ROLL CALL

Frank G. McCartney, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present- there being five members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and four members present from the State New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Welcome to the first meeting of 2011, a year that holds much promise – despite the snowy weather of the past month. I am pleased to have the privilege to kick off this first report of 2011 on a positive note. On Thursday of last week, we received confirmation from the Federal Highway Administration regarding the Commission's authority to toll the Scudder Falls

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Replacement Bridge. The FHWA communication we received states "...the DRJTBC may toll any newly constructed bridge, including a bridge that replaces an existing free bridge that has been demolished." The ruling affirms the crux of two opinions that our general legal counsels submitted to the FHWA in August, moreover, it confirms the validity of the Commission's December 2009 vote to toll the future Scudder Falls replacement facility. The FHWA ruling is good news and it certainly moves this project one giant leap closer to eventual construction. I would like to commend the Pennsylvania and New Jersey counsels, Chief Engineer George Alexandridis and the entire project team for this fine result. While this morsel of good news is welcome, there are two important steps that need to be completed with respect to tolling the replacement bridge. First, we need to finalize a Section 129 Agreement with the FHWA that articulates how the collected toll revenue will be used, second, we need to close out the review process on the addendum we filed to the project's Environmental Assessment to reflect the impacts of tolled crossings at the new bridge facility. The tolling impacts addendum currently is under review by FHWA, Penn DOT and NJ DOT. All of these steps will need to be completed before the FHWA can issue a FONSI - a finding of no significant impact - that will ultimately allow this project to move to final design and construction. Our revised timeline now anticipates a FONSI ruling sometime this August.

Moving to other projects, a four-month closure took effect at the Upper Black Eddy-Milford Toll Supported Bridge on January 11. This closure will remain in place until May 17. Despite the cold temperatures and recent snow storm, work is continuing. Crews have begun installing rigging and a temporary work platform beneath the bridge, meanwhile, guide rail and sidewalk demolitions have taken place atop the bridge. Work also has moved forward on the Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge Rehabilitation Project. A series of off-peak daytime lane closures have been in effect over portions of the past three weeks to enable work crews to suspend cables to support a work platform beneath the bridge, this work will carry over into February due to the bridge's length – our longest bridge, in fact, this project will involve the installation of new bearings beneath the bridge deck and repainting of steel superstructure members. We expect completion in November.

We also achieved another preservation milestone in our capital program during the past month. On January 5, the substantial completion of the rehabilitation project at the 106-year-old Riegelsville Toll Supported Bridge_was marked with a rededication ceremony at the bridge. The event included the attendance of elected officials from Pennsylvania and New Jersey, historians, and two descendents of John A. Roebling – the patriarch of the famous steel-wire-rope manufacturing company that built the bridge. A ceremonial ribbon was cut by local officials and a new plaque was unveiled at the site A restored 1940 Packard also was on hand to help mark the occasion. The bridge looked resplendent with period lighting and fresh coats of paint. Roebling descendent Karl Darby may have summed up the sentiments of appreciation for the rehabilitated suspension bridge the best when he said:

"Doesn't this bridge just look beautiful? ... You don't have bridges today that look like this..."

This report would be incomplete without any mention of the extraordinary number of snowfall events we have experienced. There have been six snow storms this winter, like other

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transportation agencies, we have experienced some challenges, but I'm happy to report that our maintenance crews and district office personnel have kept our bridges and roadways cleared and open through all of the storms. The cost so far has been \$214,458 in overtime, salt, and equipment repairs and parts. As large as this number is, we can count our blessings on one front, the northern portion of our jurisdiction that normally encounters the most snowfall and ice has so far been spared the worst of these storms. Historically, February is the snowiest month, so, this remains an unfolding story at this point. Whatever the outcome, we remain ready and sufficiently equipped to meet whatever new tests Mother Nature may pose in the weeks ahead.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of January 31, 2011 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (December, 2010)

Summary: The Commission experienced a decrease in total toll revenue for December 2010 in comparison to the December 2009 traffic and revenue statistics. Although toll revenue decreased 1.53% for the month of December, it is up 2.58% in a full year comparison. Toll Traffic increased 1.51% for December 2010 and 3.76% in a full YTD comparison with 2009.

Analysis of December 2010/December 2009 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue decrease of 1.53 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 2.15 percent decrease.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 0.12 percent increase.

Analysis of December 2010/December 2009 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 45,704 vehicles, or 1.51 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic decreased by 6,631 vehicles, or 1.75 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 52,335 vehicles, or 1.97 percent
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for December 2010 decreased by 29,709 vehicles, or 1.18 percent as compared to December 2009.

Traffic analysis for 2010 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for 2010 was 105,828 total vehicles as compared to 101,994 total vehicles for 2009, an increase of 3.76 percent.
- Recorded westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges in 2010 reflected a 1.84 percent decrease as compared to 2009.

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for December 2010 reflected a 7.46 percent increase as a result of increases of 42,254 cars and 668 trucks when compared to December 2009. It should be noted that roadway construction work preparation for the Trenton – Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehabilitation and One Auxiliary Northbound Lane (T-380B) began in December 2006, with full lane closures commencing in December 2007. This project was substantially completed in September 2009. Also, closure of the Calhoun Street Toll-Supported Bridge for rehabilitation, resulted in diversion of normally non-toll bridge traffic onto the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge during the period of May 24, 2010 through September 24th, when the bridge reopened to traffic. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), decreases of 786 cars and 365 trucks combined to generate an overall decrease in total toll traffic of 0.73 percent for December 2010 as compared to December 2009.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an overall increase of 4.85 percent in total toll traffic for the month of December 2010 compared to December 2009 as the result of combined increases of 36,863 cars and 2,952 trucks. It should be noted that the two new ORT lanes at I78 opened on May 13, 2010. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, decreases of 30,020 passenger vehicles and 4,169 trucks combined to generate a 6.48 percent decrease in total toll traffic for December 2010.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 9.77 percent increase in total toll traffic during December 2010 as a result of increases of 9,583 automobiles and 503 trucks compared to December 2009. It should be noted that construction of the *E-ZPass* ORT lane at DWG has resulted in the diversion of traffic to Portland-Columbia. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, the decreases of 6,999 passenger vehicles and 6,362 trucks generated an overall 1.78 percent decrease in total toll traffic for December 2010 as compared to December 2009. It should be noted that DWG's *E-ZPass* ORT lane opened on November 20, 2010. At Milford-Montague (MM), an increase of 1,440 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 145 trucks to produce a 1.65 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of December 2010.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of December, 2010 and December, 2009, and the year-to-date periods ending December 31, 2010 and December 31, 2009.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

There follows reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of December 2010 and the entire fiscal year 2010 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total operating expense totaled \$4,628,482 for the month of December. For the fiscal year 2010, total operating expense amounted to \$44,059,929 or 94.5% of the operating budget.

Most budget line items finished the year as surplus. Several line items exceeded the operating budget for 2010. They included Regular Employee Salaries \$29,000 due to a lower than anticipated vacancy rate. Healthcare Benefits expense exceeded the budget by 5.6% or \$336,000 due to higher than budgeted rates for the premium based healthcare plan. EZPass Operating expense ended the year 1.9% ahead of budget due to higher credit card charges resulting from higher toll revenues collected. All other expense line items are within their operating budgets.

The month of December was a three payroll month and as such, the monthly expense was higher than usual. Two operating months a year (July and December in 2010) have three payrolls cycles and the operating budget is designed to account for this situation.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

December 2010

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of December 2010, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 16 purchase orders. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 3 price inquiries were sent out for 1 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3 per order $(3 \div 1)$. Significant procurements for the period are highlighted below:

- Four Purchase Orders were let at the requests of Districts I and II, in the total amount of \$6,852.77, for the repair of HVAC and hot water systems
- ➤ Two Purchase Orders were let, in the amount of \$3,786.38, at the request of District II for the emergency repair of the tar wagon being used for end-of-year maintenance.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Dedication of Boat Ramp near Washington Crossing Toll-Supported Bridge: Facilitated media coverage of ceremony to raise public awareness of the boat ramp the Commission constructed as part of the "near-term improvements project" it conducted at the bridge in August and September. The event was timed to take advantage of the annual Christmas Day reenactment of General George Washington's famed 1776 crossing of the Delaware. Participants included local officials, a representative of Washington Crossing Historic Park and this year's George Washington reenactor in full garb. The Commission's efforts received widespread local and regional coverage and even generated some national attention.

Early Success of the Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Express E-ZPass Lane: Issued releases extolling the strong traffic percentage rates of the Commission's recently opened Express E-ZPass lane at the Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge. Communications used this news hook to promote the agency's E-ZPass accounts and the contact information for how the public can acquire accounts. A subsequent release was issued urging Express E-ZPass lane users to call in comments on the new facility. Again, this release contained E-ZPass account sign-up information. This release generated a wave of phone calls, the preponderance of comments being very favorable and positive. These reinforcement efforts generated local, regional and even national interest.

Substructure Repair and Scour Remediation Project: With a little over a month left in the project to repair substructures at 12 of the Commission's 20 bridges, a press release was issued to raise further awareness of the project and address a rise of public inquiries about water-line work taking place at various bridges. The result was coverage in some publications serving the Commission's jurisdiction.

Riegelsville Toll-Supported Bridge Rehabilitation Project Reaches Substantial Completion: Publicized the end of weeknight and weekend closures connected with the four-month rehabilitation of the Riegelsville Toll-Supported Bridge. A press release on the subject received daily and weekly news reports and some radio coverage.

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

- A draft Business Plan was developed and reviewed by the E-ZPass Department. Comments
 were addressed and the document was submitted to Commission Executive Staff for review
 and comment.
- 2. The lane control gates were removed from the Portland Columbia and Milford Montague Toll Bridges on December 15, 2010. The Violation Enforcement System (VES) was placed into operations and the E-ZPass Customer Service Center / Violation Processing Center (CSC/VPC) is processing violations from these facilities.
- 3. The contract for Consultant Services to Review the Commission's Toll Revenue Reporting Processes (C-587A) was awarded and Notice of Award / Limited Notice to Proceed was issued to Clifton Gunderson LLP, Inc. of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
- 4. As part of the E-ZPass Interagency Group's next generation technology procurement, we responded to a request for information regarding the number of transponders procured in 2008, 2009 and 2010, as well as the termination date of the existing agreement with Mark IV. I also participated on two (2) conference calls with the Non-Technical Committee regarding this item.
- 5. On December 17, 2010 there was a failure of the I-78 and Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridges ORT primary servers which prompted automatic activation of the secondary servers. Both primary servers were restored to normal operations, during the evening of December 17th. This resulted in no loss in transactions.
- 6. On December 23, 2010 the overhead laser scanner in the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge ORT Lane failed. ACS confirmed that the roadway loops were properly classifying the vehicles. Since the roadway loops were properly classifying the transactions and due to holiday traffic, the ORT Lane was closed after the holiday weekend and the scanner was replaced on December 30, 2010.
- ACS received a partial delivery of the Electronic Toll Collection System spare parts. It is anticipated that all items will be received by the end of February and we will complete an audit to confirm all equipment is received.
- Participation in weekly CSC/VPC Operations Calls and Bi-weekly In-Lane Toll System progress meetings.

- During a PCI Compliance upgrade which the Commuter Discount Process was disabled on December 19th through January 5th, 2011. ETC manually applied the credits to all affected customers.
- 10. We have developed a plan to contact the top violators that are ready to be sent to collections. This includes the Commission's in-house customer service representatives contacting the violator and providing an opportunity for them to pay the violations. If not, they will be turned over to a collection agency.



PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Environmental Assessment (EA)/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation for the project was circulated for public comment on 12/9/09 and was made available for public review on the Commission's project website and at a number of publicized locations. Public comments were accepted until 2/4/2010, the end of the requisite public comment period.

In conjunction with the EA review process, a Public Hearing was conducted in compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Act of 1970, and Section 128 Title 23 of the United States Code, Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as well as New Jersey Department of Transportation policies and procedures. The design consultant AECOM, with HNTB as their Environmental Team Sub-consultant, have prepared responses to the comments received during the public comment period, which have been reviewed by the Commission. To initiate the process of requesting a FONSI from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), these responses have been submitted to PennDOT, PennDOT HDAQ (Legal), NJDOT, and FHWA Metro Philadelphia and PA Division offices for review.

At a meeting held with FHWA and PennDOT representatives on June 11, 2010 the Commission was informed that tolling will have to be made part of the proposed action for the project and the impacts from tolling the bridge will have to be addressed as part of the current EA process. The FHWA will not issue a FONSI for the project until the impacts from tolling have been assessed. A subsequent meeting/conference call on August 25, 2010 with FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT representatives confirmed that an addendum to the current EA document will have to be prepared to address the tolling impacts to the project, and make tolling of the SFB part of the proposed action for the project. The re-evaluation of the EA, and the addendum thereto, are being prepared by AECOM under the C-502A I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project Design Management Consultant Services contract, Task Order Assignment C-502A-2C.

The EA/Draft 4(f) Document was also distributed to each of the involved transportation agencies (FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT) and the Cooperating Agencies (US Army Corps of Engineers, US EPA, PA DEP and the National Marine Fisheries Service) for their review. The Section 4(f) Evaluation, which is part of the EA, was forwarded by FHWA to their Washington D.C. Office for the Conditional Legal Sufficiency Review. This review has been completed by FHWA, and the request for the final executed Programmatic Agreement has been made by FHWA to issue Legal Sufficiency. The EA/Draft 4(f) Document will now need to address all comments received from the review agencies and to reflect tolling of the SFB as part of the proposed action. The final EA/4(f) Document will then be submitted to the FHWA's Washington D.C. Office along with a fully executed copy of the Programmatic Agreement for a final Legal Sufficiency review.

Both NJ and PA State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) have issued determinations of effects for project effects on historic and archaeological resources. A **Programmatic Agreement** to stipulate future actions required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act has been prepared for this project. This document identifies the mitigation measures to be taken as a result of the finding of Adverse Effect to the Delaware & Raritan Canal cultural resource in NJ; and potential for adverse effect to archaeological resources in PA and NJ.

The October 1, 2010 version of the Programmatic Agreement (PA) supersedes the February 25, 2010 version. It contains a revision to a specific mitigation section within the PA Stipulations section. This revised language has been agreed to by all signatory parties to the PA. The Commissioners at the September 27, 2010 Commission Meeting approved the change to the PA stipulation II.A.2, and authorized the Executive Director to execute the PA. The revised PA was distributed for signature to two of the three *executing parties* – New Jersey State Preservation Officer; Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Officer (PHMC); and *concurring parties* – Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission, New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT), and Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) on October 13, 2010. Signatures from each of these parties have been received PennDOT Counsel has made the determination that approval as to Legality and Form is not required since they have no obligations in the PA. On December 9, 2010 the PA was forwarded to FHWA, the third *executing party*, for signature. Upon receipt of FHWA signature, the final distribution of the executed PA will take place.

In mid-December 2010 it was found that the FHWA-Harrisburg representative for this project has recently changed due to the retirement and subsequent replacement of FHWA staff. On December 22, 2010 Commission and CPMC staff met with FHWA in Harrisburg to brief the new FHWA-Harrisburg representative on the project. This briefing included: Environmental Documentation phase status; schedule for obtaining a FONSI; and outstanding responses required from FHWA. Commission staff is working closely with the new FHWA representative to provide information on the project, and support their needs for expeditious turn-around of project documentation to support the FONSI schedule.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The FHWA recommended additional consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) on the EA. Accordingly, a **Biological Assessment Report** (BA) was prepared for threatened and endangered (T&E) species impacts and was submitted to the NMFS in September 2008. On June 11, 2010 the Commission received the final Biological Opinion from NMFS, which includes a determination of 'No Jeopardy' from NMFS. This completes Section 7 consultation.

FINANCIAL/LEGAL ADVISORY SERVICES FOR A P3 FOR SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

STUDY Contract No. C-393G-1

At the Commission's special meeting on August 17, 2010 the Commission announced the issuance of a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Financial/Legal Advisory Services for a P3 for Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge project. This RFP was posted on the Commissions web site on August 20, 2010.

On August 27, 2010 a Non-mandatory Pre-proposal conference call with interested financial/legal firms was held at the Commission's New Hope Facility. Twenty-two (22) firms participated in the conference call. An additional 38 firms listened to a digital replay of the conference call which was available through September 3, 2010.

On September 17, 2010 ten (10) proposals were received in response to this RFP. Oral interviews were held October 18 and 21, 2010. The proposals are under review.

PROGRAM MANAGER Contract No. C-396A

Work remaining for the Program Manager, Jacobs Edwards & Kelcey, includes supporting the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project through the completion of "punch-list" items as well as the preparation and submission of project close-out documentation.

DESIGN-BUILD-MAINTAIN PROJECT Contract No. DB-396A

System Acceptance work continues on the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project including addressing "punch-list" items together with the preparation and submission of all remaining documentation.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The DBM Team is currently supporting the Maintenance phase of the project under the direction of the Commission's Electronic Security and Surveillance Department which operates the system from the Primary Control Center located at the New Jersey State Police's Regional Operation and Information Center (ROIC) in West Trenton, NJ.

ESS TECHNICAL CONSULTANT Task Order Assignment No. C-539A-1

URS Corporation supported acceptance testing activities for the reinstallation of the electronic surveillance/detection system performed as part of the Riegelsville Toll Supported Bridge Rehabilitation project, Contract No. TS-445A.

I-78 OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) LANES DESIGN

DESIGN-BUILD Contract No. DB-427

I-78 ORT Construction Contract DB-427B

AP Construction, Inc. completed the installation of the safety fence along the top of the concrete barrier that separates the ORT Lanes from the Conventional Toll Plaza Lanes which completes their field work. The close out change order and final invoice were submitted to the Commission and are being processed with the project continuing to be closed out.

I-78 ORT Construction Management/Construction Inspection CM-427B

Hill International continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract. The remaining field monitoring and coordinating was associated with the installation of barrier fencing between the ORT lanes and the Toll Plaza Conventional Lane 4. The preparation of contractor's final invoice and close out/final change order is complete and both were submitted to the Commission for processing. As-built drawings were submitted and distributed to Commission Staff and the finalizing of the project documentation including the Lessons Learned Report along with the continuation of the project's close out is proceeding.

In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project DB-427C

ACS State and Local Solutions (ACS), Commission staff and STV continue to participate in bi-weekly progress meetings. As needed, ACS participates in coordination conference calls with Commission staff, STV and ETC (Customer Service Center / Violation Processing Center DBOM) to coordinate the VES implementation at the Portland – Columbia Toll Bridges and the ORT implementation at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

ACS continues to participate in bi-weekly progress meetings with all involved parties for the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge ORT project. The ORT Lane was placed into production. ACS completed the VES equipment adjustments at the Portland - Columbia Toll Bridge and Commissioning Testing is complete. The lane control gates at both the Portland – Columbia and Milford – Montague Toll Bridges were removed and the VES were placed into operations at both facilities. This completes the Conventional Toll Lane VES implementation.

ACS continues to complete preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Additionally, ACS has received partial delivery of the spare parts for the in-lane spare parts inventory. Once all items are received, Commission Staff will conduct a confirmation of the material.

<u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Design-Build-Operate-Maintain Project DB-427D</u>

Customer Service Center (CSC) operation weekly conference calls with Commission staff and ETC continue so all parties may discuss on-going and upcoming efforts, as well as issues and their resolution. ETC has participated in calls with Commission staff to coordinate the VES implementation at the Portland – Columbia Toll Bridge. With the activation of the VES at the Portland – Columbia and Milford – Montague Bridges, ETC is processing violations from these plazas. Also, with the opening of the ORT Lane ETC is processing transactions and violations from the new lane.

EASTON-PHILLIPSBURG TOLL BRIDGE REHABILITATION SCOPING/CONCEPT STUDY

DESIGN CONTRACT C-437A

This project was awarded to Pennoni Associates at the July 26, 2010 Commission meeting. A kick-off meeting was held with Pennoni on August 5, 2010 and Notice-to-Proceed was subsequently issued. Field activities including inspection and condition assessment commenced the week of September 13, 2010 and completed by the end of September 2010. A Progress Meeting was held on October 19, 2010. Pennoni submitted various draft condition/assessment reports on November 16, 2010 which were reviewed and comments provided at a December 7, 2010 Progress Meeting. Additional reports were delivered on December 23, 2010 and are currently under review by Commission staff.

A Draft Concept Study Report was submitted by Carroll Engineering, reviewed by Commission staff, and a review meeting with the Consultant was held.

As part of the review process, the Engineering staff has surveyed other E-ZPass Interagency Group members in order to gather information on other agencies' practices regarding fire protection of toll plaza tunnels housing electronic toll collection equipment. Findings were shared with the Consultant on August 13, 2010 and incorporated into the Final Report which was submitted in October.

The procurement of a final Design Consultant is expected during the first quarter of 2011.

The Design Consultant, STV, Incorporated (STV), is continuing to provide post-design services. STV is responding to Requests for Information (RFIs) from the contractors. Shop drawing reviews and comments between the designer and CM/CI are ongoing. STV participated in progress meetings for both construction contracts. STV continues to provide support in the field as needed.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-476A

Trumbull Construction Management Services, Corporation (TCMS) continues to provide construction management and construction inspection services for the two scour remediation contracts. TCMS is working out of the field office for T/TS-476A-1, located in Washington Crossing, Pennsylvania, and the field office for T/TS-476A-2, located in Easton, Pennsylvania. TCMS' services for this contract include: staffing to inspect the various work activities, preparation of contractor invoices, conducting and documenting progress and schedule meetings and the tracking of submittals, RFIs and correspondence. TCMS performed an independent safety evaluation of both construction contracts in December 2010.

KCC completed above water work at the two (2) New Hope-Lambertville bridges and all work at the Centre Bridge-Stockton Toll Supported Bridge. KCC continued to work at the Lower Trenton Toll Supported Bridge and the Calhoun Street Toll Supported Bridge in December 2010.

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T/TS-476A-2

A.P. Construction (AP) was issued Notice-to-Proceed effective September 1, 2010 for work to be performed on various bridges in Districts 2 and 3. AP continues above water and below water work at all seven bridges in their contract. AP completed all work at the Portland–Columbia Pedestrian Bridge and the Northampton Street Toll Supported Bridge in December 2010. AP continues to perform masonry repairs at the I-80 Toll Bridge structures and Riverton–Belvidere Toll Supported Bridge. All underwater work will be complete in January 2011.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

MUSSEL SURVEY Contract No. C-453B-4

Under the New Jersey Structural/Civil Task Order Agreement, T&M Associates was issued a Notice-to-Proceed effective September 7, 2010 for underwater freshwater mussel surveys and relocation work to be performed in Districts 1, 2 and 3 in support of the T/TS-476A-1 & 2 Substructure Repair and Scour Remediation Projects. T&M obtained the requisite Scientific Collection Permits to perform the surveys and relocations of endangered freshwater mussel species, as required by the construction permits. The surveys were completed in October 2010 and the NJDEP and PA Fish and Boat Commission were notified on October 13, 2010 of the found and relocated mussels. On October 22, 2010 the NJDEP gave clearance to commence construction activities. On October 28, 2010, the PAF&BC advised they received the information and no formal approval is necessary and construction could continue. The formal report was submitted to the agencies for record in November 2010. This project is complete and a final invoice will be submitted.

UNDERWATER INSPECTIONS AT SCOUR CRITICAL BRIDGES Task Order Assignment No. C-453B-5

T&M Associates was issued Notice-to-Proceed effective October 5, 2010 for Underwater Inspections at the remaining Bridges rated as Scour Critical but not included in the current scour repair contracts (T/TS-476A-1 and T/TS-476A-2) due to permitting requirements. The Kick-off Meeting was held on September 17, 2010. T&M Associates hired W.J. Castle to perform the underwater inspections, while T&M provided oversight, engineering, and reporting. The field work for the base contract was completed on October 20, 2010. T&M Associates received an assignment modification for underwater inspection and reporting services at the Pennsylvania piers of the Lower Trenton Toll Supported Bridge and Calhoun Street Toll Supported Bridge. T&M completed the inspections and submitted a draft Final report in December 2010 which is under review by Commission staff. The report will provide data for the Commission's General Engineering Consultant's input into the bridge management system (BMS2).

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-1E

This Task Order Assignment (TOA) is for Year 2 of the CPMC portion of the C-502A Contract. The expected end date for this CPMC Task Order Assignment is on or about January 31, 2011.

This TOA is a continuation of CPMC efforts throughout the CPMC Services – Year 1 (C-502A-1A) TOA. The CPMC will continue to have two (2) primary functions: to i) support the overall program development functions, and ii) provide specific resources to the individual Programs for program area management, project management and technical reviews. DESIGN MANAGEMENT CONSULTANT (DMC) SERVICES FOR THE I-95/SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

DMC TOLLING STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT & IMPLEMENTATION SUPPORT SERVICES

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2C

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 Meeting authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. This Statement of Intent, amongst other things, included the development of a strategy to implement All Electronic Cashless tolling (AECT) on the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

AECOM received a Limited Notice-to-Proceed letter was issued on May 14, 2010 effective April 26, 2010. The Limited NTP allowed work on the following tasks;

- Establishing a timeline for tolling implementation;
- Preparation of tolling applications and/or agreements with FHWA;
- · Commencing the Toll/Traffic Diversion Study;
- Preparation of the RFLOI for the Traffic and Revenue Study.

On July 26, 2010 the Commission's New Jersey Counsel, Florio Perrucci Steinhardt & Fader, L.L.C. and Pennsylvania Counsel, Fox Rothschild LLP each provided a favorable opinion as to the Commission's authority to toll the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge, with respect to the Commission's Compact. These letters of opinion from each counsel were subsequently forwarded to the FHWA. The FHWA is currently reviewing these legal opinions.

As the initial step in re-assessing the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project Environmental Assessment (EA) a Toll/Traffic Diversion Study Report was prepared by the AECOM team. The final draft of this report was submitted on August 25, 2010. AECOM briefed the Commissioners at the September 2010 Commission Committee Meeting as to the findings of the study. On December 10, 2010 the Scudder Falls Bridge Traffic Diversion Study, dated September 8, 2010 was sent out to the agencies reviewing the Addendum to the I-95/Scudder Falls Environmental Assessment. Review of this document will be concurrent with the review of the EA Addendum.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

FHWA has directed that tolling will have to be made part of the proposed action for the project and the impacts from tolling the bridge will have to be addressed as part of the current EA process. The FHWA will not issue a FONSI for the project until the impacts from tolling have been assessed. Preparation of the Toll/Traffic Diversion Study has permitted the start of the re-assessment of the EA. This re-assessment will result in an addendum to the EA, which must meet the approval of NJDEP, PADEP, and FHWA. On December 23, 2010 AECOM, and sub-consultant HNTB submitted the Draft Addendum to the I-95/Scudder Falls Environmental Assessment, and the Final 4(f) Evaluation (historical features impact) for Commission review. Commission comments have been incorporated, and on January 7, 2011 the Draft Addendum was sent out to FHWA and other agencies for review. A meeting with these agencies to discuss the schedule for obtaining a FONSI is anticipated for late January, early February.

AECOM completed coordination with Commission staff on the preparation of the RFLOI for a Level 3 (Investment Grade) Traffic and Revenue Study. AECOM is currently participating in the consultant procurement for this study, which is being performed under contract number C-549A.

DMC PROJECT DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2D

The Commission at its April 26, 2010 authorized the Executive Director to move expeditiously to accomplish the Goals and Short Term Activities enumerated in the Statement of Intent for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. This Statement of Intent, amongst other things, included the advancement of schedule-critical engineering/permitting activities to meet the objectives outlined in the Statement of Intent.

This TOA was fully executed by the Commission on July 1, 2010 and includes the necessary professional services to complete certain priority items of work that are critical to the overall schedule of the project. These priority tasks include environmental permitting; right-of-way (ROW) acquisition; archeological work necessary to obtain cultural resource clearance for the project; Stormwater Management design and permit plan preparation; and transition of key public involvement tasks from the Environmental Assessment Phase (Commission Contract C-393A) to the Design Management Consultant (DMC Contract C-502A).

In addition, this TOA includes DMC Services to support the Commission's twostep Professional Services procurement process. This process includes the preparation of a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) document and a Request for Proposal (RFP) document for Final Design and Construction Services for the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. A Draft RFQ has been prepared and is ready if/when needed. A Draft RFP is being developed at this time.

Meeting of January 31, 2011 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

Permit Pre-application Meetings have been held with the Pennsylvania DEP, USACE, NJDEP, the D&R Canal Commission, NJDEP Green Acres, the Bucks County Soil Conservation District, and the Delaware River Basin Commission, to date. A review meeting was also held with Lower Makefield Township to discuss their stormwater design requirements. Requirements of these entities will be addressed in the development of the Permit Plans, which will be submitted back to them for review and approval. AECOM submitted is preparing the DRAFT 'Pre-Application for Parkland Diversion', which includes Commission review comments. This document will ultimately be submitted to NJDEP – Green Acres Program as a result of project impacts to NJ State Park Lands for review and approval.

Field work for property surveys associated with impacted properties has been completed. Impacts to properties are being refined, along with the progression of the roadway design, and will be reflected in right-of-way plans. AECOM is preparing information outlining protocols for the right-of-way taking process. These documents will be based upon the PennDOT and NJDOT processes for each respective state.

Approval of the Phase I/II Archeological Reports, including the Phase III work plans has been received from NJ HPO and PA HPO (PHMC). The Phase III data recovery for the NJ site began in early October, and continued through December. On December 14th, AECOM Archeological staff met with an archeologist from Temple University; and on December 21st with a NJDOT representative on site. These representatives were pleased with the progress and methodology employed to date.

Work continues on the storm water design. Supplemental field survey work for natural drainage features to support the storm water drainage design and permit plan preparation has been completed. In mid-December the AECOM team received bids for drilling and testing services for the sub-surface exploration. This 'Boring Program' consists of test pits and geotechnical borings to obtain sub-surface data necessary to support the storm water management design. A NTP was issued to Converse Consultants for this work that will be managed by KSE, a sub-consultant to AECOM. This Program has been coordinated with the DOT's of each state.

AECOM continues to perform Public Involvement activities, which consist of responding to questions from the public on the project Hot Line.

COMPACT AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT DEPARTMENT December 2010

General

During the December Commissioners committee meeting, the CAI director made a presentation to the Commissioners regarding the latest applications and changes of scope of work received during the month of November. Due to the one year blanket extension of the deadline of December 31, 2010 to December 31, 2011 that the Commissioners approved for the completion of the pending CAI projects and to the inclement weather during the month of December, many of the municipalities that were struggling to complete their projects in 2010, extended them to the Spring of 2011.

The CAI department continued processing grantees reimbursement requests, and monitoring the status of the projects under construction, as well as reviewing plans, change orders and contract agreements specifications, and managing CAI project coordination with the municipalities.

Pennsylvania

- 1. **Milford Borough, PA** During the past month, the Borough awarded the construction contact for the *Storm Water Restoration Project* to Leeward Construction in the amount of \$127,725.00. As previously mentioned, the original scope of the project included four (4) separate work areas within the Borough. However, since the total low bid that was received for all four (4) work areas exceeded the Borough's grant construction budget, the Borough decided to eliminate one of the work areas. It is anticipated that the construction contract between the Borough and Leeward Construction will be finalized during the month of January. However, due to the closing of the asphalt plants, the Borough has indicated that the contractor will not proceed with construction until there are warmer weather conditions for the asphalt work to be completed. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed by late Spring 2011.
- 2. **Smithfield Township, PA** The Township continues to make progress on completing the plans and specifications for the *Intermunicipal Trail Project* in order to obtain the necessary permits from the County Conservation District, the Pennsylvania Historical Museum Commission (PHMC) and the PA Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) to complete the project. Due to the blanket extension that was granted for the CAI projects, the Township's extension request was approved. It is currently anticipated that the project will be completed in the Spring of 2011.

The Township has indicated that the construction of the original Pedestrian Improvements project is complete and a final inspection has been completed by PennDOT. However, written documentation from PennDOT indicating that they have accepted the modified work is still forthcoming from the Township.

3. **Delaware Water Gap Borough, PA** – After several changes to the intended scope of work on this grant, the Borough decided to pursue the repaving of six (6) streets within the Borough including Waring Drive, Oak Street, Parkway Drive, Croasdale Drive, Walnut Lane and Shepard Avenue. The CAI department nor the due diligence engineer received any information, plans, specs, or cost estimates for the project prior to the construction. Since the Borough did not receive approval from the Commission for the revised scope prior to the completion of the project, a meeting was held between the Borough and the CAI department on January 4, 2011. At the meeting the Borough presented the history of the project and the CAI department notified the Borough that additional documentation is required to present to the Commissioners for the approval of the project prior to the reimbursement of any grant funds. The Borough has also indicated that they will attend the January Commissioners meeting to discuss the project.

The Borough has indicated that the *Broad Street Sidewalk Improvements Project* is complete, but a final inspection by PennDOT still remains to be completed. As previously mentioned, the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project* was completed in August 2009.

- 4. **Portland Borough, PA** The Borough submitted a revised application, in the amount of \$153,782.66 for *Streetscape Improvements on State Street and Delaware Avenue*, in the hope that the project will be reconsidered by the Commissioners for funding. The revised application is a scaled-down version of their original application, which was submitted in the amount of \$515,701.40. The revised application meets the CAI criteria, but has not been awarded to date. The two other CAI funded projects have been completed. Closeout of the *Park & Walk* grant is currently in process by the CAI department.
- 5. **Lower Mount Bethel, PA** During the month of December, Kobalt Construction continued work on the *Park & Ride Trail Project*. Due to the closing of the asphalt plants, the Township has indicated that the paving work for the project will be completed in the Spring when there are warmer weather conditions.
- 6. **Easton, PA** In December the City of Easton made significant improvements with their CAI projects. Last month the City awarded three additional contracts for its Waterfront Improvements Grant. A preconstruction meeting for the Street Light Improvement Project will be held on January 10, 2011. The scope of this project includes replacement of street lights and associated work on Bushkill Street from Larry Holmes Drive to 4th Street, N. Third Street from Church Street to College Avenue, and all of College Avenue. This is part of the CAI downtown Streetscape Project which involves sidewalk, curb and ADA ramp installations. Additionally, the Larry Holmes Drive Streetscape Improvement, which extended improvements to the 3rd Street intersection, and the Decorative Streetlight Improvement Project, which involves replacing existing streetlights in the downtown area. These projects were to be completed by the end of 2010, but Easton requested an extension until the spring of 2011.

Pennsylvania (continued)

The City of Easton continues its work on Riverside Park and Scott Park projects. Alternate bids for additional improvement work was submitted by the City of Eaton for work on Commission's property (on Snyder Street and in the adjacent area of this project) that the Commission has decided not to pursue now due to the anticipated reconstruction project on the EP Route 22 Toll Bridge.

The construction contracts for Phases 1 and 2 of the *Waterfront Improvements* project have been ongoing through the summer and fall months. This includes a "road diet" for Larry Holmes Drive, high visibility pedestrian crosswalks, intersection improvements at Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive to improve pedestrian accommodation, along with a sewer line connection from the Commission's Construction of the ADA Curb Ramps and Decorative Crosswalks, which is part of the *Pedestrian Pathways/Intersection Enhancements and Northampton St. Bridge Bike Path* grant, was completed in September 2009. The City has also purchased and installed the materials for the Bike Path Extension. The curbs and sidewalks abutting the Northampton Street Bridge have been reconstructed. The change order submitted to the CAI department to add new lighting poles in the Scott Park area of the project was approved and completed.

7. **Williams Township, PA** – The *I-78 & Morgan Hill Road Interchange Traffic Signalization Project* was completed in January 2010. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township. The Township is currently in the process of preparing their final reimbursement request submission to the CAI department for the project.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted six (6) applications that were discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but have not been awarded to date. We would also note that it was previously determined that the Belmont Street Reconstruction and the Hilton Street Improvements projects did not satisfy the required characteristics of the CAI program as they could not be completed by the December 31, 2010 deadline; however, since an extension has been granted, these projects can be reevaluated.

- 8. **Riegelsville Borough, PA** During the month of December, the contractor for the *Delaware Canal Footbridge Lighting Project*, Yates Electrical Service, began construction on the project. It is currently anticipated that project construction will be completed in February 2011.
- 9. **Solebury Township, PA** The construction of the *Walton Drive Bridge Replacement Project* is complete. As previously discussed, project construction included the alternate #2 paving work, which was a change of scope approved at the September Commissioners meeting, to repave the entire length of Walton Drive. The Township's engineer has indicated that there have been several construction change orders on the project. Back-up documentation for the change orders has recently been received and is currently under review by the CAI department to determine if the change orders are eligible for reimbursement under the grant.

Construction of the *Route 202 Trail and Park* project began on August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and was completed in September 2009. To date, \$1,485,432.04 of \$1,755,150.00 has been reimbursed by the CAI Department (85%).

10. **New Hope Borough, PA** – The Borough has purchased the lighting fixtures and poles through the COSTARS program for the *Main St. Bridge Lighting Project*. The contractor for the installation of the lighting fixtures, Armour & Sons Electric, continues to work on the project. It is currently anticipated that the project construction will be completed in February 2011.

The construction of the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals Project* by Armour & Sons Electric is substantially complete. However, the construction of the ADA compliant pedestrian facilities required by PennDOT still remains to be completed. The Borough has indicated that construction of the ADA ramps will begin once final approval of the ramp designs has been received by PennDOT. To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$412,798.75 of \$446,404.00 (92% of total grant amount).

11. **Falls Township, PA** – The original traffic signal installation and modernization project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award.

In the Spring of 2010, the Township submitted another application for the *Tyburn Road & New Falls Road Traffic Signal Upgrade Project*, in the amount of \$108,140.00. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but has not been awarded to date.

12. **Upper Makefield Township, PA** – The Township continues to make progress on preparing the bid package required to complete *Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 Project*. It is currently anticipated that the project will be advertised for bids this month and be completed in February 2011.

The Washington Crossing Gateway Project was completed in the Spring of 2010. To date the Township has been reimbursed \$1,447,000.00 of \$1,447,000.00 (100% of total grant amount).

13. Lower Makefield, PA – The contractor for the Black Rock Pedestrian Trail Project, S&H Landscaping, continued work on the project during the month of December. The Township's engineer has indicated that there have been several change orders on the project. The CAI department is currently reviewing the change orders to determine if they are eligible for reimbursement under the grant.

The Traffic Signal project at the intersection of Yardley-Newtown Rd & Creamery Rd is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission and the original grant is closed out.

14. **Bristol Borough, PA** – The construction of the *Traffic Signals Revitalization Project* was completed by Armour & Sons Electric in July 2009 and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$1,333,843.28 of \$1,334,450.00 grant (99.9% of total grant amount).

In the Spring of 2010, the Borough submitted another application for the *Decorative Crosswalks Project*, in the amount of \$423,126.12. This application was considered at past Commissioners meetings, but has not been awarded to date.

15. **Yardley, PA** – The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough for its *Yardley Borough Road Improvements Project* and the project has been closed out.

The Borough of Yardley in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization submitted an application to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, and Morrisville Borough in the amount of \$872,969.00. This application has been discussed at past Commissioners meetings, but was not awarded.

16. Morrisville, PA – The construction work in Morrisville Municipal Authority CAI project on the Moreau Street Rehabilitation project is progressing well in spite of inclement weather. Recently, the MMA representatives have indicated that the project is under budget by nearly \$70,000 and would like to request an extension of work onto another road.

The Bridge Street Curb and Sidewalk replacement project is still completing its engineering design work. However, the four originally funded projects in Morrisville are completed.

New Jersey

- 1. Montague, NJ The relocation of the emergency heliport from the Park & Ride location has been completed. The construction of the Park & Ride was to begin the week of October 25 and is scheduled to be completed by the end of November 2010. The projects have been completed and only a few punchlist items are pending.
- 2. Knowlton, NJ The Township is proud to announce that The Paulinskill Trail extension has been completed! The underpass is a wonderful addition to the community. Hikers and bikers from New Jersey and Pennsylvania will now be able to link the Paulinskill Trail to the Columbia/Portland pedestrian bridge and enjoy the beautiful scenery along the Delaware and Paulinskill Rivers.
- Belvidere, NJ The Water Street Improvements project was completed and closed out in May of 2010. In May the final reimbursement request has been processed and the project is in the process of being closed out.

4. **Phillipsburg, NJ** – The second phase of the project started construction in May. The sidewalk, road reconstruction, and lighting part of the project was completed, only pending part of this job are the trees planting and few punch list items. The agreement for the Extension of South Main Street project Phase 3 is next, and the municipality requested a project completion extension until the Spring of 2010. This project was awarded a grant for \$997,962 at the Commissioners' February meeting. The CAI department continues to process the reimbursement requests for this project. No major progress on this project was reported during December

The original, Phase I project, was completed and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008.

- 5. Pohatcong NJ A new application was received by the CAI Department for Resurfacing of River Road. This application was presented to the Commissioners at their February 2010 meeting. This request was not awarded. The two granted projects to Pohatcong Township have been completed.
- 6. **Holland, NJ** Holland was awarded a CAI grant for the resurfacing of Mt. Joy Road and has requested an extension for the work to be completed by the spring of 2011.

Holland completed and was fully paid for its previous CAI project. This project is in the process of being closed out.

7. **Milford, NJ** –The Borough was awarded a grant for the repair and resurfacing of Honeysuckle Lane off Bridge Street. The Borough's staff is working on completing the final designs for this The Borough is ready to go to bid on Honeysuckle Lane. All comments for NJDOT have been addressed and the following schedule is proposed: Advertise for bids - Starting the week of November 29th. Open bids - Thursday December 16th at 11am at Borough Hall. The municipality has requested an extension until the Spring 2011 to complete this project.

The Bridge Street Improvements project is complete.

8. **Frenchtown, NJ** – Since no major development has been noted for over 2 years regarding the acquisition of the property for the Village Green Park, the CAI department met with Mayor Ron Sworen to discuss the disposition of this project. Since this meeting the Mayor has submitted a new application for resurfacing and pedestrian improvements of Bridge St., Race St. and South Harrison Street. This new application is being reviewed by the due diligence engineer and appears to meet the requirements of the CAI program. The application was presented to the commissioners at their December's meeting. A resolution will be introduce for the commissioners consideration at their January meeting.

The Park and Ride project is complete.

Lambertville, NJ – The CAI department is working with members of the City's staff to gather
the needed information to close out several completed projects, such as the Swan Street Traffic
Signal, Quarry Street, Ferry Street, Kline's Court, Jefferson Street, Blair Tract and Mount Hope
Street.

In November the CAI department also received a City's request for \$12,000 to complete a preliminary design of the South Franklin Street Drainage project. The City indicated that, if approved by DRJTBC, the funds will be drawn from excess funds available from other completed CAI funded projects. This request was presented to the commissioners at their December meeting.

The City also requested an extension for the Perry St. Road Reconstruction project until the Spring of 2011. The other outstanding projects: Delevan Street Rd. Reconstruction project, McGreary's Alley Reconstruction project, and South Franklin Street Traffic calming project are under construction.

The City of Lambertville has completed eight projects since the beginning of the CAI program.

- Stockton, NJ The funded CAI projects for the Bridge Street Improvements project is completed. The municipality received a transportation construction project award for its CAI project.
- 11. **West Amwell, NJ** The Township submitted two additional applications: The reconstruction of Old York Road Section II for \$285,000. These applications were presented to the commissioners at their December meeting, but no action was taken on them. The application for *Rocktown Hill Road Improvement Project* to the approach to the intersection of Route 31 was approved for \$100,000 by the Commissioners at their January 25, 2010 meeting. This project is in construction and progressing well. Due to inclement weather the Township requested an extension to complete this project in the Spring of 2011.

The Section 11 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project is now completed. The Section 12 and Section 13 Road Reconstruction project are also completed. Reimbursement requests continue to be processed for sections 12, and 13 of the completed projects.

12. Delaware Twp, NJ – The Township received a new grant for the Improvements and Resurfacing of Federal Twist Rd. and to install drainage improvements and erosion control within the existing road right of way. Maser Consulting Engineering is working on the design of this project.

The Previous CAI projects were completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out the projects. The municipality has made a request to utilize the remainder of their grant to chip seal the grant project and the Due Diligent engineer is still working with the municipality to ascertain the CAI qualification of this additional project cost.

- 13. **Hopewell, NJ** The Township was approved for a grant application for the design and construction of sidewalk replacement in the Village of Titusville. This application was awarded a grant by the Commissioners at their April 2010 meeting. The Township requested an extension until the spring of 2011 to complete this project. No major progress was made in this project during this month.
 - The ADA Ramps and Walkway project was complete. The CAI department is in the process of closing out of the project.
- 14. **Ewing, NJ** The Township was awarded a grant Wilburtha Rd. Improvement project. The project was awarded in October 2010 and requested an extension to complete it by the Spring of 2011. No major progress was made in this project during this month.
- 15. **Trenton, NJ** –The CAI Director and Mr. Frank Tolotta sent a letter requesting a meeting to discuss the status of this project with the City of Trenton's Mayor Tony Mack. A conference call was held on December 13, 2010 and an update of the project status was given by the new person in charged, Henrietta Owusu, director of Housing and Economic Development. It appears that the project is still on schedule to be completed by October 2011. EACOM engineers are prepared to advertise the project by January and start construction soon after. A reimbursement request for design work in the amount of \$464,971.85 was received by the CAI department on December 14th and the due diligence engineer is reviewing it.
- 16. Alpha NJ The Alpha's and Pohatcong's Reconstruction of Edge Rd. project has been completed and is in the process of being closed out.
- 17. **Kingwood, NJ** The Township's Reconstruction of Tumble Falls Road was awarded a grant for \$373,000.00 and the contract agreement has been executed. The project has been awarded and is and most of the construction was completed by December 31, 2010. Most of the construction work especially the roadway repaving, is being done by municipal forces.
