ROLL CALL

Frank G. McCartney, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present- there being four members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and three members present from the State New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda or other matters.

PRESENTATION OF TWO (2) SAFETY SUGGESTION AWARDS

Chairman DeGerolamo presented the that Safety Suggestion awards to Frank Piazza-EP Maintenance Worker I-for his suggestion –CPR/AED/First Aid Training for all Commission employees acting in the capacity of "first on scene" responder" and Thomas Chirco-DWG-Maintenance Foreman for his suggestion: Painting "Walk Your Bike" on sidewalks/approach ways leading to our toll and toll-supported bridges.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

There are two items to call attention to this morning, the toll adjustment that is set to take effect 11 p.m. this Thursday and a status report on the Capital Improvement Program -- which is completely financed by the toll revenues we collect at our toll bridges. The toll adjustment approved at the May 2 meeting is all set to go into effect later this week, the changeover to new rates will occur at 11:01 p.m. Thursday, June 30. July 1 will be the first full day of operations

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under the new rates. A web page was created to spell out the new toll rate structure and it has been available for viewing since the Commission's May 2 vote. Our Communications personnel will issue a release later today in an effort to remind our customers of the impending change in toll rates and their effective time and date, signs will also be installed at our toll facilities to tell motorists of the new rates. For simplicity, the new rates are as follows: passenger vehicles - \$1, passenger vehicles with a trailer - \$2, two-axle trucks -- \$6.50 and trucks with three or more axles -- \$4 per axle. The toll adjustment maintains significant E-ZPass discounts for our regular commuters as well as a discount for trucks travelling during off-peak driving periods. The commuter discounted toll will be 60 cents for eligible E-ZPass customers who pay a toll 20 times within a 35-day period. The 10-percent truck discount will continue to apply for E-ZPassequipped trucks that travel across a Commission bridge during off-peak hours – 9:01 p.m. to 5:59 a.m. The discount will reduce the cost of the toll for a 5-axle truck (18 wheeler) from \$20 to \$18. Overall, our toll structure remains the lowest among the five agencies that operate toll bridges across the Delaware River between New Jersey and Pennsylvania and New Jersey and Delaware. It has been almost 10 years since the Commission last authorized an across-the-board upward toll adjustment. The toll adjustment is necessary; it will enable us to: meet our debt service obligations and avert a credit downgrading, ensure uninterrupted execution of our capital improvement program which is allowing us to improve service, upgrade our infrastructure and reduce traffic congestion, offset lingering diminished truck revenue collections brought on by the 2008-09 recession. Through May, 2011 traffic revenues are roughly \$1 million below the level of our Traffic Engineer's projections, and are behind the pace estimated to be required to meet our bond covenants based on our adopted budget and expected debt service. This increase was an action of last resort. The Commission undertook a series of economization measures in recent budgets, including: froze employee salaries two of the past three years; reduced or flat-lined the 2009 and 2010 budgets, adopted a 2011 budget with flat or reduced discretionary spending lines, achieved nearly \$1 million in savings through changes in our business insurance lines and employee health care plan and eliminated five vacant job positions last year. The fact is we put off this action as long as we could, we have reached a juncture where the toll adjustment can't be avoided any longer. When the Commission last increased tolls, we promised to use the additional revenues to improve our services, our security and our network of bridges and related transportation infrastructure. We are continuing to deliver on that promise to this day. This past month alone, finished work on three projects; a comprehensive rehabilitation of the 77-year-old Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll-Supported Bridge, completion of an Express E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling and corresponding improvements to the barrier toll plaza at our Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge, installation of guiderails in the median of our 2.25-mile Pennsylvania portion of I-78 in Williams Township, PA. Work on a corresponding guiderail installation project along our New Jersey portion of I-78 also began last week. The latest project completions are the latest examples of how we have used our customer's toll dollars to reinvest in their transportation system. We have now finished 93 projects under the capital program that we initiated in 2001. This is more than \$400 million worth of work aimed improving Commission facilities and operations for purposes moving motorists and commerce. We have completed projects in every portion of our jurisdiction, by year's end, we fully expect to reach or surpass the century mark with this program – attaining over 100 project completions. There is not a single facility that has not been touched in some measure by the capital program. We have rehabilitated or improved every one of the historic vehicular truss bridges the two states assigned to the Commission to maintain and upkeep in 1987. We have modernized every one of our toll lanes

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and removed the toll gates that were our most frequently cited customer complaint. We have installed Express E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling facilities at our two busiest toll crossings – I-78 and I-80 – as party of a strategy to reduce traffic congestion and improve the flow of commerce between the two states. Our capital program was conceived to produce tangible results on four fronts: system preservation, system enhancement, system management and system protection. As our capital program results demonstrate, we will continue to use our resources to better meet the transportation needs of our bistate region and our customers. Mr Chairman this concludes my report.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of June 27, 2011 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (May, 2011)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for May 2011 in comparison to the May 2010 traffic and revenue statistics. Total toll traffic for the Commission however, reflected a decrease for the month of May.

Analysis of May 2011 / May 2010 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 0.94 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 2.16 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 2.09 percent decrease.

Analysis of May 2011 / May 2010 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic decreased by 46,034 vehicles, or 1.37 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 8,012 vehicles, or 2.01 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic decreased by 54,046 vehicles, or 1.83 percent.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for the month of May 2011 decreased by 83,365 vehicles, or 3.02 percent as compared to May 2010.

Traffic analysis for 2011 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for May 2011 was 106,617 total vehicles as compared to 108,102 total vehicles in May 2010. Average daily traffic YTD for 2011 is 98,863 compared to 98,256 for the same five-month period in 2010, an increase of 0.62%.
- Recorded westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for YTD 2011 is reflecting a 2.78% decrease as compared to the first four months of 2010.

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for May 2011 reflected a 1.39 percent increase as the result of increases of 6,777 cars and 2,595 trucks when compared to May 2010. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), decreases of 242 cars and 57 trucks combined to generate an overall decrease in total toll traffic of 0.18 percent for May 2011 as compared to May 2010.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an overall increase of 7.27 percent in total toll traffic for the month of May 2011 compared to May 2010 as the result of combined increases of 39,719 cars and 22,788 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, decreases of 48,576 automobiles and 7,984 trucks combined to generate a 10.20 percent decrease in total toll traffic for May 2011 as compared to May 2010.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 0.01 percent decrease in total toll traffic during May 2011 as a result of the decrease of 289 automobiles and the increase of 279 trucks compared to May 2010. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, a decrease of 43,735 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 9,691 trucks combined to produce an overall 6.28 percent decrease in total toll traffic for May 2011 as compared to May 2010. At Milford-Montague (MM), decreases of 8,182 automobiles and 32 trucks produced an overall decrease of 6.93 percent in total toll traffic for the month of May 2011.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of May 2011 and the five month year-to-date operations of fiscal year 2011 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$3,421,341 for the month of May. For the 2011 fiscal year-to-date period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$18,054,487 or 91.5% of the year-to-date operating budget. Most of the expense line items are well within their year-to-date operating budget.

There is one line item that is currently running ahead of budget on a year-to-date basis. Overtime Wage expense is 47.2% or \$68,000 ahead of budget due to higher than normal number of snow fall events for the months of January and February 2011. All other expense line items are within their budgets.

There were no unusual items charged to expense in the month of May.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

May 2011

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of May 2011, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 69 purchase orders. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 59 price inquiries were sent out for 23 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 2.57 per order (59 \div 23). Significant procurements for the period are highlighted below:

- Six (6) Purchase Orders were let, for a total of \$178,756.47, for various capital projects and equipment. These included an upgrade to the TM IT network switch, data storage expansion and the equipment/installation on a new tower being made available to the Commission for improved radio communications.
- A PO was let, in the amount of \$13,599.00, for the replacement of select walkway panels on the Northampton Street Toll-supported Bridge.
- At the request of ESS, an Order was let in the amount of \$11,394.57 for the replacement of a PTZ camera on the Calhoun Street Toll-supported Bridge which had been destroyed in an accident. An insurance pay-out from a third-party carrier has been received to reimburse the Commission for this cost.
- A Purchase Order was issued at the request of IT, in the amount of \$10,455.68, for the updating of the SQL server software.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT May 2011

• COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Toll Adjustment: Issued a press release and created a web page to raise public awareness of the Commission's decision to authorize the agency's first across-the-board toll adjustment in nearly a decade. The rollout generated coverage throughout the DRJTBC's jurisdiction and certainly helped provide initial public awareness of the July 1 toll adjustment. The Communications Department handled various media inquiries regarding reactions of public officials to the toll announcement. Likewise, assistance was provided to national/regional outlets – TollRoadsNews and Associated Press – that were interested in the tolling issue. Communications personnel continue to monitor news events of other agencies that have moved or are moving to raise tolls, including the DRBA, DRPA, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, and Port Authority of NY and NJ.

Upper Black **Eddy-Milford** Toll-Supported **Bridge** Reopening: Anticipating the likelihood that the rehabilitation project at the Upper Black Eddy-Milford Bridge would not achieve its original May 17 substantial completion target date. Communications took steps to prepare the public for a delayed bridge reopening. The messaging stressed the severe weather events that impacted the project from January into May, including snow storms, wind storms, river flooding and uninterrupted periods of rain. documented on the project's webpage and in a series of press releases. The bridge subsequently opened on May 20 without any protestations from the public. In fact, a very enthusiastic and grateful public were on hand to witness the bridge's reopening. The early reaction to the substantially completed rehabilitation has been very positive. There was widespread coverage by area news outlets.

Scudder Falls Peregrine Falcons: A press release and photographs were distributed to update the public on the pair of peregrine falcons that have been nesting at the Scudder Falls Bridge since 2008. It was the first release of information on the birds and their offspring in nearly three years. Coverage was generated in daily and weekly newspapers that serve the Scudder Falls location.

During the month of May, 2011 the Director of Policy and Planning participated in a number of communications and meetings that explored the following:

The New Jersey Business and Industry Association Meet the Decision Makers Series 2011 – Transportation Leaders featured New Jersey Transportation Commissioner James Simpson, New Jersey Assembly Transportation Committee Chairman Assemblyman Deputy Speaker John Wisniewski (D-19), and Port Authority of New York and New Jersey Deputy Executive Director Bill Baroni. The panel discussed and answered questions concerning New Jersey's major transportation projects and debated how to fund them.

The Director attended the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission Communications Department Meeting.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce (GLVCC) Transportation Committee discussed Pennsylvania Governor Tom Corbett's (R) Transportation Funding Advisory Commission and how it could affect the GLVCC's Transportation Policy. The Committee heard updates from the following individuals: Carol Halper, District Director Charlie Dent (R-PA15) United States House of Representatives (Federal Transportation Legislation); Sean Brown, PennDOT District 5 Safety Press Officer (Lehigh Valley Construction Projects); Steven Bliss, Renew Lehigh Valley Executive (Central New Jersey Raritan Valley Transit Study Feasibility Analysis Report); the Director (Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling and Bearing Remediation/Rehabilitation Projects, Easton/Phillipsburg Route 22 Toll Bridge Rehabilitation Scoping/Concept Study, and the July 01, 2011 Toll Adjustments).

The Greater Pocono Chamber of Commerce Government Relations and Public Policy Committee heard and discussed Legislative Reports concerning a variety of items (Pennsylvania Redistricting; Regulatory Excess, Transportation, HUBZone, and the Proposed 2011-2012 Commonwealth Budget) from Pennsylvania State Representatives Rosemary Brown (R-189); Michael Carroll (D-118); Mario Scavello (R-176); and members of the staffs of United States Representative Lou Barletta (R-PA11) and Pennsylvania State Senator John Blake (D-22). The Director reported on the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling and Bearing Remediation/Rehabilitation Projects and the July 01, 2011 Toll Adjustments.

The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission Planning Coordinating Committee and Regional Transportation Committee viewed and heard a presentation by Jim Runk, President & CEO of the Pennsylvania Motor Truck Association (PMTA). Mr.Runk provided information about the PMTA and the importance and impact the industry has on the Commonwealth's and Delaware Valley's economy. Other issues that were covered included: fuel taxes, safety programs, highway funding possibilities, local economic and traffic congestion, and mitigation coalitions.

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The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Annual State of the Town Luncheon featured Phillipsburg Mayor Harry Wyant (R). Mayor Wyant updated the latest happenings in Phillipsburg including the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission's Compact Authorized Investment Projects.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce hosted a Luncheon/Forum with Pennsylvania Governor Tom Corbett (R). Governor Corbett discussed his proposed Fiscal Year 2011-2012 Budget and answered questions from the audience.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce conducted a dialogue with Lehigh Valley State Senators Pat Browne (R-16), Lisa Boscola (D-18), and Bob Mensch (R-24). The State Senators discussed a variety of issues, and they answered questions posed by those in attendance.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Public Policy Committee discussed updates from the Chamber's four subcommittees: Energy /Environment (Marcellus Shale); Healthcare (Implementation at the State Level); Tax (Pennsylvania's Fiscal Year 2011-2012 Proposed Budget); and Transportation (Funding Proposals).

The Pike County Road Task Force was given a legislative update by Pennsylvania State Representative Michael Peifer (R-139). Debbie Noone, PennDOT District 4 Assistant Executive Director for Design and Robert Collins, PennDOT District 4 Pike County Maintenance Manager updated countywide transportation efforts. The Director reported on the Commission's I-80/Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling and Bearing Remediation/Rehabilitation Projects and the July 01, 2011 Toll Adjustments.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Transportation Breakfast featured Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation Barry Schoch. Secretary Schoch gave an overview of the transportation funding challenges facing the Commonwealth and the Nation. He, also, updated the activities of Governor Tom Corbett's Transportation Funding Advisory Commission, whose final report will be released in August, 2011.

The Warren County Regional Chamber of Commerce (WCRCC) Economic Development/Transportation Council was given an update by Robert Goltz, WCRCC President/CEO, and David Dech, Warren County Planning Director concerning countywide economic development/transportation related efforts. Noel McGuire, Domestic Business Advocate, New Jersey Business Action Center, New Jersey Department of State discussed the progress of the State's Economic Development Action Plan. The Director reported on the Commission's Warren County Capital and CAI Projects plus the July 01, 2011 Toll Adjustments.

The Congressman was unable to attend, but his District Director Gina Diorio updated and discussed a variety of issues with those in attendance.

The Safe80 Task Force heard and discussed monthly reports from the following individuals and agencies: Pennsylvania State Representative Mario Scavello (R-176) (Legislation to Ban Cell Phones/Texting while Driving – House Bill 8); Monroe County Office of Emergency Management Director Guy Miller (I-80 Emergency Management Plan); the Pennsylvania State Police and the Local Regional Police (Accidents, Arrests, and Congestion Management on I-80 and Local Municipalities); PennDOT District 5 Executive Michael Rebert (I-80 Construction Projects); Northeastern Pennsylvania Alliance Vice-President Community and Government Services Alan Baranski (Funding for the Safe80 Task Force); and the Director (Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling and Bearing Remediation/Rehabilitation Projects).

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

- 1. ACS completed tuning, testing and Commissioning of the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge ORT shoulder equipment. As-built drawings of the ORT equipment were submitted.
- 2. Commission Staff requested a proposal from ACS to replace the lane controllers for the conventional toll lanes since these were originally installed in 2002 and are reaching the end of their useful life and parts are no longer supported by the initial supplier. The proposal was due on May 27, 2011. ACS requested an extension to June 1, 2011 and we are currently waiting for the submission.
- 3. ACS and TransCore are working to implement the revised toll rate schedule by 11:00 pm on June 30, 2011.

Activities for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center

- 1. ETC has completed testing on the system to implement the Automatic Account Closing process. This provides the ability to close patron accounts that have a zero or negative account balance and no account activity within the previous 90 days. Notifications will be issued to the customer stating that the account will be closed in the following 30 days if no payment is made for the account. Thirty days later, the account status will automatically be updated to 'Pending to Close' for all accounts meeting the criteria described above. If there is a payment made on an account after a notification has been sent to the patron, the account will NOT be updated to Pending to Close.
- 2. A team of Commission Staff representing the E-ZPass, Finance, IT and Engineering Departments participated in a WebEx Conference Call with ETC to review the May Monthly Software Maintenance Release notes and test results, prior to implementing the release.
- 3. Participated in weekly CSC/VPC Operations Calls and Monthly In-Lane Toll System progress meetings.

General Electronic Toll Collection Program Activities

- 1. Participated in the E-ZPass Interagency Group Strategic Planning workshops.
- 2. Bob Luciani and I have participated in the IAG Technical and Non-Technical Committee Meetings for the evaluation of the BAFO Proposals from Kapsch (Mark IV) and TransCore. At this point the Technical and Non-Technical Evaluations are

complete. We will be working on the cost evaluation portion in early June. Once the cost spreadsheets are completed the IAG will insert the new unit prices and then the evaluation should be complete. On June 22, 2011 the Technical and Non-Technical Committees will meet again to signoff on the evaluations.





PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Environmental Assessment (EA)/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation for the project was circulated for public comment on 12/9/09 and was made available for public review on the Commission's project website and at a number of publicized locations. Public comments were accepted until 2/4/2010, the end of the requisite public comment period.

In conjunction with the EA review process, a Public Hearing was conducted in compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Act of 1970, and Section 128 Title 23 of the United States Code, Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as well as New Jersey Department of Transportation policies and procedures. The design consultant AECOM, with HNTB as their Environmental Team Sub-consultant, has prepared responses to the comments received during the public comment period, which have been reviewed by the Commission. To initiate the process of requesting a NEPA Decision (FONSI) from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), these responses have been submitted to PennDOT, NJDOT, and FHWA for review.

At a meeting held with FHWA and PennDOT representatives on June 11, 2010 the Commission was informed that tolling will have to be made part of the proposed action for the project and the impacts from tolling the bridge will have to be addressed as part of the current EA process. The FHWA will not issue a NEPA decision (FONSI) for the project until the impacts from tolling have been assessed. A subsequent meeting/conference call on August 25, 2010 with FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT representatives confirmed that an addendum to the current EA document will have to be prepared to address the tolling impacts to the project, and make tolling of the SFB part of the proposed action for the project. The re-evaluation of the EA and the addendum thereto, has been prepared by AECOM under the C-502A I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project DMC Services contract, Task Order Assignment C-502A-2C.

Meeting of June 27, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The EA/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation Document was also distributed to each of the involved transportation agencies (FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT) and the Cooperating Agencies (US Army Corps of Engineers, US EPA, PA DEP and the National Marine Fisheries Service) for their review. The Section 4(f) Evaluation, which is part of the EA, was forwarded by FHWA to their Washington D.C. Office for the Conditional Legal Sufficiency Review. This review has been completed by FHWA, and the request for the final executed Programmatic Agreement has been made by FHWA to issue Legal Sufficiency. The EA/Draft 4(f) Document has been revised to address all comments received from the review agencies and to reflect tolling of the SFB as part of the proposed action. Upon resolution of all comments on the EA the final EA/4(f) Document will be submitted to FHWA's Washington D.C. office along with a fully executed copy of the Programmatic Agreement for a final Legal Sufficiency review.

Both NJ and PA State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) have issued determinations of effects for project effects on historic and archaeological resources. A **Programmatic Agreement** to stipulate future actions required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act has been executed for this project. This document identifies the mitigation measures to be taken as a result of the finding of Adverse Effect to the Delaware & Raritan Canal cultural resource in NJ; and potential for adverse effect to archaeological resources in PA and NJ. These mitigation measures have been coordinated, and agreed upon by, the environmental regulatory agencies and transportation agencies on the project.

The PA has been fully executed with the receipt of FHWA's signature on January 6, 2011. The PA bears executing signatures from FHWA, New Jersey Historic Preservation Officer, and Pennsylvania Historic Preservation Officer; and concurring signatures from the Commission, NJDOT, and PennDOT. The PA copies bearing original signatures have been distributed to the signing Agencies, and will now be incorporated into the Final Section 4(f) Evaluation Document for final Legal Sufficiency review by FHWA. As part of the EA Addendum process, the state HPO's must provide concurrence that the Commission's decision to Toll the Scudder Falls bridge will not adversely affect the cultural resources in the vicinity of the project. Letters to the HPO's requesting this concurrence were sent on March 24, 2011. This concurrence was received from the Pennsylvania HPO (PHMC) on April 1, 2011; and from the New Jersey HPO on April 18, 2011.

The FHWA recommended additional consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) on the EA. Accordingly, a **Biological Assessment Report** (BA) was prepared for threatened and endangered (T&E) species impacts and was submitted to the NMFS in September 2008. On June 11, 2010 the Commission received the final Biological Opinion from NMFS, which includes a determination of 'No Jeopardy' from NMFS. This completes Section 7 consultation.

FINANCIAL/LEGAL ADVISORY SERVICES FOR A P3 FOR SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

STUDY Contract No. C-393G-1R

At the Commission's special meeting on August 17, 2010 the Commission announced the issuance of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Financial/Legal Advisory Services for a P3 for Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge project. This RFP was posted on the Commissions web site on August 20, 2010.

On August 27, 2010 a Non-mandatory Pre-proposal conference call with interested financial/legal firms was held at the Commission's New Hope Facility. Twenty-two (22) firms participated in the conference call. An additional 38 firms listened to a digital replay of the conference call which was available through September 3, 2010.

On September 17, 2010 ten (10) proposals were received in response to this RFP. Oral interviews were held October 18 and 21, 2010.

Review of the C-393G -1 Proposals resulted in a revised RFP. An RFP for C-393G-1R was issued on November 23, 2010 requesting five firms to resubmit a Technical and Price Proposal to provide the Commission within <u>90</u> days of receipt of Notice to Proceed sufficient information/counsel to make a "GO/NO GO" decision on a P3 for its Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. And, should it make a "GO" decision its recommendation as to form of a P3 which is most feasible from an economic/legal perspective. The revised proposals are currently under review.

ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE / DETECTION SYSTEM

PROGRAM MANAGER Contract No. C-396A

Work remaining for the Program Manager, Jacobs Edwards & Kelcey, includes verification of performance issue resolution in accordance with the Settlement Agreement approved at the January 2011 Commission Meeting and the preparation and submission of project close-out documentation as part of the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project. Staff is monitoring the progress of the Settlement Agreement items and close-out documentations.

DESIGN-BUILD-MAINTAIN PROJECT Contract No. DB-396A

Final Acceptance / Closeout activities associated with the Acquisition and Installation phase of project include those stipulated within the Settlement Agreement between the Commission and Mass. Electric Construction Co. approved at the January 2011 Commission Meeting.

Mass. Electric Construction Co. continues to resolve performance issues as required by the Settlement Agreement. Successful resolution of these items is being monitored and verified by the Program Manager and Commission staff.

The DBM Team is currently supporting the Maintenance phase of the project under the direction of the Commission's Electronic Security and Surveillance Department which operates the system from the Primary Control Center located at the New Jersey State Police's Regional Operation and Information Center (ROIC) in West Trenton, NJ.

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I-78 OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) LANES DESIGN

DESIGN-BUILD Contract No. DB-427

In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project DB-427C

ACS State and Local Solutions (ACS) and Commission Staff continue to participate in monthly progress meetings. ACS continues to participate in bi-weekly progress meetings, as needed, with all involved parties for the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling (ORT) project. ACS is preparing for the installation of the roadway pavement loops for the right shoulder of the ORT Lane. Once the roadway loops are installed, ACS will tune the shoulder equipment and test it.

ACS and TransCore completed the installation of an Audit Workstation in the Morrisville Administration Building. This workstation adds functionality to the existing electronic toll collection system to meet new needs of the Finance and Toll Audit Departments. There is now a need to retrieve up to 18 months of data locally to support the annual audit review. This new workstation provides the functionality to retrieve data from the toll system backup tapes on an as needed basis.

ACS continues to perform preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Commission Staff is working with ACS to purchase patron fare displays and transformers for the lane control signals from an alternative provider since this piece of equipment has reached the end of its useful life and is no longer supported by the initial supplier.

<u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Design-Build-Operate-Maintain Project DB-427D</u>

Customer Service Center (CSC) operation weekly conference calls with Commission staff and ETC continue so all parties may discuss on-going and upcoming efforts, as well as issues and their resolution. ETC and Commission Staff participated in a quarterly face to face meeting in Morrisville, Pennsylvania. ETC and Commission Staff participated in a WebEx meeting to review the April Software Maintenance Release prior to placing it into production.

EASTON-PHILLIPSBURG TOLL BRIDGE REHABILITATION SCOPING/CONCEPT STUDY

DESIGN CONTRACT C-437A

This project was awarded to Pennoni Associates at the July 26, 2010 Commission meeting. A kick-off meeting was held with Pennoni on August 5, 2010 and Notice-to-Proceed was subsequently issued. Field activities including inspection and condition assessment commenced the week of September 13, 2010 and completed by the end of September 2010. All of Pennoni's draft condition/assessment reports submitted in November and December 2010 have been reviewed with comments provided by Commission staff. Progress Meetings are occurring on a monthly basis. Pennoni has submitted the draft Concept Report for the proposed rehabilitation. This document has been reviewed and comments were vetted during a project workshop session held on April 19, 2011. As a result of this meeting additional follow-up and action items have been developed. It is anticipated that concepts will be presented in August 2011 at local "Open House" sessions.

DELAWARE WATER GAP TOLL BRIDGE (I-80) OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) CONSTRUCTION

DESIGN Contract No. C-440B

Stantec continues to provide post design post award services that include reviewing and responding to RFIs submitted by the contractor and reviewing and responding to technical submittals from the contractor. Additionally, Stantec participates in bi-weekly progress meetings. Stantec continues to work with the project team to develop alternate options and recommendations for proposed Sign Structure No. 1.

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CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-440B

GPI continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract which includes: monitoring and coordinating the field activities of the contractor associated with Contract T-440BR; preparation of contractor invoices; receiving and processing submittals and Requests for Information (RFI's); reviewing and commenting on the contractor's schedule updates along with reviewing, commenting on and distributing the contractor's 2-Week Look Ahead schedules; holding and documenting the bi-weekly Progress Meetings and Schedule Update Meetings with those for April held on April 7, 2011 and April 21, 2011; performing monthly independent safety inspections with the one for April held on April 19, 2011; performing independent materials inspection as required; reviewing contractor submitted cost proposals for any change order work along with if necessary preparing independent cost estimates for those items; preparing Unforeseen Allowance Reductions as necessary; preparing inspection reports for days that the contractor works on site; and maintaining project documentation controls/files. Remaining work within the toll plaza area continues with work associated with the roadway, median barrier, glare screen and the drainage on both shoulder areas of the ORT and toll plaza lanes # 4, # 5 and # 6 with the work associated with toll plaza lane # 4 and the paving of the ORT shoulder area completed. The individual toll plaza lane work requires up to two (2) toll plaza lanes being out at various times. Also work associated with the advance sign structures (4 total) continues with the median barrier work associated with the sign structures #3 and #4 ongoing. Alternates for sign structure #1 continue to be reviewed with investigation into the option of moving the sign north and west of the contract specified site continuing and possibly converting to a ground mounted sign. The electrical work associated with the new stand by generator is being scheduled for punch listing. AP's CPM Schedule Updates No. 9 was approved. Bi-Weekly Schedule Update and Progress Meetings continue to take place with those for the month of April occurring on April 7, 2011 and April 21, 2011.

Approvals have been timely, in support of the construction schedule. EA visits the construction as needed and participates in the project bi-weekly Progress and Schedule Update Meetings.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-444A

The CM/CI consultant, Johnson, Mirmiran & Thompson (JMT), continues monitoring and documenting RFIs, Submittals and Shop Drawings, conducting bi-weekly Progress and Schedule Update Meetings, along with inspection of the contractor's field activities. JMT manages construction inspection staff and fabrication inspection staff according to the contractor's schedule. Progress and Schedule Update Meetings were held on May 10, 2011 and May 24, 2011. In addition, a pre-activity meeting for the concrete deck pour was held on May 3.

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. TS-444A

The concrete deck was poured on May 5, 2011. All three spans were poured, continuously for 14 hours. The Contractor, Road-Con, completed all tasks that were required to open the bridge to traffic, including approach paving, guide rail, lighting and traffic striping. The bridge opened to traffic on May 20, the date of substantial completion. Road-con continues to work on punch list items toward final completion in June.

RIEGELSVILLE TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION

DESIGN Contract No. C-445A

A meeting was held at the bridge on May 10, to discuss the peeling paint on the suspension cables. Representatives of the contractor, the CM/CI, the CPMC, the designer and the paint manufacturer were in attendance. Paint samples were taken by all. It was determined that the primary and secondary coats are in excellent condition, providing the required protection for the cables. Preliminary indications are that, in some locations, the final coat was applied too thickly. After complete sample analysis, a decision will be made as to procedures for correcting the problem. Any cleaning and/or repainting will be done at no cost to the Commission.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-445A

The CM/CI consultant, STV, conducted the field meeting to discuss the peeling paint issue on May 10. Once the manufacturer's report is finalized and concurrence is reached among the designer, CM/CI and contractor, STV will direct the contractor accordingly. In addition to touch-up painting, inspection will also be performed when the protective coating is completed on the piers. The construction contract is extended until the water recedes sufficiently to complete the contract task.

Neshaminy Constructors is waiting for the river level to recede sufficiently to complete the application of substructure concrete protective coating. This item of work is the only remaining item on the punch list. A contract time extension to June 30, 2011 has been recommended by the Construction Manager in order to allow for the water level to recede below the pier aprons. In addition, the contractor will complete the painting touch-up of the bridge including the corrective work associated with the peeling paint on the suspension cables. Contract Final Completion is anticipated in June.

T&M secured the requisite Scientific Collection Permits to perform the surveys and relocations as required by the construction permits, and work is expected to take place in May 2011.

DESIGN MANAGEMENT CONSULTANT (DMC) SERVICES FOR THE I-95/SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

DMC TOLLING STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT & IMPLEMENTATION SUPPORT SERVICES

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2C

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 Meeting authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the *Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project*. This Statement of Intent, amongst other things, included the development of a strategy to implement All Electronic Cashless tolling (AECT) on the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

AECOM received a Limited Notice-to-Proceed issued on May 14, 2010 effective April 26, 2010. The Limited NTP allowed work on the following tasks;

- Establishing a timeline for tolling implementation;
- Preparation of tolling applications and/or agreements with FHWA;
- Commencing the Toll/Traffic Diversion Study;
- Preparation of the RFLOI for the Traffic and Revenue Study.

On July 26, 2010 the Commission's New Jersey Counsel, Florio Perrucci Steinhardt & Fader, L.L.C. and Pennsylvania Counsel, Fox Rothschild LLP, after review of the Commission's Compact, each provided a favorable opinion as to the Commission's authority to toll the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge. These letters of opinion from each counsel were sent to FHWA. FHWA provided a response to these letters on January 26, 2011. FHWA concurs that the Commission has the authority to toll the bridge, but a Tolling Agreement will be required. FHWA's response was forwarded to the Commission's Pennsylvania and New Jersey Counsel offices for review in January. Commission's Counsel has reviewed the response from FHWA, and concurs with their opinion on the need to enter into a tolling agreement.

AECOM has prepared a draft Expression of Interest as a first step in preparing a draft Tolling Agreement in parallel with the efforts required to obtain the NEPA decision (FONSI) from FHWA. The Commission's Counsel will now review the Expression of interest.

Meeting of June 27, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

In June 2010 FHWA directed that tolling will have to be made part of the proposed action for the project, and the impacts from tolling the bridge will have to be addressed as part of the current Environmental Assessment (EA) process. The FHWA will not issue a NEPA decision (FONSI) for the project until the impacts from tolling have been assessed. The inclusion of tolling into the proposed action requires reassessing the EA, the Section 4(f) Evaluation, and the Project Point-of-Access (POA) Study. This re-assessment will result in an addendum to the EA, which must meet the approval of the transportation agencies - FHWA, PennDOT, and NJDOT, and the cooperating agencies – USEPA, USACE, NMFS, and PADEP.

As the initial step in re-assessing the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project EA a Traffic Diversion Study was prepared by the AECOM team. The final draft of this report was submitted on August 25, 2010. AECOM briefed the Commissioners at the September 2010 Commission Committee Meeting as to the findings of the study. On December 10, 2010 the Scudder Falls Bridge Final Traffic Diversion Study, dated September 8, 2010 was sent out to the transportation agencies reviewing the EA Addendum. Subsequent to the submittal of the Traffic Diversion Study, the following documents were submitted to the transportation agencies on the noted date, for review:

• EA Addendum January 7, 2011

• Final Section 4(f) Evaluation January 7, 2011

• POA Study Addendum January 27, 2011

On January 31, 2011 Commission and AECOM staff met with the transportation agencies FHWA, PennDOT, and NJDOT to 1) discuss comments from each agency to the EA Addendum, Section 4(f) Evaluation, and Traffic Diversion Study; and 2) Review the schedule for obtaining the NEPA decision (FONSI) on the environmental documentation. Details of the schedule were discussed, and input from the agencies received. The target date for receipt of the FONSI remains at August 4, 2011. However, delays associated with identifying PennDOT Central Office's issues with the TDS, and providing acceptable responses to comments received from PennDOT Central Office, have placed this date in jeopardy. Discussions with PennDOT Central Office have not resulted in a definitive position of PennDOT Central Office on the TDS. FHWA will provide assistance in addressing PennDOT's concerns.

Meeting of June 27, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Review comments were received from the transportation agencies between January 28 and February 28, 2011 on the various documents. Commission and AECOM staff held a conference call with the transportation agencies on February 3, 2011 to continue discussions on comments to the Traffic Diversion Study. Responses to these comments have been prepared and submitted to the transportation agencies. Commission staff is in continuous contact with the agencies to reach a final, acceptable resolution to each of the comments, and move the project forward. However, PennDOT continues to question the validity of the traffic model that was produced for the TDS. The model is a hybrid utilizing the North Jersey transportation model along with traffic input from DVRPC. This model has been prepared by Jacobs Engineering, and calibrated by using traffic information in the project area from DVRPC. FHWA has reviewed the model, which they support. Additionally, an informal approval of the model has been received from DVRPC. However, since it is not the DVRPC model, which PennDOT is used to seeing, PennDOT has provided multiple iterations of comments requesting details of the model input not normally provided in a traditional TDS. The Commission and CPMC staff has, in turn, provided detailed responses to the comments to the transportation agencies. Commission staff attempts to work with PennDOT managerial staff in District 6-0 to bring resolution to this issue, have not been successful. A meeting was held in May 2011 between FHWA and their tolling expert and PennDOT Central Office staff to attempt to bring resolution to this issue. FHWA has indicated that the issue with the Traffic Diversion Study has to do with a reliance on professional judgment as far as the traffic diversion volumes are concerned rather than a model-derived set of volumes. FHWA will submit a formal letter to the Commission requesting additional information be provided to address this issue.

- Draft of the Revised Traffic Section for the EA Addendum

DMC ADVANCED ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR PRIORITY ITEMS OF WORK

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2D

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 meeting authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the *Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project*. This Statement of Intent, amongst other things, included the advancement of schedule-critical engineering/permitting activities to meet the objectives outlined in the Statement of Intent.

This TOA was fully executed by the Commission on July 1, 2010 and includes the necessary professional services to complete certain priority items of work that are critical to the overall schedule of the project. These priority tasks include environmental permitting; right-of-way (ROW) acquisition; archeological work necessary to obtain cultural resource clearance for the project; Stormwater Management design and permit plan preparation; and transition of key public involvement tasks from the Environmental Assessment Phase (Commission Contract C-393A) to the Design Management Consultant (DMC Contract C-502A).

In addition, this TOA includes DMC Services to support the Commission's two-step Professional Services procurement process. This process includes the preparation of a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) document and a Request for Proposal (RFP) document for Final Design and Construction Services for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project using the traditional design bid build method of project delivery. A Draft RFQ has been prepared, and will be revised to include the tolling of the new I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge. AECOM continues preparing the draft RFP, and developing the project work scope with Commission staff.

Permit Pre-application Meetings have been held with the Pennsylvania DEP, USACE, NJDEP, the D&R Canal Commission, NJDEP Green Acres, the Bucks County Soil Conservation District, and the Delaware River Basin Commission, to date. A review meeting was also held with Lower Makefield Township to discuss their stormwater design requirements. Requirements of these entities will be addressed in the development of the Permit Plans, which will be submitted back to them for review and approval. AECOM submitted the 'Pre-Application for Parkland Diversion', which includes Commission review comments, to NJDEP – Green Acres Program for review and approval, as a result of project impacts to NJ State Park Lands. Drafts of the PADEP Chapter 105 Permit Application, USACE/PADEP Joint Permit Application and the NJDEP Freshwater Wetland/Flood Hazard Area Permit Application were submitted in May, to the Commission, for review and comment.

Meeting of June 27, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Field work for property surveys associated with impacted properties has been completed. Impacts to properties are being refined, along with the progression of the roadway design, and will be reflected in right-of-way plans. AECOM has prepared information outlining protocols for the right-of-way taking process. These documents are based upon the PennDOT and NJDOT processes for each respective state, and are being submitted to Commission counsel for review.

The Phase III data recovery for the NJ site began in early October, and the field work was completed in January. AECOM is performing data analysis and documentation on the findings at this time. Upon completion the New Jersey artifacts will be submitted to the New Jersey State Museum for display and/or archival.

Phase III data recovery work for the Pennsylvania site requires a permit from the Bucks County Soil Conservation District (BCSC), due to the amount of excavation and soil storage that will be performed on site. The soil erosion and sediment control permit was received from Bucks County Conservation District in March. Phase III data recovery work at the PA site started on March 30th, with support from Commission staff. Due to the nature and location of the Phase III work, the Commission issued letters to local elected officials and nearby residents, notifying them of the work taking place at the site. Workers on the site have been issued information cards to provide to members of the public that approach the site with questions on the work. The Commission has held onsite and conference call interviews with newspaper and television reporters The Commission continues to field requests for these interviews, as well as, outside requests for access to the site from state and public entities.

Work continues on the project storm water design. Supplemental field survey work for natural drainage features to support the storm water drainage design and permit plan preparation has been completed. A 'Boring Program' consists of test pits and geotechnical borings to obtain sub-surface data necessary to support the storm water management design. The HOP's from each state were received in February. The AECOM team completed drilling along the I-95 corridor in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. The draft reports are currently being reviewed by AECOM. The boring and infiltration test data being collected has been provided to the AECOM team in support of the stormwater management design.

AECOM continued to perform Public Involvement activities, including responding to questions from the public on the project Hot Line: update of the Commission's Scudder Falls Project website; preparation of notification letters of the Phase III Archeological dig along River Road in Pennsylvania to local residents and elected officials.

Draft ROW Plans and taking descriptions have been prepared by T.Y. Lin Associates, a sub-consultant to AECOM, and are currently being reviewed by AECOM prior to submission to the Commission for review and comment;

AECOM was issued Notice to Proceed on the Task Order Agreement (TOA) on November 16, 2010. Startup of AECOMs services is on hold pending award of the C-393G-1R contract.

This Task is for an independent review of the Commission's current General Provisions based on the 2003 version of PennDOT's Publication 408. Update the Commission's General Provisions to incorporate the changes in the 2011 initial version (effective April 1, 2011) of PennDOT's Publication 408. This task also includes an independent review and recommendations for improvement to the Commission's current scheduling specification as written in current construction projects.

On December 20, 2010 the Commission held a kick-off meeting with Hill & Urban to discuss the subject assignment. Current general provisions and scheduling specifications have been reviewed by Hill & Urban and recommended revisions have been received by Commission staff and currently under review.

Assignment C-07-11A

A kick-off meeting was held on May 3, 2011 at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge (E-P TB) and attended by representatives from District 1, 2 & 3 operations, Engineering and TranSystems (TS). Inspections began May 9 at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge. Annual inspections commenced on May 9, 2011 and have been completed at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge and preliminary inspections have been completed on the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge due to ongoing construction. TS will return to DWG to complete the inspections once construction is complete.

All approach structures at Portland – Columbia Toll Bridge have been inspected. The main river bridge will be inspected soon and was delayed due to poor weather. Inspections are currently underway at Milford – Montague Toll Bridge. After completion of inspections at M-M, TS will move on to Trenton – Morrisville, finishing Portland – Columbia, New Hope – Lambertville and Interstate 78 Toll Bridges. All Toll Bridge inspections, excluding DWG, should be completed by the end of June.

Facilities Inspections have been scheduled for July 19 in District 1, July 21 in District 2, and July 22 in District 3. Vehicle & Equipment Inspections have been scheduled for September 13 in District 1, September 14 in District 2, and September 15 in District 3.

COMPACT AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT DEPARTMENT May 2011

General

Now that the weather is warmer and the construction season continues in full force complete as many as the funded and still pending CAI projects have begun.

The CAI department continues processing grantees reimbursement requests, and monitoring the status of the projects under construction, reviewing plans, change orders and contract agreements specifications, and managing CAI projects coordination with the municipalities.

Pennsylvania

- 1. **Milford Borough, PA** During the month of May 2011, construction of the *Storm Water Restoration Project* continued by Leeward Construction. To date, construction is substantially complete in all three (3) work areas, including the final mill and overlay and final restoration. Several minor construction items remain to be completed. It is currently anticipated that this project construction will be fully completed by July 2011, weather permitting. To date, the Borough has been reimbursed \$116,228.41 of \$163,475.00 (71%) by the CAI department.
- 2. **Smithfield Township, PA** The Township has completed the plans and specifications for the *Intermunicipal Trail Project* in order to obtain the necessary permits from the County Conservation District, the Pennsylvania Historical Museum Commission (PHMC) and the PA Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) to complete the project. The plans and specifications were to be submitted to the Commission on June 3, 2011 and will be reviewed by the CAI Department. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed in the Summer of 2011. To date, the Township has been reimbursed \$45,869.87 of \$584,500.00 (8%) by the CAI department.

During the month of April 2011, the Township received the Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) closeout documentation for the *Pedestrian Improvements Project*, indicating that PennDOT has accepted the work that was completed. The Township is currently in the process of preparing their final reimbursement request submission to the CAI department. To date \$751,863.18 of \$779,000.00 (97%) has been reimbursed to the Township.

3. **Delaware Water Gap Borough, PA** – The *Local Roads Paving Project* was completed in December 2010 by Bracalente Construction, Inc. for a total construction cost of \$115,831.60. The streets that were repaved included Waring Drive, Oak Street, Parkway Drive, Croasdale Drive, Walnut Lane and Shepard Avenue. In May, the CAI department received and processedthe Borough's final reimbursement and closed out this grant. The Borough has been reimbursed \$120,826.59 of the original \$130,000.00 award (93%) by the CAI department.

On April 30, 2011, the CAI department received a new application for \$396,804.00 from the DWG for the reconstruction of the sidewalk on Main Street.

The Borough has indicated that the *Broad Street Sidewalk Improvements Project* is complete; however closeout of the Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) by PennDOT still remains to be completed. PennDOT issued an updated punchlist for the project in March 2011, which indicates that the Borough is required to replace the detectable warning surfaces on two (2) of the constructed curb ramps prior to close out of the HOP. It is currently anticipated that the project will be closed out by PennDOT in May-June 2011. As previously mentioned, the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project* was completed in August 2009.

- 4. **Portland Borough, PA** The Borough submitted a revised application, in the amount of \$153,782.66 for *Streetscape Improvements on State Street and Delaware Avenue*, in the hope that the project will be reconsidered by the Commissioners for funding. The revised application is a scaled-down version of their original application, which was submitted in the amount of \$515,701.40. The revised application meets the CAI criteria, but has not been awarded to date. The two other CAI funded projects (*Park & Ride Project* and *Park & Walk Project*) have been completed.
- 5. **Lower Mount Bethel, PA** The *Park & Ride Trail Project* is substantially complete with only the final paving work remaining to be completed. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed in the late Spring/early Summer 2011.
- 6. **Easton, PA** The North 3rd Street project is still under construction. In February the Commissioners approved the City's request for the reallocation of \$58,000 of its \$891,500 to expand the N. 3rd Street Corridor Improvements project to add four additional streetlights along Pine Street. Albeit the inclement weather, during the past few months, the City made significant improvement with its North 3rd Street Corridor Improvements project. It installed all the designated streetlights along Bushkill Street, College Avenue, Cattell Street, and North 3rd Street.

The Larry Holmes Drive Streetscape Improvement, improvements to the N. 3rd Street intersections, and the Decorative Streetlight Improvement Project, which replaced existing streetlights in the downtown area are substantially completed. These projects were to be completed by the end of 2010, but Easton requested an extension until the spring of 2011.

The construction contracts for Phases 1 and 2 of the Waterfront Improvements project are substantially complete. These include a "road diet" for Larry Holmes Drive, high visibility

pedestrian crosswalks, intersection improvements at Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive to improve pedestrian accommodation, along with a sewer line connection from the Commission's Construction of the ADA Curb Ramps and Decorative Crosswalks, which is part of the *Pedestrian Pathways/Intersection Enhancements and Northampton St. Bridge Bike Path* grant, was completed in September 2009. The City has also purchased and installed the materials for the Bike Path Extension. The curbs and sidewalks abutting the Northampton Street Bridge have been reconstructed. The change order submitted to the CAI department to add new lighting poles in the Scott Park area of the project was approved and completed.

7. **Williams Township, PA** – The *I-78 & Morgan Hill Road Interchange Traffic Signalization Project* was completed in January 2010. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township. The CAI department is still awaiting the Township's final reimbursement request submission in order to close out the grant.

As previously indicated, the Township submitted six (6) applications that were discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but have not been awarded to date. We would also note that it was previously determined that the Belmont Street Reconstruction and the Hilton Street Improvements projects did not satisfy the required characteristics of the CAI program as they could not be completed by the December 31, 2010 deadline; however, since an extension has been granted, these projects can be reevaluated.

- 8. **Riegelsville Borough, PA** During the month of April, the contractor for the *Delaware Canal Footbridge Lighting Project*, Yates Electrical Service, continued construction on the project. The lights are installed and working. There are only punchlist items pending. A new reimbursement request was recently submitted by the Borough and is currently under review by the CAI Department. It is currently anticipated that project construction will be completed by July 2011. To date, the Borough has been reimbursed \$8,149.35 of \$45,000.00 (18%).
- 9. **Solebury Township, PA** The construction of the *Walton Drive Bridge Replacement Project* is complete. As previously discussed, project construction included the alternate #2 paving work, which was a change of scope approved by the Commissioners to repave the entire length of Walton Drive. The Township's engineer has indicated that there have been several construction change orders on the project. Back-up documentation for the change orders has been received and is currently under review by the CAI department to determine if the change orders are eligible for reimbursement under the grant.

Construction of the *Route 202 Trail and Park* project began on August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and was completed in September 2009. To date, \$1,485,432.04 of \$1,755,150.00 has been reimbursed by the CAI Department (85%). The Township is currently in the process of preparing their final reimbursement request to the DRJTBC for the project, and has also submitted back-up documentation for several change orders to determine if they are eligible for reimbursement under the grant, which are under review by the CAI Department.

10. **New Hope Borough, PA** – Construction of the *Main St. Bridge Lighting Project* is substantially complete by the contractor, Armour & Sons Electric. During the month of May 2011, Armour worked to complete the remaining punch list items, and the only remaining items are the final lighting tests and the preparation of as-built plans. It is currently anticipated that the project construction will be completed by July 2011. Reimbursements requests are pending and are under review by the CAI Department.

The Borough has indicated that it is satisfied with the lights installation. The only outstanding items include the as-built lighting system plan and proof of the testing of the lighting system. The CAI department is waiting for items from the municipality to close out the project.

The construction of the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals Project* by Armour & Sons Electric is substantially complete. However, the construction of the ADA compliant pedestrian facilities required by PennDOT still remains to be completed. The Borough has recently indicated the ADA ramp designs were approved by PennDOT and that construction of the ramps will begin this month. To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$412,798.75 of \$446,404.00 (92% of total grant amount).

11. **Falls Township, PA** – The original traffic signal installation and modernization project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted another application for the *Tyburn Road & New Falls Road Traffic Signal Upgrade Project*, in the amount of \$108,140.00. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but has not been awarded to date.

12. **Upper Makefield Township, PA** – The Township continues to make progress on completing the bid package for *Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 Project*. The Township submitted plans and specifications to the CAI Department in May, and the CAI Department approved the Township to advertise for bids, which is anticipated to occur in June 2011. Construction is currently anticipated to be completed by September 2011.

The Washington Crossing Gateway Project was completed in the Spring of 2010. To date the Township has been reimbursed \$1,447,000.00 of \$1,447,000.00 (100% of total grant amount).

13. **Lower Makefield, PA** – The *Black Rock Pedestrian Trail Project* is substantially complete. The contractor, S&H Landscaping, is currently working to complete the remaining contract items. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed in late Spring/early Summer 2011. The Township's engineer has also indicated that there have been several change orders on the project.

The CAI department is currently reviewing the change orders to determine if they are eligible for reimbursement under the grant.

The Traffic Signal project at the intersection of Yardley-Newtown Rd & Creamery Rd is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission and the original grant is closed out.

- 14. **Bristol Borough, PA** The construction of the *Traffic Signals Revitalization Project* was completed by Armour & Sons Electric in July 2009 and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$1,333,843.28 of \$1,334,450.00 grant (99.9% of total grant amount).
 - In the Spring of 2010, the Borough submitted another application for the *Decorative Crosswalks Project*, in the amount of \$423,126.12. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but has not been awarded to date.
- 15. **Yardley, PA** The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough for its *Yardley Borough Road Improvements Project* and the project has been closed out.
 - The Borough of Yardley in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization submitted an application to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, and Morrisville Borough in the amount of \$872,969.00. This application has been discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but was not awarded.
- 16. **Morrisville, PA** The construction work in Morrisville Municipal Authority CAI project on the *Moreau Street Rehabilitation project* is progressing well. In February, the Commissioners approved the reallocation of \$70,000 to expand the Moreau Street project to Bank Street (between Moreau and Green Streets). The plans, specifications and cot estimate have been received for the additional work.

The *Bridge Street Curb and Sidewalk replacement project* is still completing its engineering design work. However, the four originally funded projects in Morrisville are completed.

New Jersey

1. **Montague, NJ** – The relocation of the emergency heliport from the Park & Ride location has been completed. The reconstruction of the Park & Ride was also completed. The FAA has licensed the emergency heliport that had to be relocated for the construction of the Park & Ride. The CAI department is assisting the municipality with completing its final reimbursement request.

- 2. **Knowlton, NJ** The Township is proud to announce that The Paulinskill Trail extension has been completed! The underpass is a wonderful addition to the community. Hikers and bikers from New Jersey and Pennsylvania will now be able to link the Paulinskill Trail to the Columbia/Portland pedestrian bridge and enjoy the beautiful scenery along the Delaware and Paulinskill Rivers. The CAI department is assisting the municipality with completing its reimbursement requests. The Township scheduled a ribbon-cutting for the Paulinskill Trail Extension for Saturday, June 4th.
- 3. **Belvidere**, NJ The Water Street Improvements project was completed and closed out in May of 2010. In May the final reimbursement request has been processed and the project is closed out. The CAI director provided the Commission's engineering department with the latest financials and designs for this project.
- 4. **Phillipsburg, NJ** The third phase of the project started construction in April 2011 and it is still ongoing. This project was awarded a grant for \$997,962 at the Commissioners' February 2010 meeting. The sidewalk and road reconstruction are underway along with the additional extension of Sidgreaves Street and Jersey Street and on South Main Street. Most of the phase two of the project has been completed, the trees have been planted and most of the punch list items are being met. The CAI department continues to process the reimbursement requests for this project. In March 2011, at the request of the Town (CFO) a meeting was held with the due diligence engineer to review the project's remaining funds.

The original, Phase I project, was completed and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008.

- 5. **Pohatcong NJ** A new application was received by the CAI Department for *Resurfacing of River Road*. This application was presented to the Commissioners at their February 2010 meeting. This request was not awarded. The two granted projects to Pohatcong Township have been completed.
- 6. **Holland, NJ** –Holland was awarded a CAI grant for the *Drainage & Resurfacing of a Portion of Mt. Joy Road* and the municipality requested an extension for the work to be completed by the spring of 2011. The Township is gearing to start construction during the month of June, 2011. The project was awarded to English Paving Company, Inc. and a preconstruction meeting was scheduled for June 2011.

Holland completed and was fully paid for its previous CAI project. This project is in the process of being closed out.

New Jersey (continued)

7. **Milford, NJ** –The Borough was awarded a grant for the repair and resurfacing of Honeysuckle Lane off of Bridge Street. The Borough started this project construction in May 2011 and there are only punchlist items outstanding.

The Township received the construction bids for the project, awarded the contract to Line Construction.

The Bridge Street Improvements project is complete.

8. **Frenchtown, NJ** – In January 2011, Commissioners approved the reallocation of \$240,000 from its previously allocated budget for the Village Green project to the improvements of Bridge Street. The plans for Bridge Street, South Harrison St. and Race Street are complete and the project will be bid in June.

The Frenchtown Park and Ride project is complete.

9. Lambertville, NJ – the Delevan and McCready's Alley project has been substantially complete. The road was repaved and only a few punchlist items are pending. The Paving is also complete on Delavan Street as well as the concrete repairs and installation of crosswalk. A manhole riser at Delevan and North Union Street. The Perry Street reconstruction was delayed due to rain days. Some curb and sidewalk work still need to be completed on Perry Street between North and Union Streets. The construction was scheduled to start on April 18th. The recently approved survey project was completed and the maps preparation is underway. A public hearing is scheduled for May 4th and will include the portion of North Union Street between Buttonwood and Arnett Avenue. The Unimproved portion of South Franklin Street is also complete and is just waiting for the aerial survey and the drainage review.

The City of Lambertville has completed eight projects since the beginning of the CAI program.

10. **Stockton, NJ** – IN April 2011, the Borough finally completed some pending financial reports the CAI department had been waiting for to complete a final closed up of this project. The funded CAI projects for the Bridge Street Improvements project are completed. The municipality received a transportation construction project award for its CAI project.

West Amwell, NJ – The Township submitted two additional applications: The reconstruction of Old York Road Section I for \$85,000, and the reconstruction of Old York Road Section II for \$285,000. These applications have been presented to the commissioners, but no actions have been taken on them. The application for *Rocktown Hill Road Improvement Project* to the approach to the intersection of Route 31 was approved for \$100,000 by the Commissioners at their January 25, 2010 meeting. This project is to be completed during the Spring or perhaps early Summer of 2011.

New Jersey (continued)

The Section 11 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project is now completed. The Section 12 and Section 13 Road Reconstruction project are also completed. Reimbursement requests continue to be processed for sections 12, and 13 of the completed projects.

11. **Delaware Twp, NJ** – The Township received a new grant for the Improvements and Resurfacing of Federal Twist Road, and to install drainage improvements and erosion control within the existing road right of way. Maser Consulting Engineering completed the design for this project. Delaware Township has indicated to the Commission that the plans are complete and ready for bid. The plans were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and there are no objections noted.

The Previous CAI projects were completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out the projects. The municipality made a request to utilize the remainder of its grant to chip seal the grant project and the due diligent engineer is still working with the municipality to ascertain the CAI qualification of the additional project cost

Hopewell, NJ – The Township was approved for a grant application for the design and construction of sidewalk replacement in the Village of Titusville. This application was awarded a grant by the Commissioners at their April 2010 meeting. The Township requested an extension until the spring of 2011 to complete this project. No major progress was made in this project during this month. The municipality is working up a formal report as to the status of this project. The plans are completed and the Township is in the process of setting up meetings with the residents to make sure the final plans meet with their approval. The Township Manager has indicated that some limited drainage need to be dealt with some flat slopes that may send them over the budget. They would need to find ways to reconcile that issue.

The ADA Ramps and Walkway project was complete. The CAI department is in the process of closing out of the project.

- 12. **Ewing, NJ** During the month of May 2011, the Township was to restart the rest of the street reconstruction for this project. In February, the Commissioners approved a reallocation of funds request of \$25,418 for a change of scope of work by extending the project another 600 LF of road improvements on Wilbertha Road. Last October, this project was awarded an extension to be completed by the Spring of 2011. The project has recently restarted construction and will be completed soon.
- 13. **Trenton, NJ** The plans for this project have been completed and the project was advertised for bids. The bids were received, but are still pulling things together by the engineers. The CAI department is still waiting for the bids. Michelle MacKinnon, project Manager of AECOM USA, Inc., and the engineer for the City of Trenton indicated that the project is still on schedule and weather permits it will be completed by the beginning of the 4th quarter of this year.

New Jersey (continued)

Henrietta Owusu, director of Housing and Economic Development from the City of Trenton is managing this project for the City. It appears that the project is still on schedule to be completed by fourth quarter of 2011. A reimbursement request for design work in the amount of \$464,971.85 was received by the CAI department Comments were returned to Trenton for additional backup information prior to approving it. This information has not been provided yet.

- 14. **Alpha NJ** The Alpha's and Pohatcong's Reconstruction of Edge Rd. project has been completed and is in the process of being fully reimbursed and closed out.
- 15. **Kingwood, NJ** The Township's Reconstruction of Tumble Falls Road was awarded a grant for \$373,000.00 and the contract agreement has been executed. The project has been awarded and most of the construction was completed by December 31, 2010. Most of the construction work, especially the roadway repaving, was done by municipal forces. The CAI Department is working with the Township to process the reimbursement requests of the invoices for this project.
