ROLL CALL

Frank G. McCartney, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting, called the Roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present- there being four members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and five members present from the State New Jersey.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS MAY 2010 MEETING

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the Meeting and said:

"We have now progressed our Meeting to the point where we undertake the Annual Election of Officers. The Minutes of the last Commission Meeting demonstrated compliance by the Chairman of the Commission's By-Laws and the Chairman now requests the Chairman of the nominating committee to introduce nominations to fill the office of Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer to serve for the ensuing year. At this time I'll turn the gavel over to Mr. McCartney."

Executive Director McCartney addressed the Meeting and said:

"WHEREAS, the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission has convened on this 24th day of May 2010, in compliance with the By-Laws; and

"WHEREAS, the Commission's By-Laws also provide that the 'Nominating Committee' of the Commission shall consist of all the Commissioners, except the Commissioner holding the Offices of the Chairman and Vice Chairman; and

"WHEREAS, DAVID DEGEROLAMO, a Member of the Commission from the State of New Jersey, has been nominated for the Office of Chairman; and

"WHEREAS, GAETAN ALFANO, a member of the Commission from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, has been nominated for the Office of Vice Chairman; and

"WHEREAS, JAMES BROUGHAL, a member of the Commission from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has been nominated for the Office of Secretary-Treasurer;

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--each to serve in such Office for the ensuing year; and

"WHEREAS, no further nominations for the said Offices were made, and motions authorizing closure of said nominations were passed unanimously; and

"WHEREAS, the Commission Members, by the above-described actions have indicated their intent to unanimously elect DAVID DEGEROLAMO as Chairman; GAETAN ALFANO, as Vice Chairman; and JAMES BROUGHAL as Secretary-Treasurer;

"NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at this 'Annual Meeting' assembled this 24th day of May 2010, that the Executive Director of the Commission, Frank G. McCartney, in his capacity as Secretary for this 'Annual Meeting' be, and he hereby is authorized and directed, on behalf of the Commission Members, to cast a unanimous ballot of (1) DAVID DEGEROLAMO, who will serve as Chairman; (2) GAETAN ALFANO, who will serve as Vice Chairman; and (3) JAMES BROUGHAL, who will serve as Secretary-Treasurer of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission for the ensuing year, and the said DAVID DEGEROLAMO, GAETAN ALFANO and JAMES BROUGHAL will (effective immediately) assume all authorities, powers and duties vested respectively in the Offices of Chairman, Vice Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer, as set forth in (1) the By-Laws of the Commission; (2) the Minutes of previous Commission Meetings; and (3) the Trust Indenture."

Chairman DeGerolamo invited questions on the Resolution, but no questions were presented. No negative votes were cast and the Resolution was unanimously adopted.

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the Public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Thank You, Mr. Chairman,

As everyone knows, the Commission's first open-road-tolling lanes opened to traffic this past month at our I-78 toll facility. Both Express E-ZPass lanes at I-78 went online shortly before 8 a.m. May 13 – almost two weeks ahead of the original May 26 target date. The motorists' adjustment to the new facility and traffic patterns has been outstanding. In its first week, the facility handled more than 109,000 vehicles – 55.5 percent of I-78 west traffic There were no accidents in the new lanes and peak-period traffic queues have vanished. This is a huge accomplishment Each of the new Express E-ZPass lanes is capable of processing up to 2,000 vehicles per hour. The new lanes and reconfigured barrier toll plaza has exponentially increased our capacity at this location. This modernization will provide time-savings and traffic-congestion relief for many years to come. This investment in ORT technology also will enable us to better serve an anticipated upsurge in port-related truck traffic after the widening of the Panama Canal is completed in 2014. Finally, this improvement is yet another delivery on the promise we made to our customers when the Commission increased tolls in 2002, we are using the increased

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revenues to improve our facilities and operations. There are many people I want to commend Chief Engineer George Alexandridis and Program Manager for Technology Chip Stracciolini oversaw the program. In the field, Chris Rood of AECOM. along with Chris Lohrman of Hill International provided construction oversight, STV completed the initial Assessment Study, HNTB did the conceptual plan and preliminary design, AP Construction along with KS Engineers and H&J International were the design-build team, and ACS provided the In-Lane Toll System.

Construction was performed under a competively bid design-build contract with AP Construction, KS Engineers, and H&J International. ACS is the toll system integrator at the front end And ETC is running the customer service and violation processing centers. Finally – and most importantly of all – I want to thank our customers. For four months, they endured traffic delays and long lines at the toll plaza – especially during evening peak periods on Thursdays and Fridays. On Friday, a large banner was hung across I-78 west to thank our customers for their patience. The Express E-ZPass lanes are completed – but the work goes on. More project elements will be completed in June to include the installation of the LED signs over each conventional lane, a stairway / ladder access to the toll plaza canopy and the installation of large concrete barriers in front of each toll island. Total project completion is expected next month when we hope to have a dedication ceremony.

Today is significant because it marks the initiation of the four-month shutdown of the Calhoun Street Toll-Supported Bridge. At 6 a.m., construction crews closed the 125-year-old bridge to both vehicular and pedestrian traffic. It is not scheduled to reopen until September 24. This is the first time the Commission is employing a sustained traffic shutdown under the Capital Improvement Program that was initiated in 2001. The total shutdown approach was favored by 77 percent of residents who indicated a construction preference during a public involvement process that was conducted last year in Trenton and Morrisville. We have sought to alert the public of the shutdown in recent weeks through the media, mailings to large employers, and signage on or near the bridge. There also is a designated detour route using the nearby Lower Trenton Bridge. Despite these efforts, we anticipate that there will be an adjustment period for motorists. An average 18,400 vehicles use the bridge each day – the most of any of our two-lane truss bridges.

Another bridge rehabilitation will take additional step forward at today's meeting. Commissioners have before them a resolution authorizing the construction contract for the Riegelsville Bridge Rehabilitation Project. Like the Calhoun Street span, the Riegelsville Bridge is more than 100 years old and needs a facelift. The bridge is our only vehicular suspension span, so it presents a whole new set of challenges. We anticipate the following work being done: rehabilitating or replacing the bridge's steel floor system and sidewalks, painting of the superstructure, rehabilitating the substructure above the waterline, upgrading bridge lighting and improving signage. Engineers expect that the bridge's load rating can be increased to three tons when all the work is done.

Finally, I want to close out my remarks with an update on our Munis ERM project. Within the last several weeks, the Commission cut over from its 9-year-old finance system to the new ERM – which stands for Enterprise Resource Management system.

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This marked the culmination of an extensive two-year effort of planning, acquisition, conversion and training. The work included: Thorough assessment of the Commission's current and future needs, selection of an appropriate ERM system and designing, training and implementation for the new system. Accounting, purchasing, budgeting and treasury management features of the new system all went live this month. Commission staff and our vendors will continue to bring the remaining elements of the system on line over the next month: Capital program management, Human resources, Asset management and paperless management functions. This expansive software upgrade will enable scores of Commission employees to perform their job responsibilities more efficiently and effectively. Specific thanks to Sean McNeeley for leading this effort to a successful opening

With the I-78 Express E-ZPass facility on line in time for the holiday weekend – as we promised – I am happy to report that we are ready for the annual summer driving season. Have a safe holiday.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of May 24, 2010 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (APRIL, 2010)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for April 2010 in comparison to the April 2009 traffic and revenue statistics. This is the tenth month since May 2009 that toll revenue has exceeded the revenue generated in the corresponding month of the previous year. February 2010 was the only month since May 2009 that reflected a decrease in total toll revenue compared to the corresponding month of the previous year.

Analysis of April 2010/April 2009 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 4.51 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 4.72 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 3.94 percent increase.

Analysis of April 2010/April 2009 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 142,734 vehicles, or 4.70 percent.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 18,721 vehicles, or 4.78 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 124,022 vehicles, or 4.69 percent
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for April 2010 decreased by 6,949 vehicles, or 0.26 percent as compared to April 2009.

Traffic analysis for 2010 YTD:

- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for the first four months
 of 2010 was 95,712 total vehicles as compared to 93,870 total vehicles for January
 through April 2009, an increase of 1.96 percent.
- Recorded westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for YTD 2010 is reflecting a 0.72 percent decrease as compared to the same 4-month period in 2009.

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for April 2010 reflected a 17.51 percent increase as a result of an increase of 84,996 cars and an increase of 9,109 trucks when compared to April 2009. It should be noted that roadway construction work preparation for the Trenton – Morrisville Toll Bridge Rehabilitation and One Auxiliary Northbound Lane (T-380B) began in April 2006, with full lane closures commencing in April 2007. This project was substantially completed in September 2009. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 6,527 cars combined with an increase of 407 trucks to generate a combined decrease in total toll traffic of 3.65 percent for April 2010 as compared to April 2009.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an overall decrease of 3.56 percent in total toll traffic for the month of April 2010 compared to April 2009 as the result of a 33,156 vehicle decrease in cars and a 4,987 vehicle increase in trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, an increase of 76,275 passenger vehicles combined with a decrease of 944 trucks to generate a 14.22 percent increase in total toll traffic for April 2010.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 6.15 percent increase in total toll traffic during April 2010 as a result of increases of 4,717 automobiles and 1,917 trucks compared to April 2009. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, a decrease of 8,798 passenger vehicles and an increase of 3,716 trucks combined to generate a 0.64 percent decrease in total toll traffic for April 2010 as compared to April 2009. At Milford-Montague (MM), an increase of 6,515 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 417 trucks produced an overall 5.96 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of April 2010.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of April 2010 and the four month year-to-date operations of fiscal year 2010 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$3,449,274 for the month of April. For the 2010 fiscal year-to-date period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$14,233,241 or 92.3% of the year-to-date operating budget. Some of the budget surplus is due to changes in the annual encumbrance activity for 2010. Normally, fuel and salt supplies are encumbered for the entire operating year. As of March 2010, these items are only encumbered for the first half of the operating year. Additional encumbrances will be forthcoming when new supplies contracts are approved. Most of the expense line items are well within their year-to-date operating budget.

There are several line items that are currently running ahead of budget on a year-to-date basis. Salary expense is currently running about 1.6% or \$88,000 over budget. The current operating budget anticipates a 3.5% vacancy rate for all salary classes but currently less than 2% of budgeted positions are vacant. Overtime is 21.5% or \$26,000 over budget due to the significant snow events in 2010. Commission expense is 41% or \$3,000 ahead of budget due to purchases of supplies and materials. All other expense line items are within their budgets. All of these over budget line items improved from the previous month.

There were no significant expenses recorded during the month of April.

April 2010

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of April 2010, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 29 purchase orders. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 66 price inquiries were sent out for 29 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 2.28 per order ($66 \div 29$).

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT April 2010

COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Photo-op/Media Event for Gate Removal at Easton-Phillipsburg Toll Bridge: Communications personnel worked with Engineering and E-P Operations personnel to conduct a pre-planned photo opportunity for local media to help relay the news that the Commission delivered on its promise to remove gates (traffic control arms) at the E-P toll plaza in Phillipsburg. The event spurred print, television, and Internet coverage, helping to further relay the advantages of E-ZPass ownership.

First Anniversary of Motorist Assistance Program: At the urging of Commissioners, Communications began carrying out a plan to boost public awareness of the Commission's MAP program. A press release was issued extolling customer usage rates of the free service during its first full 12 months of operation. A new webpage in the News and Travel section of the agencies website also was created, replete with text and photographs. An information card for distribution at toll booths, E-ZPass events and other availabilities also is in development.

Scudder Falls Bridge Bike/Ped Path: Worked with Bellevue Communications to issue a press release and provide information to news outlets about the Commission's decision to include a walkway as part of the I-95/Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. The announcement received featured coverage in local and regional newspapers and a variety of electronic media outlets.

Completion of E-ZPass Tri-Fold Promotional Brochure: Worked with Bellevue Communications and its graphics consultants to complete development of a tri-fold brochure to help generate more E-ZPass account holder. The graphically appealing handout was developed to be distributed in toll lanes and at E-ZPass sign-up events. It contains information on the advantages of E-ZPass ownership (including widespread use in Northeast states, commuter discounts, time savings) and features the phone number and Web address motorists may use to get account applications. This is the next to last element of an advertising campaign initiated in late 2009.

During the month of April, 2010 the Director of Policy and Planning participated in a number of communications and meetings that explored the following:

The Monroe County Road Task Force had discussions of countywide transportation projects led by John Woodling, Director, Monroe County Planning Commission, and a representative from PennDOT District 5. The Director updated the Task Force on the rescheduling of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission's Delaware Water Gap (I-80) Toll Bridge E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling Project. Everyone present received a copy of our March 02, 2010 news release.

The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) Planning Coordinating Committee and Regional Transportation Committee viewed and heard a presentation by Zoe Neaderland, DVRPC Manager, Office of Transportation Safety and Congestion Management entitled "Fitting the Pieces Together – Improving Transportation Security Planning in the Delaware Valley. Ms. Neaderland presentation provided an overview of transportation security planning in the Delaware Valley, without revealing sensitive information; it increased communication about an integrated approach among professionals in transportation security planning throughout the Delaware Valley and with other members of the transportation and planning communities; and it strengthens DVRPC's work in transportation security planning as required by federal regulations for Metropolitan Planning Organizations.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Congressional Luncheon featured two members of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure from the United States House of Representatives, Charlie Dent (PA15-R) and Jim Gerlach (PA6-R). The Congressmen gave their opinions on many issues including immigration, cap and trade, healthcare, job creation, transportation, and the failed proposed tolling of I-80.

The Greater Pocono Chamber of Commerce Economic Development/Transportation Committee was updated by Charles A. Leonard, Pocono Mountains Economic Development Corporation Executive Director, on major countywide projects. Matt Neeb, a Monroe County Planning Commission Senior Planner led the discussion on countywide transportation initiatives.

The Lehigh Valley Economic Development Corporation Legislative and Governmental Relations Committee featured the six candidates for Pennsylvania Governor: Thomas Corbett (R), Pennsylvania Attorney General, (taped appearance); Joseph Hoeffel (D), Montgomery County Commissioner; Daniel Onorato (D), Allegheny County Executive; Samuel Rohrer (R-128), Pennsylvania State Representative; Jack Wagner (D), Pennsylvania Auditor General; and Anthony Williams (D-8), Pennsylvania State Senator. The candidates discussed their platforms, while emphasizing economic development and infrastructure.

Meeting of May 24, 2010

The Lehigh Valley Transportation Study Coordinating Committee led by Michael Rebert, PennDOT District 5 Executive, discussed the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act II – status and candidate projects. Armando Greco, Executive Director Lehigh and Northampton Transportation Authority, presented the authority's regional public transportation plan for the Lehigh Valley. Michael Kaiser, Executive Director Lehigh Valley Planning Commission, presented the final Lehigh Valley Trails Inventory – 2009 Lehigh and Northampton Counties.

The Pike County Road Task Force discussed countywide transportation projects with PennDOT District 4 Traffic Engineer Keith Williams and Pike County Commissioner Vice Chairman Harry Forbes (R). Pennsylvania State Representatives Michael Peifer (R-139) and John Siptroth (D-189) updated the task force on the next steps to be taken by the Commonwealth regarding the federal government's rejection of the tolling of I-80.

The Director attended the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission Workplace/Safety Health Committee Meeting.

The Northeastern Pennsylvania Rural Transportation Planning Organization Committee heard and viewed a presentation by Dan Walston, Federal Highway Administration Transportation Specialist. Mr. Walston discussed the Federal Highway Functional Classification Procedure in order for transportation projects to become eligible for federal-aid. The committee also discussed the rejection and the consequences of the proposal to toll I-80.

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Public Policy Committee discussed updates from the Chamber's four subcommittees; Energy/Environment, Healthcare, Tax, and Transportation. The Chamber's Annual Transportation Luncheon scheduled for May 14 will feature Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation Allen Biehler (invitations have been extended to the six candidates for governor).

The East Penn Chamber of Commerce and Western Lehigh Chamber of Commerce "What's New in the World of Transportation Luncheon" featured a panel discussion by Owen O'Neil, Planning Director Lehigh and Northampton Transportation Authority (LANTA), Michael Rebert, PennDOT District 5 Executive, and Joseph Gurinko, Lehigh Valley Planning Commission Chief Transportation Planner. Mr. O'Neil presented public transportation and how it is meeting the needs of the Lehigh Valley. Mr. Rebert updated major transportation projects in Lehigh and Northampton Counties. Mr. Gurinko discussed the results of the Central New Jersey/Raritan Valley Transit Study – Pennsylvania Component.

The Warren County Transportation Forum organized and moderated by Warren County Freeholder Angelo Accetturo (R) featured a panel that discussed the county's transportation projects and needs. The speakers included Dave Dech, Warren County Planning Department Director; Brian Appezzato, Warren County Senior Transportation Planner; Barth Johnson, Warren County Traffic Engineer; Jan Marie McDyer, Warren County Human Services; Mary Murphy, Executive Director North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority; Don Watt, Vice President TransOptions; Sheree Davis (Streets Policy), Nick Dogias (Capital Programming), and

Debbie Hirt (Community Relations), New Jersey Department of Transportation; John Del Colle (Government & Community Relations) and Rich Wisneski (Capital Planning), New Jersey Transit; Annette Schultz, RBA Group (Scenic Byways); and the Director who updated the Forum about the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission's Warren County Capital and CAI Projects. Also, in attendance were New Jersey Assemblymen John DiMaio (R-23) and Erik Peterson (R-23).

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Today's Trends in Commercial Real Estate Luncheon honored the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission as one of four recipients of a "2010 Commercial Real Estate Investment Award". Commission Chairman David R. DeGerolamo and Commissioner James L. Broughal accepted the honor.

The Renew Lehigh Valley Leadership Council discussed the results and next steps to be taken for the Central New Jersey/ Raritan Valley Transit Study – Pennsylvania Component. The Council also adopted a transportation policy statement, which aims to articulate smart growth principles for regional transportation planning and investment.

The Lehigh Valley Transportation Study Technical Committee was given a major Lehigh Valley Highway Status Report and a presentation on candidate American Recovery and Reinvestment Act II Projects by Gerald L. Fry Assistant District 5 Executive for Design. Lehigh Valley Planning Commission Chief Transportation Planner Joseph Gurinko discussed the draft 2011-2014 Transportation Improvement Program.

The Easton Area Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors in a discussion led by Tom Huntzinger, Emerson Reid & Company, and Chair of the Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce Healthcare Legislative Committee reviewed the recently passed federal healthcare legislation.



Radio System

- On April 5, 2010, ESS personnel met with Motorola to discuss the future maintenance of our current radio equipment and the purchase of additional equipment.

PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING AND ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION FOR I-95/SCUDDER FALLS TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE

STUDY Contract No. C-393A

The Environmental Assessment (EA)/Draft Section 4(f) Evaluation for the project was circulated for public comment on 12/9/09 and was made available for public review on the Commission's project website and at a number of publicized locations. Public comments were accepted until 2/4/2010. In conjunction with this process, a Public Hearing was conducted in compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Act of 1970, and Section 128 Title 23 of the United States Code, Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as well as New Jersey Department of Transportation policies and procedures. This Public Hearing / Open House was conducted on January 19, 2010 at the Villa Victoria Academy in Ewing, NJ and on January 20, 2010 at the Sheraton Bucks County Hotel in Langhorne, PA. The design consultant AECOM, with HNTB as their Environmental Team Sub-consultant, are preparing responses to the comments received during the public comment period, which will be submitted to the Commission for review.

The EA/Draft 4(f) Document was also distributed to each of the involved transportation agencies and the Cooperating Agencies (US Army Corps of Engineers, ES EPA, PA DEP and the National Marine Fisheries Service) for their final review. The Section 4(f) Evaluation, which is part of the EA, was forwarded by FHWA to their Washington D.C. Office for the Conditional Legal Sufficiency Review. This review has been completed by FHWA, and the request for the final executed Programmatic Agreement has been made by FHWA to issue Legal Sufficiency.

Both NJ and PA State Historic Preservation Officers (SHPO) have issued determinations of effects for project effects on historic and archaeological resources. A Draft Programmatic Agreement to stipulate future actions required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, was reviewed by FHWA, PennDOT and NJDOT. This document identifies the mitigation measures to be taken as a result of the finding of Adverse Effect to the Delaware & Raritan Canal cultural resource and potential for adverse effect to archaeological resources in PA and NJ. The Draft Programmatic Agreement also has been reviewed and commented upon by the NJSHPO, the PA SHPO and the Delaware and Raritan Canal Commission. Legal reviews have also been completed by the Commission and PennDOT. This document includes signatories from the Commission and outside New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and FHWA agencies involved in reviewing the EA. It has also been determined that the Delaware & Raritan Canal Commission (NJ) and the NJDEP Green Acres Division will not be co-signing agencies to the Programmatic Agreement.

Meeting of May 24, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The Commissioners, at the February 22, 2010 Commission Meeting authorized the Executive Director to execute the agreement on behalf of the Commission. Subsequent to this authorization the Programmatic Agreement was circulated for final signatures. Signatures have been received from the executing signatories — Federal Highway Authority (FHWA), and Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Officer (PHMC); New Jersey State Historic Preservation Officer (NJ SHPO) signature pending; and concurring signatories — Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission, New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT), and Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT). NJSHPO now indicates that Green Acres' concerns may not be fully addressed, which is preventing them from signing the Programmatic Agreement. The concern conveyed to the Commission by NJSHPO on April 29, 2010 is that by signing the PA in its current form they are precluding Green Acres from obtaining further mitigation. Commission staff is actively engaged with NJSHPO and NJDEP to resolve this latest issue.

The FHWA recommended additional consultation with the NMFS on the EA. Accordingly, a Biological Assessment Report (BA) was prepared for threatened and endangered (T&E) species impacts and was submitted to the NMFS in September 2008. A "No Jeopardy" opinion is anticipated from NMFS. The issuance of the 'No Jeopardy' opinion from NMFS has become tied to the resolution of Cooperating Agency comments to the EA and 4(f) documents. A major concern to these agencies was the causeway construction method and the associated impacts to the T & E species habitat in the vicinity of the Scudder Falls Bridge. At a meeting held on July 17, 2009 all of the agencies agreed that the trestle causeway is the preferred method of construction in the river. As a result of this meeting, a letter was prepared and submitted to NMFS (dated 9/10/09) that revised the causeway recommendation made in the BA document. NMFS prepared a draft of the Reasonable and Prudent Measures (RPMs) and the Terms and Conditions to be followed for the project and submitted these to FHWA, USACOE and the Commission on 11/2/09 for review and comment. Comments were submitted to NMFS and on 11/25/09 the NMFS - Northeast Region, issued a Draft Biological Opinion for the I-95 Scudder Falls Bridge Improvement Project. Review comments by Commission, AECOM, and the CPMC staff have been provided to NMFS. The AECOM/HNTB team has been coordinating final issues associated with this Biological Opinion with NMFS, which has resulted in a revised Biological Opinion issued by NMFS on April 29, 2010. This document is currently under review by AECOM/HNTB and Commission staff. A determination of 'No Jeopardy' is anticipated from NMFS.

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ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE / DETECTION SYSTEM

PROGRAM MANAGER Contract No. C-396A

The Program Manager, Jacobs Edwards & Kelcey, continues to support the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project involving the completion of "punch-list" items as well as the preparation and submission of project close-out documentation.

The project team is developing an action plan to address the resolution of all outstanding "punch-list" items.

DESIGN-BUILD-MAINTAIN PROJECT Contract No. DB-396A

Work relating to the Acquisition and Installation phase of the project has reached substantial completion and is limited to addressing "punch-list" items together with the preparation and submission of all remaining documentation.

Efforts have focused on the Primary Control Center as intended to be installed at the New Jersey State Police's Regional Operation and Information Center (ROIC) in West Trenton, NJ.

The DBM Team is currently supporting the Maintenance phase of the project under the direction of the Commission's Electronic Security and Surveillance Department which operates the system from the Control Center located at the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge facility.

I-78 ROADWAY REHABILITATION CONTRACT

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-424A

Greenman-Pedersen, Inc (GPI) continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract which includes: preparation of contractor invoices; working on the final report for the NJDEP Permit and final project documentation/closeout.

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CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-424A

Tilcon New York, Inc. reached Final Completion on February 5, 2010. The Final Settlement Agreement between the Commission and Tilcon, along with the Final Change Order Number 3, which were both approved at the March 29, 2010 Commission Meeting were executed by all parties.

1-78 OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) LANES DESIGN

DESIGN-BUILD Contract No. DB-427

I-78 ORT Construction Contract DB-427B

AP Construction, Inc. continues to progress the work on schedule with Contract Substantial Completion slated for May 26th. Work on the four (4) new advance sign structures is nearing completion. The remaining required design submittals continue to be submitted along with the required schedule updates. The present maintenance and protection of traffic pattern has four toll lanes opened with lanes 1, 2 and 3 as mix mode and lane 4 as E-ZPass only with this traffic pattern remaining in place until contract Substantial Completion.

I-78 ORT Construction Management/Construction Inspection CM-427B

Hill International continues to provide CM/CI services for this contract which includes: monitoring and coordinating the field activities of the contractor associated with Contract DB-427B; preparation of contractor invoices; receiving and processing submittals; reviewing and commenting on the contractor's schedule updates and 2-Week Look Ahead schedules; holding and documenting bi-weekly Progress Meetings and Schedule Update Meetings; preparing inspection reports for days that the contractor worked on site; project documentation; and operating a project hot-line.

In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project DB-427C

ACS State and Local Solutions (ACS), Commission staff and STV continue to participate in bi-weekly progress meetings. ACS continues to participate in weekly conference calls with Commission staff, STV and ETC (Customer Service Center / Violation Processing Center DBOM) to coordinate the I-78 Toll Bridge Open Road Tolling (ORT) implementation and the transmission of test transaction, violation and image data to the CSC/VPC.

ACS turned on the VES at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge. The installation and commissioning of the VES equipment in Lanes 4 – 8 at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge complete and the Commissioning Test was conducted. The system is scheduled to be turned on with the start of the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge ORT project.

Meeting of May 24, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

ACS is coordinating the installation of the ORT equipment with the I-78 ORT Design-Build Team and continues to coordinate by participating in the I-78 ORT biweekly progress meeting. Field check-out, testing and tuning is underway along with the On-Site Installation Testing. Additionally, the Commissioning test is scheduled for the first week of May 2010 and ACS is preparing to activate the system for production for the second week of May 2010. ACS installed, configured, and activated the digital video auditing system (DVAS) for I-78 ORT lanes.

ACS continues to complete predictive and preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. ACS has secured warehouse space in Flemington, New Jersey and is currently moving the Commission's electronic toll collection spare parts inventory to this location. Once the move is complete, Commission Staff will visit the location and conduct an audit of the inventory.

<u>Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center Design-Build-Operate-</u> Maintain Project DB-427D

Monthly Progress Meetings continue to occur via conference calls with Commission staff, ETC and STV. Customer Service Center (CSC) operations weekly conference calls with Commission staff, ETC, and STV continue so all parties may discuss on-going and upcoming efforts, as well as issues and there resolution. ETC continues to participate in weekly conference calls with Commission staff, STV and ACS (In-Lane Toll System DBM) to coordinate the violation processing center (VPC) with new I-78 ORT Lanes implementation and the transmission of test transaction, violation and image data. ETC is currently working with the NY DMV to develop an interface with them.

ETC began issuing notices for toll violators from the Easton - Phillipsburg Toll Bridge.

ETC has received test data from the I-78 ORT Lanes and will participate in an end-to-end test of the I-78 ORT Lanes the first week of May 2010. ETC is prepared to receive production transactions and violations from the I-78 ORT Lanes beginning the second week of May 2010.

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DELAWARE WATER GAP TOLL BRIDGE (I-80) OPEN ROAD TOLLING (ORT) CONSTRUCTION

DESIGN Contract No. C-440B

Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge (I-80) ORT Contract C-440B

The New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) requested a revision to the Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) as well as the Maintenance Agreement for the advance sign structures that will be located on NJDOT jurisdiction. The revisions to the Agreement were reviewed by Commission Counsel and both the HOP and the Agreement were signed by the Commission and returned to the NJDOT during the last week of April 2010. Stantec re-packaged the bid documents, including revising the proposed overhead roadway signage to meet the new signage standards recently issued by the Federal Highway Authority (FHWA). Stantec has incorporated plans and specifications prepared by Brinjac Engineering for an upgrade to the emergency standby generator. A Notice-to-Contractors was advertised during the first week of May 2010 with construction bids expected during the first week of June 2010.

A Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed letter was issued to Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) of Lebanon, New Jersey. A project kick-off meeting is scheduled during early May 2010. Upon receipt of approved insurance certificates, the agreement will be assembled and issued for execution.

Under this Task Order Assignment STV, Incorporated has participated in meetings, conference calls, and document reviews that are discussed under DB-427C In-Lane Toll System Design-Build-Maintain Project and DB-427D Customer Service Center / Violation Processing Center Design, Build, Operate and Maintain.

Meeting of May 24, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE FACILITY AND LOCUST STREET BRIDGE IMPROVEMENTS (CONTRACT NO. T-441A)

PORTLAND BOROUGH SEWER FORCE MAIN CONNECTION AND FACILITY PARKING LOT PAVING

Task Order Assignment No. C-450B-4

This assignment is for study and design work associated with the required connection of the Portland Toll Facility to a nearby new sanitary sewer system installed by the municipality. The Commission has studied various alternative alignments and is moving forward with Alternative No. 4 as detailed in the T&M Associates' Letter Report entitled "Portland Borough Sewer Force Main Connection" dated September 28, 2007.

Additionally, the 2007 Annual Inspection Report identified the need for minor improvements and repaying of the Administration Building main parking lot, the salt storage yard lot and the access driveway and turn-around for the salt storage yard. This work has been incorporated into this assignment.

For cost efficiency purposes, it was decided to combine the T&M sewer and paving work, T&M's new salt storage facility design with the Portland-Columbia Locust Street Bridge construction work being designed by the Louis Berger Group (LBG). LBG will take the lead in preparing the final construction bid documents.

T&M made their Final Submission which was forwarded to LBG for inclusion as part of Construction Contract T-441A. A coordination/progress meeting with Berger & T&M was held on December 16, 2009. Pre-final plans and specifications combining T&M and LBG's design were submitted on January 20, 2010 with comments provided at a February 2, 2010 progress meeting. Bids for this project were received on March 16, 2010 and the project was awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, H&G Contractors, Inc. on April 26, 2010. H&G was provided with a Notice of Award and Limited Notice-to-Proceed on the same date. It is anticipated that construction will commence in June of 2010.

PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE SALT STORAGE FACILITY

This assignment is for study and design work associated with a new District III salt storage facility to be constructed at Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Maintenance Facility as described in the 2007 and 2008 Annual Inspection Reports.

T&M's final design was incorporated into the Contract T-441A bid package. T&M is currently performing post design efforts associated with this assignment.

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PORTLAND-COLUMBIA TOLL BRIDGE FACILITY, LOCUST STREET REPAIRS

Task Order Assignment No. C-449A-8

The Louis Berger Group's (LBG) final design included improvements to the Locust Street Bridge and installation of toll plaza attenuating devices was incorporated into the Contract T-441A bid package along with other facility improvements as designed by T&M through assignments C-450B-6 (Salt Storage Facility) and C-450B-4 (Portland Borough Sewer Force Main Connection and Facility Parking Lot Paving).

LBG is currently performing post design efforts associated with this assignment.

WASHINGTON CROSSING TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE PHASE 1 REHABILITATION & CONCEPT STUDY

DESIGN Contract No. C-442A

The Design Consultant, Dewberry recently presented staging and scheduling concepts to the Commission for their consideration. Based on positive feedback Dewberry and their Public Involvement subconsultant, ACT Engineering, will be communicating relevant project schedule and staging details to the stakeholders identified during the public outreach portion of the project.

The project consists of repairs to the deteriorated masonry abutments, wingwalls and piers repair of scour protection measures at all piers, introduction of an aesthetic surface treatment on pier no. 2 to match the remaining piers, improvements to the sidewalk railing and replacement of the decking as well as various improvements to the approach roadways and lighting. Dewberry has submitted the final design drawings, specifications, construction cost estimate, and proposed construction schedule which has been reviewed by Commission staff. The contract documents are being advertised on May 11, 2010 with an anticipated award date at the June Commission Meeting. It is anticipated that construction will commence in late August 2010.

UPPER BLACK EDDY-MILFORD TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION DESIGN

DESIGN Contract No. C-444A

A Status Meeting was conducted on April 21, 2010. Final contract documents are under review by Commission and CPMC staff. A meeting was held with the PA Historic and Museum Commission (PHMC) on April 26 to discuss the historic significance of the bridge and, in particular, the chosen bridge walkway railing and lighting. After showing details of our standard railing and lighting, it was agreed by PHMC that these features hold true to the architectural style of the bridge while conforming to the latest safety standards for pedestrians. PHMC will now agree to the design, clearing the way for review by the U.S. Corps of Engineers. This review is needed to secure a permit to replace underwater stone rip-rap that has washed away near the piers, as part of the construction contract.

Project Status Meetings are conducted monthly with Commission, CPMC, and the Erdman Anthony design staff in attendance.

RIEGELSVILLE TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REHABILITATION DESIGN

DESIGN Contract No. C-445A

The Design Consultant responded to questions from contractors concerning bid documents. Three addenda were issued during the bid process. Bids were received and read on April 27. The bids are under review and analysis by the Design Consultant. Pending a recommendation by the Consultant and the Commission management team, the contract will be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT / CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Contract No. CM-445A

The Technical Evaluation Committee (TEC) evaluated the four (4) Letters of Interest submitted by prospective consultants. In a meeting with the Senior Selection Committee, it was determined that three (3) firms would be interviewed by the TEC. Subsequent to the interviews, a recommendation and selection were made.

TranSystems participated in the containment design review meeting on April 9, 2010.

Hill International, Inc. (Hill) of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania was issued their Notice-to-Proceed on March 30, 2010. Hill conducted the Progress & Scheduling Meetings No. 2 & 3 on April 14, 2010 and the 28, 2010 with Neshaminy Constructors, Inc. and their subcontractors. Commission and CPMC Staff, and TranSystems were in attendance. Hill has started adding inspection staff to meet the contractors work schedule, and has submitted invoice and monthly progress report No. 1.

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. TS-447B

Neshaminy Constructors, Inc. (NCI) of Feasterville, Pennsylvania has started installing the under deck shielding and preparations for the PA wingwall demolition. NCI participated in the Progress and Schedule Meeting No. 2 and 3, and pre-activity meetings on the containment, heat straightening, spall repairs and painting; and continues to submit shop drawings and material submittals for approval.

The bridge is scheduled for a complete closure on May 24, 2010. The Commission issued press releases in late April reminding the travelling public of the impending bridge closure, and encouraging them to begin thinking about commuting routes prior to the closure. Additionally, NJDOT has also received a 28-day notification of the closure as requested. This coordination will continue until the closure is in place.

The Draft Study Report for Easton-Phillipsburg, Portland-Columbia and Milford-Montague facilities will be reviewed in May.

A Project Kick-off meeting was conducted on March 02, 2010. A draft Space Program (analysis of existing and proposed space needs) was received on March 26, 2010 review by the Commission and comments were sent back to the Consultant on April 19, 2010 to incorporate into the Final Space Program Report.

A Final Space Program Report is expected to be received by early May 2010.

This Construction Contract was awarded to Dayspring Electric Inc., on September 30, 2009. A Pre-Construction meeting was held on October 6, 2009. Notice to Proceed was issued effective October 23, 2009, and substantial completion was achieved on December 22, 2009.

Final Project Close-Out Documents have been received from the Contractor, reviewed by the Consultant verifying the incorporation of the comments on its draft submission. This Project is being closed and its final adjusted Contract amount is 7.7% below its original Contract amount.

The Consultant, Cherry, Weber & Associates (CWA) submitted the Final Design, which is currently under review by Commission and CPMC staff. A project status meeting was held on April 6, 2010 with the CWA, the CPMC and the Commission. The CPMC met with Mass Electric Construction Co. (MEC), Cherry Weber and the Commission on April 23, 2010 to discuss and further refine the scope and schedule for the removal and replacement of the ESS equipment during construction. The PA NE Regional Railroad Authority responded with comments, flagmen rates and insurance requirements to the RR Accommodation section of the specifications. NJDEP was issued plans and description of work for permit requirements.

Coordination with permitting agencies is ongoing to determine the applicable permits, and documentation requirements.

EASTON-PHILIPSBURG TOLL BRIDGE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

FUEL STORAGE TANK IMPROVEMENTS

DESIGN Task Order Assignment No. C-450B-8

Task 1, Final Design of Fuel Storage Improvements - Final construction documents were submitted in August 2009 and the project was advertised for bid as project T-475A on September 2, 2009. Bids were opened on September 24, 2009 and the T-475A construction contract was awarded at the October 26, 2009 Commission meeting. The Consultant provided ongoing Construction Administration services during construction of the fuel storage improvements. The Consultant prepared a final punch list and will perform a final inspection when all work is complete.

Task 2, Final Design of Storm Water Outfall Improvements - As part of this assignment, the Commission approved a proposal from T&M Associates to study and design the necessary repairs to a 12" storm water outfall at the New Hope – Lambertville Toll Bridge Facility. T&M Associates and Commission staff met with Bucks County Conservation District (BCCD) and the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) at separate meetings to review the project. T&M Associates prepared a letter report summarizing their findings and recommendation. Commission staff also performed an in-house analysis of the existing infiltration basin and found it to have adequate capacity to reroute the runoff from the 12" storm water outfall. Commission staff is seeking approval from BCCD to make the necessary changes.

Meeting of May 24, 2010 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-475A

Construction of Fuel Storage Improvements at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge Administration Building – The contract provides the construction of a new 1000 gallon above ground gasoline storage tank and conversion of the existing 2500 gallon underground gasoline storage tank to diesel storage. The Contractor mobilized on December 14, 2009 and commenced construction. The project was Substantially Complete on February 16, 2010, and the Commission is using both storage tanks. Commission staff was trained on use of the new equipment on February 23, 2010. Completion of final punch list construction items and final inspection are scheduled to be completed in May 2010.

DISTRICT 1, 2 & 3 SUBSTRUCTURE REPAIR AND SCOUR REMEDIATION

DESIGN Contract No. C-476A

The consultant, STV, submitted preliminary design plans and preliminary specifications for review by the Commission and CPMC staff. A review meeting was held on April 19, 2010 and the consultant was provided with a list of review comments. A coordination meeting was held on April 26, 2010 with the Commission, CPMC and STV staff to review the status of the environmental permitting efforts and to ensure that the project is proceeding according to the established schedule.

Meetings were held with the southeast and northeast regional offices of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection on April 15, 2010 and April 26, 2010, respectively. The primary goal of the meetings was to discuss the permit application requirements and the Commission's approach to completing the proposed construction activities in an environmentally sound manner.

The geometric updates to the plans have been completed and revised plans submitted. A draft detailed work plan for the critical project activities was also prepared. The final invoice for this Task Order Assignment has been submitted and is being processed.

It is anticipated that the work started under this Task Order Assignment will be completed under a subsequent Task Order Assignment (C-502A-2D) upon authorization from the Executive Director.

DMC TOLLING STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT & IMPLEMENTATION SUPPORT SERVICES

The Applications in Pennsylvania are as follows: Falls Township, PA applied for a traffic signal modernization at the intersection of Tyburn Road and New Falls Road. Lower Makefield Township, PA applied for the Black Rock Pedestrian Trail Project. Milford Borough, PA, which has an application pending for stormwater improvements to various roadways, submitted an additional application for the Broad Street Parking Lot Improvement project. Morrisville Borough, PA submitted eight applications for road related projects throughout the Borough and one from the Morrisville Municipal Authority for a road rehabilitation project on Moreau Street. New Hope Borough, PA, in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization, submitted an application for Wayfinding Signage installation, an application for street lighting on its Main Street bridge sidewalk over the Aquetong Creek and one for ADA upgrades to the pedestrian facilities on Main Street. Portland Borough, PA submitted an application for the State Street Streetscape project. Solebury Township, PA submitted an application for the Gateway Trail Phase 2 project and one for the Gateway Trail Phase 3 project. Upper Makefield Township, PA submitted an application for the Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 project. Willams Township, PA submitted 6 applications for Drainage Improvements, Roadway Reconstruction, and Pavement overlay projects within the Township. Dingman Township submitted an application for a Trail System. The Borough of Riegelsville, PA requested that they be reconsidered for a grant to complete Delaware Canal Footbridge Lighting project that was submitted in a previous application. In New Jersey the applications are as follows: The Township of Ewing, NJ sent an application for the Wilburtha Road Improvement project, Holland Township, NJ submitted an application for the resurfacing of Mt. Joy Road: The Borough of Milford, NJ submitted an application for Bridge Street and Honeysuckle Lane Improvements; The Township of Delaware, NJ submitted an application for the improvements of Federal Twist Rd; and The City of Lambertville, NJ submitted an application for Franklin Street Drainage Improvements. Further, there were inquiries from other municipalities that intent to submit applications for projects in their municipalities. In total there were 36 new applications submitted for Pennsylvania and 9 from New Jersey.

The CAI Department continues to assist municipalities in both states to complete their reimbursement requests for invoices paid by them to consultants and contractors for their existing CAI projects.

Update of some of the most significant activities with the grantees during the month of April

Meeting of May 24, 2010

Pennsylvania

1. Milford Borough, PA – The Borough has two (2) pending grant applications, the Broad Street Parking Lot Improvements project, amount of \$99,963.00, and the Storm Water Drain System and Street Restoration project, amount of \$163,475.00. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that both applications satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The applications were discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but they have not been awarded to date.

Dingman Township also submitted an application for a multi-use trails project called the Bridge Preserve Northern Parcel Trail System. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that the application satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI program, but a determination is currently being made as to whether Dingman Township is a community eligible for a CAI grant.

An application for the replacement of the old existing Mott Street vehicular bridge with a pedestrian and bicycle Bridge that will connect Milford and Dingman Township, in coordination with the Pike County Planning Department, has been on hold in case additional funds become available for Pennsylvania's CAI projects. The CAI department has not received an updated application as of this report.

Construction for the East *Harford Street Streetscape Improvements* project was completed in December 2007 by LR Costanzo Construction. The municipality was reimbursed \$453,000.00 (100% of total grant amount). The Borough also had funds from Penn DOT for this project and the CAI department reviewed that the work funded by the CAI grant is completed.

The *Traffic Study Project* is also completed and the CAI department reimbursed \$24,900.00 (100% of total grant amount). The Borough has been reimbursed for all expenses.

2. Smithfield, PA – The Township submitted a joint application in the amount of \$584,500 for a pedestrian/bicycle trails system in both the Township of Smithfield and the Borough of Delaware Water Gap. At the April 2010 Commissioners meeting, this application was approved. The Township has been notified of their grant award and the CAI department is currently in the process of executing the grant agreement with the Township.

The construction of the original Pedestrian Improvement project is substantially complete. The contractor, Grace Industries, has installed the ADA improvements as part of the grant approved by the Commission for the project. As previously discussed, the ADA features that were installed include detectable warning surfaces at various locations, along with a colored surface overlay for the sidewalk underneath the River Road underpass. Only a few minor punch list items remain to be completed for the project, including a potential alternate for the ADA sidewalk treatment near the overpass. It is anticipated that the remaining items will be completed in the Spring 2010. To date, the CAI department has disbursed \$734,716.10 of \$779,000.00 (94% of total grant amount).

3. Delaware Water Gap, PA – As previously mentioned, the Borough's grant application to complete the Route 611 Traffic Signalization Project was approved by the Commissioners at their meeting on January 25, 2010. The project includes the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Foxtown Hill Road (SR 0611) & the Martz Trailways Terminal. The CAI department is preparing the grant agreement and financial documents for execution. The Borough made a decision not to submit another application as it had already received a grant this year.

The construction of the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* is substantially complete, with several punch list items remaining to be addressed. In addition, a final inspection must be completed by PennDOT. In December 2009, several of the project items were inspected, including the signage that was to be installed. In addition, the Borough discussed the issue of adequate sidewalk clearance for pedestrians due to the light post installations with PennDOT, and is awaiting a final determination. Currently, the work to complete the remaining concrete repairs are scheduled for Spring 2010, at which time a final inspection will be held with the Borough Engineer and PennDOT. Also, as previously noted, on October 21, 2009 the Borough submitted a request to the Commission to utilize \$2,000.00 of the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* grant funds to complete the sidewalk repairs needed to address the concrete spalling issues encountered. However, this request was denied by the Commission.

The Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project was completed in August 2009, including the sidewalk repairs that were made to address issues with the concrete cracking and flaking over the winter in several locations. The sidewalk repairs were made at the contractor's expense.

To date, the CAI department has reimbursed \$147,149.77 of \$164,583.66 (89% of total grant amount) for the *Broad Street Sidewalk Project* and \$270,746.34 of \$270,746.34 (100% of total grant amount) for the *Waring Drive/Delaware Ave. Drainage Improvements Project*.

Oak Street Water Line Replacement Project – this project is on hold - The Borough has informally indicated that this project will not be completed due to lack of additional funding needed. The preliminary cost estimate for the project was approx. \$76,000.00. The most recent engineer's estimate for the project is approx. \$172,000.00. The municipality was advised that funding was available, but instead chose to apply for the above indicated traffic signal project.

4. Portland Borough, PA – The Borough has submitted a new application for streetscape improvements on State Street in the amount of \$515,701.40. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

The Borough's Mayor, the Honorable Kay Bucci attended the Commissioners meeting in January to advise the Commission that the Borough had applied for a Federal TIGER grant that, if approved, will include an infrastructure project on the South-Eastern ramp off of Route 611 North, which includes the Commission's Portland/Columbia bridge property line.

The Construction of the SR 0611 Pedestrian Crossing and Streetscape project began in November 2009 by McCarthy Masonry & Concrete and is substantially complete. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in Spring 2010.

The *Park and Walk Project* has been completed by Glen G. Hale Construction. The project started in January 2008 and finished in August 2008, and was inspected and approved by PennDOT in November 2008. In addition, the construction of the Shade Tree and Lighting project was completed by Glen G. Hale Construction in September 2009.

To date, the CAI department has reimbursed \$518,371.59 of \$639,323.00 to date (81% of total grant amount) for the *Park & Walk* grant.

The Park & Ride Project construction contract was awarded to Glen G. Hale Construction in October 2008 and was completed in September 2009. To date, the Borough has been reimbursed in full for the project and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$329,612.10 of \$667,567.00 (49% of total grant amount), which included payment for the acquisition of the site by the Borough through eminent domain.

- 5. Lower Mount Bethel, PA In February 2010, the CAI director met with the Township project Manager, John Mauser and two of the Township supervisor to discuss the possibility of submitting other grant applications for various road and trails constructions. The Borough submitted three applications that are being reviewed by the due diligence engineer.
 - S & K Construction was given the *Notice to Proceed* the construction on the *Pedestrian Trail Project* on March 27, 2008 and the project was completed in April 2009. To date, \$336,777.50 of \$336,777.50 (100% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI Department and the project has been closed out. The *Park & Ride/Visitors' Center Project* construction started in April 2008 by Grace Industries (Park & Ride) and Weiss Construction (Visitors' Center) and was completed in April 2009. To date the CAI Department has reimbursed \$952,922.50 of \$952,922.50 (100% of total grant amount) and this project is also closed out.
- 6. Easton, PA The Easton has also applied for two additional grant requests. One is for pedestrian and traffic improvements in the North 3rd St. Corridor, which was approved by the Commissioners with some modifications at its general meeting on April 26th, and the other for a bridge deck improvement on the Hugh Moore Park Bridge.

In January a change order was approved by the CAI department to include new lighting and signage along Larry Holmes Drive south of the Northampton Street Bridge.

The construction contracts for Phases 1 and 2 of the *Waterfront Improvements* project were awarded during the month of September 2009. The construction contract for Phase 1 of the project, which is to include the "road diet" for Larry Holmes Drive, high visibility pedestrian crosswalks, intersection improvements at Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive to improve pedestrian accommodation, along with a sewer line connection from the Commission's guard house to existing lines at the intersection of Northampton Street and Larry Holmes Drive, was awarded to Lehigh Valley Site Contractors Inc. in the amount of \$530,090.00. The construction contract for Phase 2, which is to include improvements to the pedestrian pathways along Larry Holmes Drive and in Scott Park and Riverside Park, along with decorative lighting, landscaping and a visitor and pedestrian plaza at Scott Park, was awarded to S&K Construction in the amount of \$951,045.75.

To date, \$600,000.00 of \$2,700,000.00 (22% of the total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the City of Easton for the original Riverwalk project. In addition, the City's first reimbursement request for the *Waterfront Improvements* project, in the amount of \$542,199.51, is currently under review.

Construction of the ADA Curb Ramps and Decorative Crosswalks, which are part of the Pedestrian Pathways/Intersection Enhancements and Northampton St. Bridge Bike Path grant, was completed in September 2009. The City has also purchased and installed the materials for the Bike Path Extension.

Also, as mentioned previously, the City of Easton's grant application for the Majestic Theater project was reviewed by the CAI department and it was found that the application does not meet the primary characteristics of the CAI program. Therefore, the project was not approved by the Commissioners.

The Commission agreed to enter into a separate agreement with the municipality to connect the sewer lateral from the bridge officer's guardhouse to the City's public sewer system. This work is still in progress, but the connection is complete. The curbs and sidewalks abutting the Northampton Street Bridge have been reconstructed. A new change order was submitted to the CAI department for review and approval in order to add new lighting poles in the Scott Park area of the project.

7. Williams Township, PA – The I-78 & Morgan Hill Road Interchange Traffic Signalization project was substantially completed in August 2008. To date, \$374,014.13 of \$430,590.00 (87% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed to the Township by the CAI Department. In addition, Gary Hillegass Contracting completed the ADA curb ramp work required by Penn DOT at the project intersections. The Township is currently in the process of preparing their final reimbursement request submission to the CAI department for the project.

The Township recently submitted several applications for: Belmont Street Drainage Improvements, Belmont Street Reconstruction, Hilton Street Improvements, Industrial Drive North Overlay project, and Industrial Drive South Overlay project. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that the Industrial Drive North Overlay project and the Industrial Drive South Overlay projects satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The Belmont Street Drainage only partially satisfies the required characteristics of the CAI program because while the project does provide a safety improvement and eases travel on the roadway during rain events, it does not provide visible transportation improvements that will directly impact motorists and pedestrians/bicyclists on a regular basis. These applications were discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but have not been awarded to date. We would also note that it was determined that the Belmont Street Reconstruction and the Hilton Street Improvements projects do not satisfy the required characteristics of the CAI program as they cannot be completed by the December 31, 2010 deadline.

- 8. Riegelsville Borough, PA The Project started construction in August 2008 and was completed in July 2009. To date, \$230,000.00 (100% of total grant amount) has been reimbursed by the CAI department. In addition, the Borough has indicated that they will be submitting a new grant application for ornamental lighting to be installed on the Delaware Canal pedestrian bridge recently completed with CAI funds. A formal submission from the Borough is still forthcoming to date.
- Solebury Township, PA Walton Drive Bridge Replacement Project In January the Commissioners approved the Township's new grant application for \$660,000.00 to replace a deteriorated, undersized bridge located in a residential neighborhood in Solebury Township. The project will be advertised in May 2010 and it is anticipated that the project will be completed in the Fall 2010.

Construction of the *Route 202 Trail and Park* project began on August 4, 2008 by K.C. Construction, and was completed in September 2009. To date, \$1,204,444.60 of \$1,755,150.00 has been reimbursed by the CAI Department (69%). The Township's final reimbursement request, in the amount of \$326,958.65, is currently under review, awaiting further documentation from the Township.

Previously, the municipality also requested an additional grant application for a roundabout project at the intersection of Route 202/179 and Kitchens Lane in the amount of \$800,000.00 that has not been approved by the Commissioners to date.

Recently, the Township submitted two new grant applications for the Gateway Trail Phase 2 and Phase 3. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

New Hope Borough, PA – The Borough has submitted three (3) new grant applications. One application is to install new ornamental lighting on the Main Street Bridge, in the amount of \$84,815.00. This project was previously to be completed with a CAI grant, but the Borough chose to terminate the project and transfer the grant funds to the Bridge St. Traffic Signals project to construct ADA curb ramps at the intersections as required by PennDOT. The second application was submitted in conjunction with the Landmark Towns organization, to install Wayfinding Signage to/from and through New Hope Borough, Bristol Borough, Morrisville Borough and Yardley Borough, in the amount of \$872,969.00. The third application is for the Main Street Pedestrian Crosswalks project, amount of \$101,400, to improve ADA compliant accessibility, including modified curb ramps and the installation of pavement markings at a midblock crossing. These applications were reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that both applications satisfy a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The applications were discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but they have not been awarded to date.

The Borough awarded the construction of the *Bridge St. Traffic Signals project* to Armour & Sons Electric on April 9, 2008. The project started on June 26, 2008 and is anticipated to be completed in Spring 2010 due to the need to include ADA compliant pedestrian facilities as per the direction of PennDOT.

The Borough's Engineer, Carroll Engineering, has received a change order from Armour & Sons Electric to complete the installation of the ADA curb ramps, along with various minor changes (i.e., timing changes, striping changes) to the intersections, in the amount of \$16,425.00. It is anticipated that the change order work, if approved, will be completed in the Spring 2010.

To date the Borough has been reimbursed \$371,705.26 of \$446,404.00 (83% of total grant amount).

11. Falls Township, PA – The original traffic signal installation and modernization project is complete and a final reimbursement request in the amount of \$77,876.00 was approved in December 2008. The Township utilized \$332,571.00 of the \$335,000.00 grant award.

The Township has submitted a new grant application for the modernization and upgrade of the traffic signal at New Falls Road and Tyburn Road, in the amount of \$108,140.00. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

 Upper Makefield Township, PA – The Washington Crossing Gateway project was completed in the Spring 2010. To date the Township has been reimbursed \$1,447,000.00 of \$1,447,000.00 (100% of total grant amount).

The Township has recently submitted a new grant application for the completion of the Gateway Park-Village Streetscape Phase 2 project, in the amount of \$54,000.00. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

 Lower Makefield, PA – The original streetscape project is complete. A final reimbursement request has been processed by the Commission and the original grant project is closed out.

The Township has recently submitted a new grant application for the completion of the Black Rock Pedestrian Trail project, in the amount of \$170,877.00. This application was reviewed by the due diligence engineer and it was determined that it satisfies a majority of the required characteristics of the CAI grant program. The application was discussed at the April Commissioners meeting, but has not been awarded to date.

14. Bristol Borough, PA – In December 2009, the Borough submitted two new requests for CAI funding. The first request is for a new Public Works Garage, at an estimated cost of \$750,000.00. This request did not meet the characteristics of the CAI program and was not considered for a grant award. The second request is to install decorative crosswalks (initially part of the original grant project to upgrade the traffic signals in the Borough) at each signalized intersection, at an estimated cost of \$423,126.12. At the January Commissioners meeting, the Borough's application for the Decorative Crosswalks Project was tabled and will be considered for CAI funds at a future Commissioners meeting.

The construction of the *Traffic Signals Revitalization* project was completed by Armour & Sons Electric in July 2009 and the project has been closed out. The Borough utilized \$1,333,843.28 of \$1,334,450.00 grant (99.9% of total grant amount).

Also, as mentioned previously, Bristol Borough's grant application for the Regional Police Station and Training Center project has been reviewed by the CAI department and it was found that the project did not meet the primary characteristics of the CAI program. Therefore, the project was not approved by the Commissioners.

15. Yardley, PA – Construction of the project began in February 2008 by Harris Blacktopping and was completed in August 2008. The CAI department has reimbursed the entire grant amount of \$234,217.00 to the Borough and the project has been closed out.

Morrisville, PA – The Borough recently submitted a new grant application for the Moreau Street Rehabilitation project, in the amount of \$360,000. This application is currently under review by the due diligence engineer. It also submitted eight new roads, lighting, and traffic signal improvements applications.

In January the Borough submitted a grant surplus reallocation request to replace as many light heads as possible on East Bridge Street to enhance the downtown area.

Meeting of May 24, 2010

This request was presented to the Commissioners and approved in the January Commissioners Committee meeting. Morrisville will use the remaining monies in their grant to perform additional the work.

All four (4) projects in Morrisville are completed. Final reimbursement requests have been submitted by Morrisville. One final effort is the execution of a Maintenance and Jurisdiction Agreement between Morrisville and the Commission or the median on East Bridge St. that is within Commission jurisdiction. Morrisville has is taking the lead in developing said agreement. In November, the borough sent a letter requesting the use of the surplus funds in the amount of \$31,896.02 to replace the light heads for the lights on Bridge Streets.

New Jersey

- 1. Montague, NJ The Due Diligence engineer is communicating with the Township engineer to find out what is holding up the progress in this project. The CAI department attended the preconstruction meeting. The CAI department received the completed final plans from the Township engineer. The project has been bid and awarded and the contractor has begun work. The municipality has requested a time extension as the asphalt work will likely not be completed before winter. The project is currently \$80,000 under budget and the municipality is looking at further improvements to the park & ride lot.
- 2. Knowlton, NJ The application submitted by the township for \$206,800 to construct a section of the Paulinskill Trail, in order to connect with Pennsylvania via the Portland/Columbia pedestrian bridge, was approved by the Commissioners at their September 29th meeting. A project kick-off meeting for the new grant project for the extension of the Paulinskill Trail was held on Wednesday, November 5, 2008. Members of the CAI Department attended, along with officials from NJDEP, NJDOT, and Knowlton.

All parties are eager to work together to complete this project. CAI concerns about the trail concept were alleviated by NJDOT who stated that a similar trail concept was recently approved and completed in Bergen County in Route 4. In December the trail project received a letter of approval from NJ Fish & Wildlife. The Township is working with the NJDEP and NJDOT to complete the approvals.

Finelli Associates is working on a status report to forward to the CAI department. The project is broken into 2 phases. The first will be clearing brush and installing the trails. The second phase is the concrete underpass which is dependent on DEP approvals. The timing may make this part "to be completed at another time. The municipality sent an extension letter request to complete the project in the spring of 2010.

The other four projects applied for by the municipality were completed within the budget allocated previously.

- 3. Belvidere, NJ In September the bids received by the municipality were higher than the estimated engineering construction costs and they are in the process of assessing their options. The Commission's Chief engineer recommended that the 700 feet portion of Water Street in the Town that is not included in CAI project be done by the Commission in the near future. The Chief engineer indicated that it would be advantageous to include other work on the sidewalk and in the shed adjacent to the Riverton/Belvidere Bridge. It was also agreed that the town will go ahead with the CAI portion of the project and that the Town engineer will give the commission an estimate of the cost to complete the missing portion of Water Street. The project was awarded and a preconstruction meeting will be held in early June. The project is to commence construction in the 3rd week of June along with a ground breaking ceremony. The project is completed and the CAI department met with the engineer to review the final invoice for the project. A reimbursement request is being processed for this project.
- Phillipsburg, NJ In January a new grant application request to extend the South Main Street project –Phase 3 was received by the Town of Phillipsburg. This request was presented to the Commissioners at their February meeting and a grant for \$997,962 was awarded.

This project is complete, and a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on December 3, 2008. The Engineering Department and the Town of Phillipsburg reached an agreement regarding the reconstruction of Union Square. This section of the project was completed by Top Line Construction and coincided with the rest of the CAI project on Main St. and Broad and 3rd Streets. The Town requested a number of change orders to the contractors, which impacted their allocated budget for various line items.

During their September 2008 meeting, the Commissioners approved an additional \$429,422 grant request for an extension of the project from the Black Bridge, southerly to the apex of Shappel Park on South Main Street, Phillipsburg. The Town also submitted a request for a completion time extension of this section. The phase II plans are completed and the project has been bid and awarded. In December this project was awarded to Z Brothers Contractor. However, it needed an extension until the spring of 2010.

 Pohatcong, NJ – A new application was received by the CAI Department for Resurfacing of River Road. This application was presented to the Commissioners at their February 2010 meeting. This request was not awarded at said meeting.

Pohatcong also submitted a joint application with Alpha for the reconstruction of Edge Road between the two communities. This application was approved by the Commissioners at their meeting in March 2009. Alpha will serve as the lead municipality on the project. A preconstruction meeting for that project was held on Monday December 7, 2009.

The previous Pohatcong projects have been completed. After completion of the original CAI project, Pohatcong requested permission to utilize the excess funds to repave additional sections of River Road, which was approved at the November meeting. Pohatcong used the Morris County Purchasing Cooperative to contract for the services.

The work was performed and completed in December 2008. The CAI department has received Pohatcong's final reimbursement request and was paid.

- 6. Holland, NJ Holland inquired about the additional funds the Commission has for CAI projects and submitted an application for the resurfacing of Mt. Joy Road. Holland requested and received permission to reallocate their grant from their original project tone which repaired and repaved four municipal roads. The project was bid and awarded and has been substantially completed.
- 7. Milford, NJ –The Borough submitted an application for the repair and resurfacing of Honeysuckle Lane and the finishing of the guard rail and the Borough Parking lot off Bridge Street. This Bridge Street Improvements project is complete. The contractor was the subject of many positive newspaper articles regarding the extraordinary efforts they went through to minimize impacts to the business community. Reimbursement requests have been submitted and request number 3 has been paid. Reimbursement request number 4 is still under review. The municipality has made the Director aware that they are over budget and may be in need of an additional \$100,000 for the project payment.
- 8. Frenchtown, NJ The Park and Ride project is complete. The Reimbursement requests are being paid by the CAI department. However, no major development has been noted during this period regarding the acquisition of the property for the Village Green Park. The Mayor has requested an extension until 2010 for the latter project.
- 9. Lambertville, NJ The City held a press conference on the completion of the traffic signal on Swan Street and Route 179 CAI project. The City submitted a new application for a drainage system improvements that is being reviewed by the due diligence engineer. In January, the Commissioners approved two additional road reconstruction projects to Lambertville. One was for the Delevan St. Roadway Reconstruction Project for \$497,200 and the McCready's Alley Roadway Reconstruction Project for \$147,000. The City has been notified of the grant awards and the CAI department is preparing the grant Contract Agreement and financial documents for execution.

The Kline's Court CAI project was completed in September and the Jefferson Street project started its construction in the same month and was also completed in December, 2008. Both of these projects were awarded to Top Line Construction. The George Street Reconstruction project was completed in November, 2008. However, this project's bids came in approximately \$28,000 over budget and the City will pick up this amount. A Commission's CAI permanent sign was developed for this project. The Quarry Street Road Reconstruction project was also completed in May 2009.

The design for the South Franklin Street traffic calming project has been completed.

New Jersey (continued)

 Stockton, NJ – During the month of January 2010, the CAI Department and the Finance Department processed a reimbursement request in an emergency basis as a special request from the Borough.

The Bridge Street Improvements project is completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out this project. The municipality was nominated for a transportation construction project award for its CAI project. The project is complete as in the process of being closed out, the CAI department met with the grantee on Thursday, January 7, 2010 to initiate closeout and review the finances.

11. West Amwell, NJ – In February 2009, the Township submitted a new application for funding from the DRJTBC's CAI program. This application for Rocktown Hill Road Improvement Project to the approach to the intersection of Route 31 was approved for \$100,000 by the Commissioners at their January 25, 2010 meeting. The Township has been notified of the grant awards and the CAI department is preparing the grant Contract Agreement and financial documents for execution.

The Section 11 of Rocktown-Lambertville Road Reconstruction project is now completed. The Section 12 and Section 13 Road Reconstruction project are also completed.

- 12. Delaware Twp, NJ The Township submitted a new application for the Improvements and resurfacing of Federal Twist Rd. and to install drainage improvements and erosion control within the existing road right of way. These projects were completed. The CAI department and the municipality are in the process of closing out this project. The municipality has made a request to utilize the remainder of their grant to chip seal the grant project.
- 13. Hopewell, NJ The Township has submitted a grant application for the design and construction of sidewalk replacement in the Village of Titusville. The ADA Ramps and Walkway project is substantially complete. The punch list inspection was held on October 27th. The CAI department is waiting for the final close out of the project.
- Ewing, NJ The Township submitted another application requesting funding for the Wilburtha Rd. Improvement project.

The Original paving scope of work was completed and delivered under estimate cost amount. The municipality submitted a request to expand its original scope of work using the excess money and it has been approved at the Commissioners meeting in October. All the paving work was completed. The final payment has being processed.

15. Trenton, NJ – An application was to be submitted for consideration at the February, 2009 Commission meeting. The project would entail the reconstruction of Warren St. in the vicinity of the new Mercer County Courthouse and The Marriot Lafayette Square Hotel. In their application, Trenton indicates that the project would be ready to be bid in June 2009, with construction to begin in the summer and completion in the Fall of 2010 or Spring of 2011.

New Jersey (continued)

The CAI department reviewed the application and is concerned that Trenton may not be able to achieve the June's bid date. Trenton supplied additional information regarding this application to the CAI department. Work on this project is still in progress.

- 16. Alpha NJ The Commission has received an application from Alpha and Pohatcong for the reconstruction of Edge Rd. between the two communities under Route 78. Alpha would serve as the lead municipality in the project. The estimated cost of the project is \$665,239, and CAI has requested information on how the two communities will handle cost-sharing. The project is basically rebuilding of Edge Road for a little over a mile with drainage improvements to improve erosion-prone areas. The Commission awarded the grant at their meeting in March 2009, and the CAI met with Alpha in April 9th to discuss the agreement and project procedures. The project was bid and bids opened on October 23 2009. Alpha has requested a time extension for the project until 2010. A pre-construction meeting was held on December 7, 2009. The Borough is to commence construction as soon as weather permits it. This project is almost complete.
- Kingwood, NJ In January the Township submitted an application for the reconstruction of Tumble Falls Road and was awarded \$373,000, the total amount of the project.
