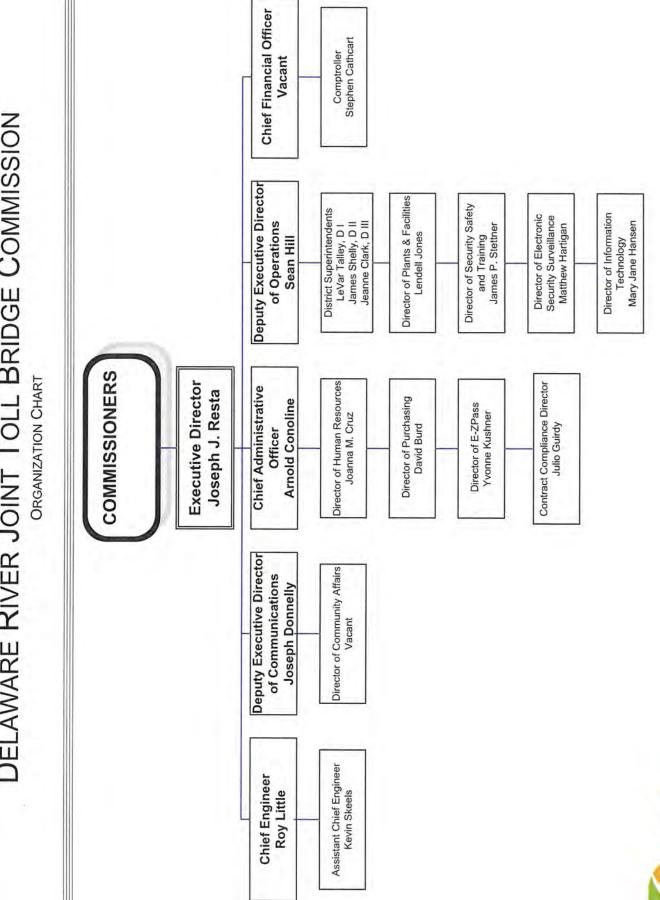

ROLL CALL

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting called the roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being five members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and five members present from the State of New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, addressed the meeting and said;

"Thank you, Mr. Chairman, with the break from monthly meetings in August, the focus of my remarks this morning will be today's meeting agenda;

significant item for consideration today is the award of a design-build-maintain contract to overhaul our agency's entire toll collection system. This modernization project will touch virtually every aspect of our toll system - manual cash collections, conventional toll lane E-ZPass transactions, highway speed open-road tolling and future all-electronic tolling at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge. In the end, our aging system of toll equipment will be swapped out and replaced and then maintained for an extended period. The work will be done in two phases. The first phase will involve the design, development, integration, installation and testing of a complete roadside toll system. This work will affect manual collections of tolls, electronic toll collection, violations enforcement systems, all-electronic tolling at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge, and integration with host computers at the New Jersey Regional Customer Service Center for E-ZPass. The second phase will include maintenance of all the newly installed equipment and operating systems for five years with two additional three-year options. It also will cover the maintenance of existing toll plaza equipment such as LED signage, lane signal indicators and vellow beacons. Optional work under the contract may include the installation of a toll-collector

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monitoring system at our seven current toll bridges and the installation of a self-service kiosk at our three low-volume toll plazas — New Hope-Lambertville, Portland-Columbia and Milford-Montague. A significant outcome of this project will be installation of dual-protocol transponder readers that will give us the capability to read toll tags from toll agencies elsewhere in the country, once National Interoperability is decided,

"There will be many other upgrades, too: Overhead LED scanners to improve profiling vehicles for toll-classification purposes, new patron fare displays, new roadway loops that will enable us to remove current-day treadles that are expensive to maintain, new violation enforcement cameras for taking front and of vehicles passing through our toll lanes, new flash units for enhancing vehicular images, new terminals will be installed in our toll booths to better handle cash transactions, and an entirely new digital video auditing system will be installed to track toll transactions. This modernization effort couldn't come at more opportune time. Our existing system was installed in 2002 and is quickly approaching the end of its useful life. Additionally, some toll agencies in our region have already begun shifting to the next-generation of toll collection technology; others are on the cusp of upgrading just like we are doing now. The Commission also needs the latest available All Electronic Toll technology to move ahead its fast approaching Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project; we currently expect the first span of that new bridge to open in 2019. Finally, the new system will enable the Commission to be ready for future interoperability of the nation's various electronic toll collection systems. We are asking Commissioners to award this important contract to TransCore of Nashville, Tn. We expect the first phase of modernization activities to be completed in 16 months with equipment installation and lane conversion work beginning in the summer of next year and ending before the onset of winter. Today's agenda also includes two one-year maintenance contracts that should enable us to keep our current toll collection system functioning until the new, modernized network comes online in late 2016,

"We're proposing one contract be awarded to Xerox for maintaining current hardware and the software for open-road tolling and violation enforcement. We are recommending the second contract be awarded to TransCore to provide maintenance and support for the software that ties our conventional toll system together with the servers at our bridges and the servers at our customer service/violations processing center,

"Moving to other business, today's agenda includes a contract award to Pennoni Associates to provide traffic engineering consulting services. The contract calls for Pennoni to provide the Commission with annual traffic and toll revenue projections and prepare annual traffic engineering reports for 2015 and 2016. The contract provides up to two additional two-year cycles to be exercised at the Commission's discretion. The projections by an independent consultant assists the

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Commission to comply with its bond indenture's financial-accountability provisions,

"Today's agenda also includes a pivotal action item that will enable the Commission to further advance its preparations for its Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. A resolution has been prepared for Commissioners' consideration to award McCormick Taylor, Inc. with a six-year Public Involvement Consultant Services contract for the bridge project. Under this contract, the McCormick Taylor and its team of subconsultants are to prepare and implement a public involvement program that will begin during final design --which is currently underway -- and continue through construction to project completion in 2021,

"Given the length and complexity of this project, the McCormick Taylor team will be called upon to provide a wide array of tasks, including, development of comprehensive mailing, email and contact lists of project stakeholders, updating the project-specific website, operating a toll-free public information line, informing the public of major project milestones and travel-route changes, planning and staging events such as open houses, public hearings and other meetings, designing and distributing informational brochures, fact sheets and info-graphics, conducting a multi-medium educational campaign about how the replacement bridge's all-electronic toll, collection system will work, encouraging motorists' use of E-ZPass as a means of saving money mitigating conflicts and disputes, and gathering public comment from residents, motorists, business leaders, elected officials and other stakeholders. McCormick Taylor will work closely with the overall project team, our engineers, and our E-ZPass, communications and community affairs personnel. We'd like to get this moving as soon as possible. With final design progressing toward the 60-percent completed threshold, we soon will have some decision-making and outreach tasks to conduct. This will include a project presentation for Lower Makefield Township and an open house on noise wall design input, both in November. Additionally in early 2016, we anticipate holding six public hearings relative to the toll pricing schedule that will be employed once the first span of the replacement bridge opens to traffic with all electronic tolling in 2019,

"In closing today, I want to commend our operations division for their work in preparing for potential traffic and other issues arising from Pope Francis's recent visit to Philadelphia this past weekend Preparations included: Placing additional staffing at our high-volume bridges serving Route 1, I-78 and I-80, having maintenance personnel on duty for any incident-management needs that might arise at our Trenton-Morrisville and Scudder Falls bridges. Increasing the bridge monitor presence at our Calhoun Street and Washington Crossing bridges.

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Developing a plan to handle any charter bus breakdowns on our bridges, including towing by on-call wreckers, deploying mobile traffic counters at the Trenton-Morrisville and Scudder Falls bridges to monitor real-time traffic volumes, and fully staffing of our Primary Control Center in coordination with the New Jersey Transportation Command Center and the PennDOT Regional Command Center, a job well done by everyone involved,

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of September 28, 2015 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (July, 2015)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for July 2015 in comparison to the July 2014 traffic and revenue statistics. In addition, total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month of July. July is the eleventh consecutive month that both total toll revenue and total toll traffic have reflected increases over the prior year.

Analysis of July 2015 / July 2014 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 5.78 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 5.72 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 5.93 percent increase.

Analysis of July 2015 / July 2014 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 214,312 vehicles, or 5.97 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 28,839 vehicles, or 6.28 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 185,473 vehicles, or 5.93 percent.
- Total recorded westbound traffic at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for July 2015 increased by 61,290 vehicles, or 2.21 percent as compared to July 2014. Average daily westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for July 2015 was 91,626 vehicles as compared for 89,649 vehicles in July 2014.

Traffic analysis for 2015 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for July 2015 was 122,670 vehicles as compared to 115,757 total vehicles in July 2014. Total YTD toll traffic at these bridges is reflecting a 3.830% increase through the first seven months of 2015 as compared to the same period in 2014.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the 11 toll supported bridges is reflecting a 2.30% increase through the first seven months of 2015 as compared to 2014.

DISTRICT REVIEW:

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) reflected a 7.95 percent increase for July 2015 when compared to July 2014 as the result of the increases of 55,226 cars and 3,133 trucks. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 834 cars and an increase of 666 trucks combined to generate a 0.10 percent decrease in total toll traffic for July 2015 as compared to July 2014.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge recorded an increase of 4.10 percent in total toll traffic for the month of July 2015 compared to July 2014 as the result of increases of 34,108 cars and 11,096 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 36,358 passenger vehicles and 3,427 trucks generated a 9.34 percent increase in total toll traffic for July 2015.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 9.41 percent increase in total toll traffic during July 2015 as a result of the increases of 6,654 automobiles and 3,808 trucks compared to July 2014. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 45,936 passenger vehicles and 6,373 trucks generated an increase of 5.78 percent in total toll traffic for July 2015 as compared to July 2014. At Milford-Montague (MM), an increase of 8,025 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 336 trucks to produce a 6.24 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of July 2015.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of July, 2015 and July, 2014, and the year-to-date periods ending July 31, 2015 and July 31, 2014.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of July 2015 and the seven month year-to-date ("YTD") operations of fiscal year 2015 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,624,638 for the month of July. For the 2015 fiscal period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$31,324,422 or 96.6% of the YTD operating budget.

Most of the expense line categories are within their normal line item budget. Overtime Wages exceed the budget by \$80,178 or 37.0% primarily due to the high level of adverse weather activity for the first three months of 2015. It is anticipated that cost will come in line with the budget during the operating year.

Regular Employee Healthcare is currently \$300,584 or 5.7% ahead of budget due to higher than anticipated expense for 2015.

EZPass Maintenance Expense exceeds YTD budget by \$47,881 or 7.0% as the cost of maintaining the current in-lane system is higher than originally anticipated. EZPass operating expense exceeds the YTD budget by \$195,383 or 7.4% as a result of unanticipated increases in CSC rates. It is anticipated that these two line items will exceed their full year operating budget.

There were no unusual expenses during the month of July.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of September 28, 2015 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (August, 2015)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for August 2015 in comparison to the August 2014 traffic and revenue statistics. In addition, total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month. August is the twelfth consecutive month that both total toll revenue and total toll traffic have reflected increases over the prior year.

Analysis of August 2015 / August 2014 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 3.59 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 3.80 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 3.10 percent increase.

Analysis of August 2015 / August 2014 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 114,988 vehicles, or 3.09 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 19,342 vehicles, or 4.27 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 95,646 vehicles, or 2.92 percent.
- Total recorded westbound traffic at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for August 2015 decreased by 3,402 vehicles, or 0.12 percent as compared to August 2014.
 Average daily westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for August 2015 was 88,929 vehicles as compared for 89,038 vehicles in August 2014.

Traffic analysis for 2015 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for August 2015 was 123,883 vehicles as compared to 120,174 total vehicles in August 2014. Total YTD toll traffic at these bridges is reflecting a 3.72% increase through the first eight months of 2015 as compared to the same period in 2014.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the 11 toll supported bridges is reflecting a 1.97% increase through the first eight months of 2015 as compared to 2014.

DISTRICT REVIEW:

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) reflected a 5.46 percent increase for August 2015 when compared to August 2014 as the result of the increase of 41,837 cars and the decrease of 1,296 trucks. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), increases of 307 cars and 297 trucks combined to generate a 0.34 percent increase in total toll traffic for August 2015 as compared to August 2014.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge recorded an increase of 0.79 percent in total toll traffic for the month of August 2015 compared to August 2014 as the result of increases of 269 cars and 8,786 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 40,798 passenger vehicles and 2,245 trucks generated a 10.17 percent increase in total toll traffic for August 2015.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 5.21 percent increase in total toll traffic during August 2015 as a result of the increases of 2,749 automobiles and 3,255 trucks compared to August 2014. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 7,343 passenger vehicles and 5,664 trucks generated an increase of 1.33 percent in total toll traffic for August 2015 as compared to August 2014. At Milford-Montague (MM), an increase of 2,343 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 391 trucks to produce a 1.97 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of August 2015.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of August, 2015 and August, 2014, and the year-to-date periods ending August 31, 2015 and August 31, 2014.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of August 2015 and the eight month year-to-date ("YTD") operations of fiscal year 2015 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,410,721 for the month of August. For the 2015 fiscal period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$35,735,143 or 97.1% of the YTD operating budget.

Most of the expense line categories are within their normal line item budget. Overtime Wages exceed the budget by \$72,261 or 30.9% primarily due to the high level of adverse weather activity for the first three months of 2015. It is anticipated that cost will come in line with the budget during the operating year.

Regular Employee Healthcare is currently \$351,802 or 5.8% ahead of budget due to higher than anticipated expense for 2015.

EZPass Maintenance Expense exceeds YTD budget by \$44,203 or 5.6% as the cost of maintaining the current in-lane system is higher than originally anticipated. EZPass operating expense exceeds the YTD budget by \$348,521 or 11.52% as a result of unanticipated increases in CSC rates. It is anticipated that these two line items will exceed their full year operating budget.

There were no unusual expenses during the month of August.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

JULY 2015

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of July 2015, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 37 purchase orders in the total amount of \$160,712.84. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 18 price inquiries were sent out for 6 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3.0 per order (18/6 = 3.0).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the period of July 2015 are shown below:

- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$78,276.55, for the approved Capital vehicle purchase of a 2016 Ford F-350 Utility Truck for District II.
- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$15,782.00, for the Commission's traffic counter demonstration project.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$9,642.28, for vehicle tires for the Delaware Water Gap Facility.
- ➤ A Purchase Orders was issued, in the total amount of \$8,511.48, for Commission uniform needs at our Delaware Water Gap Facility.
- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$5,521.70, for truck repairs due to a vehicular accident at the New Hope-Lambertville Facility. An insurance claim has been submitted for reimbursement to the Commission by the carrier.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

AUGUST 2015

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of August, 2015, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 34 purchase orders in the total amount of \$130,960.95. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 25 price inquiries were sent out for 8 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3.12 per order (25/8 = 3.12).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the period of August 2015 are shown below:

- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$71,346.00, for ESS camera equipment repairs and upgrades at our Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Facility.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$21,500.00, for guide rail repairs and attenuator services at the I-78 Toll Bridge Plaza.
- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$5,236.67, for the bucket truck inspection and repair for our Easton-Phillipsburg Facility.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

ELECTRONIC TOLL COLLECTION PROGRAM MONTH OF JULY AND AUGUST 2015

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

- 1. Xerox and TransCore continue to perform preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Commission Staff met with Xerox and TransCore to review maintenance activity for the month.
- 2. Commission Staff issued a purchase order to Xerox for the 2015 Spare Parts/Consumables. The spare parts are being required and placed in the Commission's inventory. Once all items are received, we will conduct an inventory review.
- 3. RK&K completed their review of the submitted proposals for the Electronic Toll Collection System Replacement. RK&K attended the oral interviews and subsequent meetings with the Technical Evaluation Committee (TEC), serving as an advisor. Additionally, RK&K prepared a summary of the assumptions and exceptions included in the proposal and participated with the Commission in the negotiation process.

Activities for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center

- A monthly status meeting with Duncan Solutions and Commission Staff was held to
 continue discussing the process that was implemented to collect from all pre-NJ
 Regional CSC violators that were transitioned from the Commission's standalone
 CSC to Duncan Solutions.
- 2. Xerox continues to provide services for the E-ZPass New Jersey Regional Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center (CSC/VPC).
- 3. The New Jersey Turnpike Authority (NJTA) procurement for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center System & Operations is on-going. Proposals were received on May 29, 2015, the proposal submission date. Commission Staff met with the other agencies included in the NJ CSC to discuss their evaluation of the proposals. Oral interviews were conducted and best and final offers were submitted to the NJTA. Commission staff participated in meetings with the other agencies included in the CSC to discuss our final evaluation and prepare for submitting to the NJTA.

General Electronic Toll Collection Program Activities

- 1. Mr. Stracciolini participated in the IAG E-ZPass Executive Management Committee and Policy Committee meetings.
- 2. Mr. Stracciolini served on the Non-toll Opportunities subgroup for the IAG. This subgroup is preparing a policy and procedure document that provides a method for the IAG to follow for non-toll opportunities, such as use of the E-ZPass transponder system at parking garages or drive-thru services.
- 3. Mr. Stracciolini was requested to participate on the E-ZPass Group Transition Subcommittee. This subcommittee is charged with developing a plan to transition the E-ZPass Group staff from their hosted positions to the E-ZPass Group once it becomes a corporation.

STATUS UPDATES

During the month of July the Contract Compliance Department (CCD) reviewed the two proposals received proposals from two different companies. One of the proposals was received from The Hierarchy and the other from LCP Tracker. These proposals are required to assist in managing the Workforce Utilization and Certified Payroll information of the managing engineering contracts. After careful evaluation of them, the CCD staff determined that the proposal from LCP Tracker was more appropriate to meet the needs of the CCD.

At the end of July, the Secure File Transfer Protocol (SFTP) was developed and made available for the DRJTBC to begin providing data to B2GNOW. In early August the CCP, with the assistance of the IT Department, conducted its first file interface from DRJTBC MUNIS into the B2GNOW's FTP site. From there on the previous month's files data should run on the first of each month.

In August, the CCD updated the Construction Services and Professional Services Guidelines as well as the forms posted on the website, to include the B2GNow system instruction mandates.

IDENTIFIED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (IBE) PROGRAM

➤ Contract Compliance IBE Target of 25% of the total contract award became effective on July 1, 2014. From the start of the IBE program to June 2015, the Commissioners have awarded a total of eight (8) projects with the new IBE target.

B2GNOW and LCP TRACKER CONTRACT COMPLIANCE DEPARTMENT SYSTEMS

- ➤ In August, the CCD staff in coordination with the B2GNOW staff decided to now hold only monthly meetings for the B2GNOW system updates and coordinate new vendors' webinar trainings for such system.
- ➤ The CCP is in the process of finalizing the purchase of the LCP Tracker program module to track the construction projects Workforce Utilization and Certified Payroll.

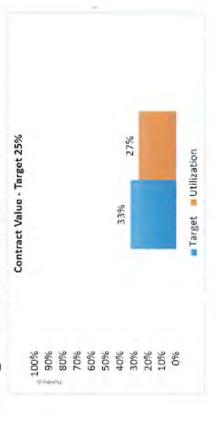

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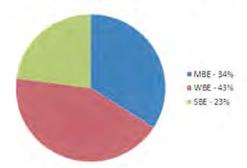

COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project Website Redesign - The redesigned website went live in mid-August, ending a roughly four-month process that involved the creation of new content, the utilization of an up-todate content management system (CMS) called Drupal, and interfacing between the Commission's IT department and the ACT Engineering/Zahler IT consulting team. The changes for the project website were pursued because the former site had become outdated in terms of content, display, navigation and software. The updates to the website coincide with the project's transition from the completed environmental documentation phase to the current final design phase. An emphasis is placed on explaining the project's genesis, its benefits, and the envisioned sequencing of bridge construction. The site is sleeker and easier to navigate. There is more documentation and it is better organized for public viewing. The plan is to add some photographs and graphics as those materials become available. One major advantage of the site is that the Communications Department has a largely unfettered ability to access the site's CMS and make corrections and changes to content.

60th Anniversary of the Historic 1955 Delaware River Flood – The 60th anniversary of the worst recorded flooding in the history of the Delaware River valley occurred on August 18-20. In recognition of the event, a press release was issued that incorporated the depiction of the devastating flood as chronicled in the Commission's annual report for 1955. The flood destroyed four Commission-controlled bridges (the crossings were actually owned by the two states at the time of the flood). The press release further detailed the closure periods for the respective bridges that were damaged or knocked out of service by the flood. The press release garnered attention by a variety of publications up and down the river. The Communications Department subsequently provided JPG photos of flooded or destroyed bridges to various outlets that requested them.

TRENTON MORRISVILLE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS

SPACE PROGRAM AND CONCEPT STUDY Task Order Assignment No. C-598B-3

This Task Order Assignment is for a Space Program and Concept Study for the Trenton Morrisville Toll Bridge Administration Building. The purpose of this assignment is to provide the Commission with guidance in enhancing operational efficiency and facility space utilization. The Space Program will include a detailed analysis of the current versus required space to support the Commission's current as well as the projected operational, administrative and maintenance needs at the T-M facility. Three (3) proposed alternatives will be identified by the Consultant for review and consideration by the Commission

A kick-off meeting was held with Gannet Fleming on February 25, 2014. Subsequent to this meeting, the Commission asked Gannet Fleming to explore an additional fourth option to this Project for enhanced maintenance capabilities at the Trenton-Morrisville site that could serve District I wide Maintenance and Operations' needs. A Preliminary Draft Submission was received from the Consultant on November 13th and a submission review meeting was held with the Commission executive staff on November 17, 2014. Commission comments were shared with the Consultant to incorporate and advance this fourth option into a Draft Submission.

Draft Concept Study Report was received on March 20th and an Executive Staff work session meeting was held with the Consultant on March 30, 2015. Consultants Draft Report was presented to the Commission and comments were shared with the Consultant to incorporate into the Final Report. Draft Final Report was received on June 30th and comments were shared with the Consultant related to the financial analysis of the Project and Final report was received on July 22, 2015. This Task Order Assignment is being closed.

TRENTON-MORRISVILLE TOLL & LOWER TRENTON TOLL-SUPPORTED BRIDGES APPROACH ROADWAYS IMPROVEMENTS

DESIGN Contract No. C-639A

Cherry, Weber and Associates, P.C. (CWA) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective February 25, 2014. This contract is for the Scope Development, Preliminary and Final Design and Post-Design Services for work at both the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Approach Roadways and the Lower Trenton Toll-Supported Bridge Approach Roadways. The Preliminary and Final Design effort under this contract that included the development of two (2) separate construction contracts: T-639A Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Approach Roadways Improvements; and TS-639B Lower Trenton Toll-Supported Bridge Approach Roadways Improvements, has been completed.

CWA has completed their Post-Design Services for Contract T-639A and will complete their effort to provide post-design, post-award services for the TS-639B construction contract with the completion of construction in early September. CWA's continued post-design services included the review of contractor submittals, responding to RFIs, maintaining a field presence for the direction of work, assisting the General Contractor in the layout of concrete pavement patches, and participating in the TS-639B Progress Meetings as needed.

The latest Progress Meeting was held with Baker on July 7 to review the status of the contract and progress of the work completed to date. Baker progress submittals made during the months of July and August included the Final NJ Route 29 Interchange Roundabout and Ramp Analysis Technical Memorandum, the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility Technical Memo, the NJ and PA Design Exceptions Report, the Lighting Warrant Analyses Technical Memo, the NJ Line & Grade Plans, the NJ 175 Ramp to NB I-95 Analysis Report, and the 60% and Pre-Final Submissions for the Advanced Tree Clearing Contract. TRC began their field work on June 22nd with their work to date continuing on schedule. As of the end of August one hundred and seventy (170) of the Contract three hundred and ten (310) borings have been completed. Bi-Weekly Schedule and Progress Meetings continue to take place.

PRE-CONSTRUCTION TRAFFIC STUDY FOR THE SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

DESIGN Contract No. C-663A

Pennoni Associates, Inc. (Pennoni) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective July 28, 2015. This Contract is for professional traffic engineering services for a pre-construction traffic study required prior to construction of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, in accordance with the Interagency Agreement (IA) dated April 30, 2012 between the DRJTBC, PennDOT and NJDOT. CPMC SERVICES – YEAR 2015

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-1J

The Capital Program Management Consultant (CPMC) services are being continued under this Task Order Assignment, which began in March 2015. AECOM is providing one (1) full-time Project Manager and one (1) part-time Program Area Manager to oversee and manage various design and construction projects that are being advanced in the Capital Improvement Program. Under this Task Order Assignment the CPMC is currently providing full-time Resident Engineering duties for Construction Contract TS-639B, Lower Trenton TSB Approach Roadways Improvements; and, management and oversight of the other CPMC assigned projects. Contract TS-639B reached substantial completion in early July and the CPMC provided Resident Engineering duties for Contract TS-677A, Interim Deck Repairs for the Scudder Falls Bridge, which reached substantial completion for the first year of repairs on. August 24th.

CPMC COMMUNICATIONS INFRASTRUCTURE SUPPORT SERVICES

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-1K

AECOM has completed its alternatives assessment identifying potential solutions customized to meet the system requirements / future needs and submitted a draft report summarizing the results of the same together with a draft recommendation report.

DMC ADVANCED ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR PRIORITY ITEMS OF WORK

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2D

The AECOM team continued to perform **Public Involvement** activities with the monitoring of the Project Hotline and providing updates to the project website. The public involvement work under this Task Order Assignment was completed in early August. All of the remaining DMC public involvement activities will now be completed under Task Order Assignment C-502A-2G.

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DMC SERVICES FOR MANAGEMENT AND OVERSIGHT OF FINAL DESIGN

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2G

AECOM's Design Management Consultant (DMC) Services are being continued under this Task Order Assignment that was authorized on January 16, 2015. The DMC services being provided under this Task Order Assignment include management and oversight of final design for the project through award of the Scudder Falls Bridge construction contracts. The DMC Services also include support to the Commission with the following: agency coordination, ROW acquisition plan development, ROW acquisition process coordination, environmental permitting, public involvement support, and coordination of necessary agreements with outside agencies. This DMC Task Order Assignment will cover DMC services through final design and award of the main Scudder Falls Bridge Project construction contract.

Environmental permitting agency coordination continues as well as preparation of the USACE and PADEP permit application packages, including all back-up documentation. Coordination is also ongoing with NJDEP – Green Acres regarding the back-up documentation required for the final application package for the Parkland Diversion Permit, and the draft Memorandum of Understanding for the maintenance and operation of the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility. The final NJDEP – Green Acres application was submitted for review and comment in mid-August. The Commission is currently awaiting preliminary approval of the Revised Jurisdictional Determination (JD) Plans that were submitted to the USACE on June 19, 2015. Work is progressing on the conceptual design of the PA Wetlands Mitigation Site. Staff and Legal Counsel continued the coordination with Evergreen Environmental to finalize the draft agreements for the NJ Wetlands Mitigation and the NJ Riparian Zone Mitigation.

The ROW acquisition process continued during the month of June, including coordination between Commission staff and the Commission's NJ and PA Legal Counsel. At the March 2015 Commission Meeting the Commissioners provided authorization, in the form of a Resolution, for the Right-of-Way Acquisition process. The PA and NJ Legal Counsels have initiated the necessary appraisals for all of the various property acquisitions in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Appraisals have been received for all but one of the properties. Various offer letters have gone out to the property owners and others are currently being drafted up by the Commission's Legal Counsel. A request for a Court Order to access the Morris property and perform necessary survey and boring work was filed with the Bucks County Court on July 24, 2015 after the property owner (James Morris) refused to allow this work to be done. Subsequent to this court order being files, Mr. Morris has agreed to work with us and allow this work to be done on his property.

DMC Staff are coordinating and overseeing the performance of Contract T-661, Geotechnical Boring Contract for the SFB Project that was awarded at the May 18, 2015 Commission Meeting. The boring work began June 22nd. Approximately 170 of the 310 total borings have been completed through August. Scheduling of 112 pavement cores and miscellaneous test pits that remain to be done also started. The latest Progress

Meeting of September 28, 2015 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Meeting for Contract C-660A was held on August 11th, 2015. Various technical review meetings were held with Baker in July and August to review technical issues and requirements for the various bridges, the BM/AET Facility, the NJ Route 29 Interchange Roundabout and Ramp Analyses, the Advanced Tree Clearing Contract and the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility Technical memos. The DMC also reviewed and commented on various Baker submittals including the PA and NJ Design Exceptions reports, the NJ Line and Grade Plans, the PA Route 332 Ramp Analysis Technical Memo, and the 60% and Pre-Final Submissions for the Advanced Tree Clearing Construction Contract. The Consultants baseline Final Design Schedule was approved at the end of July.

A coordination meeting was held with NJDOT staff on April 20, 2015 to review the proposed design layout for the NJ Route 29 Interchange. NJDOT confirmed that they want the design to proceed with the roundabouts. Additionally, they requested that the northbound entrance ramp from NJ Route 175 to I-95 remain open rather than be restricted for emergency access only. They are concerned that fully loaded tri-axle trucks from the nearby quarry that will be utilizing the roundabout during the peak traffic periods to access northbound I-95 will create an unacceptable Level of Service for the roundabout. Subsequent to that meeting, Baker was requested to prepare a report that analyzed the conceptual alignment and overall cost for providing full ramp access from Route 175. The results of this report and of the Final NJ Route 29 Interchange and Roundabout Analyses Technical Memo were discussed with NJDOT at a meeting on August 31, 2015. They were in agreement with the recommendations made in these reports. A RFP was prepared for Contract C-663A, SFB Project Pre-Construction Traffic Study. The RFP was posted on the Commission's website on April 23, 2015. A preproposal meeting was held on April 30, 2015 and four (4) proposals were submitted on May 21, 2015. Oral interviews with each of the four proposers were held on June 3, 2015. Authorization to negotiate was received at the June 29, 2015 Commission Meeting and final award was issued at the July 27, 2015 Commission Meeting.

SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE INTERIM DECK REPAIRS

Task Order Assignment No. C-628A-2

Under this Task Order Assignment (TOA) the Consultant, Dewberry Engineers Inc. (Dewberry), is preparing plans for a contract to do deck repairs on the Scudder Falls Bridge. The existing deck is deteriorating and needs to be repaired to provide a satisfactory riding surface until the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge is constructed. The purpose of this TOA is to prepare plans for a deck repair contract. After the repairs are complete, have the Contractor retained on an on-call basis for the following two (2) years, with an additional 1-year option, to repair new potholes as they develop. Bid opening was May 5, 2015. At the May Commission meeting it was voted to award the contract to Sparwick Contracting Inc. for \$916,696.00. A Pre-Construction meeting was held on June 19 and the Notice to Proceed was sent June 23, 2015. Since there are no nesting Peregrine Falcons the restriction of not starting work until August 1 was rescinded. The Contractor started construction on July 13, 2015 in the left lane of the southbound direction. All work, deck patching and line striping, was completed on August 24, 2015. Contractor is substantially complete for this year.

Meeting of September 28, 2015 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Construction Contract No. TS-677A

Sparwick Contracting, Inc. (SCI) was awarded this construction contract at the Commission's May 2015 Meeting and Notice to Proceed was issued effective June 23, 2015. Sparwick mobilized and began the deck repairs on July 13, 2015. All Type 1, 2 and 3 spall repairs were completed by August 22nd, and the bridge was restriped on August 24, 2015 completing the construction work for this project. Two progress meetings were held in August and SCI started demobilizing from the site in late August. One invoice was processed and the final invoice is being developed. SCI will provide on-call and emergency spall repairs for the next two years on an as-needed basis as part of their construction contract. Any bridge deck spall repairs that are needed will be performed between August 1st and November 6th of that year.

CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Task Order Assignment Contract No. C-627B-3

This is a Task Order Agreement Assignment to French and Parrello (F&P) for inspection services associated with the TS-677A Scudder Falls Toll-Supported Bridge Interim Deck Repair Project. Inspections by F&P were conducted by full time Assistant Resident Engineer (RE), provided inspection services for the Construction Contract. The RE participated in the Construction Contract Bi-Weekly Schedule Update and Progress Meetings, provided construction inspection services and assisted with document control. The Space Program will include a detailed analysis of the current versus required space to support the Commission's current as well as the projected operational, and maintenance needs at the facility.

At the conclusion of the Space Program, a Concept Study Report will be prepared to include three (3) proposed alternatives for review and consideration by the Commission in selecting the preferred alternative to be advanced to Final Design under a separate procurement process. As part of each alternative, the mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and life and safety improvements will be presented. Also, Building Management Systems will be part of each design concept which will reduce building systems' energy use and benefit the Commission in a long-term energy cost saving.

A kick-off meeting was held with Buchart Horn, Inc. / BASCO Associates on September 8, 2014 and a space utilization program interview was conducted on October 2, 2013.
