Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Thank you, Mr. Chairman, We are entering the peak of this year's construction season, and we have projects wrapping up, Projects going into the field, and new projects in the pipeline

Meeting of June 28, 2010

Calhoun Street Bridge Rehabilitation

The rehabilitation project at the Calhoun Street Toll-Supported Bridge is already more than one month old. Work is moving right along. The progress on the project has been evident that we have received minimal public complaints even though the bridge has been completely closed to traffic since May 24. This project marks the first time that we have completely shut down a bridge to vehicular traffic to conduct a project under our current Capital Improvement Program. There have been traffic impacts, of course, the bridge carried over 18,000 vehicles per day.

But the public has adjusted well to the shutdown and they generally have been understanding of the fact that the work is entirely necessary

I-78 Express E-ZPass Project

We plan to hold a modest event on Wednesday to mark completion of the I-78 Express E-ZPass/ORT project. Work began in January and we were able to open the two Express E-ZPass lanes to customers two weeks ahead of schedule last month. The facility has been working splendidly – seven weeks of operation and there has not been a single accident to date in the two new Express E-Pass lanes. The peak-period traffic jams that were commonplace for years at this location have vanished.

Contract Awards for Next Wave of Projects

Three contract awards on today's agenda, including our next Express E-ZPass project. Construction contract for Delaware Water Gap Express E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling Project We expect work to begin in August. Lane closures delayed until after Labor Day. During construction, current eight-lane plaza will be six lanes during peak periods and five lanes off-peak. Held off traffic restrictions until end of Pocono Mountain/Delaware Water Gap Recreation Area summer travel season. Goal is to have Express E-ZPass lane operational by the busy Thanksgiving Day weekend

Riegelsville Toll-Supported Bridge Rehabilitation

The Riegelsville Toll-Supported Bridge Rehabilitation CM/CI award is today. The Construction contract was awarded last month. The Contractor was issued a June 25 notice to proceed. Project staging and materials ordering will begin in the next couple weeks and construction to get fully underway will be later in July.

There will be alternating lane closures on the bridge through the summer, but all full traffic closures will be held off until after Labor Day, an accommodation for seasonal tourism economy in northern Bucks County region. Full traffic closures will be limited to weeknights and six weekends with an anticipated completion in December

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Washington Crossing Toll-Supported Bridge improvements Project

The Washington Crossing Toll-Supported Bridge Improvements Project, Construction contract is on today's agenda. Variety of work elements – most important being repairs to the Pennsylvania abutment and wingwalls that are exhibiting severe bulging. Work is expected to begin August 2 and all work to be done by November 1. A complete traffic shutdown will be necessary for a portion of this project. An Anticipated 46-day closure is expected to be put into place sometime in mid- to late-August and continue until the end of September or mid-October

CAI

There are nine CAI grant awards, on the agenda for the Commissioners approval, for projects that can meet the program's current December 31, 2010 expiration date. The largest number of grant awards to be considered since 10 grants were awarded in September 2005. Today's nine resolutions are for eight Pennsylvania projects and one New Jersey project. The Commission started the CAI program in 2005. Our paramount community partnering program allows us to finance worthy transportation-related projects in our host communities

Recent Awards and Honors

I have the privilege to share some award news with the Commissioners this month. The Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Widening and Rehabilitation Project now has six awards. Construction Management of Association of America Mid-Atlantic gave its Project Achievement Awards for Infrastructure Construction Projects over \$20 million at a ceremony on June 8 in Philadelphia. The project also recently received a Globe Award from the American Road and Transportation Builders Association's in late May

Also this past month, New Jersey's Alliance for Action construction advocacy organization informed us that our Chief Engineer, George Alexandridis, will be this year's recipient of the prestigious Dr. John L. Buzzi Engineering Excellence Award. The Award will be formally given at the Alliance's Eagle Awards Dinner on October 13 in New Brunswick, N.J. Last week. Chairman DeGerolamo and Vice Chairman Alfano were proclaimed to be Lord High Admirals for the passage of the Delaware River Sojourn through our jurisdiction on June 24. Honorary designations were bestowed in recognition of the entire Commission for its 75 years of service along the Delaware River and its preservation efforts of its bridges.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of June 28, 2010 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (MAY, 2010)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for May 2010 in comparison to the May 2009 traffic and revenue statistics. This is the eleventh month since May 2009 that toll revenue has exceeded the revenue generated in the corresponding month of the previous year. February 2010 was the only month since May 2009 that reflected a decrease in total toll revenue compared to the corresponding month of the previous year.

Analysis of May 2010/May 2009 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 1.66 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 0.78 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 3.92 percent increase.

Analysis of May 2010/May 2009 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 141,078 vehicles, or 4.39 percent.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 4,641 vehicles, or 1.18 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 136,437 vehicles, or 4.84 percent
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for May 2010 increased by 20,546 vehicles, or 0.75 percent as compared to May 2009.

Traffic analysis for 2010 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for the first five months
 of 2010 was 98,255 total vehicles as compared to 95,858 total vehicles for January
 through May 2009, an increase of 2.50 percent.
- Recorded westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for YTD 2010 is reflecting a 0.40 percent decrease as compared to the same 5-month period in 2009.

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for May 2010 reflected a 20.64 percent increase as a result of an increase of 107,474 cars and an increase of 8,045 trucks when compared to May 2009. It should be noted that roadway construction work preparation for the Trenton – Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehabilitation and One Auxiliary Northbound Lane (T-380B) began in May 2006, with full lane closures commencing in May 2007. This project was substantially completed in September 2009. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 9,428 cars combined with an increase of 125 trucks to generate a decrease in total toll traffic of 5.18 percent for May 2010 as compared to May 2009.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an overall increase of 1.69 percent in total toll traffic for the month of May 2010 compared to May 2009 as the result of an increase of 18,519 cars and a decrease of 4,192 in trucks. It should be noted that the two new ORT lanes at I78 opened on May 13, 2010. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, an increase of 18,012 passenger vehicles combined with a decrease of 114 trucks to generate a 3.34 percent increase in total toll traffic for May 2010.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 2.96 percent increase in total toll traffic during May 2010 as a result of increases of 3,181 automobiles and 330 trucks compared to May 2009. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, a decrease of 5,697 passenger vehicles and an increase of 863 trucks combined to generate a 0.57 percent decrease in total toll traffic for May 2010 as compared to May 2009. At Milford-Montague (MM), an increase of 4,376 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 416 trucks produced an overall 3.45 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of May 2010.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of May, 2010 and May, 2009, and the year-to-date periods ending May 31, 2010 and May 31, 2009.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of May 2010 and the five month year-to-date operations of fiscal year 2010 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$3,475,734 for the month of May. For the 2010 fiscal year-to-date period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$17,708,977 or 92.7% of the year-to-date operating budget. Some of the budget surplus is due to changes in the annual encumbrance activity for 2010. Normally, fuel and salt supplies are encumbered for the entire operating year. As of May 2010, these items are only encumbered for the first half of the operating year. Additional encumbrances will be forthcoming when new supplies contracts are approved. Most of the expense line items are well within their year-to-date operating budget.

There are several line items that are currently running ahead of budget on a year-to-date basis. Salary expense is currently running about 1.6% or \$132,000 over budget. The current operating budget anticipates a 3.5% vacancy rate for all salary classes but currently less than 2% of budgeted positions are vacant. Overtime is 16.6% or \$24,000 over budget due to the significant snow events in early 2010. All other expense line items are within their budgets. All of these over budget line items improved from the previous month.

There were no significant expenses recorded during the month of May.

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of May 2010, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 35 purchase orders. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 44 price inquiries were sent out for 15 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 2.94 per order $(44 \div 15)$.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Photo-op/Media Event for Opening of I-78 Express E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling Facility: Communications personnel worked with Engineering and Operations personnel to conduct a controlled media site visit to the recently completed Express E-ZPass lanes at the I-78 Toll Plaza. The event helped reporters get an understanding of the new facility so they could advance public awareness of the facility's opening on May 13, inform motorists about who may and may not use the lanes, and help spread the word for more cash customers to get E-ZPass tags. The event generated print, television, radio and Internet coverage in the Lehigh Valley media market.

Closure of the Calhoun Street Toll-Supported Bridge: Stepped up public awareness efforts through press releases and direct media outreach in advance of the shutdown of the May 24 shutdown of the Calhoun Street Bridge for a four-month rehabilitation project. During the month of May, 2010 the Director of Policy and Planning participated in a number of communications and meetings that explored the following:

The Greater Pocono Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Committee received Harrisburg updates concerning the proposed 2010-2011 Budget and the Commonwealth's Transportation Issues from Pennsylvania State Representatives Mike Carroll (D-118), Mario Scavello (R-176), John Siptroth (D-189), and members of the staffs of Pennsylvania State Senators Lisa Baker (R-20) and Robert Mellow (D-22). Monroe County Commissioner Janet Weidensaul (R) gave the county report.

The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) Planning Coordinating Committee and Regional Transportation Committee viewed and heard a presentation by Stephen Buckley from the Philadelphia Office of Transportation and Utilities. Mr. Buckley discussed the DVRPC Region's 17.2 million dollar grant from the Federal Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) program that was a component of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. This money will help fund the construction of ten different bicycle/pedestrian trail projects: seven links along the Schuylkill River Trail and the East Coast greenway in Philadelphia, and three trail segments in the City of Camden near the Ben Franklin Bridge, Wiggins Park Promenade, and a connection to waterfront paths along the Cooper River.

The Greater Pocono Chamber of Commerce Report to Business featured Monroe County Commissioners Suzanne McCool (D) Chairperson, Theresa Merli (D) Vice-Chairperson, and Janet Weidensaul (R). The Commissioners updated the audience in their areas of responsibility for the county.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Annual Transportation Luncheon featured Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation Allen Biehler. Secretary Biehler gave a State of the Commonwealth concerning Pennsylvania's Transportation Issues. Also present were Pennsylvania State Senators Pat Browne (R-16), Lisa Boscola (D-18), and Bob Mensch (R-24), along with Pennsylvania State Representatives Douglas Reichley (R-134) and Mario Scavello (R-176).

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Public Policy Committee discussed updates from the Chamber's four subcommittees: Energy/Environment, Healthcare, Tax, and Transportation.

The Hunterdon Area Rural Transit Commuter Information Services Board discussed changing their status from a 501c4 to a 501c3 and their organization name to Sustainable Hunterdon. The Director distributed the fact sheet for the Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll Supported Bridge Rehabilitation Project.

Meeting of June 28, 2010

The Pike County Road Task Force discussed countywide transportation projects with representatives of PennDOT District 4. Pennsylvania State Representative John Siptroth (D-189) updated the task force on the legislature's special transportation session. The Director distributed our Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling Project Fact Sheet.

The Director attended the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission Workplace/Safety Health Committee.

The Lehigh Valley Transportation Study Technical Committee discussed its major bridge status report. A project of note is the Route 611 Bushkill Creek Bridge which is currently in the preliminary engineering phase with the preferred alternative to replace the superstructure only. The consultant is to do core borings at existing abutments to determine their stability. Also, the City of Easton and Lafayette College presented two projects for the Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP): the realignment of South College Avenue where it meets McCartney Street and College Avenue; and Streetscape Enhancements to Cattell Street.

The Easton Area Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors discussed the latest news concerning chamber events past, present, and future. The Chamber will study the issue of workmen's/workwomen's compensation.

The Warren County Regional Chamber of Commerce Economic Development/Transportation Council discussed countywide economic development/transportation related efforts including an update by the Director on the Commission's Warren County Capital and CAI Projects.

The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) Board and Executive Committee Meetings heard and viewed a presentation by Catherine Popp-McDonough, Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority's (SEPTA) Director of Capital Budgets. Ms. Popp-McDonough discussed SEPTA's Fiscal Year 2011 Capital Budget and Twelve Year Capital Program. The presentation included the negative impact the loss of Act 44 Funding will have on the Authority's ability to advance planned capital projects, beginning July 01, 2010. The DVRPC is calling on Pennsylvania Legislators to act now to restore the lost of Act 44 funding and create a dedicated funding source for the Commonwealth's roads, bridges, and transit.

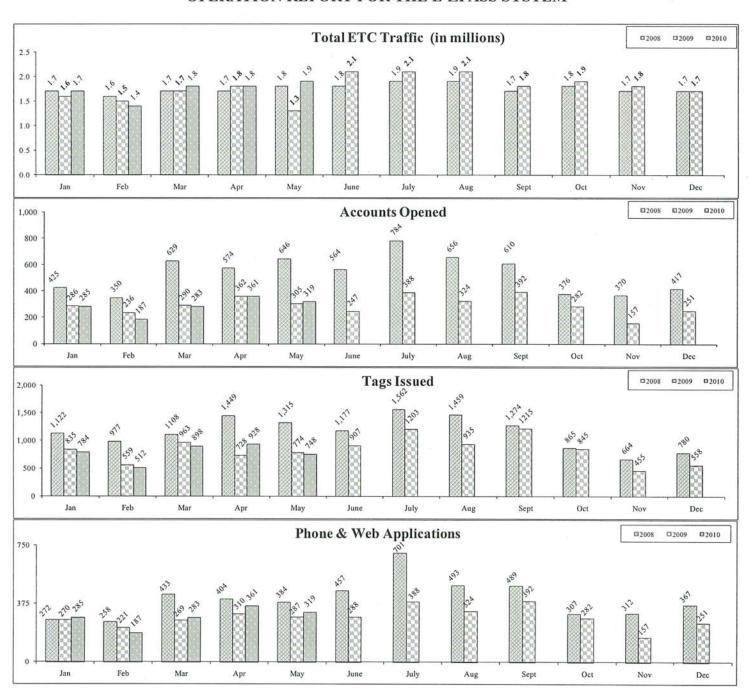

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving Electronic Security and Surveillance:

Radio System

- On May 7, and 21, 2010, ESS personnel conducted a 2010 radio in-service training class for District I personnel.
- On May 25, 2010, ESS personnel received the quote from Motorola for the inbuilding radio antenna system for the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Facility tunnel. To save the Commission money, the NJSP radio technicians will install the equipment when delivered.
- On May 27, 2010, ESS personnel worked with NJSP radio technicians to enhance the radio reception in District II. Radio technicians reviewed the current repeater settings and radio programming in an attempt to solve intermittent issues.
- On May 28, 2010, ESS personnel worked with District I personnel to assign
 portable radios to local emergency services during the first New HopeLambertville fireworks event. In the event of an emergency, Commission officers
 had direct communications with fire and rescue personnel.
- During the month of May, ESS continued re-programming the District's portable radios. The re-programming includes the installation of channels 13 and 14, which will be the Commission's interoperability channels with allied agencies (NJSP, PSP, NJDOT, Penn DOT, etc.).
- The T-1 line for the repeater at the Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Facility is installed and being configured by the NJSP. The repeater should be operational by the end of June.

PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Environmental Assessment (EA)/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation for the project was circulated for public comment on 12/9/09 and was made available for public review on the Commission's project website and at a number of publicized locations. Public comments were accepted until 2/4/2010. In conjunction with this process, a Public Hearing was conducted in compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Act of 1970, and Section 128 Title 23 of the United States Code, Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as well as New Jersey Department of Transportation policies and procedures. This Public Hearing / Open House was conducted on January 19, 2010 at the Villa Victoria Academy in Ewing, NJ and on January 20, 2010 at the Sheraton Bucks County Hotel in Langhorne, PA. The design consultant AECOM, with HNTB as their Environmental Team Sub-consultant, have prepared responses to the comments received during the public comment period, which have been reviewed by the Commission. To initiate the process of requesting a FONSI from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), these responses have been submitted to PennDOT, PennDOT HDAQ (Legal), NJDOT, and FHWA Metro Philadelphia and PA Division offices for review. Based upon the analysis included in the EA, agency comments, and public comments, the AECOM/HNTB Project Team are of the opinion that the Preferred Alternative will result in no significant impact to the environment.

The EA/Draft 4(f) Document was also distributed to each of the involved transportation agencies and the Cooperating Agencies (US Army Corps of Engineers, ES EPA, PA DEP and the National Marine Fisheries Service) for their final review. The Section 4(f) Evaluation, which is part of the EA, was forwarded by FHWA to their Washington D.C. Office for the Conditional Legal Sufficiency Review. This review has been completed by FHWA, and the request for the final executed Programmatic Agreement has been made by FHWA to issue Legal Sufficiency.

Meeting of June 28, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Both NJ and PA State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) have issued determinations of effects for project effects on historic and archaeological resources. A Draft **Programmatic Agreement** to stipulate future actions required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, was reviewed by FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT. This document identifies the mitigation measures to be taken as a result of the finding of Adverse Effect to the Delaware & Raritan Canal cultural resource and potential for adverse effect to archaeological resources in PA and NJ. The Draft Programmatic Agreement also has been reviewed and commented upon by the NJSHPO, the PHMC (Pennsylvania SHPO) and the Delaware and Raritan Canal Commission. Legal reviews have also been completed by the Commission and PennDOT. This document includes signatories from the Commission and outside New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and FHWA agencies involved in reviewing the EA. It has also been determined that the Delaware & Raritan Canal Commission (NJ) and the NJDEP Green Acres Division will not be co-signing agencies to the Programmatic Agreement.

The Commissioners, at the February 22, 2010 Commission Meeting authorized the Executive Director to execute the Programmatic Agreement on behalf of the Commission. Subsequent to this authorization the Programmatic Agreement was distributed to all signatory agencies on February 25th, 2010. This Programmatic Agreement was the result of several meetings and reviews held beginning in October 2008 and extending through the end of 2009. The agencies who participated in these meetings/reviews included;

- Federal Highway Authority (FHWA),
- Pennsylvania State Historic Museum Commission (PHMC)
- Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission (DRJTBC)
- Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT)
- New Jersey Department Of Transportation (NJDOT)
- New Jersey State Historic Preservation Office (NJSHPO)
- Green Acres Program (GAP)
- Delaware & Raritan River Canal Commission (D&RCC)

Signatures have been received from two of the three *executing signatories* – Federal Highway Authority (FHWA), and Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Officer (PHMC); and all (three in total) of the *concurring signatories* – Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission, New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT), and Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT). It is noted that all the executing and concurring signatories executed the Programmatic Agreement within two weeks after its distribution on February 25th, 2010.

The remaining *executing signatory* the New Jersey Historic Preservation Office (NJSHPO) has had the document in-hand for 3 months, and have not signed the document. It is noted that during the review period extending from October 2008 through the end of 2009 NJSHPO has been provided the opportunity to comment on the DRAFTS of the Programmatic Agreement. The document which was sent to them on February 25, 2010 reflects the resolution of NJSHPO's comments as well of all the other *executing and concurring agencies*. Commission staff is actively engaged with NJSHPO and NJDEP to resolve this latest issue.

Meeting of June 28, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The FHWA recommended additional consultation with the NMFS on the EA. Accordingly, a Biological Assessment Report (BA) was prepared for threatened and endangered (T&E) species impacts and was submitted to the NMFS in September 2008. A "No Jeopardy" opinion is anticipated from NMFS. The issuance of the 'No Jeopardy' opinion from NMFS has become tied to the resolution of Cooperating Agency comments to the EA and 4(f) documents. A major concern to these agencies was the causeway construction method and the associated impacts to the T & E species habitat in the vicinity of the Scudder Falls Bridge. At a meeting held on July 17, 2009 all of the agencies agreed that the trestle causeway is the preferred method of construction in the river. As a result of this meeting, a letter was prepared and submitted to NMFS (dated 9/10/09) that revised the causeway recommendation made in the BA document. NMFS prepared a draft of the Reasonable and Prudent Measures (RPMs) and the Terms and Conditions to be followed for the project and submitted these to FHWA, USACOE and the Commission on 11/2/09 for review and comment. Comments were submitted to NMFS and on 11/25/09 the NMFS – Northeast Region, issued a Draft Biological Opinion for the I-95 Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. Review comments by Commission, AECOM, and the CPMC staff have been provided to NMFS. The AECOM/HNTB team has been coordinating final issues associated with this Biological Opinion with NMFS, which has resulted in a revised Biological Opinion issued by NMFS on April 29, 2010. This document has been reviewed by AECOM/HNTB and Commission staff. Minor comments to the BO have been sent to NMFS, and there are no unresolved issues. A determination of 'No Jeopardy' is anticipated from NMFS, which will complete Section 7 consultation.

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ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE / DETECTION SYSTEM Contract No. C-396A

The Program Manager, Jacobs Edwards & Kelcey, continues to support the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project involving the completion of "punch-list" items as well as the preparation and submission of project close-out documentation.

The project team is developing an action plan to address the resolution of all outstanding "punch-list" items.

DESIGN-BUILD-MAINTAIN PROJECT Contract No. DB-396A

Work relating to the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project has reached substantial completion and continues to address "punch-list" items together with the preparation and submission of all remaining documentation.

The DBM Team is proceeding with the design, acquisition and installation of the Primary Control Center at the New Jersey State Police's Regional Operation and Information Center (ROIC) in West Trenton, NJ.

The DBM Team is currently supporting the Maintenance phase of the project under the direction of the Commission's Electronic Security and Surveillance Department which operates the system from the Control Center located at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge facility.

I-78 ROADWAY REHABILITATION CONTRACT

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-424A

Greenman-Pedersen, Incorporated (GPI) continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract which includes finalizing the final report for the NJDEP Permit and final project documentation/close-out.

Meeting of June 28, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-424A

The contract with Tilcon New York, Incorporated remains open with \$300,000 remaining in retainage until resolution of the westbound roadway depression is obtained. The survey information associated with the depression taken monthly from November 2009 to May 2010 is being evaluated by the Engineer of Record for necessitating repairs if any to the depression.

I-78 OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) LANES DESIGN

DESIGN-BUILD Contract No. DB-427

I-78 ORT Construction Contract DB-427B

AP Construction, Incorporated continues to progress the work on schedule with Contract Substantial Completion obtained this month. Work on the four (4) new advance sign structures was completed along with the installation of the new canopy LED variable message overhead signs. Outstanding contract items, including the access to the toll plaza canopy and hydro seeding disturbed areas is on-going. The remaining required design submittals were submitted along with the required bi weekly schedule updates.

I-78 ORT Construction Management/Construction Inspection CM-427B

Hill International continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract which includes: monitoring and coordinating the field activities of the contractor associated with Contract DB-427B; preparation of contractor invoices; receiving and processing submittals; reviewing and commenting on the contractor's schedule updates and 2-Week Look Ahead schedules; holding and documenting bi-weekly Progress Meetings and Schedule Update Meetings; preparing inspection reports for days that the contractor worked on site; project documentation; and operating a project hot-line. Since the contractor reached Substantial Completion Hill has terminated the project hotline and has begun Project Close-out.

In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project DB-427C

ACS State and Local Solutions (ACS), Commission staff and STV continue to participate in bi-weekly progress meetings. ACS continues to participate in weekly conference calls with Commission staff, STV and ETC (Customer Service Center / Violation Processing Center DBOM) to coordinate the I-78 Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling (ORT) implementation and the transmission of test transaction, violation and image data to the CSC/VPC.

Meeting of June 28, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

ACS completed the installation of the ORT equipment/system at the I-78 ORT Lane. Field check-out, testing and tuning and the On-Site Installation Testing was completed. Additionally, the Commissioning test was completed and a three (3) hour diversion of traffic through the ORT Lanes was conducted to provide additional test transactions for the Commission's Finance and Toll Audit Department's evaluation. Prior to opening the ORT Lanes to production traffic, a "go" / "no-go" poll to all involved Departments was conducted by the Executive Director. Upon receiving a "go" decision from all involved Departments, the lanes were opened.

ACS continues to complete predictive and preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system.

The ETC spare parts inventory was transferred from TransCore to ACS in November 2009. ACS has moved the inventory from their Newark, NJ warehouse to a secured facility in Flemington, NJ. Engineering inspected the spare parts and found then properly stored. Major items were counted and accounted for. Additional spare parts have been placed into inventory due to the permanent lane closings as a result of the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge rehabilitation and the Interstate 78 Toll Bridge ORT projects however, a spare parts order will be required for 2010.

As a result of the implementation of the Violation Enforcement System (VES), the gates have been removed from the Trenton-Morrisville, Interstate 78 and Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridges and are being stored in ACS's Flemington, NJ warehouse. As the plan goes forward, additional gates will be removed and stored in the ACS warehouse. ACS has been advised to store all the gates until disposition instructions are given by the Commission.

<u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Design-Build-Operate-Maintain Project DB-427D</u>

Monthly Progress Meetings continue to occur via conference calls with Commission staff, ETC and STV. Customer Service Center (CSC) operations weekly conference calls with Commission staff, ETC, and STV continue so all parties may discuss on-going and upcoming efforts, as well as issues and there resolution. ETC continues to participate in weekly conference calls with Commission staff, STV and ACS (In-Lane Toll System DBM) to coordinate the violation processing center (VPC) with new I-78 ORT Lanes implementation. ETC continues to work with the NY DMV to develop an interface with them. ETC participated in an end-to-end testing of the I-78 ORT Lanes.

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DELAWARE WATER GAP TOLL BRIDGE (I-80) OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) CONSTRUCTION

DESIGN Contract No. C-440B

Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge (I-80) ORT Contract C-440B

The New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) was received and incorporated into the construction bid documents. Commission Staff has executed the Maintenance Agreement for the advance sign structures that will be located on NJDOT jurisdiction and submitted to the document to the NJDOT. We are currently waiting for NJDOT to return the fully executed Jurisdictional Agreement. Stantec, Brinjac Engineering and Commission Staff facilitated a mandatory pre-construction meeting. Stantec is currently preparing Addendum No. 1 and we expect to receive and open bids on June 3, 2010.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-440B

CM/CI Services for Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge (I-80) ORT Construction Contract CM-440B

A project Kick-Off meeting was held with Greenman-Pedersen, Incorporated (GPI) of Lebanon, New Jersey. The insurance certificates were received and accepted and the Agreement is in the process of being executed.

Under this Task Order Assignment STV, Incorporated has participated in meetings, conference calls, and document reviews that are discussed under DB-427C In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project and DB-427D Customer Service Center / Violation Processing Center Design, Build, Operate and Maintain.

PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE FACILITY AND LOCUST STREET BRIDGE IMPROVEMENTS (CONTRACT NO. T-441A)

PORTLAND BOROUGH SEWER FORCE MAIN CONNECTION AND FACILITY PARKING LOT PAVING

DESIGN
Task Order Assignment No. C-450B-4

This assignment is for study and design work associated with the required connection of the Portland Toll Facility to a nearby new sanitary sewer system installed by the municipality. The Commission has studied various alternative alignments and is moving forward with Alternative No. 4 as detailed in the T&M Associates' Letter Report entitled "Portland Borough Sewer Force Main Connection" dated September 28, 2007.

Additionally, the 2007 Annual Inspection Report identified the need for minor improvements and repaving of the Administration Building main parking lot, the salt storage yard lot and the access driveway and turn-around for the salt storage yard. This work has been incorporated into this assignment.

For cost efficiency purposes, it was decided to combine the T&M sewer and paving work, T&M's new salt storage facility design with the Portland-Columbia Locust Street Bridge construction work being designed by the Louis Berger Group (LBG). LBG will take the lead in preparing the final construction bid documents.

T&M made their Final Submission which was forwarded to LBG for inclusion as part of Construction Contract T-441A. A coordination/progress meeting with Berger & T&M was held on December 16, 2009. Pre-final plans and specifications combining T&M and LBG's design were submitted on January 20, 2010 with comments provided at a February 2, 2010 progress meeting.

PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE SALT STORAGE FACILITY

DESIGN
Task Order Assignment No. C-450B-6

This assignment is for study and design work associated with a new District III salt storage facility to be constructed at Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Maintenance Facility as described in the 2007 and 2008 Annual Inspection Reports.

T&M's final design was incorporated into the Contract T-441A bid package. T&M is currently performing post design efforts associated with this assignment.

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PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE FACILITY, LOCUST STREET REPAIRS

DESIGN
Task Order Assignment No. C-449A-8

The Louis Berger Group's (LBG) final design included improvements to the Locust Street Bridge and installation of toll plaza attenuating devices was incorporated into the Contract T-441A bid package along with other facility improvements as designed by T&M through assignments C-450B-6 (Salt Storage Facility) and C-450B-4 (Portland Borough Sewer Force Main Connection and Facility Parking Lot Paving).

LBG is currently performing post design efforts associated with this assignment.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Task Order Assignment No. C-454A-4

This assignment is for providing Construction Management and Inspection Staff for Contract T-441A. Carroll Engineering Corporation (Carroll) was issued a Notice-to-Proceed in early June 2010. Carroll attended the Kick-Off Meeting with H&G Contractors and conducted the initial progress & scheduling meetings.

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-441A

This project was awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, H&G Contractors, Incorporated on April 26, 2010. H&G was provided with a Notice of Award and Limited Notice-to-Proceed on the same date. A Kick-Off Meeting was held with H&G on May 18, 2010 and Notice to Proceed was provided on May 24, 2010. The Contractor has started to mobilize and construction will commence in early June 2010.

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WASHINGTON CROSSING TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE PHASE 1 REHABILITATION & CONCEPT STUDY

DESIGN Contract No. C-442A

The Design Consultant, Dewberry, recently presented staging and scheduling concepts to the Commission for their consideration. Based on positive feedback Dewberry and their Public Involvement subconsultant, ACT Engineering, will be communicating relevant project schedule and staging details to the stakeholders identified during the public outreach portion of the project.

The project consists of repairs to the deteriorated masonry abutments, wingwalls and piers repair of scour protection measures at all piers, introduction of an aesthetic surface treatment on pier no. 2 to match the remaining piers, improvements to the sidewalk railing and replacement of the decking as well as various improvements to the approach roadways and lighting. Dewberry has submitted the final design drawings, specifications, construction cost estimate, and proposed construction schedule which has been reviewed by Commission staff.

Dewberry attended the Pre-Bid Meeting and is currently performing post design services.

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UPPER BLACK EDDY-MILFORD TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION DESIGN

DESIGN Contract No. C-444A

Final contract documents for the Upper Back Eddy-Milford Toll Supported Bridge Rehabilitation construction contract were reviewed by Commission and CPMC staff in May. This project is scheduled to be advertised in early June and a Pre-Bid meeting will be held prior to receipt of bids.

RIEGELSVILLE TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION DESIGN

DESIGN Contract No. C-445A

The Design Consultant, Amman & Whitney, reviewed the bid from the apparent lowest responsible bidder for the Riegelsville Toll Supported Bridge Rehabilitation construction contract, Contract TS-445A and provided the Commission with a recommendation.

Amman & Whitney has started the post design services task of Contract C-445A.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-445A

The Delaware River Join Toll Bridge Commission, at its May 24, 2010 Meeting authorized the Executive Director to negotiate scope and fee with the Consultant whose letter of interest has been deemed qualified through the RFLOI procurement process and determined to be fair, reasonable and in the best interest of the Commission. A negotiation meeting was held with the Consultant on May 27, 2010.

Meeting of June 28, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

CONSTRUCTION Contract TS-445A

The Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its May 24, 2010 Meeting awarded the Riegelsville Toll Supported Bridge Rehabilitation construction contract, Contract TS-445A to the lowest responsible bidder, Neshaminy Constructors, Incorporated of Feasterville, Pennsylvania.

Insurance documents are under review. The contractor is submitting Requests for Information (RFIs), which are being forwarded to the Design Consultant through the CPMC Project Manager until the CM/CI Services Contract, CM-445A is awarded.

CALHOUN STREET TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION PRELIMINARY DESIGN, FINAL DESIGN AND POST DESIGN SERVICES

DESIGN Contract No. C-447B

TranSystems is in their post design support phase of this project and continues to review submittals and respond to Requests for Information (RFIs). TranSystems participated in the May 5, 2010 Partnering Session for the TS-447B construction contract; and the May 12, 2010 and May 26, 2010 progress and scheduling meetings. They also observed the initial heat straightening operation on May 6, 2010.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-447B

Hill International, Incorporated (Hill) continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract which includes: building staff to inspect the various work activities, preparation of contractor invoices, conducting progress and schedule meetings and the tracking of submittals and RFIs. Hill participated in the May 5, 2010 Partnering Session for the TS-447B construction contract; and the May 12, 2010 and May 26, 2010 progress and scheduling meetings.

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CONSTRUCTION Contract No. TS-447B

Neshaminy Constructors, Incorporated (NCI) of Feasterville, Pennsylvania has completed installing the under deck shielding on all spans and the full containment for spans 2 and 3. They blast cleaned and prime coated the trusses in span 3 and started blast cleaning the trusses in span 2. The heat straightening/shorting of various truss members was completed on May 22, 2010. NCI continues to submit shop drawings and material submittals for approval.

After extensive public outreach and advertisement, and coordination with adjacent communities and agencies, the Calhoun Street Toll-supported Bridge was closed to all vehicular and pedestrian traffic at 6:00 AM on May 24, 2010. The Commission issued press releases and signs were installed on both sides of the bridge prior to the closure reminding the travelling public of the impending bridge closure. Additionally the Commission provided NJDOT with information to issue the 14 and 7-day notification of the closure as requested.

I-78 and DWG Emergency Standby Generator Final Draft Study Report will be revised to include the current and future power requirements for the Delaware Water Gap facility. The revised report will be sent to the Commission by Brinjac in early June.

The Draft Study Report for the Trenton-Morrisville facility is being revised to incorporate the Commission's comments. The Draft Study Report for Easton-Phillipsburg, Portland-Columbia and Milford-Montague facilities has been submitted and is under review.

Representatives from the Commission, Consultant, the Commission's Electronic Toll Collection maintenance contractor - ACS, and the Commission's Electronic Surveillance System Maintenance Contractor – MECC attended this workshop.

A Draft Concept Study Report was submitted by Carroll Engineering on May 3, 2010 and a draft report submission review meeting was conducted on May 17, 2010.

Meeting of June 28, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

NEW HOPE LAMBERTVILLE TOLL BRIDGE FACILITY ELECTRICAL SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS

DESIGN Task Order Assignment No. C-450A-8

As part of the post design services, the Consultant received the Contractor's revised Project Close-out documents and found them to be in compliance with the Contract Documents. This Contract is complete and is being closed out.

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-554A

Final Project Close-out documents have been received from the Contractor, reviewed by the Consultant verifying the incorporation of the comments on its draft submission. This Contract is complete and is being closed out. The final adjusted Contract amount is 7.7% below its original amount.

DELAWARE WATER GAP TOLL BRIDGE BEARING REMEDIATION AND DECK STUDY

DESIGN Contract No. C-472A

The Consultant, Cherry, Weber & Associates (CWA) is finalizing the Final Design for bid by mid June 2010. The second submission of Mass Electric Construction Company's (MEC) scope, schedule and cost proposal to remove and replace the ESS equipment during construction was reviewed by the CPMC and Commission on May 21, 2010. CWA is in the process of finalizing the specification sections on the Railroad Accommodation and ESS protection. NJDEP has been issued plans and description of work for permit requirements.

Coordination with permitting agencies is ongoing to determine the applicable permits, and documentation requirements.

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EASTON-PHILIPSBURG TOLL BRIDGE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

FUEL STORAGE TANK IMPROVEMENTS

DESIGN Contract No. C-450B-8

Task 1, Final Design of Fuel Storage Improvements - The Consultant provided ongoing Construction Administration services during construction of the fuel storage improvements. The Consultant prepared a final punch list and found all items to be complete at the May 25, 2010 final inspection. The Consultant will review the Contractor's final application for payment and maintenance bond, which will conclude the services under this contract.

Task 2, Final Design of Storm Water Outfall Improvements - As part of this assignment, the Commission approved a proposal from T&M Associates to study and design the necessary repairs to a 12" storm water outfall at the New Hope – Lambertville Toll Bridge Facility. T&M Associates and Commission staff met with Bucks County Conservation District (BCCD) and the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) at separate meetings to review the project. T&M Associates prepared a letter report summarizing their findings and recommendation. Commission staff also performed an in-house analysis of the existing infiltration basin and found it to have adequate capacity to reroute the runoff from the 12" storm water outfall. Commission staff forwarded a Basin Modification Report to BCCD on May 19, 2010 and is anticipating approval in June.

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-475A

<u>Construction of Fuel Storage Improvements at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge Administration Building</u> – The contract provides the construction of a new 1000 gallon above ground gasoline storage tank and conversion of the existing 2500 gallon underground gasoline storage tank to diesel storage. Commission staff has been trained on use of the new equipment. A final inspection took place on May 25, 2010 and all work was determined to be properly complete. The Contractor will submit a maintenance bond and final application for payment, which will close out the project.

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DISTRICT 1, 2 & 3 SUBSTRUCTURE REPAIR AND SCOUR REMEDIATION

DESIGN Contract No. C-476A

The Design Consultant, STV, incorporated comments from the preliminary submission and submitted pre-final design plans and specifications on May 14, 2010 for review by the Commission and CPMC staff. A Review Meeting was held on May 21, 2010 to discuss comments on the latest submission. The Consultant initiated efforts to revise the plans to address comments received during the Review Meeting.

A Coordination Meeting was held on May 11, 2010 with the environmental permitting agencies from Pennsylvania and New Jersey to discuss the type of work to be performed under the project and to identify options for expediting the permitting review process.

The Consultant completed the Historic Evaluation of the various structures in accordance with requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. The Historic Evaluation is required to be completed in order to obtain the necessary environmental permits for undertaking the work. The Historic Evaluation report was reviewed by the Commission and CPMC staff and submitted to the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission and the New Jersey Historic Preservation Office for review on May 28, 2010.

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CAPITAL PROGRAM MANAGEMENT SERVICES - YEAR 1

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-1A

This Task Order Assignment is for Year 1 of the CPMC portion of the C-502A Contract.

The CPMC has two (2) primary functions: to i) support the overall program development functions, and ii) provide specific resources to the individual Programs for program area management, project management and technical reviews. In providing these primary functions, the CPMC is responsible for:

- Procurement assistance
- Scheduling & cost/budget analysis/control
- Programming/planning

- Commencing the Toll/Traffic Diversion Study
- Preparation of the RFLOI for the Traffic and Revenue Study

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DMC PROJECT DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. COMPACT AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT DEPARTMENT May 2010

General

During the month of May, the CAI department reviewed the new applications submitted by various communities to assure that they are complete and comply with the characteristics of the CAI program. Bridgeton Township, PA submitted a new grant application this month for the Veterans Park Improvements project, which is currently under review. In May, the Commission requested that Pennsylvania municipalities that have pending applications for CAI grant requests be invited to the next commissioners committee meeting on June 22nd. A total of fourteen municipalities have been invited from Pennsylvania and one from New Jersey.

The pending applications in Pennsylvania are as follows: Bridgeton Township, PA applied for the Veterans Park Improvements project, which includes park facility upgrades, improved pedestrian access and connectivity with other areas of the Township, Falls Township, PA applied for a traffic signal modernization at the intersection of Tyburn Road and New Falls Road. Lower Makefield Township, PA applied for a Black Rock Pedestrian Trail Project. Milford Borough, PA, which has an application pending for stormwater improvements to various roadways, submitted an additional application for the Broad Street Parking Lot Improvement project. Morrisville Borough, PA submitted eight applications for road related projects throughout the Borough and one from the Morrisville Municipal Authority for a road rehabilitation project on Moreau Street. New Hope Borough, PA, in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization, submitted an application for Wayfinding Signage installation, an application for street lighting on its Main Street bridge sidewalk over the Aquetong Creek and one for ADA upgrades to the pedestrian facilities on Main Street. Portland Borough, PA submitted an application for the State Street Streetscape project. Solebury Township, PA submitted an application for the Gateway Trail Phase 2 project and one for the Gateway Trail Phase 3 project. Upper Makefield Township, PA submitted an application for the Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 project. Willams Township, PA submitted 6 applications for Drainage Improvements, Roadway Reconstruction, and Pavement overlay projects within the Township. Dingman Township submitted an application for a trail system. The Borough of Riegelsville, PA requested that they be reconsidered for a grant to complete Delaware Canal Footbridge Lighting project that was submitted in a previous application.

In New Jersey the applications are as follows: The Township of Ewing, NJ sent an application for the Wilburtha Road Improvement project, Holland Township, NJ submitted an application for the resurfacing of Mt. Joy Road; The Borough of Milford, NJ submitted an application for Bridge Street and Honeysuckle Lane Improvements; The Township of Delaware, NJ submitted an application for the improvements of Federal Twist Rd; and The City of Lambertville, NJ submitted an application for Franklin Street Drainage Improvements. Further, there were inquiries from other municipalities that intent to submit applications for projects in their municipalities. In total there were 36 new applications submitted for Pennsylvania and 9 from New Jersey.

The CAI Department continues to assist municipalities in both states to complete their reimbursement requests for invoices paid by them to consultants and contractors for their existing CAI projects.

Update of some of the most significant activities with the grantees during the month of May

Pennsylvania

1. **Milford Borough, PA** – The Borough has two (2) pending grant applications, the Broad Street Parking Lot Improvements project, amount of \$99,963.00, and the Storm Water Drain System and Street Restoration project, amount of \$163,475.00. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that both applications satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The applications were discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but they have not been awarded to date.

Dingman Township also submitted an application for a multi-use trails project called the Bridge Preserve Northern Parcel Trail System. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that the application satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI program, but a determination is currently being made as to whether Dingman Township is a community eligible for a CAI grant.

An application for the replacement of the old existing Mott Street vehicular bridge with a pedestrian and bicycle Bridge that will connect Milford and Dingman Township, in coordination with the Pike County Planning Department, has been on hold in case additional funds become available for Pennsylvania's CAI projects. The CAI department has not received an updated application as of this report.

Construction for the East *Harford Street Streetscape Improvements* project was completed in December 2007 by LR Costanzo Construction. The municipality was reimbursed \$453,000.00 (100% of total grant amount). The Borough also had funds from Penn DOT for this project and the CAI department reviewed that the work funded by the CAI grant is completed.

The *Traffic Study Project* is also completed and the CAI department reimbursed \$24,900.00 (100% of total grant amount). The Borough has been reimbursed for all expenses.

2. Smithfield, PA – The Township submitted a joint application in the amount of \$584,500 for a pedestrian/bicycle trails system in both the Township of Smithfield and the Borough of Delaware Water Gap. At the April 2010 Commissioners meeting, this application was approved. The Township has been notified of their grant award and the CAI department has executed the grant agreement with the Township.

Pennsylvania (continued)

The construction of the original Pedestrian Improvement project is substantially complete and is waiting for Penn Dot final inspection. The contractor, Grace Industries, has installed the ADA improvements as part of the grant approved by the Commission for the project. As previously discussed, the ADA features that were installed include detectable warning surfaces at various locations, along with a colored surface overlay for the sidewalk underneath the River Road underpass. Only a few minor punch list items remain to be completed for the project, including a potential alternate for the ADA sidewalk treatment near the overpass. It is anticipated that the remaining items will be completed in the next month. To date, the CAI department has disbursed \$734,716.10 of \$779,000.00 (94% of total grant amount).

3. **Delaware Water Gap, PA** – As previously mentioned, the Borough's grant application to complete the *Route 611 Traffic Signalization Project* was approved by the Commissioners at their meeting on January 25, 2010. The project includes the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Foxtown Hill Road (SR 0611) & the Martz Trailways Terminal. The CAI department has executed the grant agreement and financial documents with the Borough. The Borough made a decision not to submit another application as it had already received a grant this year.

The construction of the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* is substantially complete, with several punch list items remaining to be addressed. In addition, a final inspection must be completed by PennDOT. In December 2009, several of the project items were inspected, including the signage that was to be installed. In addition, the Borough discussed the issue of adequate sidewalk clearance for pedestrians due to the light post installations with PennDOT, and is awaiting a final determination. Currently, the work to complete the remaining concrete repairs are scheduled for Summer 2010, at which time a final inspection will be held with the Borough Engineer and PennDOT. Also, as previously noted, on October 21, 2009 the Borough submitted a request to the Commission to utilize \$2,000.00 of the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* grant funds to complete the sidewalk repairs needed to address the concrete spalling issues encountered. However, this request was denied by the Commission.

The Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project was completed in August 2009, including the sidewalk repairs that were made to address issues with the concrete cracking and flaking over the winter in several locations. The sidewalk repairs were made at the contractor's expense.

To date, the CAI department has reimbursed \$147,149.77 of \$164,583.66 (89% of total grant amount) for the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* and \$270,746.34 of \$270,746.34 (100% of total grant amount) for the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project*.

Oak Street Water Line Replacement Project – this project is on hold - The Borough has informally indicated that this project will not be completed due to lack of additional funding needed. The preliminary cost estimate for the project was approx. \$76,000.00. The most recent

Engineer's estimate for the project is approx. \$172,000.00. The municipality was advised that funding was available, but instead chose to apply for the above indicated traffic signal project.

4. **Portland Borough, PA** – The Borough has submitted a new application for streetscape improvements on State Street in the amount of \$515,701.40. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

The Borough's Mayor, the Honorable Kay Bucci attended the Commissioners meeting in January to advise the Commission that the Borough had applied for a Federal TIGER grant that, if approved, will include an infrastructure project on the South-Eastern ramp off of Route 611 North, which includes the Commission's Portland/Columbia bridge property line.

The Construction of the SR 0611 Pedestrian Crossing and Streetscape project began in November 2009 by McCarthy Masonry & Concrete and is substantially complete. PennDOT completed a final inspection of the SR 0611 pedestrian crossing flashing warning device, but a few punch list items remain to be completed. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in the next month.

The *Park and Walk Project* has been completed by Glen G. Hale Construction. The project started in January 2008 and finished in August 2008, and was inspected and approved by PennDOT in November 2008. In addition, the construction of the Shade Tree and Lighting project was completed by Glen G. Hale Construction in September 2009.

To date, the CAI department has reimbursed \$518,371.59 of \$639,323.00 to date (81% of total grant amount) for the *Park & Walk* grant. A reimbursement request in the amount of \$22,669.75 is currently under review for the *Park & Walk* grant.

The *Park & Ride Project* construction contract was awarded to Glen G. Hale Construction in October 2008 and was completed in September 2009. To date, the Borough has been reimbursed in full for the project and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$329,612.10 of \$667,567.00 (49% of total grant amount), which included payment for the acquisition of the site by the Borough through eminent domain.

- 5. Lower Mount Bethel, PA In February 2010, the CAI director met with the Township project Manager, John Mauser and two of the Township supervisors to discuss the possibility of submitting other grant applications for various road and trails constructions. The Borough submitted three applications that have been reviewed by the due diligence engineer.
 - S & K Construction was given the *Notice to Proceed* the construction on the *Pedestrian Trail Project* on March 27, 2008 and the project was completed in April 2009. To date, \$336,777.50 of \$336,777.50 (100% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI Department and the

project has been closed out. The *Park & Ride/Visitors' Center Project* construction started in April 2008 by Grace Industries (Park & Ride) and Weiss Construction (Visitors' Center) and was completed in April 2009. To date, the CAI Department has reimbursed \$952,922.50 of \$952,922.50 (100% of total grant amount) and this project is also closed out.

6. **Easton, PA** – The City of Easton has applied for two additional grant requests. One is for pedestrian and traffic improvements in the North 3rd St. Corridor, which was approved by the Commissioners with some modifications at its general meeting on April 26th, and the other for a bridge deck improvement on the Hugh Moore Park Bridge.

In January a change order was approved by the CAI department to include new lighting and signage along Larry Holmes Drive south of the Northampton Street Bridge.

The construction contracts for Phases 1 and 2 of the *Waterfront Improvements* project were awarded during the month of September 2009. The construction contract for Phase 1 of the project, which is to include the "road diet" for Larry Holmes Drive, high visibility pedestrian crosswalks, intersection improvements at Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive to improve pedestrian accommodation, along with a sewer line connection from the Commission's guard house to existing lines at the intersection of Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive, was awarded to Lehigh Valley Site Contractors Inc. in the amount of \$530,090.00. The construction contract for Phase 2, which is to include improvements to the pedestrian pathways along Larry Holmes Drive and in Scott Park and Riverside Park, along with decorative lighting, landscaping and a visitor and pedestrian plaza at Scott Park, was awarded to S&K Construction in the amount of \$951,045.75.

In February 2010, S&K indicated to Easton that they did not have the ability to perform the contract and pulled out. The City rebid the contract and awarded it to Serfass Construction Co., for \$939,844 with one alternate. The pre-construction meeting was held on June 2. In addition the streetlight replacement project that was approved by change order had a pre-construction meeting on May 12th, and the construction is scheduled to be performed during the week of June 7th.

To date, \$600,000.00 of \$2,700,000.00 (22% of the total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the City of Easton for the original Riverwalk project. In addition, the City's first reimbursement request for the *Waterfront Improvements* project, in the amount of \$542,199.51, has been approved

Construction of the ADA Curb Ramps and Decorative Crosswalks, which is part of the *Pedestrian Pathways/Intersection Enhancements and Northampton St. Bridge Bike Path* grant, was completed in September 2009. The City has also purchased and installed the materials for the Bike Path Extension.

As mentioned previously, the City of Easton's grant application for the Majestic Theater project was reviewed by the CAI department and it was found that the application does not meet the primary characteristics of the CAI program. Therefore, the project was not approved by the Commissioners.

The Commission agreed to enter into a separate agreement with the municipality to connect the sewer lateral from the bridge officer's guardhouse to the City's public sewer system. This work was completed in May. The curbs and sidewalks abutting the Northampton Street Bridge have been reconstructed. A new change order was submitted to the CAI department for review and approval in order to add new lighting poles in the Scott Park area of the project.

7. Williams Township, PA – The *I-78 & Morgan Hill Road Interchange Traffic Signalization project* was substantially completed in August 2008. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township by the CAI Department. In addition, Gary Hillegass Contracting completed the ADA curb ramp work required by Penn DOT at the project intersections. The Township is currently in the process of preparing their final reimbursement request submission to the CAI department for the project.

The Township recently submitted six applications for: Belmont Street Drainage Improvements, Belmont Street Reconstruction, Hilton Street Improvements, Industrial Drive North Overlay project, and Industrial Drive South Overlay project. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that the Industrial Drive North Overlay project and the Industrial Drive South Overlay projects satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The Belmont Street Drainage only partially satisfies the required characteristics of the CAI program because while the project does provide a safety improvement and eases travel on the roadway during rain events, it does not provide visible transportation improvements that will directly impact motorists and pedestrians/bicyclists on a regular basis. These applications were discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but have not been awarded to date. We would also note that it was determined that the Belmont Street Reconstruction and the Hilton Street Improvements projects do not satisfy the required characteristics of the CAI program as they cannot be completed by the December 31, 2010 deadline.

8. **Riegelsville Borough, PA** – The Project started construction in August 2008 and was completed in July 2009. To date, \$230,000.00 (100% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI department. In addition, the Borough has indicated that they will be submitting a new grant application for ornamental lighting to be installed on the Delaware Canal pedestrian bridge recently completed with CAI funds. A formal letter of request for \$45,000 was submitted by the Borough to complete lighting portion of the Pedestrian Bridge project.

9. **Solebury Township, PA** – Walton Drive Bridge Replacement Project – In January the Commissioners approved the Township's new grant application for \$660,000.00 to replace a deteriorated, undersized bridge located in a residential neighborhood in Solebury Township. The project will be advertised in June 2010 and it is anticipated that the project will be completed in the Fall 2010.

Construction of the *Route 202 Trail and Park* project began on August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and was completed in September 2009. To date, \$1,204,444.60 of \$1,755,150.00 has been reimbursed by the CAI Department (69%). The Township's final reimbursement request, in the amount of \$326,958.65, is currently under review, awaiting further documentation from the Township. A meeting with the municipality was scheduled for June 3rd to discuss the rest of the pending invoices for this project.

Previously, the municipality also requested an additional grant application for a roundabout project at the intersection of Route 202/179 and Kitchens Lane in the amount of \$800,000.00 that has not been approved by the Commissioners to date.

Recently, the Township submitted two new grant applications for the Gateway Trail Phase 2 and Phase 3. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that they satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The applications were discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but have not been awarded to date.

10. **New Hope Borough, PA** – The Borough has submitted three (3) new grant applications. One application is to install new ornamental lighting on the Main Street Bridge, in the amount of \$84,815.00. This project was previously to be completed with a CAI grant, but the Borough chose to terminate the project and transfer the grant funds to the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals project* to construct ADA curb ramps at the intersections as required by PennDOT. The second application was submitted in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization, to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, Morrisville Borough and Yardley Borough, in the amount of \$872,969.00. The third application is for the *Main Street Pedestrian Crosswalks project*, amount of \$101,400, to improve ADA compliant accessibility, including modified curb ramps and the installation of pavement markings at a midblock crossing. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that both applications satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The applications were discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but they have not been awarded to date.

The Borough awarded the construction of the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals project* to Armour & Sons Electric on April 9, 2008. The project started on June 26, 2008 and is anticipated to be completed in Summer 2010 due to the need to include ADA compliant pedestrian facilities as per the direction of PennDOT.

The Borough's Engineer, Carroll Engineering, has recently received a revised change order from Armour & Sons Electric, in the amount of \$350.00, to complete only a controller modification at the intersection of Bridge St. & Main St. at this time to modify the pedestrian phase operation at the intersection. It is anticipated that a second change order will be submitted by the contractor for the installation of the ADA curb ramps at both project intersections once they have been designed and approved by PennDOT. It is anticipated that the change order work, if approved, will be completed in the Summer 2010.

To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$371,705.26 of \$446,404.00 (83% of total grant amount). The Borough recently submitted a reimbursement request in the amount of \$25,262.03, which is currently under review.

11. **Falls Township, PA** – The original traffic signal installation and modernization project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award.

The Township has submitted a new grant application for the modernization and upgrade of the traffic signal at New Falls Road and Tyburn Road, in the amount of \$108,140.00. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

12. **Upper Makefield Township, PA** – The *Washington Crossing Gateway project* was completed in the Spring 2010. To date the Township has been reimbursed \$1,447,000.00 of \$1,447,000.00 (100% of total grant amount).

The Township has recently submitted a new grant application for the completion of the Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 project, in the amount of \$54,000.00. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

13. Lower Makefield, PA – The Traffic Signal project at the intersection of Yardley-Newtown Rd & Creamery Rd is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission and the original grant is closed out.

The Township has recently submitted a new grant application for the completion of the Black Rock Pedestrian Trail project, in the amount of \$170,877.00. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the May Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

14. **Bristol Borough, PA** – In December 2009, the Borough submitted two new requests for CAI funding. The first request was for a new Public Works Garage, at an estimated cost of \$750,000.00. This request did not meet the characteristics of the CAI program and was not considered for a grant award. The second request was to install decorative crosswalks (initially part of the original grant project to upgrade the traffic signals in the Borough) at each signalized intersection, at an estimated cost of \$423,126.12. At the January Commissioners meeting, the Borough's application for the Decorative Crosswalks Project was tabled and will be considered for CAI funds at a future Commissioners meeting.

The construction of the *Traffic Signals Revitalization* project was completed by Armour & Sons Electric in July 2009 and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$1,333,843.28 of \$1,334,450.00 grant (99.9% of total grant amount).

Also, as mentioned previously, Bristol Borough's grant application for the Regional Police Station and Training Center project has been reviewed by the CAI department and it was found that the project did not meet the primary characteristics of the CAI program. Therefore, the project was not approved by the Commissioners.

15. Yardley, PA – Construction of the project began in February 2008 by Harris Blacktopping and was completed in August 2008. The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough and the project has been closed out. The Borough of Yardley in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization submitted an application to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, and Morrisville Borough in the amount of \$872,969.00.

Morrisville, PA – The Borough recently submitted eight new roads, lighting, and traffic signal improvements applications. The Borough also agreed to submit a new grant application for the Moreau Street Rehabilitation project, in the amount of \$360,000. This application is currently under review by the due diligence engineer. It also submitted

In January the Borough submitted a grant surplus reallocation request to replace as many light heads as possible on East Bridge Street to enhance the downtown area. This request was presented to the Commissioners and approved in the January Commissioners Committee meeting. Morrisville will use the remaining monies in their grant to perform additional the work.

All four (4) projects in Morrisville are completed. Final reimbursement requests have been submitted by Morrisville. One final effort is the execution of a Maintenance and Jurisdiction Agreement between Morrisville and the Commission or the median on East Bridge St. that is within Commission jurisdiction. Morrisville has is taking the lead in developing said agreement. In November, the borough sent a letter requesting the use of the surplus funds in the amount of \$31,896.02 to replace the light heads for the lights on Bridge Streets.

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New Jersey

- 1. Montague, NJ On May 21, CAI Director visited the project site and noticed that the construction work has just started the day before. The storm water drainage basin had been excavated and the helipad was under construction; however, there is several change orders that the due diligence engineer is reviewing with the municipal engineer. Montague has also submitted 10 change orders requests for approval for a total of \$101,000. The CAI department has requested additional backup information to justify those requests and has expressed concern that they would increase the construction cost by 43%.
- 2. **Knowlton, NJ** Finelli Consulting Engineers submitted a flood hazard area permit and a freshwater wetlands general permit to the NJ DEP to continue the work of the trail extension.

The application submitted by the township for \$206,800 to construct a section of the Paulinskill Trail, in order to connect with Pennsylvania via the Portland/Columbia pedestrian bridge, was approved by the Commissioners at their September 29th meeting. A project kick-off meeting for the new grant project for the extension of the Paulinskill Trail was held on Wednesday, November 5, 2008. Members of the CAI Department attended, along with officials from NJDEP, NJDOT, and Knowlton.

All parties are eager to work together to complete this project. CAI concerns about the trail concept were alleviated by NJDOT who stated that a similar trail concept was recently approved and completed in Bergen County in Route 4. In December the trail project received a letter of approval from NJ Fish & Wildlife. The Township is working with the NJDEP and NJDOT to complete the approvals.

Finelli Associates is working on a status report to forward to the CAI department. The project is broken into 2 phases. The first will be clearing brush and installing the trails. The second phase is the concrete underpass which is dependent on DEP approvals. The timing may make this part "to be completed at another time. The municipality sent an extension letter request to complete the project in the spring of 2010. The other four projects applied for by the municipality were completed within the budget allocated previously.

3. **Belvidere**, NJ – In May the final reimbursement request has been processed and the project is in the process of being closed out.

In September the bids received by the municipality were higher than the estimated engineering construction costs and they are in the process of assessing their options. The Commission's Chief engineer recommended that the 700 feet portion of Water Street in the Town that is not included in CAI project be done by the Commission in the near future. The Chief engineer indicated that it would be advantageous to include other work on the sidewalk and in the shed adjacent to the Riverton/Belvidere Bridge. It was also agreed that the town will go ahead with the CAI portion of the project and that the Town engineer will give the commission an estimate of the cost to complete the missing portion of Water Street. The project was awarded and a

preconstruction meeting will be held in early June. The project is to commence construction in the 3rd week of June along with a ground breaking ceremony. The project is completed and the CAI department met with the engineer to review the final invoice for the project. A reimbursement request is being processed for this project.

4. **Phillipsburg, NJ** – The second phase of the project started construction in May. The sidewalk reconstruction part of the project is being done in South Main Street. In January a new grant application request to extend the South Main Street project –Phase 3 was received by the Town of Phillipsburg. This request was presented to the Commissioners at their February meeting and a grant for \$997,962 was awarded.

The original project is complete, and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008. The Engineering Department and the Town of Phillipsburg reached an agreement regarding the reconstruction of Union Square. This section of the project was completed by Top Line Construction and coincided with the rest of the CAI project on Main St. and Broad and 3rdStreets. The Town requested a number of change orders to the contractors, which impacted their allocated budget for various line items.

During their September 2008 meeting, the Commissioners approved an additional \$429,422 grant request for an extension of the project from the Black Bridge, southerly to the apex of Shappel Park on South Main Street, Phillipsburg. The Town also submitted a request for a completion time extension of this section. The phase II plans are completed and the project has been bid and awarded. In December this project was awarded to Z Brothers Contractor. However, it needed an extension until the spring of 2010.

5. **Pohatcong, NJ** – A new application was received by the CAI Department for *Resurfacing of River Road*. This application was presented to the Commissioners at their February 2010 meeting. This request was not awarded at said meeting.

Pohatcong also submitted a joint application with Alpha for the reconstruction of Edge Road between the two communities. This application was approved by the Commissioners at their meeting in March 2009. Alpha will serve as the lead municipality on the project. A preconstruction meeting for that project was held on Monday December 7, 2009.

The previous Pohatcong projects have been completed. After completion of the original CAI project, Pohatcong requested permission to utilize the excess funds to repave additional sections of River Road, which was approved at the November meeting. Pohatcong used the Morris County Purchasing Cooperative to contract for the services. The work was performed and completed in December 2008. The CAI department has received Pohatcong's final reimbursement request and was paid.

6. **Holland, NJ** – Holland inquired about the additional funds the Commission has for CAI projects and submitted an application for the resurfacing of Mt. Joy Road. The first and final reimbursement request is under review.

Holland requested and received permission to reallocate their grant from their original project tone which repaired and repaved four municipal roads. The project was bid and awarded and has been substantially completed.

- 7. **Milford, NJ** –The Borough submitted an application for the repair and resurfacing of Honeysuckle Lane and the finishing of the guard rail and the Borough Parking lot off Bridge Street. This Bridge Street Improvements project is complete. The contractor was the subject of many positive newspaper articles regarding the extraordinary efforts they went through to minimize impacts to the business community. Reimbursement requests have been submitted and request number 3 has been paid. Reimbursement request number 4 is still under review. The municipality has made the Director aware that they are over budget and may be in need of an additional \$100,000 for the project payment.
- 8. **Frenchtown, NJ** The Park and Ride project is complete. The Reimbursement requests are being paid by the CAI department. However, no major development has been noted during this period regarding the acquisition of the property for the Village Green Park. The Mayor has requested an extension until 2010 for the latter project.
- 9. Lambertville, NJ The CAI director and the due diligence engineer will be meeting with Lambertville on June 15 to discuss the status of the grant project budgets and reimbursements. Lambertville has requested to reallocate money based on excess funds being available. CAI is not convinced that a surplus exists but Lambertville's reimbursement requests are not up to date. The City held a press conference on the completion of the traffic signal on Swan Street and Route 179 CAI project. The City submitted a new application for a drainage system improvements that is being reviewed by the due diligence engineer. In January, the Commissioners approved two additional road reconstruction projects to Lambertville. One was for the *Delevan St. Roadway Reconstruction Project* for \$497,200 and the *McCready's Alley Roadway Reconstruction Project* for \$147,000. The City has been notified of the grant awards and the CAI department is preparing the grant Contract Agreement and financial documents for execution.

The Kline's Court CAI project was completed in September and the Jefferson Street project started its construction in the same month and was also completed in December, 2008. Both of these projects were awarded to Top Line Construction. The George Street Reconstruction project was completed in November, 2008. However, this project's bids came in approximately \$28,000

over budget and the City will pick up this amount. A Commission's CAI permanent sign was developed for this project. The Quarry Street Road Reconstruction project was also completed in May 2009.

The design for the South Franklin Street traffic calming project has been completed.

10. **Stockton, NJ** – During the month of January 2010, the CAI Department and the Finance Department processed a reimbursement request in an emergency basis as a special request from the Borough.

The Bridge Street Improvements project is completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out this project. The municipality was nominated for a transportation construction project award for its CAI project.

11. **West Amwell, NJ** – In February 2009, the Township submitted a new application for funding from the DRJTBC's CAI program. This application for *Rocktown Hill Road Improvement Project* to the approach to the intersection of Route 31 was approved for \$100,000 by the Commissioners at their January 25, 2010 meeting. The Township has been notified of the grant awards and the CAI department is preparing the grant Contract Agreement and financial documents for execution.

The Section 11 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project is now completed. The Section 12 and Section 13 Road Reconstruction project are also completed. Reimbursement requests continue to be processed for sections 12, and 13 of the completed projects.

- 12. **Delaware Twp, NJ** The Township submitted a new application for the Improvements and resurfacing of Federal Twist Rd. and to install drainage improvements and erosion control within the existing road right of way. These projects were completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out this project. The municipality has made a request to utilize the remainder of their grant to chip seal the grant project.
- 13. **Hopewell, NJ** The Township has submitted a grant application for the design and construction of sidewalk replacement in the Village of Titusville. This application was awarded a grant by the Commissioners at their April 2010 meeting. The ADA Ramps and Walkway project is substantially complete. The punch list inspection was held on October 27th. The CAI department is waiting for the final close out of the project.
- 14. **Ewing, NJ** The Township submitted another application requesting funding for the Wilburtha Rd. Improvement project.

The Original paving scope of work was completed and delivered under estimate cost amount. The municipality submitted a request to expand its original scope of work using the excess money and it has been approved at the Commissioners meeting in October. All the paving work was completed. The final payment has being processed.

15. Trenton, NJ – CAI in coordination with Commissioner Laurenti and the City scheduled a meeting with Trenton on Friday June 4 to revise the project design, schedule and its overall progress. An application was to be submitted for consideration at the February, 2009 New Jersey (continued)

Commissioners meeting. The project would entail the reconstruction of Warren St. in the vicinity of the new Mercer County Courthouse and The Marriot Lafayette Square Hotel. In their application, Trenton indicates that the project would be ready to be bid in June 2009, with construction to begin in the summer and completion in the fall of 2010 or spring of 2011. The CAI department reviewed the application and is concerned that Trenton may not be able to achieve the June's bid date. Trenton supplied additional information regarding this application to the CAI department. Work on this project is still in progress.

- 16. Alpha NJ The Commission has received an application from Alpha and Pohatcong for the reconstruction of Edge Rd. between the two communities under Route 78. Alpha would serve as the lead municipality in the project. The estimated cost of the project is \$665,239, and CAI has requested information on how the two communities will handle cost-sharing. The project is basically rebuilding of Edge Road for a little over a mile with drainage improvements to improve erosion-prone areas. The Commission awarded the grant at their meeting in March 2009, and the CAI met with Alpha in April 9th to discuss the agreement and project procedures. The project was bid and bids opened on October 23 2009. Alpha has requested a time extension for the project until 2010. A pre-construction meeting was held on December 7, 2009. The Borough is to commence construction as soon as weather permits it. This project is almost complete.
- 17. **Kingwood, NJ** In January the Township submitted an application for the reconstruction of Tumble Falls Road and was awarded \$373,000, the total amount of the project. The agreement is in process for execution. CAI met with Kingwood on May 14 to discuss the process of the grant project.
