUDY Contract No. C-450A-9

The Commission received a proposal from Brinjac Engineering to perform a noise abatement study to address emergency generator noise emissions and provide recommendations to improve the existing conditions. The proposal has been reviewed and approved by the Commission. A Kick-off meeting was held with Brinjac on February 24, 2009 with a follow-up field investigation taking place on March 11, 2009. Brinjac has submitted a draft noise abatement study which is currently under review by Commission staff.

# TRENTON-MORRISVILLE TOLL FACILITY, PADEP SITE CHARACTERIZATION REPORT AND SOIL SAMPLING

Contract No. C-449A-9

The Commission met with the Louis Berger Group (LBG) on December 16, 2008 to discuss scope and schedule for a site characterization report requested by PADEP for an underground storage tank removal performed in 1993 at the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge facility. LBG's proposal was reviewed and approved by the Commission and field testing was performed on February 19, 2009. The Commission has received the draft letter report/summary. Once it is finalized the report will be forwarded to PADEP.

# PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

# STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Draft Environmental Assessment (EA) and the Section 4(f) documents were submitted to and reviewed by Commission staff, the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT), the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT), and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The Draft EA and 4(f) documents were revised to address agency comments and were forwarded to them on November 14, 2008 for final review and approval to circulate to the public. The Project Team has received minor comments from NJDOT, PennDOT, and FHWA-NJ Division. These comments have been addressed. Copies of the documents have been forwarded to PennDOT for forwarding to the four NEPA Cooperating Agencies for final review and to FHWA for Legal Sufficiency Review. Comments from these agencies are anticipated in coordination with PennDOT and **FHWA** mid-May and Commission/AECOM staff are holding weekly meetings to track the EA review process.

The FHWA has recommended additional consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) on the EA. Accordingly, a Biological Assessment Report (BA) was prepared for threatened and endangered species and was submitted to the NMFS in September. The report addresses the construction impacts, and specifically the temporary causeway that is needed for the construction of the bridge over Delaware River, on the shortnose sturgeon spawning environment and yellow lampmussel habitat, which are endangered species known to be present in the area of the Scudder Falls Bridge. The report also addresses the hydraulic impacts of the causeway construction on the back water elevation upstream of the Scudder Falls bridge location. Additional information was transmitted to the NMFS at their request, to clarify certain sections of the BA report. NMFS has indicated they have all required information with which to issue their Biological Opinion (BO). A "No Jeopardy" opinion is anticipated from NMFS.

Both NJ and PA State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) have issued determinations of effects for project effects on historic and archaeological resources. A Draft Programmatic Agreement to stipulate future actions required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, has been prepared and has been reviewed by FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT. This document identifies the mitigation measures to be taken as a result of the finding of Adverse Effect to the Delaware & Raritan Canal cultural resource and potential for adverse effect to archaeological resources in PA and NJ. The Draft Programmatic Agreement also has been reviewed by the NJHPO and the Delaware and Raritan Canal Commission, and comments have been received. The Draft Programmatic Agreement will be sent to the PA SHPO for review and concurrence. This document includes signatories from the Commission and outside New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and FHWA agencies involved in reviewing the EA.

The Program Manager, Jacobs Edwards & Kelcey (E&K), has been reviewing DBM Team schedules, tracking and reviewing project submittals, conducting bi-weekly Project Status / Design Review Meetings, coordinating communications with the traveling public, and providing construction oversight.

# DESIGN-BUILD-MAINTAIN PROJECT Contract No. DB-396A

Construction work continues and primarily involves the installation of outside plant infrastructure along with devices at various facilities throughout the Commission's jurisdiction. Access control work activities involve installation of elements within administration / maintenance buildings at various toll bridge facilities.

Devices at the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge, Lower Trenton Toll Supported Bridge, Scudder Falls Toll Supported Bridge, Interstate 78 Toll Bridge, Northampton Street Toll Supported Bridge, Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge, and Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge have been made operational along with the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge Control Center.

Field Installation Tests and Field Integrated System Tests were conducted at the Lower Trenton Toll Supported Bridge, and Calhoun Street Toll Supported Bridge.

Bi-weekly Project Status / Design Review Meetings are being held to review milestone project construction activities, design progress and other project related items.

Final Acceptance Testing of the system is scheduled to begin in June and completed in July.

This Report has been reviewed by VITETTA, and enhancements recommendations were made in regards to the old electrical system for the Commission to consider in an upcoming future Contract. Revised close-out documents are being prepared by Twining Construction Company for review.

Greenman-Pedersen, Inc (GPI) continues to provide CM/CI services for this CM/CI contract which includes monitoring and coordinating field activities of the contractor, reviewing and commenting on contractor biweekly schedule updates, preparation of contractor invoicing, preparing and distributing minutes of the bi-weekly Progress and Schedule Update Meetings and pre-activity meetings, preparing daily inspection reports, tracking and processing both requests for information (RFIs) and project submittals and tracking project correspondence along with public information efforts which includes responding to customer generated questions/concerns obtained via the toll free construction hotline phone number. A meeting was held with GPI to review and discuss their cost-to-complete submission.

# CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-424A

Tilcon New York, Inc. continues to progress the work on schedule. Work continues on the full depth concrete replacement and the overlay asphalt paving operations in both the east bound and west bound directions. The median areas continue to be raised to the new grades along with the raising of the drainage inlets in those median areas. The full depth concrete replacement sections in both the left lanes and center lanes were completed with those in the right lane begun. Overlay asphalt pavement of both the interlayer and intermediate layer has been completed in the left shoulder, left lane and center lane in the westbound direction between approximate Mile Post 3.5 and approximate Mile Post 1.5 and in the eastbound direction from the River to approximate Mile Post 3.5. Overlay asphalt of both the interlayer and the intermediate layer in the right lane and right shoulder in both the westbound and east bound direction within the aforementioned Mile Post locations was begun. Guide rail replacement continues. Work on the parapets on both Edge Road and Carpentersville Road over head bridges was started. The present maintenance and protection of traffic implemented results in two through travel lanes 24/7. The contractor also continues to maintain the work zone.

# I-78 ORT Lanes Design (Infrastructure Project) Contract C-427B

A proposal has been submitted to prepare a Design-Build package to convert lanes 5, 6 and 7 of the conventional plaza to 2-lanes of ORT at the I-78 Toll Bridge. The design-build approach will follow the guidelines for a one step, low bid selection as outlined in the PennDOT Publication No. 448 – Innovative Bidding Toolkit. The proposal includes Tasks A through E of Part V of the contract and includes services from the pre-bid phase through construction. The proposal is under evaluation by Commission staff.

# In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project DB-427C

ACS State and Local Solutions (ACS) and Commission staff participated in a monthly progress meeting. ACS submitted the project schedule, QA Program, and Software Development document for acceptance. ACS has completed a field view of the seven (7) toll plazas, associated tunnels and communication rooms of the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges. ACS researched the Commission's Records Room and has received copies of drawings of the various toll plazas, ETC installation plans, and ETC advanced signage plans.

# <u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Design-Build-Operate-</u> Maintain Project DB-427D

The software escrow agreement was executed by the Commission, ETC and the escrow agent. Program Monthly Review Meeting No. 5 was held via conference call with ETC to discuss completed efforts and upcoming tasks associated with implementing the CSC transition. Bi-weekly Progress Meetings continue to occur via conference calls.

Weekly conference calls with Commission staff, ETC and ACS continue so all parties may coordinate activities with the CSC database transfer. ETC and ACS completed its first database transfer of all customer data and transaction history from the inception of *E-ZPass*<sup>SM</sup> at the Commission. The data was transferred from ACS to ETC via a secure FTP site over a weekend period. This involved shutting down the existing CSC so a true snapshot of the database could be transferred. In addition to using the secure FTP site, a portable hard drive was hand delivered from ACS to the Commission to ETC and used as a backup. The database transfer required additional time than anticipated, therefore all parties agreed to complete a second database transfer as a dress rehearsal prior to going live. This database transfer will again take place over a weekend period and requires ACS to shutdown the CSC in order to provide a snapshot of the data. Should the database transitioning smoothly ETC will continue preparing for the June 1, 2009 cutover. In the event the transition does not go well, a recovery plan will be developed by ETC.

Commission staff, ETC and the IAG continue to participate in several meetings to coordinate the new IAG network connection in Richardson, Texas. This connection to be completed by AT&T was requested several months ago by the IAG and is anticipated to be installed by mid-May 2009. Members from the sponsoring agencies to complete the IAG testing of the CSC have participated in the weekly conference calls. ETC began sending files to the sponsoring agencies to check for proper format.

The agreement with Paymentech for credit card processing was executed by Commission staff and ETC has developed the interface. ETC has procured the lockbox services and has developed the interface with the Commission's bank, Wachovia.

Commission staff traveled to Richardson, Texas to observe the Factory Acceptance Test (FAT). Additionally, Commission staff will visit the Lisle, IL location to confirm that the backup system was installed and is successfully operating.

Commission staff transferred the archived paper files from ACS and has stored them is a secure location at the Phillipsburg Administration Building. These archived files can be destroyed by year, once a records retention policy is adopted by the Commission. The existing inventory of *E-ZPass*<sup>SM</sup> tags, the Commission's tag programmer and the Commission's tag tester were transferred from ACS to ETC. Carrier services to transfer these items were arranged and coordinated by Commission staff.

# TREADLE AND FRAME REHABILITATION AT 1-78

Contract No. T-379AR-5

The concrete support and steel treadle frames at I-78 lanes 1, 4 & 5 have deteriorated to the point where audit integrity is being impaired. A proposal has been received from TransCore for the replacement of the treadle frames. A rehabilitation contract for this emergency work was approved by the Commission at the April meeting.

The CM/CI Consultant, STV Incorporated, monitors and coordinates construction activities. The inspectors complete daily diaries of contractor work activities. The Resident Engineer submits work activity summaries with updates, the 2-week look-ahead schedule weekly, and monthly progress reports. Staffing fluctuates according to the contractor's activities.

A list of potential change orders and necessary activities because of unforeseen conditions has been established and regularly updated. The construction contract is projected to finish within budget.

The Consultant continues to log RFIs and Shop Drawing submittals and coordinate his staff's activities. Progress Meetings and Schedule Update Meetings are conducted in the Project Field Office a minimum of once a month.

# CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-430A

Quadrant D deck removal began in early April. Installation of new deck panels was completed in mid April. Deck waterproofing and post-tensioning of the deck panels will be completed in mid May. The deck is on schedule for completion by Memorial Day.

The new Toll Plaza is open to traffic and fully functional. Manufactured stone facing of the toll booths, island barriers and single faced barrier will be completed in early May. The Toll Plaza is scheduled for completion by Memorial Day.

Traffic across the bridge is controlled by coordinated signals at each end of the bridge. These signals allow northbound and southbound traffic to alternately use the northbound lane while the contractor replaces the deck in the fourth, and final, bridge quadrant. Uninterrupted traffic across both lanes of the bridge will be established by Memorial Day.

# DELAWARE WATER GAP TOLL BRIDGE OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) STUDY AND CONCEPT DESIGN

# Contract No. C-440A

Progress Meeting No. 3 was held with Commission staff and Stantec Consulting Services Inc. to discuss progress completed, upcoming work efforts, status of the schedule and budget.

Conceptual plans of three (3) alternatives: One-Lane ORT, One-Lane ORT with Alignment Shift, and Two-Lane ORT were developed by Stantec. Conceptual design of the approach roadway signage and toll plaza canopy signage was also prepared.

Stantec submitted a draft Study and Concept Design report, which is under review by Commission staff and comments will be provided to Stantec. Stantec and Commission staff participated in a workshop to review the traffic simulations and analysis, the alternatives that were developed, the results of the concept study and develop consensus on the preferred alternative. The preferred alternative, the One-Lane ORT, will be presented at the May 2009 Committee Meeting along with a summary of the concept study.

Stantec is advancing the design of the sign structures that are necessary for the ORT implementation. The sign structures will be developed to a level of completeness that allows Stantec to begin the approval process with the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) since some of the proposed sign structures are located within NJDOT jurisdiction.

In accordance with Part II, Task F of the scope of services included in the agreement, the Commission requested a proposal from Stantec that includes developing plans, specification and estimate (PS&E) for this project. The option for the Commission to request a proposal for the final design was included in this agreement to continue with the expedited implementation of ORT at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge. The proposal will include effort by Stantec to prepare contract documents that allows the Commission to advertise the construction project and receive bids.

# PORTLAND BOROUGH SEWER FORCE MAIN CONNECTION AND FACILITY PARKING LOT PAVING

Contract No. C-450B-4

This assignment is for study and design work associated with the required connection of the Portland Toll Facility to a nearby new sanitary sewer system installed by the municipality. The Commission has studied various alternative alignments and is moving forward with Alternative No. 4 as detailed in the T&M Associates' letter report entitled "Portland Borough Sewer Force Main Connection" dated September 28, 2007.

Additionally, the 2007 Annual Inspection Report identified the need for minor improvements and repaying of the Administration Building Main Parking Lot, the Salt Storage Yard Lot and the Access Driveway and Turn-Around for the Salt Storage Yard. This work has been incorporated into this assignment.

For cost efficiency purposes, it was decided to combine the T&M sewer and paving work, T&M's new Salt Storage Facility design with the P-C Locust Street Bridge construction work being designed by the Louis Berger Group (LBG). LBG will take the lead in preparing the final construction bid documents.

T&M made their Final Submission which was forwarded to LBG for inclusion as part of construction contract T-441A.

This assignment is for study and design work associated with a new District III salt storage facility to be constructed at Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Maintenance Facility as described in the 2007 and 2008 Annual Inspection Reports. The design will determine the final salt storage capacity, storage location and type of storage structure.

For cost efficiency purposes, it was decided to combine the T&M sewer and paving work, T&M's new Salt Storage Facility design with the P-C Locust Street Bridge construction work being designed by the Louis Berger Group (LBG). LBG will take the lead in preparing the final construction bid documents.

A problem statement and pre-proposal meeting was held with T&M on March 4, 2009. T&M has submitted a proposal and it has been reviewed and recommended for Commission approval. A Notice-to-Proceed was provided on March 26, 2009. T&M is currently working on the Concept Study Phase of the assignment.

# PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE FACILITY, LOCUST STREET REPAIRS

Contract No. C-449A-8

The Louis Berger Group's (LBG) was issued a Notice-to-Proceed on September 3, 2008. Field work has been completed and inspection findings have been submitted and reviewed by the Commission. A field meeting was held on October 23, 2008 with LBG and T&M Associates to discuss combining both design assignments for the Portland-Columbia Facility into a single construction project (T-441A). LBG has submitted a proposal to include the additional coordination and design effort necessary to combine the work into one construction contract as part of their Task Order Assignment. LBG has submitted preliminary design plans and specifications which have been reviewed by Commission staff. Berger is now working toward final design and will be incorporating design elements from Contract No. C-450B-4 (Portland Borough Sewer Force Main Connection and Facility Parking Lot Paving) & new assignment C-450B-6 (P-C Toll Bridge Salt Storage Facility).

# WASHINGTON CROSSING TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE PHASE 1 REHABILITATION & CONCEPT STUDY

Contract No. C-442A

A Notice of Award and Limited Notice-to-Proceed was provided to Dewberry-Goodkind on September 30, 2008.

The Contract documents have been executed and field work commenced the week of October 27, 2008. Field inspections and assessments have been completed and reports summarizing findings have been submitted and reviewed. A revised In-Depth Inspection and Evaluation Report was submitted on January 26, 2009. Dewberry has also submitted a Draft Concept Report that is currently under review by Commission Staff. A Concept Study Workshop was held on March 4<sup>th</sup> with Dewberry, and other members of the design team, Louis Berger Group and Commission staff to review Dewberry's findings and recommendations and to provide comments. Dewberry has completed revisions to the report based on comments received and is proceeding with preliminary design. Commission staff has met with local public officials in Upper Makefield, PA and Hopewell Township, NJ to begin the public outreach process. Additional stakeholder meetings are scheduled to be held in May with open houses anticipated in June.

# VALUE ENGINEERING /CONSTRUCTABILITY REVIEW WORKSHOP WASHINGTON CROSSING TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE PHASE 1 REHABILITATION

Contract No. C-449A-10

This assignment requests Berger to review Dewberry's draft in-depth inspection and concept study report, attend the one-day workshop and the development of a letter report summarizing the findings and recommendations as a result of the workshop. The overall goal of the workshop is to provide comments to Dewberry to be considered in advancing the preferred design concept for near-term improvements and the conceptual improvement alternatives for long-term consideration. Subsequent to the workshop Berger provided the Commission a draft of the letter report summarizing the workshop session which is currently being finalized.

The Design Consultant, Erdman Anthony (EA), submitted the DRAFT Concept Study Report at the end of March. EA has determined that a complete deck replacement is required. Traffic must be detoured during the deck replacement. Several alternative concepts, in terms of maintenance of traffic during construction, are being developed. Alternatives include: a complete bridge closure until deck replacement is complete; closure and deck replacement on weekdays with the bridge open to traffic on the weekends; closure and deck replacement during extended weekends with the bridge open to traffic during weekdays.

The Project has been introduced to the public officials on both sides of the river and Open House Meetings are being scheduled. A public Meeting will be held on either side of the river for the general public prior to establishing the preferred alternative bridge closure schedule.

Project Status Meetings are conducted monthly.

# CALHOUN STREET TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION PRELIMINARY DESIGN, FINAL DESIGN AND POST DESIGN SERVICES

# DESIGN Contract No. C-447B

This project is for the Preliminary Design, Final Design and Post Design Services for the Rehabilitation of the Calhoun Street Toll-Supported Bridge based on the Concept Study Report developed under separate contract (C-447A). The project consists of a floor system replacement, truss repairs and miscellaneous improvements.

The Consultant has performed coordination with Public Officials in Morrisville and Trenton to introduce the project and to better identify project stake holders. The initial public officials meetings have been conducted. After stakeholders meeting which will be held in Morrisville and Trenton, the Consultant will prepare for Open House meetings on each side of the river.

This task order is for a comprehensive audit of the Commission's current safety program (policies, practices and resources) and to develop the recommended next steps required to align this program with the Commission's stated goal of facilitating a work environment that is as safe as possible for contractors, employees and general public. The Commission's executive staff (Executive Director, Chief Operating Officer, Chief Engineer and Director of Safety) has determined that this audit is necessary given the increase in the number of safety exposures associated with the Commission's expanded capital program.

Transportation Resources Associates, Inc (TRA), a sub Consultant to Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) has visited the Commission's active construction sites and has conducted interviews with contractors, CM/CI Consultants and Commission Project Managers. Meetings were also held with District Superintendents to gain insight into the internal operational and work zone environment of each facility.

AECOM incorporated the final review comments into two independent reports which isolate internal operations from the contracted construction projects the Commission awards.

The Draft Final Report has been submitted and is currently being reviewed by Commission Engineering staff.

# DELAWARE WATER GAP TOLL BRIDGE BEARING REMEDIATION AND DECK STUDY

# DESIGN Contract No. C-472A

The Concept Study Report recommendations have been reviewed by the Engineering Department. Discussions with the consultant during the review have resulted in recommendation to replace the existing bridge bearings instead of repairing them. Additionally, the limits of painting of the bridge have been revised to include the entire bridge and, bridge deck treatment has been recommended for inclusion in the upcoming construction contract.

The Part II Preliminary Design for the Bearing Replacements and Structural Repairs has been submitted and is currently under review by the CPMC staff.

# Pennsylvania

 Milford Borough, PA – Construction for East Harford Street Streetscape Improvements project was completed in December 2007 by LR Costanzo Construction. The municipality was reimbursed \$453,000.00 (100% of total grant amount). The Borough also had funds from Penn DOT for this project and the CAI department reviewed that the work funded by the CAI grant is completed.

The Traffic Study Project is also completed and the CAI department reimbursed \$24,900.00 (100% of total grant amount). The Borough has been reimbursed for all expenses.

The application for the replacement of the old existing Mott Street vehicular bridge for a pedestrian and Bicycle Bridge that will connect Milford and Dingmans Township, in coordination with Pike County Planning Department, is on hold in case additional funds become available for Pennsylvania's CAI projects. If more funds become available, this would be an application that can meet the CAI characteristics.

2. Smithfield, PA – The construction of the project is substantially complete. The contractor is currently addressing final punch list items and a final inspection by PennDOT is anticipated to be completed this month. To date, the CAI department has disbursed \$700,766.35 of \$779,000.00 (90% of total grant amount). The Township has indicated that they will be submitting a second reallocation request to the Commission to transfer funds from the Contingency phase to the Construction phase to facilitate the total cost for the construction of the project (original contract award plus approved change orders). This request is still forthcoming to date.

# Pennsylvania (continued)

3. Delaware Water Gap, PA – The construction of the Broad Street Sidewalk Project is substantially complete, with several punch list items remaining to be addressed. In addition, a final inspection by PennDOT must be completed. The Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project is also substantially complete with a final inspection by the Borough's engineer, Boucher & James, remaining to be completed. The Borough's engineer, Boucher & James, has indicated that repairs will need to be made to the concrete sidewalks for both projects due to some cracking and flaking that occurred over the winter. Boucher & James has proposed a repair method, which is scheduled to be completed this month. The Borough has indicated that the repairs will be made at the contractors' expense and they do not intend to seek reimbursement from the Commission for the work.

To date, the CAI department has reimbursed \$134,986.74 to the Borough for the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* and \$245,159.50 for the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project*.

A reimbursement request for the Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvement Project, in the amount of \$21,198.05, is currently on hold until the sidewalk repairs are completed and the Borough's construction contract with the contractor is closed out.

Oak Street Water Line Replacement Project – this project is on hold - The Borough has informally indicated that this project will not be completed due to lack of additional funding needed. The preliminary cost estimate for the project was approx. \$76,000.00. The most recent engineer's estimate for the project is approx. \$172,000.00. If new funds become available, this is a project that could meet the CAI requirements.

4. Portland Borough, PA – The Park and Walk project has been completed by Glen G. Hale Construction. The project started in January 2008 and finished in August 2008, and was inspected and approved by PennDOT in November 2008. The SR 0611 Pedestrian Crossing construction bids came in above the anticipated cost, and the project will be re-bid in an attempt to obtain a lower construction cost. The Borough's engineer, RKR Hess, is currently working with PennDOT to revise the pedestrian crossing plans and specifications to reduce the project cost so the second round bids come in within budget. The construction of the pedestrian crossing will be completed in the Summer 2009.

The construction of the Shade Tree and Lighting project has been substantially completed by Glen G. Hale Construction and is estimated to be completed this month. At this time, various punch list items remain to be completed, along with the replacement or repair of a section of the sidewalk, as directed by RKR Hess, due to construction quality issues. The Streetscape project along the eastern side of Delaware Avenue (SR 0611) is currently in design and RKR Hess anticipates that the project will be bid in June 2009. To date, the CAI department has reimbursed \$333,302.57 of \$639,323.00 to date (52% of total grant amount).

The Park & Ride construction was awarded to Glen G. Hale Construction in October 2008. To date, the project is substantially complete with only a few punch list items remaining. It is anticipated that construction will be complete this month. To date, \$281,643.11 of \$667,567.00 (42% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI department, which included payment for the acquisition of the site by the Borough through eminent domain.

- 5. Lower Mount Bethel, PA S & K Construction was given the Notice to Proceed to begin construction on the *Pedestrian Trail Project* on March 27, 2008. The project is substantially complete and only a few project elements remain to be installed by Township staff. The work associated with this project is substantially complete, and is anticipated to be 100% complete this month. To date, \$331,777.50 of \$336,777.50 (99% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI Department. The *Park & Ride/Visitors' Center Project* construction started in April 2008 by Grace Industries (Park & Ride) and Weiss Construction (Visitors' Center). The work to be completed under the original contract is substantially complete and the project is anticipated to be 100% complete this month. The Township is currently working with their engineer and the contractor to install a wetland area for drainage purposes with the additional funding received from the Commission. To date the CAI Department has reimbursed \$753,069.23 of \$952,922.50 (79% of total grant amount). A ribbon cutting ceremony was held at the Visitor's Center on April 29, 2009.
- 6. Easton, PA The Riverwalk Project At the March 2009 Commissioners meeting, the City's proposal to complete an alternate project for the Riverwalk grant was approved. The new project, known as the Waterfront Improvements project, will implement pedestrian pathway, roadway, and intersection improvements in and around the area of the Northampton Toll-Supported Bridge and the segment of Larry Holmes Drive (SR 0611) between Northampton Street and South 3<sup>rd</sup> Street. Improvements would include a "road diet" for Larry Holmes Drive, consisting of a reduced number of lanes, high-visibility pedestrian crosswalks, intersection improvements at Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive to improve pedestrian accommodations, improvements to pedestrian pathways in the area such as lighting and horizontal and vertical hardscapes, and a visitor and pedestrian plaza at Scott Park. The City recently submitted the technical/price proposals for the consultants for the Waterfront Improvements project. The proposals are currently under review by Pennoni Associates. To date, \$600,000.00 of \$2,700,000.00 (22% of the total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the City of Easton for the original Riverwalk project.

On March 25, 2009 the City awarded the construction contract for the ADA Curb Ramps project, which is part of the *Pedestrian Pathways/Intersection Enhancements and Northampton St. Bridge Bike Path* grant. The contract was awarded to A.J. Trunzo, Inc., in the amount of \$44,547.00. In addition, the City also recently received bids for the Decorative Crosswalks project. The only bidder for the project was Dynamic Surface Applications, Ltd. with a bid of \$69,627.70. It is anticipated that the City will award the contract for the Decorative Crosswalks project to Dynamic Surface Applications, Ltd. this month. The City has also indicated that their Public Works Department intends to purchase and install the materials for the Bike Path Extension project and the LED Pedestrian Signals project. The Comprehensive Concept Plan for Larry Holmes Drive will now be part of the *Waterfront Improvements Project*. No grant disbursement has been requested for this project to date. In April, a number of letters have been received by the CAI department in support and in opposition of the "platform" section of the Waterfront project. Those letters in opposition were specific to indicate that they were not opposed to the other work being proposed in the area.

As mentioned previously, the City of Easton's new grant application for the Majestic Theater project was reviewed by the CAI department and it was found that the application does not meet the primary characteristics of the CAI program. Therefore, the project was not approved by the Commissioners.

- 7. Williams Township, PA This project was substantially completed in August 2008. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township by the CAI Department. The Township requested reimbursement for design/inspection services that exceeded their original budget for design/inspection. To date, the Township has been reimbursed up to their design/inspection budget. Costs exceeding the budget will be the responsibility of the Township. According to the municipality, the Contractor addressed and completed all the punch list items from PennDOT in September 2008; however, at a meeting held in late October, the municipality indicated that PennDOT is requesting additional ADA ramp work to comply with the new ADA standards. It is anticipated that the ADA ramp work will be completed this month. No significant improvement was noticed on this project since the last submitted report.
- 8. Riegelsville Borough, PA The Project started construction in August 2008 and it is anticipated to be completed in May 2009. On March 24, 2009 the pre-fabricated pedestrian bridge was set in place over the Delaware Canal. To date \$100,741.05 of \$230,000.00 (44% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI department. A Ribbon Cutting Ceremony is planned for June 4<sup>th</sup> at 11 AM.
- Solebury Township, PA This project is in construction as of August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and is substantially complete with the exception of the canal bridge pier staining and minor site drainage and restoration items, which will be completed in Spring 2009. To date, \$1,208,299.04 of \$1,755,150.00 has been reimbursed by the CAI Department (69%).
  - The municipality also requested an additional grant application for a roundabout project at the intersection of Route 202/179 and Kitchens Lane in the amount of \$800,000.00 that has not been approved by the Commissioners to date.
- 10. New Hope Borough, PA The Borough awarded the construction of the Bridge St. Traffic Signals project to Armour & Sons Electric on April 9, 2008 at their monthly Borough Council meeting. The project started on June 26, 2008 and is scheduled to be completed by June 2009 due to the need to include ADA compliant pedestrian facilities as per the direction of PennDOT. The Borough's engineer, Carroll Engineering, has also submitted revised plans to PennDOT for the approval of various minor changes (i.e. timing changes, striping changes) to the intersections that were identified during construction. It is anticipated that these changes can be implemented at the intersections as soon as PennDOT approval is received. Also as mentioned previously, the Borough's request to transfer the Main St. Bridge Lighting grant funds, in the amount of \$20,000.00, to the Bridge St. Traffic Signals project to facilitate the construction of the ADA curb ramps at the project intersections was approved by the Commissioners in January 2009 and therefore the Main St. Bridge Lighting project is officially terminated. To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$221,791.20 of \$446,404.00 (50% of total grant amount). The Borough recently submitted a reimbursement request in the amount of \$123,707.17, which is currently under review.
- Falls Township, PA Project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award.

- 12. Upper Makefield Township, PA This project is substantially complete. The Township has indicated that the project will be completed this month. To date the Township has been reimbursed \$1,342,055.57 of \$1,447,000.00 (93% of total grant amount). The Township recently submitted a reimbursement request in the amount of \$104,944.43, which is currently under review. This will be the Township's final reimbursement request for the project. The municipality has requested supplemental funding in the amount of \$50,000.00 due to the increased cost in construction materials and the additional costs associated with upgrading the ADA ramps to meet the new Penn DOT standards. Due to lack of funds in PA, this request has not been granted to date by the Commissioners.
- Lower Makefield, PA The project is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission. This project is closed.
- 14. Bristol Borough, PA The construction of the project is substantially complete by Armour & Sons Electric with only minor punch list items remaining to be completed. To date the CAI Department has reimbursed \$1,201,328.30 of \$1,334,450.00 (90% of total grant amount).
  - As mentioned previously, Bristol Borough's new grant application for the Regional Police Station and Training Center project has been reviewed by the CAI department and it was found that the project does not meet the primary characteristics of the CAI program. Therefore, the project was not approved by the Commissioners.
- 15. Yardley, PA Construction of the project began in February 2008 by Harris Blacktopping and was completed in August 2008. The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough and the project has been closed out.
- 16. Morrisville, PA – All the 4 projects in Morrisville are substantially completed and only puchlist items remain. The South Pennsylvania Avenue Curb and Sidewalk Replacement project was completed and since it was completed under budget, the project has been expanded to include more sidewalk replacement on Washington Street and South Pennsylvania Avenue. This project is substantially complete and has a couple of punchlist items to be completed in the next couple of months as the weather gets better. The West Bridge Street Curb/Sidewalk Reconstruction project was also expanded westward. A grant reallocation for \$125,000 from the West Bridge Street Curbs and Sidewalk project to the East Bridge Street Traffic Signals project. A new resolution was done which combined all four projects in Morrisville. All four projects were expected to be completed by December 31, 2008. The municipality will do as much road work in the area as possible with the available funds. Morrisville projects are as follow: 1). East Bridge Street Signals/Striping, 2). The West Bridge Street Curbs and Sidewalk Reconstruction, 3). The Bridge Street Traffic Calming and 4). The South Pennsylvania Avenue Curbs and Sidewalk. All projects continued to work through December 2008, and there are only a few punchlist items to be completed on each one. All projects are expected to be completed in early spring 2009 once weather conditions improve. Discussions with the engineer indicate that only landscaping items remain for all the projects.

#### New Jersey

- 1. Montague, NJ The CAI department received the completed final plans from the Township engineer, Michael O'Krepky of KSM Engineers that went into the FAA for approval. The municipality received the FAA approval and now it is just waiting for the approval of the NJDOT to move forward with the process to relocate the heliport from the current site where the Park and Ride is going to be constructed to the rear of the Township's building. The project bid package was approved by the municipality on September 23, 2008. But the municipality has advertised the projects for bids. No further development during this month.
- 2. Knowlton, NJ During a meeting with the municipality in September, the CAI department was advised by Warren County engineering department that there were still a few punchlist items to be completed by the contractor due to the wrong position of the installment of a stop sign and the pavement of a sliver of road that trucks were traveling on as they were trying to turn around on newly reconstructed intersection. The Restoration of the Washington Street property adjacent to the Portland/Columbia pedestrian bridge was restored to its natural condition and the project was completed. Both projects were completed under budget.

The application submitted by the township for \$206,800 to construct a section of the Paulinskill Trail, in order to connect with Pennsylvania via the Portland/Columbia pedestrian bridge, was approved by the Commissioners at their September 29th meeting. A project kick-off meeting for the new grant project for the extension of the Paulinskill Trail was held on Wednesday, November 5, 2008. Members of the CAI Department attended, along with officials from NJDEP, NJDOT, and Knowlton. All parties are eager to work together to complete this project. CAI concerns about the concept were alleviated by NJDOT who stated that a similar trail concept was recently approved and completed in Bergen County in Route 4. In December the trail project received a letter of approval from NJ Fish & Wildlife. The Township is working with the NJDEP and NJDOT to complete the approvals.

Finelli Associates is working on a status report to forward to the CAI department. The project is broken into 2 phases. The first will be clearing brush and installing the trails. The second phase is the concrete underpass which is dependent on DEP approvals. The timing may make this part "to be completed at another time" - we are still striving for completion in '09. The municipality expects to get bids for the trails pieces in May at the latest, and it is waiting for Finelli and Associates to forward the specs.

3. Belvidere, NJ – In September the bids received by the municipality were higher than the estimated engineering construction costs and they are in the process of assessing their options. The Commission's Chief engineer recommended that the 700 feet portion of Water Street in the Town that is not included in CAI project be done by the Commission in the near future. The Chief engineer indicated that it would be advantageous to include other work on the sidewalk and in the shed adjacent to the Riverton/Belvidere Bridge. It was also agreed that the town will go ahead with the CAI portion of the project and that the Town engineer will give the commission an estimate of the cost to complete the missing portion of Water Street. Belvidere has indicated that they will be putting the project out to bid in February, 2009 and the advertisement will appear in the paper on February 4th. Bids were received and the Borough Council and it is reviewing them.

4. Phillipsburg, NJ – This project is substantially complete, and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008. The Engineering Department and the Town of Phillipsburg reached an agreement regarding the reconstruction of Union Square. This section of the project will be completed by Top Line Construction and will coincide with the rest of the CAI project on Main St. and Broad and 3rd Streets. The Town requested a number of change orders to the contractors, which impacted their allocated budget for various line items. We are awaiting their final reimbursement request.

During their September 2008 meeting, the Commissioners approved a \$429,422 grant request for an extension of the project from the Black Bridge, southerly to the apex of Shappel Park on South Main Street, Phillipsburg. The Town also submitted a request for a completion time extension. We had been awaiting some final details regarding cost allocation between the Commission's grant and the FHWA grant to accurately track allocation of funds prior to finalizing the revised agreement. Agreement has been finalized.

In April it was noticed that the concrete in various sections of the sidewalks was chipping or scaling. This information was related to CMX engineer, Stan Shrek who indicated that he is aware of this and has discussed it with the contractor as it was a problem with the concrete delivered, but that the work is on scheduled for to be corrected this month.

5. Pohatcong, NJ – This is another substantially complete CAI project. Pohatcong requested permission to utilize the excess funds to repave additional sections of River Road, which was approved at the November meeting. Pohatcong used the Morris County Purchasing Cooperative to contract for the services. The work was performed and completed in December. The CAI department has received Pohatcong's final reimbursement request and is waiting for additional information.

Pohatcong has also submitted a joint application with Alpha for the reconstruction of Edge Road between the two communities. This application was approved by the Commissioners at their meeting in the month of March. Alpha will serve as the lead municipality on the project. The CAI department has requested additional information as to how cost-sharing will be handled if costs exceed the grant amount, as this is a reimbursement program. The CAI department met with Alpha and Pohatcong on April 9 to review the agreement. It appears that there is still a bit of disagreement over the terms and condition of the MOU between Alpha and Pohatcong.

6. Holland, NJ – At their September meeting, the Commissioners awarded a supplement grant to the Municipality for the amount of \$120,000 to cover the increased cost of material from the original cost estimate. The engineer is still waiting for the Stream Encroachment Permit approval. The municipality received a letter of completeness of the application from SHPO, but it still needs another 90 days before they would get a permit. Project is ready to go to bid, subject to NJDEP approval of a flood hazard area mitigation plan. Holland has been unable to locate a litigation site along the impacted waterway and has been allowed by NJDEP to propose a site within an expanded area adjacent to the flood plain. Holland is working on identifying parcels and contacting property owners to acquire a site. Further delays could cause this project to be at risk of not being completed. No change this month.

- 7. Milford, NJ –This Bridge Street Improvements project is substantially complete. The contractor was the subject of many positive newspaper articles regarding the extraordinary efforts they went through to minimize impacts to the business community. Reimbursement requests have been submitted and are under review. No change this month.
- 8. Frenchtown, NJ The Park and Ride project made significant progress and, as of the end of December, the base course of the parking lot, the retaining wall, drainage, stairways and lighting were complete. Final paving and landscaping will be weather dependent. The contractor resumed work in late March. No major development has been noted during this period regarding the acquisition of the property for the Village Green Park.
- 9. Lambertville, NJ - The Kline's Court CAI project was completed in September and the Jefferson Street project started its construction in the same month. The latter project was completed in December, 2008. Both of these projects were awarded to Top Line Construction. The Quarry Street Road Reconstruction project has had all concrete work completed as well as the base course paving final courses will be weather dependent. The Traffic Calming Phase I and Phase II project bids were received at the end of October and awarded. Lambertville had a pre-construction meeting in February 5, 2009. Construction has begun on that work. The Phase 1 Architectural contract was required to be rebid by the NJDOT and FHWA who are also providing funds for this project. The George Street Reconstruction project was completed in November, 2008. However, this project's bids came in approximately \$28,000 over budget and the City will pick up this amount. The Swan Street traffic signal is still going to be done, but the City has not received the permits from the NJDOT. In November, the Commissioners granted Lambertville a new grant for the roadway improvements of Blair Tract. The final plans have been received from Lambertville and they desire to bid the project in early May. The City of Lambertville submitted 2 applications to the CAI department that were recommended to be divided into 5 new applications which were submitted and received in April. The applications all appear to meet the characteristics of the CAI requirements. The due diligent engineer is making its final review of the new applications.
- Stockton, NJ The Bridge Street Improvements project is essentially completed. The CAI department
  and the municipality are in the process of closing out this project. The municipality was nominated and
  won a transportation construction project award for its CAI project from the NJDOT.
- 11. West Amwell, NJ The Section 11 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project is now completed. The Section 12 Road Reconstruction project was completed. In November, the municipality was awarded a new CAI grant to continue he project as Section 13. In February, West Amwell also submitted a new application for funding from the DRJTBC's CAI program. This application is for a road reconstruction of Rockhill Road at the approach to the intersection of Route 31. This application was not approved by the Commissioners at their meeting in March, 2009.
- Delaware Twp; NJ This project is completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out this project.

- 13. Hopewell, NJ The ADA Ramps and Walkway project was advertised and the Construction bids came in over budget. Hopewell has applied for additional funding to cover shortfall. A supplemental grant to the municipality was awarded by the Commissioners in November. The municipality is still working on a jurisdictional agreement of a section of the ADA ramp that is being built in DRJTBC property. The municipality provided verification of permit authorization to construct the ADA ramp from the State of
  - NJ Div. of Park and Forestry, and insurance requirements to satisfy the Appendix D of the Contract. The Municipality awarded the contract at its December 8 meeting. The pre-construction meeting was held on March 11. Construction continues to progress through the month of April.
- 14. Ewing, NJ Original paving scope of work was completed and delivered under estimate cost amount. The municipality submitted a request to expand its original scope of work using the excess money and it was approved at the Commissioners meeting in October. All the paving work was completed in November. The final quantities and change orders from the municipality's CAI project are being processed.
- 15. Trenton, NJ The mayor of Trenton sent a letter requesting abandonment of the South Warren Street Relocation project and to allow the City to use the existing grant awarded (\$5,309,800) for another project within City limits. The municipality has not sent the description of the project it wants to reapply for the Commissioners for their consideration. A letter acknowledging their request was sent to the City in October. The CAI program met with the City of Trenton on December 2, 2008 to discuss a new project to utilize the funding.
  - An application was to be submitted for consideration at the February Commission meeting. The project would entail the reconstruction of Warren St. in the vicinity of the new Mercer County Courthouse and The Marriot Lafayette Square Hotel. In their application, Trenton indicates that the project would be ready to be bid in June 2009, with construction to begin in the summer and completion in the Fall of 2010 or Spring of 2011. CAI is still reviewing the application and is concerned that Trenton may not be able to achieve the June's bid date. Trenton supplied additional information regarding this application to the CAI department. Trenton attended the April Commissioners Committee meeting to discuss the new project. A presentation was made to the Commissioners and questions still remain regarding the jurisdiction of part of the work proposed to be done in the area. A meeting has been scheduled internally with Commission staff and the due diligent engineer to discuss this issue and submit recommendation to the Commissioners.
- 16. Alpha NJ The Commission has received an application from Alpha and Pohatcong for the reconstruction of Edge Rd. between the two communities under Route 78. Alpha would serve as the lead municipality in the project. The estimated cost of the project is \$665,239, and CAI has requested information on how the two communities will handle cost-sharing. The project is basically rebuilding of Edge Road for a little over a mile with drainage improvements to improve erosion-prone areas. The Commission awarded the grant at their meeting in March, and the CAI will be meeting with Alpha on April 9 to discuss the agreement and project procedures. The CAI department met with Alpha and Pohatcong on April 9 to review the agreement. It appears that there is still disagreement over the terms and condition of the MOU between Alpha and Pohatcong.
