ROLL CALL

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting called the roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being three members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and four members present from the State of New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF VICE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Lavery welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the public on items pertaining to today's Agenda. No questions were presented.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, addressed the meeting and said;

"A series of proposed toll adjustments and the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project will be the primary focus of today's meeting;

"On the tolling front, we are presenting Commissioners with a proposed toll schedule for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge as well as an additional adjustment in the current toll schedule for the Commission's seven existing toll bridges. These toll proposals were advertised in early July and posted on the Commission website. Testimony subsequently was gathered at six public hearings—two in each operating district (each taking place on opposite sides of the river). Additional public comments on the proposals were received through email, our

website portal and the postal service A draft report summarizing the collected testimony and comments was compiled and provided to the Commissioners more than 10 days ago This process of notification, comment collection and review was executed in accordance with the Commission's 2013 Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy Subsequently, a resolution has been prepared and placed on today's meeting agenda for consideration by the Commissioners;

"The toll proposals are:

- A full schedule of tolls to be charged in the southbound direction at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge once its upstream span opens to traffic and its corresponding all-electronic toll (AET) system has been successfully implemented, tested, and made operational -- currently anticipated to occur early in 2019;
- Clarification of the cash toll rate for Recreational Vehicles (RVs) with a car or trailer in tow also expected to take effect at our seven existing toll bridges on or about March 2017

"The Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge toll schedule needs to be established now so we can secure the financing for the upcoming construction project. This includes a bond issue that we expect to pursue in early 2017 and a \$100 million contribution of reserve funds that will enable us to tamp down toll rates at the new bridge as much as possible. The other toll adjustment being proposed today is independent of the Scudder Falls project. The resulting revenues from these changes will help fund the continued operation and maintenance of the Commission's existing bridge system;

"Moving to other agenda items, we have a series of resolutions to create three pools of legal, banking and advisory firms to shepherd the financing for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project and any subsequent needs for the life of the pools:

- One pool would consist of qualified investment banks to provide bond underwriting and other bond-related services;
- Another would consist of qualified law firms to provide bond and disclosure counsel services:
- A final pool would consist of firms to serve as the Commission's general financial advisor and/or as transaction financial advisor with a specific Commission bond issue

"An additional resolution after consultation with the Commissioners would authorize negotiation of scope and fees with the firms from the respective pools to handle the Scudder Falls project's bond issue. These negotiations and firm selections would be conducted in consultation with the Commissioners, determining the team of firms to lead the bond-issue process as well as additional firms needed to complete the underwriting structure;

"Moving to the Scudder Falls project's non-financial preparations, today's agenda includes a resolution that would authorize the negotiation of scope and fees for purposes of determining the project's construction management firm. An RFP for these services was posted June 7 and the proposals received in July have been reviewed using a Technical Evaluation process. This professional services work will involve a wide variety of oversight tasks, including establishing and monitoring the project schedule and construction progress, administering invoicing and payments, and providing resident engineers to supervise the project's field inspectors. Our goal is to provide a negotiated contract proposal on these services for Commissioner's consideration at the October Commission meeting. Another project-related item on today's agenda is a memorandum of agreement for the New Jersey portion of the pedestrian/bicycle facility that is to be constructed on the new bridge. This document lays out the responsibilities for the construction, operation and maintenance of the New Jersev access to the Ped/Bike ramp. In addition to the Commission, the other parties in the MOA are the New Jersey Department of Transportation, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and the New Jersey Water Supply Authority;

"A final project item on today's agenda would authorize the purchase of a private residential parcel adjacent to the Lower Makefield park-and-ride property the Commission recently acquired to serve as the location of a new administration building. This parcel has logistical significance because it will enable us to provide the public with a direct and safe connecting route from the park-and-ride lot to the nearby Delaware Canal towpath corresponding access ramp to the new bridge's bike-ped facility;

"Many other project preparations have advanced in the field and in the design process since the Commission's last meeting two months ago. The review and approval of the project's final design documents were completed on September 7th. A week later, on September 13, the project was put out to bid on our website with corresponding legal advertisements in area newspapers and notifications to the contracting community. Work on the noise-abatement walls along the I-95 approach to the Scudder Falls Bridge in Lower Makefield also has progressed during summer months with surveying, land-clearing, erosion and sedimentation control, drainage installation and foundation construction alongside designated portions of the highway's northbound and southbound lanes;

"The first noise panels were delivered and put into place last week;

"Meanwhile, the installation of bird-mitigation netting beneath the current Scudder Falls Bridge is expected to begin next Monday evening;

"And lastly – but by no means least – stage two of the advance tree cutting for the project is poised to get underway next week after the Indiana bat foraging season moratorium draws to a close on October 1;

"We're on a tight schedule, but we're determined to wrap up these advance activities in the spring of 2017, so that major construction work can begin on the Scudder Falls Replacement Project, we will continue to provide further updates in the months and years to come;

"Thank you Mr. Chairman, this concludes my report."

APPROVAL OF MINUTES FOR COMMISSION MEETING HELD JULY 18, 2016

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 26th day of September, 2016, that the Minutes of the Regular Commission Meeting held on June 27, 2016 be and the same hereby are approved."

Chairman Lavery then invited any questions on the Resolution. No questions were presented and the Resolution was unanimously adopted.

APPROVAL OF OPERATIONS REPORT FOR THE MONTHS OF JULY AND AUGUST 2016

R: 3034-09-16- ADM-02-09-16

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and asked if there were any questions on any of the reports contained in the "Operations Report".

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Janvey moved and Commissioner Siptroth seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 26th day of September, 2016, that the Operations Report, which reflects Commission activity for the months of July and August, 2016 are hereby approved."

Chairman Lavery then invited any questions on the Resolution. No questions were presented and the Resolution was unanimously adopted.

APPROVAL OF TOLL ADJUSTMENT

R: 3035-09-16- ADM-03-09-16

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and asked the Commission Members if, after their review, there were any questions.

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Van Vliet moved and Commissioner Janvey seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"WHEREAS: the Commission's administration has advanced two proposed toll adjustments to the Commissions consisting of (1.) a full schedule of tolls to be charged at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge upon conversion to a tolled facility with an all-electronic toll collection system at a yet-to-be determined date in 2019; and (2.) clarification of the cash toll rate for Recreational Vehicles (RVs) with a car or trailer in tow at the Commission's seven existing toll bridges; and

"WHEREAS: public notice of these two proposed toll adjustments were posted on the Commission website on July 8, 2016 and advertised in New Jersey and Pennsylvania newspapers in the same manner in which the Commission's regular monthly meetings are advertised, as stipulated in the Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy adopted by the Commission on July 29, 2013; and

"WHEREAS: the website posting and applicable newspaper advertisements appeared at least 10 days prior to each respective hearing date as stipulated in the Commission's 2013 Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy; and

"WHEREAS: the proposed toll adjustments have remained on the Commission website until consideration by the Board of Commissioners as stipulated in the Commission's 2013 Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy; and

"WHEREAS: six public hearings – with two hearings (one in each of Pennsylvania and New Jersey) in each of the Commissions three districts were conducted with appropriate Commissioner representation as stipulated in the Commission's 2013 Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy; and

- "WHEREAS: the Commission also accepted public comment via email, web application or mail as stipulated in the Commission's 2013 Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy; and
- "WHEREAS: a written summary of hearing testimony and other public comments was provided to the Board of Commissioners prior to consideration of this resolution as stipulated in the Commission's 2013 Toll Adjustment Public Hearing and Comment Policy; and
- "WHEREAS: the Commission has previously determined that the minimum targeted cash balance of the Commission should be the greater of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000.00) or fifteen (15%) percent of the Commission's then current outstanding principal indebtedness (the "Minimum Balance"); and
- "WHEREAS: after sufficient investigation and study into the matter, the Commission has determined that in order to maintain the Credit Rating, the optimal targeted debt service coverage shall be equal to or greater than 1.50 times annual debt service for each year bonds are outstanding (the "Target Coverage Ratio"); and
- "WHEREAS: after sufficient investigation and study into the matter, the Commission hereby clarifies that a uniform toll rate will be charged at the Commission's seven existing toll bridges whenever a recreational vehicle has a trailer or vehicle in tow, regardless of whether payment is made electronically through E-ZPass or manually with cash, and reaffirms the rate established in the Commission's 2011 toll adjustment is Four Dollars (\$4.00) per axle (the "Truck Tolls") as more particularly set forth in the attached Toll Table (the "Toll Table"); and
- "WHEREAS: this clarification is intended to ensure that the toll rates currently being applied in electronic toll transactions for RVs with trailers and vehicles in tow also are applied to cash transactions involving the same vehicle combinations; and
- "WHEREAS: the combined weight of an RV with a trailer or vehicle in tow causes higher levels of stress in a bridge's components; and
- "WHEREAS: this change also conforms with prevailing tolling industry practices and is in step with the policies of the region's other toll systems such as the Pennsylvania and New Jersey Turnpikes, the Delaware River Port Authority (DRPA), the Delaware River and Bay Authority (DRBA), and the South Jersey Transportation Authority (SJTA), among others; and
- **"WHEREAS:** this adjustment in the Commission's current toll schedule shall take effect only upon completion of installation and testing of the next-generation in-lane toll collection system for cash and E-ZPass transactions at the Commission's seven existing toll bridges with the resulting revenues being used to help fund the continued operation and maintenance of the Commission's existing system of seven toll bridges and 13 toll-supported bridges; and

"WHEREAS: after extensive, deliberate and thorough preparations, the Commission plans to help finance its Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project with an additional bond issue that the Commission anticipates to issue in 2017, and

"WHEREAS: in order to proceed, the Commission must establish a schedule of tolls to be charged at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge, and

"WHEREAS: the rates for this new bridge were formulated based on the findings of a Level 3 Investment Grade Traffic and Revenue Study, the cost projections from the project's final design consultant engineers, and other extensive financial analysis; and

"WHEREAS: a significant portion of available cash reserves will be used to tamp down the respective toll rates for this replacement bridge as much as possible; and

"WHEREAS: after sufficient investigation and study into the matter, the Commission has concluded that the appropriate amount to be charged for each passenger vehicle crossing southbound on the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge will be One Dollar, Twenty Five Cents (\$1.25) (the "Auto E-ZPass Toll") and Two Dollars Sixty Cents (\$2.60) (the "Auto Toll-by-Plate Toll"), as set forth in the attached Toll Table; and

"WHEREAS: the Commission has further determined that the appropriate amount to be charged for light trucks (two-axle trucks, buses and other vehicles eight feet or above in height) crossing southbound on the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge will be Seven Dollars (\$7.00) (the "Light Truck E-ZPass Toll") and Eight Dollars Thirty Five Cents (\$8.35) (the "Light Truck Toll-by-Plate Toll"), as set forth in the attached Toll Table; and

"WHEREAS: the Commission has further determined that the appropriate amount to be charged for heavy trucks, buses and other vehicles with three or more axles per crossing southbound on the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge will be Four Dollars Twenty Five Cents (\$4.25) per axle (the "Heavy Truck E-ZPass Toll") and Four Dollars Seventy Five Cents (\$4.75) (the "Heavy Truck Toll-by-Plate Toll"), as set forth in the attached Toll Table; and

"WHEREAS: the Commission has further determined that its frequent commuter discount program for customers who use a Commission-affiliated E-ZPass passenger-vehicle transponder (a transponder issued by the Commission's E-ZPass back-office service provider – the New Jersey E-ZPass Group) to pay for passage at Commission toll bridges shall be extended to the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge; and

"WHEREAS: this discount program provides an automatic 40-percent reduction on the E-ZPass toll rate when 16 or more trips are recorded per month on a respective Commission-affiliated E-ZPass transponder, allowing for a 75-cent commuter discount toll at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge (the "Auto Commuter Discount"), as set forth in the attached Toll Table; and

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION (DRJTBC) C-662A, PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT SERVICES 2016 TOLL HEARINGS SUMMARY

This report presents a summary of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission's (DRJTBC) toll hearings, associated public outreach activities and comments received in connection with a series of proposed toll adjustments proposed by Commission staff for consideration by the Board of Commissioners at their September 26, 2016 meeting.

SUMMARY OF HEARING/COMMENT PROCESS

On July 8, 2016 the DRJTBC initiated a three-day rollout of a proposed toll schedule for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge and two narrowly defined adjustments in the current toll schedule for the Commission's seven existing toll bridges. The rollout consisted of proposed rate tables posted on the Commission's website on July 8 and legal advertisements in the newspapers used for official Commission meeting announcements – as required under the toll adjustment public hearing/comment policy adopted by the Commission on July 29, 2013. The official notice and proposed rate actions shall remain on the agency website until Commission action occurs – another 2013 toll policy stipulation.

The proposed toll actions include:

- A full schedule of tolls to be charged at the Scudder Falls (I-95) Replacement Bridge upon conversion to a tolled facility with an all-electronic toll collection system in the southbound direction beginning in early 2019;
- An adjustment in the cash and E-ZPass toll rates for two-axle vehicles less than eight-feet high
 with more than four wheels to be charged at the Commission's seven existing toll bridges:
 Trenton-Morrisville (Route 1); New Hope-Lambertville (Route 202); I-78; Easton-Phillipsburg
 (Route 22); Portland-Columbia; Delaware Water Gap (I-80); and Milford-Montague (Route 206);
- A clarification of the cash toll rates for recreational vehicles with a car or trailer in tow at the Commission's seven existing toll bridges. (Currently, RVs with a car or trailer in tow are being charged cash rates that can range anywhere from \$3 to as much as \$9 less than what is being charged in an E-ZPass transaction.)

Although not required under the Commission's toll hearing and comment policy, additional outreach was conducted to generate public awareness of the proposed tolling actions and the hearing/comment process. In District 1, this included direct letters to public officials, project stakeholders, and concerned motorists and residents as previously identified in hearings and public involvement activities for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. In District 2, this included direct letters to public officials, project stakeholders and concerned motorists and residents previously identified in public involvement activities for major capital projects at the I-78 Toll Bridge, Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge, the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge, the Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge and the Milford-Montague Toll Bridge. Updated public official contact lists for the two states as compiled by the Commission's Community Affairs Department also were utilized. A total of 247 direct letters were mailed.

A series of press releases also were issued to generate advance coverage of the impending hearings and subsequent articles about the proposed toll changes. Media coverage included daily newspapers, weekly newspapers, some television, radio, internet postings and social media outlets.

To further advance public awareness of the Commission's tolling plans, press releases were issued to promote the placement of the educational video on the all-electronic toll collections system that will be used at the replacement bridge beginning in 2019; these releases made reference to the proposed toll schedules and hearing process. Viewing of the online video – two videos – now exceeds 500 views. This video will continue to be promoted over the next couple years in advance of the anticipated early 2019 start of all-electronic tolling in the southbound direction on the first completed span of the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

As an additional public notification measure, the proposed Scudder Falls toll schedule, District 1 toll hearings and corresponding public comment process were prominently featured on the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project website – www.scudderfallsbridge.com. (These postings are a required element of the 2013 toll hearing and comment policy.) All related press releases also were posted on that site along with links to the public notice and proposed toll rate schedule and toll adjustment pages on the Commission's website.

As provided under the Commission's public hearing and comment policy for proposed toll actions, two hearings were scheduled and held in each of the Commission's three geographic operating districts (one each in Pennsylvania and New Jersey), for a total of six (6) hearings.

At the District 1 locations, each hearing was preceded by an open house to provide attendees with information about the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, in addition to the proposed toll structure. At the District 2 and District 3 locations, Commission staff members were made available before the hearings to answer questions regarding the proposed toll structure.

At each location, meeting attendees were provided informational handouts and offered the opportunity to view display boards. Each District 1 event also included a station where attendees could view videos about the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge project and the new bridge's all-electronic toll (AET) collection system.

Residents, motorists, stakeholders and elected officials attended the DRJTBC's six toll hearings. A court stenographer attended each hearing to take verbal testimony. Comment cards were provided at each location for individuals who may have preferred to submit testimony privately or by mail after the hearing's close.

Specific goals of the events in District 1 were:

- Obtain feedback from the public on the proposed toll schedule for subsequent consideration and action by the members of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission;
- Share the details of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project with residents, public officials and stakeholders; and
- Describe the new all-electronic tolling system at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

Specific goals of the events in Districts 2 and 3:

- Obtain feedback from the public on the proposed toll schedule for subsequent consideration and action by the members of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission; and
- Share the details of the proposed toll schedule with residents, public officials and stakeholders.

(For the record, all of the proposed toll actions were presented at all six hearing sites to fulfill the requirements of the Commission's 2013 toll adjustment policy hearing and comment policy.)

In accordance with the Commission's 2013 toll adjustment hearings and comment policy, public comment also was accepted by U.S. Mail, through the "Contact Us" portal on the Commission's website and via email to a web address – communityaffairs@drjtbc.org – that was created for the purpose of collecting public comment on the proposed toll actions.

The deadline for submitting comments was set for Monday, August 29, 2016. As was the case in other recent Commission-orchestrated public comment periods, the submission deadline was extended – in this case to Tuesday, September 6, 2016.

Comments/testimony were recorded for the public record only from individuals who provided names and addresses as verification of authenticity. Anonymous comments are not a part of this public record.

SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY/COMMENTS

Hearings and Testimony

- Six toll hearings as required under Commission's 2013 toll adjustment public comment process completed.
 - Total signed-in attendance at the hearings = 48 individuals
 - Six people provided verbal testimony at the six hearings
 - Five comment cards were submitted at the six hearings

Comment Process

- 22 comments were received through the Commission's Community Affairs Department email address communityaffairs@dritbc.org. (17 qualified for inclusion/response by providing names and addresses.)
- 18 comments were received through the "Contact Us" portal on the home page of the Commission's website <u>www.drjtbc.org</u>. (Note: For this toll hearing/comment process, a URL friendly address was established for the portal – <u>www.drjtbc.org/comment</u>)
- Two letters were sent to the Community Affairs Department via U.S. Mail. One letter was sent to the Commission (Joe Donnelly) outside of the prescribed instructions for the proposed toll adjustment public comment process.
- Two individuals submitted comments through both the Community Affairs email address and the Commission website comment portal.
- Five of the 40 comments received electronically during the process came from individuals who did not respond to follow-up identification requests. Two of these communications were requests for no tolls on the replacement bridge and a third was for computation of the E-ZPass commuter discount on a perfamily basis instead of a per-transponder basis. (Both of these issues were cited by other commenters.) A fourth was of an inquiry about whether tolls would be charged in one direction or both. The fifth was a declaration to forgo driving in New Jersey and Pennsylvania, replete with a profanity. Because of the lack of additional identifying information, these comments are not included among the full listing of testimony and comments later in this report.
- An additional communication from a Lower Makefield charter bus company executive was received after the comment-period deadline and has been added to this report.

Summation of Public Input

Proposed Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge Toll Schedule

- Expressions of opposition to any tolling on the replacement bridge
 - Crossing has always been "free" and should remain without tolls
 - Do the project only after saving up all funds to carry out the project
 - Area residents should drive toll free or receive local discount
- Extend the commuter discount to transponders/accounts issued by the PA Turnpike
- Apply the Commission's E-ZPass Commuter Discount Program on a per-account basis, not a per-transponder basis
- The proposed \$2.60 toll-by-plate rate is excessive
 - Not everyone wants to use E-ZPass
- Concerns about tolling causing diversion to other bridges
 - Washington Crossing Bridge was most often cited recipient of diverted traffic

Dual-Wheel Rear-Axle Pickup Trucks (Dualies)

- Commission should keep classifying dualies as pickup trucks
 - Some use these vehicles for commuting/personal purposes
 - Only two more wheels rate unjustified
 - A 550-percent increase
- Will hurt commerce in the Pike County region

Perhaps the Commission --- I know I shouldn't be able to say this but other channels that the public hearing might keep that in mind. And aside from that, the fact that this project is going to clear up the mess that makes for the entry ramp on the New Jersey side from 29 and I-95 is a big plus. The bicycle/pedestrian ramp is a big plus. The toll seems quite justified overall. Thank you. Staff The current functionally obsolete Scudder Falls Bridge was constructed in 1959 with 50 percent federal highway funds (not part of Response the Interstate Highway System), 25 percent New Jersey funds, and 25 percent Pennsylvania funds. The two states transferred their joint ownership of the bridge to the Commission on July 1, 1987. Tollpayers at the Commission's seven existing toll crossings have shouldered the maintenance, operation and repair costs of the bridge ever since. Tolling will be needed on the replacement bridge to pay the costs of constructing the replacement structure and to help fund the future operating, maintenance, repair and capital improvement costs of the Commission's entire bridge system, including the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

Judi Reiss Lower Makefield, PA Township supervisor Lower Makefield hearing	Good evening. I'm Judy Reiss. I'm a Lower Makefield Supervisor and I'm a resident of Lower Makefield for over 40 years. I also want to thank the Commission. I think I can speak for all of us. It was very difficult for us to deal with the sale of the park and ride. It was wonderful that you were so agreeable to almost everything we really wanted for our community. We understood your needs and I think you understood our desires. So I appreciate what you've done. I think the issue was signed last night and I think we're good. And I think you've answered one of my questions about the commuter rate. It is all of the bridges. It's not just using one. That was one question that my people had. Is there any chance in my lifetime that we'll pay this bridge off? And the other question really was the tolls. Staff Response	With respect to the question of paying off the bridge, the terms of bond financing for this multi-faceted project have yet to be determined. That said, the debt-service targets for carrying out the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project are to be paid by the tolls collected at the new Scudder Falls facility. After retirement of the bond proceeds, it's envisioned that tolling will remain in place at the new facility to help fund the continuing operation, maintenance, repair and capital improvements to the agency's tolled and nontoll facilities, including the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge.

We had to make model bridges and put weight on them. I also was a welding instructor who did a lot of design for building trailers, ramps, footbridges. I also have undergraduate degree in engineering, so I thought I would be a good candidate to be on the bridge commission and add a lot of good things. I had a young lady out there ask me if, you know, if -- am I in public office. No, I'm not in public office now. Back in 2010, I wasn't -- I was in public office, but I was in public office prior to that. So basically I just think the toll increase is wrong. I don't think you need it. I think people at the top sometimes polish their, you know, their pensions and everything else. Like you say, I waste – I think I waste my time coming here. I don't see anybody else. The last one in the paper said no one came around and basically, you know, I want to express my opinion. I don't think you need a toll increase. Like I said, I could probably do a peace agreement with the North Koreans easier than talking to a lot of guys. I don't have any answers. I came here for answers tonight, and I don't see any answers. So basically that's my testimony. I mean, I feel that I think there is some real crookedness going on. That's my opinion. And a 550 -- 550 percent increase in tolls I think is ridiculous. We pay enough taxes here in New Jersey. People in Pennsylvania pay enough taxes. My wife crosses the bridge every day because she works at Pocono Medical Center in East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania so we do cross the bridges and people have to cross the bridges. You know, you move to lowa and you move to Illinois, you can cross the Mississippi River as many times you want and not a dime. So that's my testimony. I would like to know why. Thank you for having me here, but I'm very disappointed that I don't have answers. And I know you are going to increase the tolls anyway, so you just might as well go ahead and do it.

Staff Response

Mr. Menegus arrived after the start of the hearing and missed the Q&A portion where some of his assertions and questions could have been addressed.

- 1. The DRJTBC is not in a position to explain what the financial and jurisdictional arrangements are in other areas of the country where bridges span bodies of water separating two different states. It should be noted, however, that a new I-65/Lincoln Bridge across the Ohio River between Kentucky and Indiana will now have a toll. Additionally, toll bridges were in existence along the Delaware River between Pennsylvania and New Jersey for 128 years before the Commission was established in 1934. The Commission is legally bound to operate tolled crossings as the sole funding source for the operation, maintenance, and capital improvements of its bistate transportation system.
- 2. No change is proposed in the tolls for the truck/trailer combination Mr. Menegus outlines: a pickup truck with four wheels towing a trailer. The base toll currently is \$2 (\$1 for the pickup truck and \$1 for the trailer).

The exception would be if the truck/trailer combination involves a gooseneck/fifth-wheel assembly in the truck's bed. In that case, the toll currently would be \$12 or \$16, depending on the number of trailer axles. That toll charge, however, will remain the same under the Commission's proposed toll adjustments. (Note: The truck/trailer combination mentioned by Mr. Menegus could qualify for an even lower toll if the vehicle were outfitted with an E-ZPass transponder in which 16 tolled DRJTBC bridge trips are recorded in a single month. This discount would not apply with a gooseneck/fifth-wheel trailer connection.)

- 3. With respect to the RV rates cited by Mr. Menegus, the rates he cited have been charged to E-ZPass account holders since 2011. The proposal is to ensure those same rates are applied to cash customers since the Commission's tolling policy has been to classify vehicles by profile (height) and number of axles. This policy will expand slightly to include the number of wheels (as with dual rear-wheel pickup trucks) when the Commission's new next-generation toll-collection system goes into operation before March 1, 2017.
- 4. With respect to Mr. Menegus's assertions about his nomination to serve as a Commission member, the Commission does not involve itself in the selection, review or approval process in any way. The disclosure requirements he cites are not a Commission requirement, but are instead an obligation of the NJ State Ethics Commission.
- 5. (Note: Commission employee Joe Donnelly spoke with Mr. Menegus after the hearing to answer his questions and assure him the toll rates on his conventional four-wheel pickup truck are not changing.)

Richard Clauberg Montague, NJ

Montague Hearing My name is Richard Clauberg. I moved to Montague 15 years ago with my wife. And I would like to welcome all of you here. I'm not used to seeing so many suits and ties mind you, but I would like you to come and play golf when you don't have your ties on. It's a great place, and I'd like to give you a little history of Montague. It is one of the oldest towns. I forget how old it is. But it is old. And Clove Road is our main route here running north and south.

Now Clove Road was laid out by the cattles (ph). If you go down, you can see it goes up this way and down that way and blind spots, and it was long before they had road engineers, and the county has a few times laid out plans with big amounts of money to redo it, but it's never been done.

Now, in 15 years that I've been here – I didn't grow up here, but I don't remember anybody ever being killed in an automobile accident. In the 15 years that I have been here, we have killed between ten and fifteen people. Maybe at least ten or twelve on Clove Road. It's just a terrible road.

Now, when you raise the toll – I'll give you an example. My wife and I, we are going to go to Wal-Mart, and that's on the other side of the river. So we go down Clove Road, we get on 84 over the free bridge into Milford and to Wal-

	Mart. When we come home, we come home the other way, and we drive over your bridge free. So that's a normal route for people up here. By you raising tolls, all you are going to do is have more of these trucks, it is going to pay them to go down Clove Road and avoid paying any tolls. They can come home at night for free. So you are not doing us any favors raising tolls. You people should look in to cutting the tolls like you did – at one time it was a dollar, and they raised it to \$1.25, and then you put it back to a dollar. So it can be done. But by raising tolls all you are going to do is kill a couple more of our children. Thank you.	
Staff Response	Clove Road is a county road, but its traffic volumes are relatively light compared to our other bridge locations. Moreover, the two toll changes to the current Commission toll structure apply only to dual-wheel rear-axle pickup trucks and cash transactions involving RVs with trailers or passenger vehicles in tow. The number of these vehicles on the road pales in comparison to other vehicle classes. Accordingly, the amount of diversion – if any – resulting from these extremely narrow toll adjustments will not appreciably affect traffic volumes on the lightly traveled Clove Road. It's outside our purview to determine if the existing safety issues along Clove Road may be attributed to speeding and insufficient enforcement.	
David Jacobi Marshalls Creek, PA East Stroudsbu rg Hearing	I just wanted to make comments on two of the proposals. One was the RV change, the price on the trailer. Basically my questions were – and I had them answered as far as justification and fairness of the – using the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge. The eight times fare addition it is versus driving a car across. My feeling is you are already paying extra for the RV. If you drove the car individually, it would be a dollar. Now it is \$8. That just seems kind of hard for me to understand where that price justification and fairness comes from. The RV is not just cars, although that is what is stated there. It does not matter if you are pulling a 250-pound trailer with a lawnmower on it, you are still going to be getting charged the increased rate per axle. That's kind of hard to understand how that is so much different versus a car. You are already paying extra for an RV to begin with. It's not like you are paying a car price, and you are paying extra for the added weight. If you are already paying extra for the added size of the RV, plus now you are paying eight times more for the care you are pulling across instead of just driving it yourself. Dually, the dually is the same situation. Here you have a truck, again, you know, here where we live in Pennsylvania many many people drive trucks as a typical commuter vehicle. When you look around, if you are driving, the majority of them are actually empty. There is nothing even in the back. Your system currently, my understanding is, cannot tell whether it is empty or not. The charge is purely on the ability for that vehicle to carry more weight, not that it is actually carrying more weight.	-Cannot understand justification for increase in tollsToll rate weight discrepancy

Again, I feel that's an injustice, and that it should simply be if you cannot determine what the weight capacity is, it should just be whereas you go out, and you charge the most you can because they have the potential to carry more. It should be what they are actually carrying.

Same thing as far as the truck goes. With a dually, you would be charged a light truck, so the same situation. It doesn't matter if now you are pulling a single-axle trailer with either a car on it or a lawnmower on it. It is still going to be charged the light truck rates versus the passenger vehicle rates. That's all I have. Thank you

Staff Response

- 1. The current in-lane toll collection system classifies vehicles by their profile (height) and number of axles. It cannot determine vehicular weight. The new in-lane toll collection system will have the ability to classify vehicles by profile (height), number of axles and number of tires. Like the current in-lane toll system, the new system won't be able to determine vehicle weights. The Commission's policy of classifying vehicles by profile and axles dates back to 2002 and is consistent with the practices of numerous other toll agencies across the country.
- 2. The reason for clarifying that the cash toll rates for RVs with trailers and cars in tow will be the same as the E-ZPass rates for the same vehicle configuration is a matter of fairness and consistency. Both the current and next-gen toll collection systems will classify transactions by profile and number of axles. (The exception will be transactions involving "dualies" where wheels also will be factored in to the transaction.) Rates ultimately get determined by the size and number of wheels of the lead vehicle and then the total number of rolling axles, thereby resulting in the final computed toll charge.
- 3. The combined weight of an RV with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow causes higher levels of stress in a bridge's components.
- 4. With respect to dualies, the Commission currently classifies these heavier-payload pickup trucks as a passenger vehicle. Other toll agencies in the region classify dualies as trucks or light trucks. The Commission's proposed toll adjustment for dual-wheel rear-axle pickup trucks will put the agency in line with the vehicle-classification practices of other toll agencies in our region. Dually pick-up trucks are heavier and wider than conventional four-wheel pickup trucks. If the proposed adjustment is approved, dualies would be classified as a light truck. While the toll for a light truck is higher than a passenger vehicle, the Commission's long-standing policy is to charge a lower per-axle rate for light trucks -- \$3.25 per axle compared to the \$4 per-axle rate charged to vehicles with three or more axles.

I employ – I have a payroll of 40 people. More than \$16,000 a week. I have a very successful business, and I think your rates are unconscionable. I am going to put a sign up in my store saying if you got a motor home, and you are towing a car when you get to the toll booth, stop, unhook your car and let the wife get in and pay a dollar to go across and you pay for the motor home. You save \$7 that way. I mean, this is kind of ridiculous to penalize the recreational industry which is the backbone of the Poconos. I mean, you want to build a new bridge, fine, build a new bridge. I don't have no trouble with that. I don't use that bridge anyway. But, I mean, whatever happened to all the money that was collected for the interstate? When Eisenhower proposed it, it was five cents a gallon tax on gasoline to pay for it. I have driven all over this country, and it looks like the interstate is just about done. Now they are making two lanes in to three lanes, and that cost money, too. But there should be money to build an interstate bridge. The one on I-84 crosses the Delaware, there is no toll. I mean, it is just an unconscionable amount of money. I know you have to collect money, and I was told years ago when they were talking about toll increase, that about 80 percent of the toll money goes to fund salaries for toll collectors' benefits and pensions. So, if we didn't have any toll collectors, we wouldn't need any tolls more or less. It is just unconscionable for the recreational industry anyway. And I'm just very upset about it, and that's about all I can say. I mean, I don't know how you dovertised, but, obviously, from my people who come one third of my business comes from Pennsylvania and	-Increase in toll will have a negative effect on commerce				

Staff Response

- 1. The Commission charges the lowest rates of any bridge-oriented toll agency in the region. This includes all of the public agencies providing passage across the Delaware River.
- 2. The proposal for RVs with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow clarifies only what the cash toll should be in these particular transactions. This will ensure that E-ZPass customers and cash customers pay the same toll when driving an RV with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow through a Commission toll lane.
- 3. The combined weight of an RV with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow causes higher levels of stress in a bridge's components.
- 4. The Commission has never received federal funds of any kind to operate and maintain the Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge. The Commission is obligated under its federal compact and its bond covenants to operate the facility as a toll bridge.
- 5. The gentleman's assertions about 80 percent of toll revenue going to fund salaries, benefits and pensions is unfounded hearsay. While labor costs are substantial for the Commission just like they are for any private business or other government agency toll collectors are among the lowest paid employees at the Commission. In fact, the entire operating budget for the Commission generally represents 51 cents out of every dollar in revenues the Commission collects each year.

Staff Response	Like other toll agencies, the Commission will classify school buses at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge according to profile and rolling axles/wheels. As most school buses are two-axle vehicles eight feet and above in height, these vehicles will be charged a light truck rate. Proponents said the bridge should comply with Complete Streets policies in the two states by including a walkway. Staff Response

- 1. The proposed adjustment for an RV with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow applies only to cash transactions. The proposed rate change is to the toll amount currently being charged in E-ZPass transactions for the same vehicle combinations. The methodology for setting the toll rates for RVs with a trailer or car in tow is similar to that of other toll agencies. It is based on the profile/number of wheels of the lead vehicle and the total number of rolling axles in the transaction. A 10-percent discount applies in these transactions when the toll is paid with an E-ZPass transponder during off-peak hours (9:01 p.m. to 5:59 a.m.)
- 2. The combined weight of an RV with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow causes higher levels of stress in a bridge's components.
- 3. The Commission's proposed toll adjustment for dual-wheel rear-axle pickup trucks will put the agency in line with the vehicle-classification practices of other toll agencies in our region. Dually pick-up trucks are heavier and wider than conventional four-wheel pickup trucks. If the proposed adjustment is approved, dualies would be classified as a light truck. The Commission's long-standing practice is to provide a reduced toll rate for light trucks (currently \$3.25 per axle) as compared to trucks with three or more axles (currently \$4 per axle).

The exceptions are a 40-percent discount for Class 1/passenger vehicles with E-ZPass that make 16 tolled commutes per month and a 10-percent discount for non-peak-period (9:01 p.m. to 5:59 a.m.) crossings by non-Class 1/passenger vehicles, including RVs.

Staff Response 1. The commenter apparently does not want tolls to be charged at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge. However, she does not identify any other achievable alternatives to pay for the new bridge and all of the many other improvements included in the comprehensive Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. 2. The decision to toll the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge was made in December 2009. Comments on tolling the bridge were collected as part of the project's Environmental Assessment Addendum in late 2010. The tolling decision has been affirmed by the Federal Highway Administration on three separate occasions including a legal opinion received in 2011, the issuance of a Finding of No Significant Impact in 2012, and a subsequent tolling agreement status communication, also in 2012. 3. With respect to backing up traffic, toll booths will not be used at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge as that would defeat the intended outcomes of the project's safety and efficiency objectives. This is why an all-electronic tolling (AET) system will be used to collect tolls from motorists traveling at highway speeds without stopping or slowing down. 4. Staff Response

- 1. A legal advertisement was published in the July 9 edition of The Times of Trenton in accordance with the Commission's 2013 toll adjustment policy. The Times of Trenton subsequently published a front-page article on the proposed Scudder Falls toll schedule in advance of the two District 1 toll hearings in mid-July.
- 2. The commenter opposes a toll at the Scudder Falls location but does not offer any achievable alternative mechanism to pay for the new bridge and all of the many other improvements that are included in the comprehensive Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project.
- 3. The proposed toll-by-plate rates are not a penalty. Rather, this proposed higher toll is to be applied to cover the additional administrative costs involved in identifying and billing motor-vehicle owners who travel across the new bridge without E-ZPass.

Dorothea Malina, Pennington, NJ

I appreciate that my neighbors have shared information on expected tolls for the next Scudder Falls Bridge connecting NJ and PA along Interstate 95.

So many residents of both NJ and PA use it to get to their jobs and medical appointments that I must echo their concerns regarding the financial burdens this will place on them. Working couples don't have the same schedules, yet share responsibilities for child care. Also, they may need to switch cars for any number of reasons Indeed, we do not want to see families squeezed.

And for safety and environmental reasons we don't want to see them detour to free or less expensive alternative crossings.

The replacement Scudder Falls Bridge that connects I-95 between NJ and PA will become a tolled crossing. To ease the future financial burden upon working families, I suggested the following:

The proposed base future toll for an E-ZPass-equipped passenger vehicle crossing the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge would be \$1.25. I understand that frequent commuters who make 16 tolled crossings in a respective month across Commission toll bridges would be provided an automatic 40-percent discount to 75 cents per tolled trip, provided the transactions are recorded on the same DRJTBC-affiliated E-ZPass tag. To lessen the financial burden on families with multiple commuters and E-Zpass tags, meeting the discount eligibility threshold of 16 tolled crossings should be per E-Zpass account number, not per tag number. This would lessen the budgetary difficulties households will be facing while adjusting for the tolls and reduce its regressive tax implications upon lower income classes.

Staff Response	 The E-ZPass rates proposed for the replacement bridge are still among the lowest for a bridge-oriented toll agency in the region as well as any toll agency along the Delaware River. The cited \$2.60 toll-by-plate passenger vehicle toll that is being proposed is higher than the base E-ZPass rate because of the need to cover the additional administrative costs of identifying and billing motor-vehicle owners without E-ZPass. A Traffic Diversion Study was conducted in 2010 for the project's Environmental Assessment Addendum. The report's conveyance letter states: "The overall findings of this study indicate that the traffic diversions resulting from the tolling of the new Scudder Falls Bridge will cause minimal traffic impacts to the adjacent roadways and bridge crossings within the region during both peak and non-peak periods." The Commission's long-term policy is to apply the commuter discount on a per-transponder basis. A change in this policy could necessitate a change in the toll rates of both the proposed toll schedule for the new Scudder Falls Bridge and the current toll schedule for the Commission's seven existing toll bridges. 	
Andrew Peiffer Yardley, PA	To Whom it May Concern, I am writing to comment on the Scudder Falls Bridge toll schedule. I feel that using the metric of 16 times per month to reduce the toll is inconvenient to the people who carpool over the bridge. Staff Response	 Due to the arrangement the Commission has with its current E-ZPass back-office service provider, the commuter discount must be provided on a month-to-month basis. A change in this arrangement could necessitate a change in the toll rates of both the proposed toll schedule for the new Scudder Falls Bridge and the toll schedule for the Commission's seven existing toll bridges. While the Commission supports carpooling as a public policy aim, the agency is not in a position to administer any kind of further discounts for carpooling customers. 	

3. The proposed toll schedule for the new Scudder Falls Bridge is based in large measure on traffic projections, estimated project costs, and anticipated bond market rates. There are no scheduled toll increases factored into the toll proposal and additional toll increases for this facility are not anticipated as being needed for the foreseeable future.

Linda Ditmars Ewing, NJ

As a resident who lives extremely close to I-95 and the current and proposed Scudder Falls Bridge, I have a number of comments re: the tolling proposal and related matters:

- 1. Why is the toll plaza on the NJ side of the bridge? The NJ side has residents (including me!) who live much closer to the road and bridge than on the Pa. side and as traffic will need to slow down as they approach the plaza, NJ will be subjected to the majority of the noise, exhaust fumes, etc. I realize a noise wall will be built in some areas, but that will certainly not eliminate all noise and air pollution that will be generated by the slowing traffic in the area.
- 2. Can the use of so-called compression or "Jake" brakes be banned in the area of the bridge? Currently, the loudest noise results from the use of these truck brakes as they suddenly slow down as they reach the bridge. I can only imagine how much more these brakes will be used when a toll plaza is in place. Some areas in NJ ban their use now. It doesn't seem right that one truck using these brakes can destroy the peace and quiet of thousands of surrounding neighbors.
- 3. I was unable to attend the public meetings on the tolling as I did not get my notice until one of the meetings had already taken place and the other meeting was literally the day I received my letter and I could not change my plans on such short notice. Please consider providing adequate notice for future meetings.
- 4. Finally, I strenuously object to this bridge being tolled. I have gone to most of the public meetings on the proposed bridge going back almost ten years and there was not even a mention of tolls until relatively recently in the process---and at the point that many folks had stopped attending the meetings. The entire toll concept seemed to be thrown in as an afterthought even if the Commission had it in mind all along. Scudder Falls should continue to be a "free" bridge---just as it has been untolled for the course of its entire existence. If the Commission cannot afford to build this bridge without ongoing toll funding, then don't build until the Commission has the necessary funds. As I've pointed out on many occasions--the overwhelming majority of traffic backups on this bridge occur during the morning

rush hour from Pa. into NJ, and the evening rush hour from NJ into Pa---i.e., commuter traffic---which can be handled by less drastic means than a billion dollar new bridge. Consider van pools, improved public transportation options, flex hours, etc.

It is quite obvious that the new Scudder Falls bridge, and the later tolling proposal was a done deal from the very first mention, and all of the public meetings and public comments were just legally required distractions to make it appear that the public had some real input into the process--but little has changed during the entire process other than the project's rapidly increasingly price tag. Please reconsider the plan and put your emphasis on improving the older bridges in your inventory.

Staff Response

- 1. The new Scudder Falls Bridge will not have a conventional barrier toll plaza. Tolls will be collected at the location using an all-electronic toll (AET) collection system of E-ZPass transponder readers and high-resolution cameras that will record license plate images of vehicles without E-ZPass. The bridge's AET facility will be on the Pennsylvania side and will collect tolls only in the southbound direction from vehicles moving at highway speeds.
- 2. There won't be a toll plaza on the New Jersey side of the new Scudder Falls Bridge; the cited concern of trucks using compression-release engine brakes at such a facility is not applicable to the toll-setting process.
- 3. The toll hearings were advertised in accordance with the Commission's 2013 toll adjustment hearings and comment policy. The hearings were further publicized through the issuance of press releases. Some of the news coverage in the District 1 area included front-page articles in daily newspapers and internet postings.
- 4. The Commission approved tolling for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge in 2009. The initial announcement of tolling generated front-page articles and radio and television coverage. Tolling of this location has been mentioned on the project and Commission websites ever since. A hearing on tolling was conducted as part of the Environmental Assessment Addendum public comment process in December 2011, which also was publicized. The tolling decision has since been affirmed by the FHWA on three separate occasions, including the June 2012 issuance of a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) – which further publicized that the bridge will be tolled.
- 5. The commenter does not provide an achievable alternative for funding the new bridge and related regional transportation improvements that are part of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. Toll collections are the sole revenue source for the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission.

- 1. The basis for setting the toll amounts is not clear. I could not attend any of the hearings and I did not see an explanation on the web site for how the tolls were calculated and why they were set at the posted amounts. For example, why is the toll set at \$2.60 for a passenger vehicle toll-by-plate? The public comment period should be extended again so an explanation for how the toll amounts were derived or calculated is better explained.
- 2. It is also noted that this specific toll, and likely all the others, is higher than what is charged at the other similar bridges, such as the \$1.25 toll for the Route 1 bridge between Trenton and Pennsylvania. Why are the tolls so much higher for the new bridge? This will likely mean drivers will divert to other bridges that are not tolled or have lower tolls, resulting in decreased revenue over what is projected. The toll should be lowered to be closer to what is charged at the other bridges.
- 3. For non-EZ Pass vehicles, a self-addressed stamped envelope should be included with the bill to encourage compliance with paying the bill. It is cheaper for the DRJTBC to get a bulk postage rate than for each vehicle owner to have to use a full price stamp. Also, the envelope with the bill must be clearly labeled as being a bridge toll so it does not get tossed as junk mail.
- 4. For non-EZ pass vehicles, how often will bills be sent? As I cross the bridge a number of times on a monthly basis, but not enough to justify EZ-Pass, bills should be sent on a frequency no more than a monthly calendar basis, which saves on postage for the DRJTBC as well as the vehicle owners.
- 5. Hopefully, there will be clear signage before the bridge for nonEZ-Pass vehicles to know what the toll amount will be and that billing will be determined via camera and mailing a bill to vehicle owner.

Staff Response

- 1. Toll rates were computed after the submission of 60-percent design documentation for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project in the spring. The 60-percent documentation provided clarity on projected construction costs. Melding that information with the findings of the Level III Traffic Study and bond-market trend analysis from the Commission's financial advisers, a proposed toll schedule was constructed. The proposed toll schedule is projected to provide sufficient cash flow so the Commission can obtain the financing it needs from the bond market and meet its bond covenant obligations with the least impact to toll payers.
- 2. The proposed E-ZPass toll rates for the new Scudder Falls Bridge are only slightly higher than the tolls the Commission charges at its other tolled crossings. Nonetheless, they still rank among the lowest base toll rates among the various toll agencies that operate bridges across the Delaware River between New Jersey and Pennsylvania.
- 3. The Commission is already committing to use a \$100 million share of its cash reserves to tamp down the proposed toll rates for the new Scudder Falls Bridge as much as possible.
- 4. The cited \$2.60 toll-by-plate passenger vehicle toll that is being proposed is higher than the base E-ZPass rate because of the need to cover the additional administrative costs of identifying and billing motor-vehicle owners without E-ZPass.
- 5. Other toll agencies with all-electronic toll (AET) collection facilities charge higher rates for toll-by-plate transactions compared to transponder-based (E-ZPass, etc.) transactions.
- 6. A Traffic Diversion Study was conducted in 2010 for the project's Environmental Assessment Addendum. The study's conveyance letter states: "The overall findings of this study indicate that the traffic diversions resulting from the tolling of the new Scudder Falls Bridge will cause minimal traffic impacts to the adjacent roadways and bridge crossings within the region during both peak and non-peak periods."
- 7. The detailed business rules for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge's all-electronic toll (AET) facility have yet to be drafted and finalized. The business rules will determine what kind of return envelopes are to be included with toll-byplate billings.
- 8. The frequency of toll-by-plate billing will be determined as part of the detailed business rules for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge's AET facility.
- Pricing signage may not be permitted in advance of the bridge since the approach roadways are part of the interstate highway system and subject to Federal Highway Administration rules and regulations.

Mark Warriner Washington Crossing, PA	In order for someone to receive the commuter discount, they need to have a NJ EZPass. Is it possible for the commission to establish a relationship with the PA EZPass group so the discount is available to both states' users? Typically it would not be an issue, but the fees associated with NJ's EZ Pass are \$9 more per year than the PA EZPass.	-Can the Commission extend the commuter discount to the transponders issued by the Pennsylvania Turnpike?
Staff Response	 An E-ZPass transponder issued by the Pennsylvania Turnpike does not qualify for the Commission's E-ZPass frequent commuter discount program. Only transponders issued by the Commission's E-ZPass back-office service provider the New Jersey E-ZPass Group – qualify for the commuter discount program. Because the NJ E-ZPass Group processes the E-ZPass toll transactions recorded at Commission crossings, the commuter discount can be applied automatically to passenger-vehicle transponders issued by the NJ E-ZPass Group. Savings from the Commission's commuter discount program easily offsets the additional annual administrative fees for a Commission-affiliated E-ZPass transponder: commuter discount of \$8 per month (based on minimum 16 tolled trips per month of \$1.25 toll reduced to \$0.75.). State residency does not prohibit anyone from acquiring an E-ZPass transponder from the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission's E-ZPass back-office service provider – the New Jersey E-ZPass Group.

I see this as adding little more than additional hardship to those who are required to cross the bridge daily for work, or make use of the bridge to frequent shops on either side of the river. All I see coming from this effort is increased traffic on the few remaining free bridges which are already overcrowded due to commuters. I have yet to see the value in this move to those that use the bridge daily. I also think it is prudent to question the cost in the construction of a toll plaza, the eventual upkeep costs, and wages for employees to staff it. This raises the question how is introducing such new costs prudent or provide value to those who use the bridge? I also feel rewarding regular commuters who purchase EZ Pass with reduced rates is just wrong, given the rise in identity theft you appear to be encouraging people to allow yet another corporation to have access to information that goes above and beyond the normal level of personal identifier information as it also paints a picture of where you have travelled. While I understand that there is potentially a need for the bridge to be replaced, I disagree strongly with drawing a comparison to the Mianus River Bridge as this seems little more than fear mongering. If we really believe that these bridges are so similar and the Mianus River Bridge only lasted 25 years, as the Scudders Fall is currently around 55 years we appear to be 30 years past due for a collapse.

Staff Response

- 1. The commenter opposes a toll at the Scudder Falls location but does not offer any achievable alternative mechanism to pay for the new bridge and the many other improvements included in the comprehensive Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project.
- Tolling of the replacement bridge was approved in 2009 and the decision has since been affirmed by the FHWA on three separate occasions.
- 3. Tolling was approved at the time due to the absence of available funds from the federal government and the states of Pennsylvania and New Jersey that might have paid the costs of the bridge replacement project so that it could stay a non-tolled crossing. Those funding dynamics have not changed.
- 4. A Traffic Diversion Study was conducted in 2010 for the project's Environmental Assessment Addendum. The report's conveyance letter states: "The overall findings of this study indicate that the traffic diversions resulting from the tolling of the new Scudder Falls Bridge will cause minimal traffic impacts to the adjacent roadways and bridge crossings within the region during both peak and nonpeak periods.
- 5. Toll booths will not be used at the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge as that would defeat the intended outcomes of the project's safety and efficiency objectives. This is the reason why an allelectronic tolling (AET) system will be used to collect tolls from motorists traveling at highway speeds without stopping or slowing down.

	 Electronic toll collection with an active vehicle transponder is the most efficient and least-expensive means of toll collection. Toll agencies across the country apply lower rates to transponder-based toll transactions. This is always the case at facilities where all-electronic toll (AET) collection is employed. Strict privacy restrictions apply to the Commission's E-ZPass transactions. To the Commission's best knowledge, there has never been a breach of the Commission's E-ZPass accounts. Based on the findings and recommendations of a federal investigation into the 1983 Mianus River Bridge collapse, the Commission in 1991 installed a system of auxiliary supports at the Scudder Falls Bridge to prevent a Mianus-like collapse. This extended the bridge's safe lifespan over the past 22 years. However, the bridge continues to experience roadway and structural deterioration. It does not meet current design criteria, presenting a future reliability and safety concern. It is now classified as "functionally obsolete" due capacity limitations, poor roadway geometry and safety concerns. It is heavily congested during peak travel periods and accident prone. The Commission cites the Mianus collapse to explain why it would be wasteful to spend further public money on the existing Scudder Falls Bridge.

The E-ZPass toll rates proposed for the replacement bridge are still among the lowest for a bridge-oriented toll agency in the region as well as any toll agency along the Delaware River. The cited \$2.60 toll-by-plate passenger vehicle toll that is being proposed is higher than the base E-ZPass rate because of the need to cover the additional administrative costs of identifying and billing motor-vehicle owners without E-ZPass.

Staff Response	Dual-wheel rear-axle pickup trucks certainly constitute a fraction of the vehicles that use our bridges. However, the proposed change in toll rates for this type of vehicle is not based on vehicular volumes. Rather, the proposed adjustment will bring the Commission's rate classification for this type of vehicle in line with that of other toll agencies in the region, none of which classify this type of vehicle at a Class 1/passenger vehicle toll rate. The toll rate for a dually pickup truck will be the light truck rate. It has been the Commission's long-standing policy to charge a lower per-axle rate for light trucks compared to the per-axle rate applied to trucks with three or more axles. The light truck rate is \$3.25 per axle instead of \$4 per axle.	

Note: Currently, if a conventional four-wheel pick-up truck or a dual-wheel rear-axle pickup truck is using an in-bed towing assembly (a.k.a. "gooseneck" or "fifth wheel") to tow a trailer, the \$4 per-axle rate is supposed to be charged right now and this rate will continue to be charged in the future.

I appreciate being kept in the loop as an interested stakeholder. Referencing the enclosed letter, my comments and concerns are noted below. Per the NJ E-ZPass website, itemized billing statements are issued monthly for the first 6-months of use, then bi-monthly (every other month) thereafter. The statements do not coincide (synchronize) with a calendar month, but correspond to the monthly anniversary date of when the account was first activated. For example, the first toll transaction on a statement could occur on August 19th and the last transaction could be on October 18th. To coincide with the billing statement cycles, I recommend that eligibility for the automatic 40% commuter discount be based on a minimum of 16 tolled trips per monthly account statements, and a minimum of 32 tolled trips per bi-monthly account statements. This will make the toll transactions easier to track since it would correspond to the billing statements' actual fiscal cycle, not the calendar month. As a means to reduce the financial impact upon struggling families having to budget for the upcoming tolls, it is imperative that the discount be based on meeting the minimum tolled trips per E-ZPass account number, not per E-ZPass tag number. This would provide some degree of financial relief for low to middle income households and those with multiple adult children bundled on the same account, especially when dependent on part time jobs requiring a river crossing three days or less per week. Thank you for considering my input on this matter. Staff Response	Due to the arrangement the Commission has with its current E-ZPass back-office service provider, the commuter discount must be provided on a calendar month basis. A change in this arrangement could necessitate a change in the toll rates of both the proposed toll schedule for the new Scudder Falls Bridge and the toll schedule for the Commission's seven existing toll bridges.	

2. Most Commission E-ZPass frequent commuter discount customer base probably would oppose changing the computation of the frequent commuter discount from a calendar month. Of the 77,339 migrated accounts from the former DRJTBC-issued E-ZPass transponder system and the more than 2.5 million NJ CSC E-ZPass accounts eligible for the Commission's frequent commuter discount, this is the first time anyone has requested a change of this nature.

	tow. The methodology for setting the toll rates for RVs with a trailer or passenger vehicle in tow is similar to that of other toll agencies. It is based on the profile or number of wheels of the lead vehicle and the total number of rolling axles. A 10-percent discount will be charged in these transactions when the toll is paid by E-ZPass during off-peak hours. 4. There is no discount for local residents. However, the Commission provides a 40-percent E-ZPass discount for area residents who make frequent use of one or more of the Commission's toll bridges. To qualify, a motorist must have a Commission-affiliated E-ZPass passenger-vehicle transponder (a transponder issued by the New Jersey E-ZPass Group, the Commission's E-ZPass back-office service provider) and make 16 tolled trips within a one-month period using a Class 1/passenger vehicle. The discount reduces the passenger vehicle toll to 60 cents (instead of \$1). DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of September 26, 2016 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (July, 2016)

Summary: The Commission experienced a decrease in total toll revenue for July 2016 in comparison to the July 2015 traffic and revenue statistics. The Commission has not generated a decrease in total toll revenue since August 2014. Total toll traffic however, reflected an increase for the month of July.

Analysis of July 2016 / July 2015 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue decrease of 3.54 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 5.43 percent decrease.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 1.20 percent increase.

Analysis of July 2016 / July 2015 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 10,116 vehicles, or 0.27 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic decreased by 25,989 vehicles, or 5.32 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 36,105 vehicles, or 1.09 percent.
- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for July 2016 was 122,997 total vehicles as compared to 122,670 total vehicles in July 2015.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for July 2016 decreased by 88,719 vehicles, or 3.12 percent as compared to July 2015.
 Average daily westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for July 2016 was 88,765 vehicles as compared to 91,627 in July 2015.

Traffic analysis for 2016 YTD:

- Total YTD toll traffic for the seven toll bridges is reflecting a 4.43 percent increase through the first seven months of 2016 as compared to the same period in 2015.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the eleven toll supported bridges is reflecting a 0.50 percent increase for the first seven months of 2016 as compared to last year.

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for July 2016 reflected a 0.49 percent decrease as the result of the increase of 1,457 cars and the decrease of 5,364 trucks when compared to July 2015. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), decreases of 2,062 cars and 1,327 trucks combined to generate a decrease in total toll traffic of 1.92 percent for July 2016 as compared to July 2015.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced a minimal increase of 0.05 percent in total toll traffic for the month of July 2016 compared to July 2015 as the result of the increase of 11,126 cars and the decrease of 10,542 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, an increase of 2,416 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 2,160 trucks combined to generate a net increase of 0.05 percent in total toll traffic for July 2016.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 0.76 percent decrease in total toll traffic during July 2016 as a result of the increase of 1,056 automobiles and the decrease of 1,976 trucks compared to July 2015. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, the increase of 24,837 passenger vehicles and the decrease of 4,355 trucks combined to generate an increase of 2.14 percent in total toll traffic for July 2016 as compared to July 2015. At Milford-Montague (MM), decreases of 2,725 passenger vehicles and 265 trucks produced a 2.10 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of July 2016.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of September 26, 2016 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (August, 2016)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for August 2016 in comparison to the August 2015 traffic and revenue statistics. Total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month of August.

Analysis of August 2016 / August 2015 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 4.94 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 6.81 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 0.48 percent increase.

Analysis of August 2016 / August 2015 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 29,288 vehicles, or 0.76 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 30,632 vehicles, or 6.49 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic decreased by 1,344 vehicles, or 0.04 percent.
- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for August 2016 was 124,828 total vehicles as compared to 123,883 total vehicles in August 2015.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for August 2016 increased by 42,240 vehicles, or 1.53 percent as compared to August 2015.
 Average daily westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for August 2016 was 90,291 vehicles as compared to 88,929 in August 2015.

Traffic analysis for 2016 YTD:

- Total YTD toll traffic for the seven toll bridges is reflecting a 3.89 percent increase through the first eight months of 2016 as compared to the same period in 2015.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the eleven toll supported bridges is reflecting a 0.64 percent increase for the first eight months of 2016 as compared to last year.

DISTRICT REVIEW:

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) reflected a 4.57 percent increase for August 2016 as the result of increases of 31,578 cars and 4,163 trucks when compared to August 2015. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 6,000 cars combined with an increase of 663 trucks to generate a decrease in total toll traffic of 2.97 percent for August 2016 as compared to August 2015.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced a decrease of 0.35 percent in total toll traffic for the month of August 2016 compared to August 2015 as the result of the decrease of 20,942 cars and the increase of 16,871 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, increases of 17,043 passenger vehicles and 1,822 trucks combined to generate an increase of 4.05 percent in total toll traffic for August 2016.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 7.28 percent increase in total toll traffic during August 2016 as the result of the increase of 10,313 automobiles and the decrease of 1,475 trucks compared to August 2015. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, the decrease of 26,000 passenger vehicles and the increase of 8,358 trucks combined to generate a decrease of 1.78 percent in total toll traffic for August 2016 as compared to August 2015. At Milford-Montague (MM), decreases of 7,067 passenger vehicles and 39 trucks produced a 5.02 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of August 2016.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of August, 2016 and August, 2015, and the year-to-date periods ending August 31, 2016 and August 31, 2015.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of August 2016 and the eight month year-to-date ("YTD") operations of fiscal year 2016 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,780,537 for the month of August. For the 2016 fiscal period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$35,946,685 or 86.8% of the YTD operating budget.

Most of the expense line categories are within their normal line item budgets. Currently, EZPass Operating expense is running \$119,436 above the year-to-date operating line budget. This increase is mainly due to larger than anticipated increases in EZPass traffic.

There were no unusual expenses or charges during the month.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

Months of July/August 2016

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the months of July and August, 2016, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the two (2) months culminated in the preparation and placement of 94 purchase orders in the total amount of \$453,023.14. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 58 price inquiries were sent out for 19 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3.05 per order (58/19=3.05).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the periods of July and August 2016 are shown below:

- > Seven (7) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$212,746.00, at the request of the Electronic Security & Surveillance Department for camera installations and upgrades for the Commissions Toll and Toll-Supported Bridge Facilities.
- > A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$28,302.10 for the approved Capital procurement of office and conference room furniture for the Trenton-Morrisville Administration Building.
- Four (4) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$27,550.00 for guide rail repairs at the I-78 and Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Facilities. Only one (1) of the four (4) Purchase Orders was eligible for insurance reimbursement.
- > A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$17,121.79 for the Capital storage yard fencing project at the Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Facility.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$12,092.56 for paint for the walkway painting project at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll-Supported Bridge Facility.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

ELECTRONIC TOLL COLLECTION PROGRAM MONTH OF JULY & AUGUST 2016

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

- 1. Xerox and TransCore continue to perform preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Commission Staff met with Xerox and TransCore to review maintenance activity for the month.
- 2. Commission staff issued a Purchase Order for the 2016 Annual Spare Parts / Consumables. Acquisition of the spare parts and consumables is underway by Xerox. Once all items are received, Commission Staff will review the inventory. Additionally, as the new electronic toll collection system is installed in a lane, the existing equipment will be added to the spare parts inventory.
- 3. Commission staff is working with Xerox to determine where to store the removed toll equipment as it is removed from the lanes. We will prepare a list of equipment and check with other toll agencies to see if they have a need for it.
- 4. For the Electronic Toll Collection System Replacement, TransCore is preparing the engineering design package, they completed a revised submission of training manuals, continue to work on the Onsite First Installation Testing document, Disaster Recovery Plan and the Maintenance Plan. Additionally, TransCore continued to provide details for the installation of the All Electronic Toll Collection System to Michael Baker for the Scudder Falls Bridge project. TransCore facilitated bi-weekly project status meetings.
- 5. TransCore completed Factory Acceptance Testing of the conventional toll lane system at Lane 2 at the New Hope Lambertville Toll Bridge. Commission staff and vehicles were used for creating the test transactions both in dry runs and the official testing. TransCore began installation of equipment at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge for preparation of the open road tolling (ORT) Factory Acceptance Test. TransCore will utilize the 17' wide right shoulder of the ORT zone for this testing. Xerox will remove the existing equipment from the shoulder lane to make room for the new equipment.

Activities for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center

1. The design of the new NJ Customer Service Center (CSC) is on-going. The New Jersey Turnpike Authority (NJTA), as the lead agency, is facilitating all meetings

with the other agencies and Xerox. The new CSC is expected to go live in February 2017.

2. Commission Staff reviewed the revised draft Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) prepared by the NJTA. This document includes the terms and conditions for all the agencies that operated within the NJ CSC. Comments were provided to the NJTA for inclusion in the final document.

General Electronic Toll Collection Program Activities

- 1. Mr. Stracciolini participated in the IAG E-ZPass Executive Management Committee meeting and Policy Committee meetings.
- 2. Mr. Stracciolini served on the Non-toll Opportunities subgroup for the IAG. This subgroup is preparing a policy and procedure document that provides a method for the IAG to follow for non-toll opportunities, such as use of the E-ZPass transponder system at parking garages or drive-thru services.
- 3. Mr. Stracciolini is assisting the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission with the technical evaluation of proposals for their Cashless Tolling System Implementation and Maintenance procurement.

IDENTIFIED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (IBE) PROGRAM

The Contract Compliance Program and IBE Target of 25% of the total Commission's contract award became effective on July 1, 2014. From the start of the IBE program to date, the Commissioners have awarded a total of twenty-six (26) contracts, including four (4) Task Order Agreements awarded with the new IBE program requirements.

STATUS UPDATES

During the months of July and August, the Contract Compliance Department continues to work on enhancing the Contract Compliance Program by monitoring and auditing the awarded contracts. The CCD staff has also been actively researching best practice efforts of sister agencies by contacting and meeting with other contract compliance professionals at a regional and national level. To this end, the CCD is compiling information of other monitoring systems used by other entities in this very unique field. This information will keep the department at the edge of continued development in an effort to create the best program possible in order to have the most effective tools necessary to increase the CCD program delivery.

B2GNOW CONTRACT COMPLIANCE DEPARTMENT PAYROLL REPORTING SYSTEMS

> The CCD staff added contract TS605A - Riverton-Belvidere Toll Support Bridge Critical Member Strengthening into the B2GNOW system.

Through the B2GNOW system the CCD is able to generate dozens of reports to provide an array of information as to how the contracts are performing. The CCD has chosen three of these reports that identify the contracts being monitored and audited by the CCD through the B2GNOW program. The three reports are the Compliance Overview Report, the Primes and Subs on Active Contracts Report, and the IBE Quarterly Report. These reports provide significant amount of information pertaining to the types of certified IBEs being subcontracted by the Primes to complete the work awarded by the Commission. The reports include pertinent information of each subconsultant/subcontractor's gender, ethnicity, and payments compared to the 25% Commission target.

LCP TRACKER CONTRACT COMPLIANCE DEPARTMENT PAYROLL CERTIFICATION SYSTEMS

> The Contract Compliance Department along with Mr. Arnie Conoline, CAO held various conference meetings with the staff of LCP Tracker in an effort to eliminate inconsistencies with the data provided by them during the development of the Master List for the counties of Mercer and Warren and the entire state of New Jersey. During the third week of August LCP Tracker was given a cure period to assure that their system is able to provide flawless data verification and that CCD staff have the most reliably functioning system to monitor the prevailing wages and certified payrolls of the Commission's issued contracts.

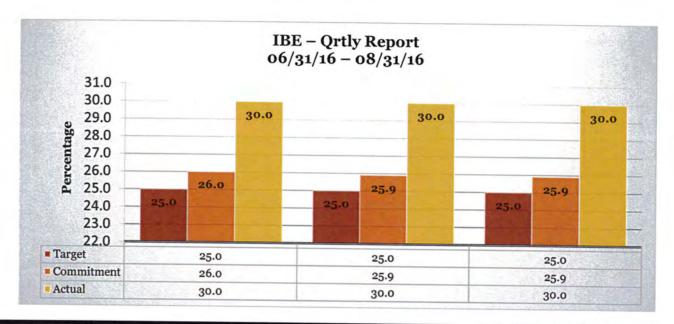

• COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project Website – Made a series of updates and additions to the project website in an effort to further spread awareness of the proposed toll schedule for the new bridge. Posted and made corresponding date corrections for releases pertaining to the noise walls construction currently taking place along the I-95 approach in Lower Makefield, PA.

DRJTBC.ORG Website Redesign — Completed the page-by-page and screen-shot-by-screen-shot critiques of the draft pages comprising the Commission's submitted redesigned website. All totaled, 77 separate scree shot reviews were provided to the web consultants Stokes Creative Group. Additional corrective photographs and IBE forms were provided to ensure the accuracy and appearance of the website. A significant task in this effort was working with designer Qiao Wu to overhaul and correct the submitted toll rates page, which had serious factual and icon errors. The current goal is to have the new website fully vetted and in a condition to go live on or shortly after October 1. This target date was chosen to ensure there wouldn't be any conflict or consequences related to the public comment process for the proposed toll adjustment now pending before the Board of Commissioners.

Noise Wall Construction on Scudder Falls Bridge PA Approach – Issued a project-update press release to apprise motorists and area residents of a post-Labor Day shift in focus of construction in the noise-abatement wall installation project on the Pennsylvania I-95 approach to the Scudder Falls Bridge. This generated coverage in several Bucks County news outlets. The Commission's media consultant team, Bellevue Communications Group, also linked the release on Scudder Falls area social media sites. Another release is anticipated in early September to advance the installation of bird-roosting-resistant netting beneath the current Scudder Falls Bridge.

Public Hearing/Comment Process for Proposed Scudder Falls Toll Schedule and Two Changes in Existing Bridge Toll Rate Classifications – Worked with engineering department, Scudder Falls public involvement consultant McCormick Taylor, Bellevue Communications Group and legal counsel Florio Perrucci to roll out a proposed toll schedule for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge and two unrelated adjustments in the current toll structure for the Commission's seven existing toll bridges. There were a variety of components to this effort, pivoting off the creation of a public notice posted on the commission's website and used as the basis for advertisements in the newspapers that publish legal ads for Commission meetings. Toll schedule sheets were drafted, distributed and posted. Display boards were conceived, reviewed and established for the hearings organized

by McCormick Taylor. An email address was created for the Community Affairs department for purposes of collecting comments. A series of press releases were issued to generate awareness of the proposed toll actions and to advance the toll hearings and corresponding public comment avenues. Links to materials were placed on the Commission's website and the Scudder Falls project website. All of the rollout components were crafted in a manner to comply with the Commission's 2013 toll adjustment policy. The rollout generated news a wide variety of media coverage through the Commission's service jurisdiction.

Riverton-Belvidere TSB Critical Member Strengthening Project – Issued a press release on the approaching start of an upcoming project at the R-BTSB involving repairs to the bridge's truss work and slope-stabilization improvements along the bridge's approaches. The press release emphasized that motorists could experience minor delays while work take place over the coming months. The heads-up release generated some news articles and, in tandem with an informational letter from Community Affairs, helped generate public awareness of the upcoming project and its potential travel impacts.

Toll hearings/Scudder Falls

Participated in planning, publicizing and organizing the public toll hearing/comment process on the proposed Scudder Falls toll schedule and other proposed toll adjustments for the Commission's seven current toll bridges. Attended six public hearings in New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Collected public comments via the Communityaffairs@dritbc.com address and the website comment portal. Distributed these inquiries and comments to McCormick-Taylor and Commission staff for inclusion in a final report. Developed responses to those messages which contained nonrhetorical questions. Comments on Scudder Falls include concerns about traffic diversion onto Washington Crossing, questions about All Electronic Tolling and E-ZPass procedures, and requests for local discounts/free passage. Comments about the other proposed adjustments include questioning the necessity and justification for changes.

Riverton-Belvidere Attended construction scheduling and kick-off meeting for the Critical Member Strengthening project. Distributed updated notice to neighbors, municipalities and other stakeholders prior to start of the project.

> Coordinated and attended a meeting with a facility neighbor, District Superintendent Shelly and District Security, Safety and Training Coordinator William Wright to discuss parking on Commission property on the New Jersey approach to the bridge.

Knowlton-Columbia Winter maintenance

Continued working with Knowlton Township, Warren County and New Jersey Department of Transportation officials to finalize map and agreement for winter maintenance of roadways in the village of Columbia. The Commission is firm in no longer maintaining roadways outside of its

Portland-Columbia facility jurisdictions. This will allow the Township to have sole control over the manner of salt application in winter storms.

Coordinated meeting among representatives the NJ Department of Environmental Protection, the NJ Department of Transportation and the Commission for a presentation on the results of the DEP's study of the area's salt/groundwater issue. This meeting is scheduled for late September. The DEP has already met with Knowlton Township officials. At a recent Township Committee meeting, it was stated that well water tests have not shown a seasonal variance in salt levels.

Liberty- Water Gap Trail

We showed how the strips were filled-in and explained that other forms of highway noise are inevitable.

Reviewed request from Lafayette College regarding a letter of support for a grant application. Spoke with Maurice Luker, Executive Director of Government Relations and will meet with him in the future.

Responded to a call from Lambertville Mayor David DelVecchio on behalf of a resident who had items damaged from a tree on Commission property. Reached out to with Insurance Manager Arne Larsen to ensure the claim was being processed and followed-up with Mayor DelVecchio.

Responded to a request from Morrisville Police Department regarding funding for security cameras in the area of Calhoun Street Bridge.

Assisted Senator Scavello's office with a constituent who received an E-ZPass violation in error.

Spoke with Scott Brady of the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission regarding traffic counters at the Lower Trenton Bridge to count bicycle passage.

Follow-up on other various website inquires to ensure customer inquiries receive a confirmation of receipt and/or response.

DESIGN Contract No. C-628A-5

Dewberry was issued Notice to Proceed effective February 22, 2016. A project kick-off meeting was held with Dewberry and their sub-consultant, The Lighting Practice, on March 3, 2016. The designer is proceeding with required tasks. The initial draft concept report has been submitted and reviewed by Commission staff. The consultant revised and resubmitted the concept report as a result of staff comments. The revised report is currently under review by staff.

LOWER TRENTON TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE NJ APPROACH TRAFFIC SIGNAL UPGRADES

Contract No. C-627B-4

French & Parrello Associates (FPA) submitted the draft NJ Approach Traffic Signal Upgrades Schematic Design Report. The document was reviewed by Commission Staff and comments were prepared and provided to FPA. FPA will finalize the report by addressing the review comments and then will begin preliminary design that includes preparing plans and specifications for upgrading the traffic signal equipment.

SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT FINAL DESIGN SERVICES

FINAL DESIGN Contract No. C-660A

Michael Baker Jr., Incorporated (MB) of Hamilton New Jersey was issued the Notice to Proceed effective March 11, 2015. During the months of July and August Baker prepared and submitted responses to the Pre-Final Submission comments and developed final construction documents for the project. The Final Submission of Contract T-668A contract documents was made on August 29, 2016. The final submission included plans, specifications, cost estimate, construction schedule, quantity calculations, and design calculations. In addition to the above, Baker submitted the NJDEP Permit Modification application package to NJDEP for review and approval as well as the Aids to Navigation Plan application to the PA Fish and Game Commission for their review and approval..

A meeting was held with the Baker Team on August 4, 2016 to resolve any outstanding comments from the Pre-Final Design submission and discuss any outstanding design issues related to the project.

DMC SERVICES FOR MANAGEMENT AND OVERSIGHT OF FINAL DESIGN

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2G

AECOM's Design Management Consultant (DMC) Services are being continued under this Task Order Assignment that was authorized on January 16, 2015. The DMC services being provided under this Task Order Assignment include management and oversight of final design for the project through award of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project main construction contract. The DMC Services also include support to the Commission with the following: agency coordination, ROW acquisition plan development, ROW acquisition process coordination, environmental permitting, public involvement support, and coordination of necessary agreements with outside agencies.

Environmental permitting agency coordination continued with the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) regarding the two (2) Joint Permit application packages for the final build condition — one (1) for PennDOT maintenance jurisdiction, and one (1) for Commission maintenance jurisdiction. The Joint USACE/PADEP Permit Application Package for the Commission's maintenance jurisdiction was submitted to the PADEP on February 29, 2016, and to the USACE on March 4, 2016. The Joint USACE/PADEP Permit Application Package for PennDOT's maintenance jurisdiction was submitted to PennDOT in early March and to the PADEP on March 25, 2016. Additional back-up information was provided to PADEP on May 18th to support the Joint Permit Application for the Commission's jurisdiction.

Coordination has also been ongoing with NJDEP – Green Acres regarding final approval of the Parkland Diversion Permit, and the draft Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the maintenance and operation of the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility. NJ Statehouse Commission approval of the conveyance of State lands (ROW impacts by the SFB project) was received at the June 30, 2016 Statehouse Commission meeting. The draft MOU for the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility has been circulated for final comments from the involved agencies on August 25th and is anticipated to be presented to the Commissioners for final approval at the September 26, 2016 Commission Meeting.

The Commission is still awaiting preliminary approval of the Revised Jurisdictional Determination (JD) Plans that were submitted to the USACE on December 11, 2015.

The ROW acquisition process continued during the month of June, including coordination between Commission staff and the Commission's NJ and PA Legal Counsel. To date the Commission has purchased the following properties in Pennsylvania: Parcel 20-030-084 at 1140 Woodside Road, an additional property not required for construction; Parcels 20-030-083 and 20-030-096, at 185 River Road, an additional property not required for construction; and, Parcels 20-030-059 and 20-030-059-001, at 1149 Woodside Road, both parcels required for construction. The Commission also purchased a partial easement on Parcel 20-027-007, necessary for

construction. The Right-of-Way Easement Agreement for the property over the PA Delaware Canal was fully executed by the Pennsylvania DCNR in July.

The Commission continues to pursue properties in Pennsylvania and New Jersey in support of this project. An offer was made to Judith Sackheim for Parcel 20-030-057 in the amount of \$420,000. The offer was accepted and the agreement of sale is being reviewed by Mrs. Sackheim. An Agreement of Sale for Parcel 20-030-056 (I-95 Park and Ride site) has been reached, and is awaiting final signatures by Lower Makefield Township.

DMC Staff completed the coordination and oversight of Contract T-661, Geotechnical Boring Contract for the SFB Project. All work under the call-back phase of the contract, which included thirty-four (34) additional borings, was completed during the month of May. The contract was close-out in July. The DMC continues to provide Resident Engineer and Construction Inspection services for the T-667A, Advanced Tree Clearing Contract. Phase 1 work began in early January and all tree cutting work was completed by March 31, 2016. Phase 2 work will begin in October of this year. The DMC is coordinating changes in the limits of the tree clearing for the Phase 2 tree clearing work with the Contractor as well as work involved with the demolition of the dwelling located at 1140 Woodside Road (former Ferrante property).

Various submittals by Baker were reviewed by the DMC Staff during July and August and comments returned to Baker. These included review of the Pre-Final Design Submission in July and the subsequent review of the responses to the comments. In addition, ongoing coordination continued with the Baker Team and the various utility companies regarding the Utility Relocation Agreements in Pennsylvania. The Utility companies are currently finalizing cost estimates for the relocation of their facilities. The Commission is working with NJDOT on the NJ utility relocation effort and coordinating the necessary utility agreements with them for the impacted NJ utility companies. The Commission will reimburse the NJDOT for the costs associated with relocating the impacted NJ utility companies.

In Pennsylvania, the draft utility agreement for PECO Electric, Comcast, and Sunesys have been prepared and are in various stages of review and approval.

The Commission has received a copy of the fully executed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Commission and NJDOT, to address coordination efforts required during design and construction, on June 6, 2016. The Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the Commission and PennDOT is with PennDOT for execution.

The request for proposals (RFP) for the CM Services associated with the main construction contract for the SFB Project (Contract CM-669A) was posted on June 7th. The Pre-Proposal Meeting was held on June 28th. Four (4) proposals were received on July 28th. Oral Presentations with the four firms are scheduled for September 7, 2016.

Pennoni Associates, Inc. (Pennoni) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective July 28, 2015. This Contract is for professional traffic engineering services for a pre-construction traffic study required prior to construction of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, in accordance with the Interagency Agreement (IA) dated April 30, 2012 between the DRJTBC, PennDOT and NJDOT. This study will serve as the baseline for purposes of determining the traffic diversion impacts from tolling the new Scudder Falls Bridge. As prescribed in the IA, the study area includes bridge crossings, various County and State road networks, intersections and interchanges that may be affected by the tolling of the new bridge. The scope of services includes traffic counts, data collection and traffic analysis.

The Pennoni team has completed the traffic data collection, the base modelling of the regional traffic network and they have finalized the Pre-Construction Traffic Study Report addressing all previous Commission comments. Copies of the report were provided to PennDOT and NJDOT for their information, on April 20, 2016 in accordance with the Interagency Agreement for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project.

Comments were received from the PennDOT District 6-0 Traffic Unit and a meeting to review and resolve the comments was held on June 6, 2016. Agreed upon comment resolution has been incorporated into the Report. Upon review and approval by te Commission the final document will be transmitted to NJDOT as well as PennDOT.

Sparwick Contracting, Inc. (SCI) completed all deck repairs and roadway striping by September 8, 2015. SCI is now into the on-call and emergency spall repairs phase of the contract for the next two years, on an as-needed basis, as part of their construction contract.

This contract is for Preliminary, Final and Post-Design Services for renovations and expansion at the I-78 Maintenance Garage as identified under a Task Order Assignment for Space Utilization Program and Concept Study provided by Buchart Horn, Inc. / BASCO Associates.

Burns Engineering Inc. (BE) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective July 28, 2015. A kick-Off Meeting was conducted on August 4th, and the Consultant collected As-Built information on August 11, 2015.

Subsurface borings exploration were completed on August 26, preliminary Topographic Land Survey submission, preliminary Geotechnical Report, and Basis of Design were received on September 22, 2015. User group work session was held with the Commission senior staff on October 9, reviewed the building systems' infrastructure requirements necessary to support the Commission's maintenance and operation functions for inclusion in the Consultant's first design Submission. Final Topographic Land Survey and Survey Control Report were received November 3, 2016, and Final Geotechnical Report was received on December 7 2015.

Meeting of September 26 2016 PROJECT STATUS REPORT For Months of July and August, 2016

Xerox and TransCore continue to perform preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Commission Staff met with Xerox and TransCore to review maintenance activity for the month.

Commission staff issued a Purchase Order for the 2016 Annual Spare Parts / Consumables. Acquisition of the spare parts and consumables is underway by Xerox. Once all items are received, Commission Staff will review the inventory. Additionally, as the new electronic toll collection system is installed in a lane, the existing equipment will be added to the spare parts inventory.

Commission staff is working with Xerox to determine where to store the existing toll equipment as it is removed from the lanes. We will prepare a list of equipment and check with other toll agencies to see if they have a need for it.

DB-584 <u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Project</u>

The design of the new NJ Customer Service Center (CSC) is on-going. The New Jersey Turnpike Authority (NJTA), as the lead agency, is facilitating all meetings with the other agencies and Xerox. The new CSC is expected to go live in February 2017.

Commission Staff reviewed the revised draft Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) prepared by the NJTA. This document includes the terms and conditions for all the agencies that operated within the NJ CSC. Comments were provided to the NJTA for inclusion in the final document.

TRAFFIC COUNT PROGRAM UPGRADE DR-550A

A Purchase Order was issued to Signal Service, Inc., West Chester, PA for the traffic counters, server and additional materials. Signal Service is a member of the Pennsylvania Department of General Services COSTARS Program (Cooperative Purchasing Contract No. 4400012659). The COSTARS Program sets the pricing for the traffic counters, auxiliary equipment, and software to be purchased.

The computer server was received and forwarded to Signal Service for programming. We expect to begin receiving the traffic counter equipment in the near future. Coordination with Verizon for activation of the wireless modems is on-going.

Signal Service submitted the draft reports that will be produced by the new system and they are under review by Commission Staff.

IMPLEMENTATION ADVISOR
Task Order Assignment No. C-621A-4

The RK&K team continues to support the Commission in its design of the replacement Electronic Toll Collection System (DB-540A). Team members attended biweekly status meetings and the Factory Acceptance Testing (FAT) at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge. RK&K also prepared the FAT punch list and reviewed and summarized comments on the revised Training Manuals.

Meeting of September 26 2016 PROJECT STATUS REPORT For Months of July and August, 2016

DESIGN, BUILD AND MAINTAIN Contract No. DB-540A

TransCore is preparing the engineering design package, they completed a revised submission of training manuals, continue to work on the Onsite First Installation Testing document, Disaster Recovery Plan and the Maintenance Plan. Additionally, TransCore continued to provide details for the installation of the All Electronic Toll Collection System to Michael Baker for the Scudder Falls Bridge project. TransCore facilitated biweekly project status meetings.

TransCore completed Factory Acceptance Testing of the conventional toll lane system at Lane 2 at the New Hope–Lambertville Toll Bridge. Commission staff and vehicles were used for creating the test transactions both in dry runs and the official testing. TransCore began installation of equipment at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge for preparation of the open road tolling (ORT) Factory Acceptance Test. TransCore will utilize the 17' wide right shoulder of the ORT zone for this testing. Xerox will remove the existing equipment from the shoulder lane to make room for the new equipment.

TOLL PLAZA SIGN REPLACEMENT

NEW HOPE - LAMBERTVILLE, EASTON-PHILLIPSBURG, PORTLAND-COLUMBIA, MILFORD-MONTAGUE TOLL BRIDGES Task Order Assignment No. C-621A-3

Commission Staff received a fair and reasonable price through the on-call agreement with J. Flectch Creamer & Son for the I-78 approach roadway sign overlays. A shop drawing was submitted and reviewed by the design engineer, RK&K. Comments were addressed and a final shop drawing was submitted. The work was completed through a nighttime, two lane closure to minimize impact on traffic.

TransCore provided a cost for the acquisition of the Daktronics LED signs to be installed over each toll lane at the New Hope-Lambertville, Easton-Phillipsburg, Portland-Columbia and Milford-Montague Toll Bridges. Commission Staff prepared an unforeseen allowance reduction package for the procurement of the signs. TransCore and Commission Staff are working on a contract Change Order for the installation of the signs. Since these signs will be integrated into the new toll system and TrasnCore will be on site with their electrician, there is an opportunity to reduce risk and achieve a savings by completing the installation of the signs with TransCore.

STUDY FOR SELECT VEHICULAR BRIDGES Contract No. C-556A

Pennoni Associates submitted their final report outlining opportunities for implementation of structural health monitoring as well as overweight / oversized vehicle detection, deterrence and enforcement through the long term application of sensor type technologies together with a data acquisition / reporting system to function as an integrated Bridge Monitoring System.

The Commission is currently evaluating the recommendation to recommission the monitoring equipment at New Hope-Lambertville and Riverton-Belvidere Toll Supported bridges.

DESIGN FOR SELECT BRIDGES Task Order Assignment C-628B-6

Under this Task Order Assignment (TOA) the Consultant, the Louis Berger Group. Inc. (Berger), is providing professional services for the design of the installation of overweight / oversized vehicle detection linked to alarms, signage and camera to discourage the passage of these vehicles over selected bridges. Notice to proceed was given on December 15, 2015. Kick off meeting was held on January 15, 2016. Existing plans were transmitted to Consultant in order to start construction plan preparation. Consultant conducted field visit to all five bridge sites February 18 & 19, 2016. A Meeting was held with IT and ESS on March 7, 2016 to discuss possible location of over height sensors and connectivity to existing communication systems. Plans showing proposed location of over height sensors, cameras and new weight restriction signing have been submitted and reviewed. Based on review comment locations will be adjusted and a field meeting with ESS will be scheduled to verify and finalize camera locations. Due to the departure of personnel Berger submitted the name and qualifications of a new project manager which has been accepted by the Commission.

LEVEL 3 – INVESTMENT GRADE TRAFFIC AND REVENUE FORECASTS Contract No. C-549AR

Once the Commission determines the final toll rate schedule for the Scudder Falls Bridge, Jacobs Engineering will finalized their traffic and revenue forecast be preparing a report. Additionally, Jacobs Engineering prepared an expected Scudder Falls Bridge daily toll revenue value that was provided to Commission Staff to assist with determining a liquidated damage amount that will be included as part of the Scudder Falls Bridge specifications.

Meeting of September 26 2016 PROJECT STATUS REPORT For Months of July and August, 2016

GENERAL ENGINEERING CONSULTANT 2015-2016 ANNUAL INSPECTIONS C-684A

As the Commission's General Engineering Consultant (GEC), Cherry, Weber & Associates (CWA) is providing Annual Inspection Services for the Toll-Supported Bridges in 2016. CWA was provided with Notice to Proceed on March 23, 2015. A kick-off meeting was held on February 25, 2016 for the 2016 Toll-Supported Bridge Inspections at the Easton - Phillipsburg Toll Bridge Administration Building and attended by representatives from District 1, District 2, Operations, Engineering and CWA.

Bridge and Facility Inspections have been completed at the toll-supported bridges. 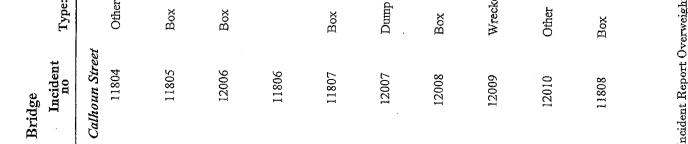

ELECTRONIC SECURITY AND SURVEILLANCE REPORT MONTHS OF JULY &AUGUST 2016

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving the Electronic Security and Surveillance Department:

Radio System

- During the months of July and August 2016, ESS personnel worked with the Districts to start installing the new radios in the various trucks and equipment. The new Stockton Repeater site is progressing along.
- ESS personnel alone, and in conjunction with the New Jersey State Police investigated various other DRJTBC radio issues both during and after normal working hours.
- ESS personnel continue to work with the Districts and IT to update the Cartegraph radio inventory database.

Access Control System

- During the months of July and August 2016, ESS personnel worked with General Supply (Commission's lock smith) to address various lock issues.
