## ROLL CALL

Frank J. Tolotta, Acting Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being three members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and five members present from the State New Jersey.

## INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

## ACTING EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

With summer having ended and fall now upon us, today seems like an appropriate time to provide a traffic update and a status report on recent construction activities. The Commission

experienced a modest increase in traffic at both its toll and toll-supported bridges during the summer driving season. Overall, more than 300,000 additional vehicles used our crossings this summer as compared to last year, particularly at our toll bridges. Traffic at our toll-collection points continues to track on an upward path almost on a monthly basis. Most importantly, this has been the prevailing trend with commercial vehicles. While the year-to-year comparison of commercial vehicle travel dipped slightly in June, it rebounded well during the next two months. Trucks rose by nearly 4 percent in July and an additional 1.75 percent in August. The year-to-date comparisons with 2011 are just as positive. They continue to show trucks outperforming passenger vehicles with an overall increase of nearly 4 percent during the first eight months of 2012, however while truck traffic has been trending upward, the monthly volumes are still lagging almost 7 percent below the pre-recession peaks of 2006.

Turning to the capital program, there have been a variety of construction project launches and completions since the Commission's last meeting. The final work elements on the multi-year Substructure Repair and Scour Remediation Project were completed at the I-78 Toll Bridge and the Lower Trenton Toll-Supported Bridge at the end of August and the contractor is now out of the river at those two locations. This multi-year project involved rehabilitation of piers and abutments at 15 of our 20 bridges. The first phase of the project was launched two years ago. Despite challenges such as hurricanes and red-bellied turtle mating seasons, it is safe to say that the project has achieved its ultimate goal. It has put our bridge substructures in their best overall condition since they were originally constructed.

Another recent accomplishment was the completion of the Broad Street Viaduct Priority Repairs Project near the Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge. This primarily involved repair and reinforcement of corroded steel members on the bridge structure that carries Route 22 traffic over Bridge Street in Phillipsburg. Staging operations began in late August and all construction elements reached substantial completion on September 21. Around the same time as the viaduct work began, construction activities kicked off on the Water Street Improvement Project in Belvidere, N.J. This project is addressing a series of issues along the 700-foot section of Water Street owned by the Commission immediately east of the Riverton-Belvidere Toll-Supported Bridge. In addition to road paving, the project will involve sidewalk repairs, curb replacements, and lighting improvements. The Commission has scheduled the project's substantial completion to occur before Belvidere's annual Halloween parade in late October. Last, but certainly not least, is the I-78 Toll Bridge Pennsylvania Approach Paving Improvements Project. Construction activities on this multi-faceted project were initiated about two weeks ago. The work includes rehabilitation and paving of existing concrete pavements in the eastbound and westbound directions; deck joint repairs to various approach bridges; and work on the rock outcropping where a landslide occurred last year. A series of lane closures are being utilized to carry out the work, and the agency is utilizing a variety of tools to keep I-78 motorists informed of the travel restrictions. Besides local news media outlets, we are using New Jersey's 511 travel alert system, variable message boards, a Twitter feed, and postings on our website home page. The plan is to reach substantial completion eight months from now. This means the I-78 lane closures will be completed before any travel restrictions take effect for the rehabilitation project scheduled for later next year at the nearby Easton-Phillipsburg (Route 22) Toll Bridge.

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To summarize, the state of our transportation network is as follows: All of our bridges are open for travel, our traffic numbers are on a slow but steady incline and our construction projects are moving forward as scheduled. ## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CANDIDATE SEARCH

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the Meeting and asked the Commission Members if, after their review, there were any questions.

Commissioner Uliana addressed the meeting and stated:

"Mr. Chairman, before we go to the resolution, if I could just give everybody a little update on our executive director search. We are happy to note that at the end of August, the Commission advertised the position of executive director in six different regional newspapers, as well as on our website and other websites. That advertising and that coverage gave the Commission 40 applicants. The. applicants came from six different states not only in the Mid-Atlantic region, but from other parts of the country. I was really happy to see the high quality of applicants we had and the diversity. We have people who are transportation professionals in the public sector, private sector executives, as well as engineering executives, so we have a very good group of people which to narrow down our search from. We are going to try to do that here in October, Mr. Chairman. And then our goal would be, sometime by the end of October or November to try to come to a decision because with the changes in leadership both from Mr. McCartney leaving and now with today's chief engineer and our deputy executive director, leaving we have a leadership void that we need to fill, so there is a real concern and a desire to get that done. So I think we are moving ahead very well and appreciate the guidance of leadership here."

## SUPPLEMENT TO RESOLUTION ADOPTED AUGUST 15, 2012 AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF BRIDGE SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS TO REFUND 2003 AND 2005 BONDS

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the Meeting and asked the Commission Members if, after their review, there were any questions.

Commissioner Smith addressed the meeting and stated:

"Mr. Chairman, I just want to emphasize that the Finance Committee has moved forward and this should yield substantial savings as a result of the change in the rates in the market, and I am very very pleased to see this move forward."

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Smith moved and Commissioner Laurenti seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its' Regular Meeting assembled this 24<sup>th</sup> day of September, 2012, via this resolution:

"WHEREAS, on August 15, 2012 the Board of Commissioners ("Board") of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission ("Commission") adopted Resolution No. ADM-01-08-12 ("Original Resolution"), which, among other things, authorized the issuance and sale by the Commission of "Additional Bonds" (as defined by the hereinafter defined Indenture) for the purpose of advance refunding all or a portion of the Commission's outstanding: (i) Bridge System Revenue Bonds, Series 2003 ("2003 Bonds"); and (ii) Bridge System Revenue Bonds, Series 2005A ("2005 Bonds") (collectively, the Refunding Project"); and

"WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Original Resolution, the Commission authorized the issuance of Additional Bonds to undertake the Refunding Project in accordance with the terms and provisions of: (i) the Compact between the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of

Pennsylvania creating the Commission, dated December 19, 1934, authorized by certain Acts of the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey and certain Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and consented to by certain Acts of the Congress of the United States ("Compact"); and (ii) the Trust Indenture, dated as of January 1, 2003, by and between the Commission and the TD Bank, National Association (as successor to Commerce Bank/Pennsylvania, N.A.) ("Trustee"), as amended and supplemented from time to time, and as it may be further amended and supplemented from time to time, including by the Seventh Supplemental Indenture authorized by the Original Resolution (as amended and supplemented, the "Indenture"); and

"WHEREAS, subsequent to the adoption of the Original Resolution, the members of the Finance Committee, the Executive Director and the Chief Financial Officer of the Commission, upon consultation with the Commission's professional advisors, collectively determined that the most economically advantageous method of effectuating the Refunding Project would require the issuance of both tax-exempt and taxable bonds by the Commission; and

"WHEREAS, a full summary statement setting forth the economic benefits of issuing a separate series of taxable bonds in addition to tax-exempt bonds as part of the Refunding Project has heretofore been provided to the Board by the Executive Director and Chief Financial Officer of the Commission, which summary statement has been fully considered by the members of the Commission; and

"WHEREAS, at the time of the adoption of the Original Resolution, the Commission did not anticipate the utilization of taxable bonds as part of the Refunding Project and did not specifically authorize the issuance and sale of the same under the terms and provisions of the Original Resolution; and

"WHEREAS, the Commission, after due circumspection, has determined that the recommendations provided by the Finance Committee, the Executive Director and the Chief Financial Officer with respect to the utilization of both tax-exempt and taxable bonds to effect the Refunding Project are in the best interest of the Commission and is now desirous of adopting this supplemental resolution in order to, among other things, supplement the terms and provisions of the Original Resolution for the purpose of authorizing and approving the issuance and sale of a series of taxable bonds the proceeds of which, together with the proceeds of a series of tax-exempt bonds heretofore authorized by the Original Resolution, will be utilized to effectuate and complete the Refunding Project; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION, AS FOLLOWS:

## **ARTICLE I**

## **DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS**

## Meeting of September 24, 2012

- Section 1.01 Short Title. This supplemental resolution may hereafter be cited by the Commission, and is hereafter referred to as the "Supplemental Resolution." The Original Resolution, as supplemented by this Supplemental Resolution, is collectively referred to as the "Resolution."
- Section 1.02 <u>Definitions</u>. As used, mentioned or referred to in this Supplemental Resolution, the following words, terms and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed thereto, unless the context shall clearly require otherwise.
- "Refunding Bonds" shall mean the Bridge System Revenue Refunding Bonds of the Commission, to be issued as Tax-Exempt Bonds or Taxable Bonds, in one or more series, with a customary series designation for each series, authorized hereby and by the Original Resolution or other obligations issued in accordance with the Indenture to refund the 2003 Bonds and the 2005 Bonds.
- "<u>Tax-Exempt Bonds</u>" shall mean the Commission's Bridge System Revenue Refunding Bonds issued as Additional Bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to the Original Resolution, the Indenture and the Compact the interest on which shall be excludable from federal income taxation.
- "<u>Taxable Bonds</u>" shall mean the Commission's Bridge System Revenue Refunding Bonds issued as Additional Bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to the terms of the Original Resolution, this Supplemental Resolution, the Indenture and the Compact the interest on which shall be includable for federal income taxation.
- Section 1.03 <u>Amendment of Certain Defined Terms of the Original Resolution</u>. The following term, originally defined in the Original Resolution, is hereby amended and restated in its entirety to provide as follows:
- "2012 Refunding Project" shall mean the issuance, sale and delivery, pursuant to the Indenture of one or more series of Additional Bonds, in the form of tax-exempt or taxable bonds, notes or other obligations permitted under the Indenture for the purpose of advance refunding all or a portion of the Outstanding (as defined in the Indenture) 2003 Bonds and 2005 Bonds, making the required deposit, if any, into the Debt Service Reserve Fund held and maintained by the Trustee under the Indenture to meet the Debt Service Reserve Fund Requirement, and paying the costs, including the costs of issuance, of the Refunding Bonds.
- Section 1.04 Other Defined Terms. Capitalized terms, not otherwise defined herein, shall have the meanings ascribed thereto in the Original Resolution, unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
- Section 1.05. <u>Certain Terms</u>. As used in this Supplemental Resolution, the terms "herein", "hereby", "hereto", "hereof" and any similar terms refer to this Supplemental Resolution; the term "heretofore" means before the time of adoption of this Supplemental Resolution; and the term "hereafter" means after the time of adoption of this Supplemental Resolution.

Section 1.06. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. Whenever the Commission is named or referred to in this Supplemental Resolution, such reference shall be deemed to include its successors and assigns, whether so expressed or not.

Section 1.07. Severability. If any one or more of the provisions, covenants or agreements contained in this Resolution to be performed by the Commission or by any Fiduciary or agent should be contrary to law, then such provision or provisions, covenant or covenants or agreement or agreements shall be deemed separable from the remaining provisions, covenants and agreements and shall in no way affect the validity of the other provisions of this Supplemental Resolution or of the 2012 Refunding Project.

**Section 1.08.** <u>Applicable Law.</u> This Supplemental Resolution is adopted pursuant to the Compact.

## ARTICLE II

### AUTHORIZATION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE TAXABLE BONDS

Section 2.01. <u>Authorization of Taxable Bonds</u>. Subject to the determination of the Authorized Officers of the Commission and subject to the terms, provisions and limitations specifically set forth in Section 2.02 of the Original Resolution, the Commission hereby authorizes the issuance of Taxable Bonds in addition to Tax-Exempt Bonds for the purpose of effectuating the 2012 Refunding Project.

Section 2.02. <u>Authorization of Execution and Delivery of Documents</u>. The Commission hereby and authorizes and directs a Commission Officer to execute and deliver all documents, agreements and certificates necessary to enable the Commission to issue the Taxable Bonds in connection with the 2012 Refunding Project, subject in all cases to the terms, provisions and limitations set forth in the Original Resolution.

Section 2.03 <u>Applicability of Provisions of Original Resolution to Taxable Bonds</u>. Any and all terms, provisions and limitations specifically provided by the Original Resolution for the issuance of Refunding Bonds shall be applicable to the issuance of any Taxable Bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to this Supplemental Resolution.

### ARTICLE III

## **MISCELLANEOUS**

Section 3.01. <u>Ratification and Prior Actions</u>. ### DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of September 24, 2012 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (July, 2012)

**Summary:** The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for July 2012 in comparison to the July 2011 traffic and revenue statistics. (It should be noted that on July 1, 2011, the Commission implemented a toll adjustment which increased toll rates for all vehicle classes). Total toll traffic reflected a decrease for the month as a result of a decrease in automobile traffic as compared to last July. (It should be noted that 2012 is a leap year and that 2012 year-to-date statistics have 91 days compared to the 90 days for 2011).

### Analysis of July 2012/July 2011 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 2.11 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected 4.75 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 3.54 percent decrease.

### Analysis of July 2012/July 2011 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic decreased by 85,504 vehicles, or 2,40 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 15,793 vehicles, or 3.93 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic decreased by 101,297 vehicles, or 3.21 percent.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for July 2012 decreased by 27,578 vehicles, or 1.01 percent as compared to July 2011.

### Traffic analysis for 2012 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic YTD for the Commission's seven toll bridges is 102,921 vehicles as compared to 103,011 average daily vehicles YTD thru July 2011.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the 11 toll supported bridges is reflecting a 4.01% increase for the first seven months of 2012 as compared to the same period in 2011.

### District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for July 2012 reflected a 2.55 percent increase as the result of combined increases of 16,673 cars and 774 trucks when compared to July 2011. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 595 cars and an increase of 20 trucks generated an overall decrease in total toll traffic of 0.35 percent for July 2012 as compared to July 2011.

### District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an overall increase of 0.25 percent in total toll traffic for the month of July 2012 compared to July 2011 as the result of a decrease of 18,799 cars and an increase of 21,384 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, decreases of 21,925 passenger vehicles and 5,473 trucks combined to generate a 5.73 percent decrease in total toll traffic for July 2012.

### District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced an 11.99 percent decrease in total toll traffic during July 2012 as a result of a decreases of 14,838 automobiles and 614 trucks compared to July 2011. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, combined decreases of 50,910 passenger vehicles, and 118 trucks generated a 5.52 percent decrease in total toll traffic for July 2012 as compared to July 2011. At Milford-Montague (MM), decreases of 10,903 passenger vehicles and 180 trucks combined to produce a 8.25 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of July 2012.

### **E-ZPass** Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of July, 2012 and July, 2011, and the year-to-date periods ending July 31, 2012 and July 31, 2011.

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### DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of September 24, 2012 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (August, 2012)

**Summary:** The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for August 2012 in comparison to the August 2011 traffic and revenue statistics. (It should be noted that on July 1, 2011, the Commission implemented a toll adjustment which increased toll rates for all vehicle classes). Total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month as a result of increases in both automobile and truck traffic as compared to last August. (It should be noted that 2012 is a leap year and that 2012 year-to-date statistics have 91 days compared to the 90 days for 2011).

### Analysis of August 2012/August 2011 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 3.02 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected 2.09 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 5.29 percent increase.

### Analysis of August 2012/August 2011 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 176,015 vehicles, or 5.08 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 7,698 vehicles, or 1.75 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 168,317 vehicles, or 5.56 percent.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for August 2012 decreased by 80,160 vehicles, or 3.00 percent as compared to August 2011.

### Traffic analysis for 2012 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic YTD for the Commission's seven toll bridges is 105,013 vehicles as compared to 104,129 average daily vehicles YTD thru August 2011.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the 11 toll supported bridges is reflecting a 4.20% increase through the first eight months of 2012 as compared to the same period in 2011.

### District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for August 2012 reflected a 7.10 percent increase as the result of the increase of 48,901 cars and the decrease of 322 trucks when compared to August 2011. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), an increase of 3,397 cars and the decrease of 83 trucks combined to generate an overall increase in total toll traffic of 2.01 percent for August 2012 as compared to August 2011.

### District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an increase of 16.24 percent in total toll traffic for the month of August 2012 compared to August 2011 as the result of combined increases of 125,907 cars and 27,945 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, decreases of 47,349 passenger vehicles and 18,488 trucks combined to generate a 12.41 percent decrease in total toll traffic for August 2012.

### **District III**

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 2.23 percent decrease in total toll traffic during August 2012 as a result of a decreases of 2,719 automobiles and 52 trucks compared to August 2011. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, an increase of 41,360 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 943 trucks generated an over-all increase of 4.56 percent in total toll traffic for August 2012 as compared to August 2011. At Milford-Montague (MM), decreases of 1,180 passenger vehicles and 359 trucks combined to produce a 1.21 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of August 2012.

### **E-ZPass** Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of August, 2012 and August, 2011, and the year-to-date periods ending August 31, 2012 and August 31, 2011.

### STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of August 2012 and the eight month year-to-date operations of fiscal year 2012 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,026,051 for the month of August. For the 2012 fiscal year-to-date period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$29,871,981 or 93.7% of the year-to-date operating budget. All of the expense line items are well within their year-to-date operating budget.

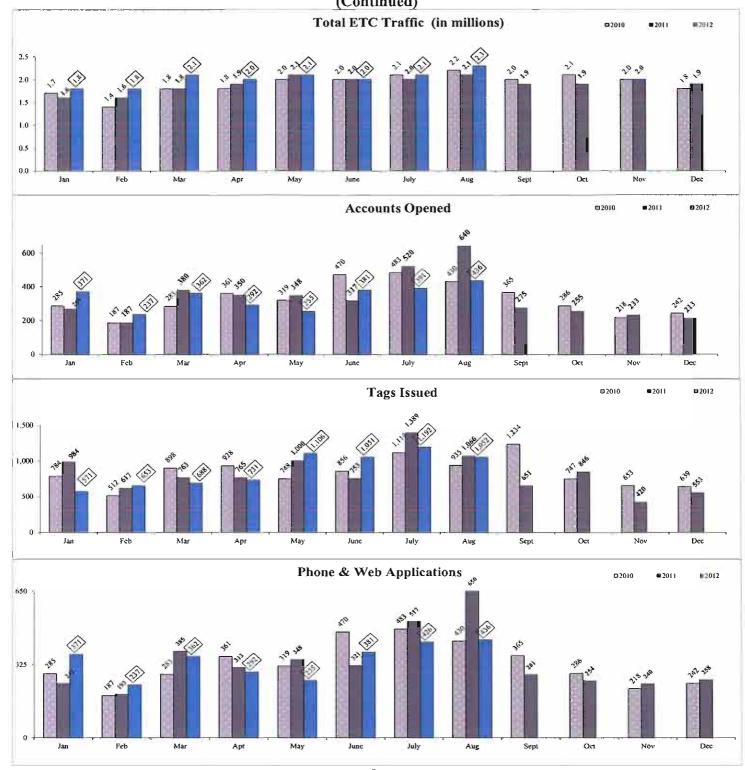

# PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

### STUDY Contract No. C-393A

A formal **Request for NEPA decision** was submitted to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) on Friday May 4, 2012. On June 14, 2012 FHWA issued the NEPA decision a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project in Bucks County, Pennsylvania and Mercer County in New Jersey. This is a determination that the Proposed Action will have no significant impact on the human environment.

The Commission submitted a formal request for the Final approval of the project Point of Access Study Report on July 6, 2012. A conditional approval of this report was issued by NJDOT, PennDOT and FHWA in November 2011. This conditional approval permitted the circulation of the Addendum to the Environmental Assessment for public review in December 2011. Final approval of this document typically occurs after the NEPA decision for a project. Comments were received from PennDOT on July 17, 2012, with responses to the comments sent in August.

# FINANCIAL/LEGAL ADVISORY SERVICES FOR A P3 FOR SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

### STUDY Contract No. C-393G-1R

The Commission's Financial/Legal Advisory Services consultant KPMG/Nossaman, completed their analysis of the P3 project delivery method on schedule, and presented their preliminary findings to the Commission in November. These findings are currently under review by the Commission with a final decision pending.

# COMPACT AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT DEPARTMENT July/August 2012

### General

During the months of July and August the CAI Department concentrated its efforts on working with the municipalities that still have pending invoices to submit for payments to the Commission.

The construction of the Smithfield Township/Delaware Water Gap Intermunicipal Trails Project is complete and only punchlist items are still pending. In New Jersey there are two projects in construction, the City of Trenton's Market and South Warren Street Boulevard Relocation Project dubbed the "Trenton Gateway Project" and the Lambertville's South Franklin St. Drainage Improvements project. Both of these projects are to be completed in the last quarter of this year.

The CAI department will continues its efforts to assist the municipalities in completing their pending invoices and send their reimbursement requests to be processed and paid by the Commission. The CAI department also continues to assist other Commission departments when necessary.

# Pennsylvania

- 1. Milford Borough, PA The Storm Water Restoration Project was completed by Leeward Construction in July 2011. During the month of February 2012, the final reimbursement for project was processed and the grant was closed out. The Borough has been reimbursed \$163,475.00 of \$163,475.00 (100%) by the CAI department.
- 2. Smithfield Township, PA During the months of July and August 2012, the construction of the amended plan for the *Intermunicipal Trail Project* was completed by the contractor, Rutledge Excavating, Inc. No extra cost to the Commission will arise from the work completed by the contractor. To date, the Township has been reimbursed \$318,264.81 of \$584,500.00 (54%) by the CAI department and the municipality is gathering all the competed invoices to complete the reimbursement requests.

The *Pedestrian Improvements Project* has been completed and the grant is closed out with the CAI department. The Township was reimbursed for 100% of the grant amount (\$779,000.00).

3. Delaware Water Gap Borough, PA – in April the Borough engineer, David Jones sent the Commission and a follow up letter from the March conversation requesting funds for a curb and sidewalk project along Route 611. On March 29, 2012, the Borough submitted the application for the project to the Commission seeking a grant in the amount of \$396,804.00. This application was previously submitted for consideration by the Commissioners in April 2011, and a subsequent letter was received by the Commission detailing the latter request. This grant request has not been awarded to date.

The Local Roads Paving Project was completed in December 2010 by Bracalente Construction, Inc. for a total construction cost of \$115,831.60. The streets that were repaved included Waring

Drive, Oak Street, Parkway Drive, Croasdale Drive, Walnut Lane and Shepard Avenue. In May 2011, the CAI department received and processed the Borough's final reimbursement and closed out this grant. The Borough has been reimbursed \$120,826.59 of the original \$130,000.00 award (93%) by the CAI department.

The Borough has indicated that the *Broad Street Sidewalk Improvements Project* is complete; however closeout of the Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) by PennDOT still remains to be completed. PennDOT issued an updated punchlist for the project in March 2011, which indicates that the Borough is required to replace the detectable warning surfaces on two (2) of the constructed curb ramps prior to close out of the HOP. The Borough has recently indicated that their Public Works Department will complete the repairs to address the PennDOT punchlist issues. It is currently anticipated that the project will be closed out by PennDOT in the next several months. The CAI department continues to coordinate with the Borough regarding this closeout. As previously mentioned, the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project* was completed in August 2009.

4. Portland Borough, PA – In the summer of 2010, the Borough submitted a revised application, in the amount of \$153,782.66 for Streetscape Improvements on State Street and Delaware Avenue, in the hope that the project would be reconsidered by the Commissioners for funding. The revised application was a scaled-down version of an original application in April 2010, which was submitted in the amount of \$515,701.40. The revised application met the CAI criteria, but was not awarded. The two other CAI funded projects (Park & Ride Project and Park & Walk Project) have been completed.

Lower Mount Bethel, PA – The Park & Ride Trail Project was completed in June 2011. In April 2012, the CAI department processed the Township's final reimbursement request and closed out the grant. The Township was reimbursed \$80,190.80 of \$80,191.00 (100%) by the CAI department.

The previous CAI funded projects in Lower Mt. Bethel Township were completed and closed out.

**5. Easton, PA** – The City has submitted its final reimbursement request to close the *North Third St. Corridor and pedestrian Improvements project*.

During the month of February, 2012, the director of the city's public works department requested the support of the Commission to apply for a grant from the National Endowment of Arts. This request was sent directly to the Commission's executive office. The executive office was amenable to send a letter of support, but no direct financial support for this request was granted.

All three CAI funded projects in Easton have been completed as of July 2011. The CAI department has now completed reviewing all the City's submitted invoices for pending reimbursement requests. These projects included: the Waterfront Improvements Project, the Trolley Project and the North 3<sup>rd</sup> Street Corridor Traffic and Pedestrian Improvements project.

6. Williams Township, PA – The *I-78 & Morgan Hill Road Interchange Traffic Signalization Project* was completed in January 2010. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township. The CAI department worked with the new Township Manager and she was able to submit the final reimbursement request for the project and the CAI department is in the process of closing it out.

In March 2010, the Township submitted six (6) new applications that were discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but were not awarded.

- 7. Riegelsville Borough, PA Construction of the *Delaware Canal Footbridge Lighting Project* was completed by the contractor, Yates Electrical Service, in July 2011. The CAI department has received all the necessary documentation to process the Borough's final reimbursement request and closeout the grant. The Borough utilized \$40,349.91 of the \$45,000.00 grant amount (90%). The previous CAI funded project in Riegelsville Borough has been completed and closed out.
- 8. Solebury Township, PA The construction of the Walton Drive Bridge Replacement Project is complete. As previously discussed, project construction included the alternate #2 paving work, which was a change of scope approved by the Commissioners to repave the entire length of Walton Drive. In December 2011, this grant was closed out with the CAI department. The Township was reimbursed \$351,811.02 of \$660,000.00 (53%).

Construction of the *Route 202 Trail and Park* project began on August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and was completed in September 2009. In September 2011, the CAI department closed out this grant with the Township. To date, the Township has been reimbursed \$1,755,150.00 of \$1,755,150.00 (100%).

9. New Hope Borough, PA – Construction of the *Main St. Bridge Lighting Project* has been completed by the contractor, Armour & Sons Electric. The CAI department is currently working with the Borough to complete their final reimbursement request in the amount of \$8,138.39, and the project will be closeout. To date, the Borough has been reimbursed \$73,922.49 of \$84,815.00 (87%).

The construction of the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals Project* is complete. During the month of December 2011, the construction of the ADA ramps was completed by L.C. Costa Contractors, Inc., for a total Construction cost of \$27,200.06. The Borough has also submitted a request to the Commission to transfer the residual funds in the *Main St. Bridge Lighting* grant to the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals* grant in order to assist with the additional cost associated with installing the ADA ramps that are required by PennDOT. This request was reviewed and approved by the CAI department. The project will be completed and it is in the process of being closed out. To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$412,798.75 of \$446,404.00 (92% of total grant amount).

10. Falls Township, PA – The original traffic signal installation and modernization project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award. The project was closed out.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted another application for the *Tyburn Road & New Falls Road Traffic Signal Upgrade Project*, in the amount of \$108,140.00. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but was not awarded.

11. Upper Makefield Township, PA – The construction of the Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 Project has been completed by DHC Construction and Land-Tech. DHC Construction completed the signage portion of the project and Land-Tech completed the remainder of the construction work for the project. In April 2012, the CAI department processed the Township's final reimbursement request for the project and closed out the grant. The Township was reimbursed \$48,600.00 of \$48,600.00 (100%) by the CAI department.

The Washington Crossing Gateway Project was completed closed in the Spring of 2010. The Township was been reimbursed \$1,447,000.00 of \$1,447,000.00 (100% of total grant amount).

**12. Lower Makefield, PA** – The *Black Rock Pedestrian Trail Project* is complete. The CAI department continues to work with the Township to process their final reimbursement request submission and closeout the grant. There have been several change orders on this project, which are also being considered as part of the Township's reimbursement request to determine if they are eligible expenses in accordance with the CAI grant.

The Traffic Signal project at the intersection of Yardley-Newtown Rd & Creamery Rd is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission and the original grant is closed out.

13. Bristol Borough, PA – The construction of the *Traffic Signals Revitalization Project* was completed by Armour & Sons Electric in July 2009 and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$1,333,843.28 of \$1,334,450.00 grant (99.9% of total grant amount).

In the Spring of 2010, the Borough submitted another application for the *Decorative Crosswalks Project*, in the amount of \$423,126.12. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but was not awarded.

**Yardley, PA** – The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough for its *Yardley Borough Road Improvements Project* and the project has been closed out.

In the Spring of 2010, the Borough of Yardley in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization submitted an application to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, and Morrisville Borough in the amount of \$872,969.00. This application was discussed at the Commissioners meetings, but was not awarded.

**14. Morrisville, PA** – In April 2012, the construction work for the repaying of Nolan Avenue project was completed. The CAI department has advised the Borough that it needs to expedite the completion of its final reimbursement request deliverables.

During the October 31, 2011 Commissioners meeting, the Commissioners approved a request from the Borough to revise the scope of work from the original Sidewalk Replacement Project to the Paving of Nolan Avenue Project in the Borough and to add several LED street lights in the Avenue. On December 26, 2012 the CAI department received a letter from Morrisville requesting an extension of time until the spring of 2012 to complete the project.

In February 2011 the Commissioners approved a reallocation of \$70,000 to expand the Moreau Street project to Bank Street (between Moreau and Green Streets). As of June 2011 the construction work for the Morrisville Municipal Authority CAI project on the *Moreau Street Rehabilitation project* was completed. The CAI department reimbursed all the projects invoices and closed out the grant.

The four previously funded projects in Morrisville have been completed.

# New Jersev

1. Montague, NJ – The relocation of the emergency heliport from the Park & Ride location has been completed. The reconstruction of the Park & Ride was also completed. The FAA has licensed the emergency heliport that had to be relocated for the construction of the Park & Ride. The CAI department continues to assist the municipality with completing its final reimbursement requests. In February, the CAI department received the final reimbursement

request of \$2,417.22 for the final payment of the contract. This request has been being processed.

- 1. **Knowlton, NJ** A new reimbursement request was completed for the Paulinskill Trail extension as it has been completed. The underpass is a wonderful addition to the community. Hikers and bikers from New Jersey and Pennsylvania are now be able to link the Paulinskill Trail to the Columbia/Portland pedestrian bridge and enjoy the beautiful scenery along the Delaware and Paulinskill Rivers. The Township held a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Paulinskill Trail Extension on Saturday, June 4, 2011. A reimbursement request for the amount of \$140,765.22 was paid during the month of February. The CAI department is assisting the municipality with completing its reimbursement requests.
- 2. Belvidere, NJ The Water Street Improvements project was completed and closed out in May of 2010. In May the final reimbursement request has been processed and the project is closed out. The CAI director provided the Commission's engineering department with the latest financials and designs for this project.
- 3. Phillipsburg, NJ The Town has completed its last reimbursement request to close out the grant. All the phases of the Main Street project have been completed.

The third phase project was awarded a grant for \$997,962 at the Commissioners' February 2010 meeting. The approved extension of the project to Sidgreaves Street and Jersey Street to South Main Street was completed. The sidewalks around Shappell Park and on South Main Street were completed, the streets were repaved, new street lights were installed, and all mandated trees have been planted.

The phase two of the project was completed in 2011, the trees have been planted and all punch list items have been met. The CAI department has completed processing all the reimbursement requests submitted for this project to date.

The original, Phase I project, was completed and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008.

- **4.** Pohatcong NJ A new application was received by the CAI Department for Resurfacing of River Road. This application was presented to the Commissioners at their February 2010 meeting. This request was not awarded. The two granted projects to Pohatcong Township have been completed and closed out.
- **5.** Holland, NJ –Holland was awarded a CAI grant for the *Drainage & Resurfacing of a Portion of Mt. Joy Road* and the municipality requested an extension for the work to be completed by the spring of 2011. This Spring the project was awarded to English Paving Company, Inc. and a

preconstruction meeting was held in June, 2011. The project construction started in June 2011 and completed in July. The CAI department closed out this project.

Holland completed and was fully paid for its previous CAI project. This project was closed out.

- 6. Milford, NJ –The CAI department has been working with the Borough complete its final reimbursement request and close out this project. The project construction contract for *The Honeysuckle Road* project was awarded to Top Line Construction. Top Line Construction started this construction in May 2011 and the project is completed by June 2011. In August 2011, the Borough requested to amend the project to include the resurfacing of the Borough's Water Works driveway located at the corner of York Road and
  - Water Street. The Borough also wanted to install three speed bumps and backstop fence for the little league ball field. The additional work will not increase the amount of the grant awarded by the Commission. The extra resurfacing and speed bumps were approved by the Commission at the September 2011 meeting. The resurfacing and installation of speed bumps is complete. The CAI Department is finishing the reimbursement requests and closing out of this project. Final project's invoices are being processed.
- 7. Frenchtown, NJ The CAI department has been working with the Borough to complete its reimbursement request in order to close out this project. A ribbon cutting ceremony for the *Improvements Bridge St. project* and the *Park and Ride project* was held on May 17<sup>th</sup>. It was a great success. The CAI department is encouraging the Borough to complete all its reimbursement requests to close out this project.

The contraction for the *Improvement of Bridge Street* project started in March 2012 and by the third week of April 2012, the construction for the Milling and paving work as well as the all the inlet installation and handicap assessable ramps was completed as planned.

In January 2011, Commissioners approved the reallocation of \$240,000 from its previously allocated budget for the Village Green project to the *Improvements of Bridge Street*. The plans for Bridge Street, South Harrison St. and Race Street were complete and the project was advertised for bids in June 2011. The work included sidewalk and handicap assessable ramps installation, milling, curb installation, pavement installation, raised crosswalk installation, pavement striping and restoration. The project was held up due to specificities of the MPT plan by the Commission on work to be performed on Bridge Street.

Last fall this project was advertised for bids and two were received. The bids came in above the grant budget. Frenchtown decided to rebid the project for spring 2012 construction. In January, the Borough advertised the project construction and the bids came in lower than last fall. The Borough tabulated the bids and awarded the project to the A-Team Construction. A preconstruction meeting is scheduled for March 5, 2012 at the Frenchtown Borough Hall.

The Frenchtown Park and Ride project was completed in 2009.

8. Lambertville, NJ – The CAI department continues to work with the Lambertville to complete the drainage improvement project on South Franklin Street. The McCready's Alley project was completed. The Paving was also completed on Delavan Street as well as the concrete repairs and installation of crosswalk. The Perry Street reconstruction was completed. The previously unimproved portion of South Franklin Street is also complete with the survey and base mapping. The planters have been installed and shimmed

to level them out. The residents will take responsibility for planting and maintenance of the landscape. Final payment has been made to the Contractor.

The City of Lambertville was awarded CAI grants for 13 projects since the beginning of the CAI program.

- 9. Stockton, NJ –In April 2011, the Borough finally completed some pending financial reports that the CAI department had been waiting for to complete a final closed out of this project. The funded CAI projects for the Bridge Street Improvements project are completed. The municipality received a transportation construction project award for its CAI project.
- 10. West Amwell, NJ The Rocktown Hill Road Improvement Project to the approach to the intersection of Route 31 approved for \$100,000 by the Commissioners at their January 25, 2010 was completed at the end of June 2011. The CAI department is reviewing the reimbursement requests. Three pending reimbursement requests were completed in January 2012. These requests were paid in February 2012 in the amount of \$38,905.68.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted two additional applications: The Reconstruction of Old York Road Section I for \$85,000 and the reconstruction of Old York Road Section II for \$285,000. These applications were presented to the commissioners, but there was no action taken for new grants awards.

Section 11, 12 and 13 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project are now completed.

11. Delaware Twp; NJ – The CAI department continues to work with the Delaware Township to complete the reimbursement requests for the *Improvements and Resurfacing of Federal Twist Road*.

Maser Consulting Engineering completed the design for this project. The project was bid for material and awarded, and the Township has indicated that the work was done in-house with its PW crew. The project started construction at the beginning of August 2011 and various basins

have been installed. On December 16, 2012, the township held a preconstruction meeting for the repaying of the Federal Twist Road. Due to the great winter weather, the construction work begun at the beginning of January 2012 and was completed by the end of the same month. The township's public works crew completed the drainage construction work.

There was an opened issue on the Seabrook Resurfacing project that was completed in 2009, in that the municipality requested the use of remaining fund in the amount of \$15,057.54 for the work that was done without authorization. The township's DPW completed an "Oil and Chip" surface treatment of the roadway as part of its customary maintenance. This work was not included in the original scope of work of the application submitted to the DRJTBC as part of the CAI grant; therefore, denied for payment.

12. Hopewell, NJ – The CAI department received the final reimbursement requests, and it is working on obtaining missing deliverables to complete the reimbursement for the Township.

Hopewell Township was approved for a grant application for the *Design and Construction of Sidewalk Replacement in the Village of Titusville*. This application was awarded a grant by the Commissioners at their April 2010 meeting. The Township requested an extension to complete this project until the Spring of 2011. The plans were completed and the State Historic office granted its approvals of the plans. The Township Manager has indicated that limited drainage needs to be dealt with due to some flat slopes that put them over the budget. They would need to find ways to reconcile this issue. The construction for this project restarted in March 2012 and was completed in April 2012.

The ADA Ramps and Walkway project previously awarded was completed. The CAI department closed out this project.

13. Ewing, NJ – The Wilbertha Road Improvement Project was completed in July 2011. The CAI department is still working with the township to complete the reimbursement and closeout the project. In February 2011, the Commissioners approved a reallocation of funds request of \$25,418 for a change of scope of work by extending the project another 600 LF of road improvements on Wilburtha Road. This work was also completed. The municipality staff is still Working on gathering all deliverables and invoices for its final reimbursement request to the Commission.

**Trenton, NJ** – The construction of the Trenton Gateway project is still ongoing and making progress. The project appears to be moving forward to meet its completion deadline. The contractor for this project restarted the construction on March 19, 2012 and completed the base course on the medium on Warren Street. Work is on all sections of the work area. A new construction schedule has been developed and received by the CAI department. The CAI department has been working with the City and the staff has submitted to get all the necessary invoices deliverables for a second invoice to be paid. The CAI department is also reviewing change orders submitted by the City.

In July, the CAI Department, Mr. Frank Tolotta and Commissioner Laurenti met with Acting Mayor, Sam Hutchinson and the City's project manager, Mr. Anthony Santora to discuss status of the Trenton Gateway project. Everyone found it to be a fruitful meeting.

Meetings continue to be held between the project engineers, project administrators (Anthony Santora, Hoggart Stevens and Carmen Melendez) and the construction company (Waters and Bugbee) as needed. The project administrators have indicated that the project is on target to be completed by the end of the Summer in 2012.

The Bids were received on June 1, 2011 and the project construction contract was awarded to Waters and Bugbee as recommended by the Department to the Division of Purchasing to be selected as the contractor. In addition, the City selected an oversight engineer, JMT Associates based in Lawrenceville, for the project to ensure its timely completion.

Thanks to Commissioner Yuki Laurenti for her support in speaking with her colleagues in the City of Trenton, the CAI department has received a lot of updates on the current status of the funded project. There have been many emails with Walter Denson, the former City Director of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and Carmen Melendez, the Acting Director of HCD and is now in charge of the project.

On October 23, a conference call was held with Commissioner Laurenti, the CAI director, the City's staff managing this project and representatives of Waters and Bugbee. It was revealed that the project construction will start November 2, 2011 and go through the end of the Summer of 2012. A revised construction schedule was forwarded to the CAI director by the City. A meeting between Trenton Mayor Tony Mack, Trenton Business Administrator Anthony Roberts, the Commission's Executive Director Frank McCartney, and the Commission's Deputy Executive Director of Operations Frank Tolotta, CAI Director Julio Guridy, Commissioner Yuki Laurenti, and CAI Due Diligence Engineer Robert McGowan was held in Trenton on November 3, 2011 to discuss the intricacies of this project. The Mayor was appreciative of the money from the grant program and understood the Commission's concerns. A groundbreaking ceremony was held that same day and soon after the construction begun on the project. A month later there was substantial work done in the area of Market St., Broad St. and Warren St. At the end of December 2011, the project construction stopped due to the inclement weather and resumed as construction restarted and as soon as weather permitted Spring.

- 14. Alpha NJ The Alpha's and Pohatcong's Reconstruction of Edge Rd. project has been completed and is in the process of being fully reimbursed and closed out.
- 15. Kingwood, NJ The Township's Reconstruction of Tumble Falls Road was awarded a grant for \$373,000.00 and the contract agreement has been executed. The project construction was completed last Summer. Most of the construction work, especially the roadway repaving, was done by municipal work forces. The CAI Department has approved the reimbursements and the project has been closed out.

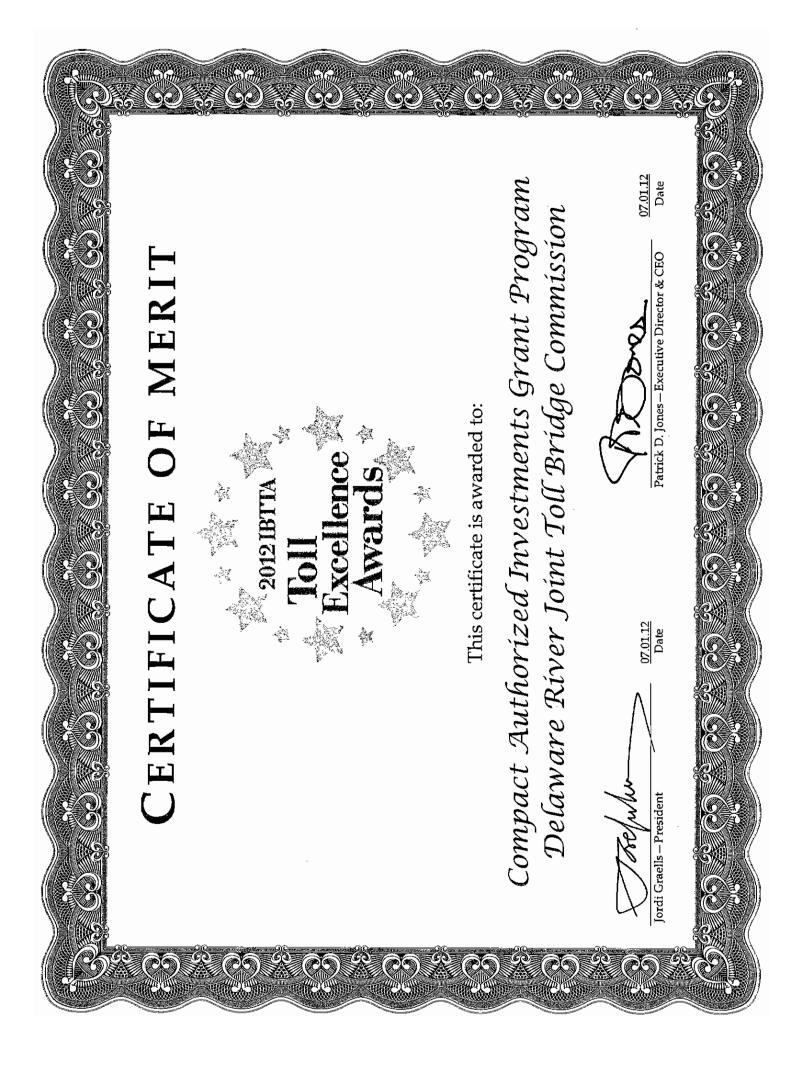
