David DeGerolamo. Chairman, presided at this Meeting. The Commission met in Executive Session to discuss legal and personnel matters prior to this meeting.

#### ROLL CALL

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting called the roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being five members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and five members present from the State of New Jersey.

#### WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman DeGerolamo welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

Nancy Pesti, Makefield resident addressed the meeting and said:

"Hi, my name is Nancy Pesti. My address is 1367 Brentwood Road, Yardley, Pennsylvania. It's in Lower Makefield Township. My home backs up to preserved, farmland which backs up to I-95, and I'm here to plead for extending the sound barriers along this land. You have sound barriers along a lot of the other areas, but our area is not protected. We get a lot of highway noise. I'm concerned now with the other sound barriers in place it will create like a tunnel effect and channel it even more through our neighborhood. There is a lot of support within the neighborhood for these sound barriers. People just can't make these meetings. So I'm here to just voice a concern. I know it is a lot of money to extend the barriers, but it's a small percentage of the total project. With increasing traffic in the future, it will just become worse, and that's it. That's what I'm here to say."

#### Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and said

"Just to let you know, on our committee day, we actually did have a conversation with regard to the potential extending the sound barriers, and that an additional study is going to be held to look at potentially extending those sound barriers, so we appreciate your comments. And we are taking them into consideration and a study is going to be done."

Chairman DeGerolamo then invited any other comments from the public?

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Dan Noonan addressed the meeting and said:

"I think my comments are similar to Nancy's. I have the same questions. My name is Dan Noonan, 1371 Brentwood Road, two houses down from Nancy, and equally concerned about the loud noise from the highway, just to reiterate the things that Nancy said, our concerns are we feel very valid about the noise which we hear all the time sitting on the deck, and there are many cars and trucks coming by. So that's our primary concern. Along with that, why did the noise abatement wall stop right where our property seemingly begins and then pick up again? What is the difference between the noise at this level at this section and then, you know, a hundred yards away? We are wondering about that. And further, you did mention that a new study is being done."

Chairman DeGerolamo stated that was correct.

Mr. Noonan asked why was that study never done before?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and said:

"It was done before, but we did commit during the environmental assessment process to do a revised study during final design. So what we have chosen to do with that revised study is go to the areas that don't have sound walls, two on the north side of 95. I think that's your area. One is behind the rest area, and there is another one on the south side of 95. So we are taking a kind of refreshed look at that in the specific areas where folks have concerns, but the noise study was done. It did not yield the barrier. I mean, the reasoning for that is essentially, it did not reach the threshold that warrants the barrier based on our standards which were higher than both FHWA and the DOTs, but we are taking another look at it."

Mr. Noonan asked when will that study be done?

Executive Director Resta replied that the sampling is going to be done over the next couple of weeks. It won't be plugged in to the model probably until near the end of February.

Mr. Noonan asked if they will hear what the progress is along the way?

Executive Director Resta replied when it is done, the Commission will have another public meeting to announce what the findings are.

Mr. Noonan stated that he just wanted the Commission to hear their concerns

Mr. Resta relied, that their concerns have been heard and we are pledged to take a fresh look at it.

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Chairman DeGerolamo that asked if there were any further comments from the public

Jim Bischoff, resident of Lower Makefield addressed the meeting and said

"My name is Jim Bischoff, I live at 1335 James Court, same neighborhood as my two colleagues here. What is different where I live is my house doesn't border 95. It doesn't back up like theirs does, so I'm a little further into the neighborhood on a cul-de-sac. And when I moved in 20 years ago, we moved from Downingtown, Pennsylvania, commuted back and forth to New York, so I understand the necessity to expand the bridge. It is certainly a project that needs to be done. So I was in that traffic a lot leaving in the morning and coming home at night. However, as a homeowner, the noise sitting out on my deck -- remember, I don't back up to 95 -- is still very high noise level even back then, so my concerns now are as cars drive faster because you won't have as much traffic, if you expand the lanes and so forth, that's the noise you hear is the loudness of cars going So that's the concerns I have, and I will second most of those motions, but I wanted you to understand that I don't back up to 95. So I am another 100 yards in, and I can still hear it. It is a fairly sizable noise level. If I can just point to that map real quick? So the area of concern, just to make sure you are all aware of it, is right here. And, or course, the noise laws certainly barriers make sense here and here. We just don't understand why it is not continued. We understand there's budget projections and so forth, so we are just asking for some consideration."

Chairman DeGerolamo asked Mr. Bishoff where his house was located on the Scudder Falls Map

Mr. Bischoff stated his house is not even on the map because he is further up. He does not back up to 95.

Commissioner Stanley addressed the meeting and asked Mr. Bischoff if his property is off the map then he should not hear anything

Mr. Bischoff said

"What's that? Well, I wish we didn't hear anything, especially when my kids were young, but that isn't the case. That's all the points I wanted to make. Thank you so much."

#### INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman DeGerolamo addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, addressed the meeting and said;

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"Today marks the start of winter, normally we would be giving a snow preparedness status report this morning, but it doesn't look like we will be facing any inclement weather for the foreseeable future, please be assured that the Commission is prepared. So we are thankful that this winter is predicted to maintain a strong El Nińo, potentially delaying the start of extreme weather; but our maintenance crews, toll collectors, and our operating budget is thankful, despite Climate Change being debated by politicians and pundits;

"Weather anomalies aside, this is our last meeting of 2015 and it seems like a fitting time to outline what we expect to be our core focus of attention for the coming year – the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. Earlier this month, we held a very successful open house at a Yardley, Pa, middle school. This Pennsylvania-oriented public information session attracted 240 residents. motorists, and elected officials. The event had a dual purpose. First, it enabled the public to reacquaint themselves with the project and our current schedule for design, construction and completion. Second, it allowed us to raise public awareness and gather input on the noise-abatement walls that we have committed to build along the I-95 approach to the bridge in Lower Makefield Township during 2016. This included information on the necessary tree clearing work that is scheduled to get underway along the noise wall corridor in January. Additionally, attendees were requested to fill out a brief survey for purposes of determining what architectural treatment and color should be used on the side of the noise walls that will face residential properties along the corridor. We have extended the deadline for submission of the surveys until December 31. One recurring comment we received from homeowners at the event concerned the absence of noise walls at certain points along the corridor. These affected property owners were largely from two areas: the homes behind PennDOT's welcome center on southbound I-95 and the homes north of I95 where the highway curves southward before the Newtown exit. We will be reexamining those areas as part of the project's final design process, as stipulated in the Environmental Assessment and, by extension, the corresponding Finding of No Significant Impact from the FHWA. This reexamination includes updating prior analyses by utilizing the latest version of the FHWA's Traffic Noise Model. Additionally, we'll be collecting new noise measurements in the affected areas to calibrate the model. We expect the data collection to occur over the next few weeks and we hope to relay the outcome to Lower Makefield officials in early February. Another current project development is the subject of a resolution on today's executive agenda. We are seeking Commission approval of a Memorandum of Understanding with New Jersey's Department of Transportation for the portions of the project that will affect their bridge approach facilities along I-95 and state routes 29 and 175;

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"With the Commission's approval, we'll be in position to finalize the signing of the MOU early next year. The Scudder Falls project is clearly on a path to build further momentum in 2016. Tree removal for the PA noise wall corridor will begin in early January and end by April 1. This will clear the way for noise wall construction starting later in the spring. Meanwhile, a lot of other project activity is expected to occur in the year ahead, including, Executing of a Project Labor Agreement, Developing an Owner-Controlled Insurance Program, Organizing a springtime outreach event regarding project tree cutting measures that are expected to get underway on the New Jersey side during the fall, Establishing accurate costs for project construction, project financing and Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge toll rates after submittal of 60-percent final design documentation in March, Hosting six separate hearings on the new bridge's toll schedule in accordance with the Commission's 2013 public-input policy for setting new toll rates, and acquisition of a finance team and ultimately project financing in advance of the larger construction contracts;

"As you can tell, a lot of work still remains ahead of us, but we remain on a trajectory to launch full-scale project construction in early 2017;

"Looking ahead to 2016, there also are two very important fiduciary matters on today's executive agenda. The passage of next year's operating and capital budgets. These budgets are the culmination of months of preparation and review by staff and Commissioners. There are a lot of thanks to spread around, but I particularly want to thank our Comptroller Steve Cathcart and Accounting for constructing the operating budget and making all the refinements that arose during the review process. I would also like to recognize Chief Engineer Roy Little and Engineering for their work on the capital budget plan, notably with their responses to requests for more information and back-up materials on the various individual projects in the updated capital program. Finally, I want to thank the Commissioners for their efforts on these fiscal documents, these materials are voluminous and the review process is both time consuming and challenging. Our Commissioners serve without compensation and it takes an extraordinary amount of time on their part to pore over the budgets and the supporting materials that 20 with them. We have presented a fiscally sound budget. We have had two bond ratings upgrades in the past 18 months, and it is very, very uncommon for a public agency in this day to get upgraded. We have an over 2.2 times debt service coverage ratio, so we are have a sound footing financially for our borrowing for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement;

"We are four days removed from Christmas and less than two weeks away from the start of the New Year according to AAA, year-end holiday travelers are expected to top 100 million for the first time on record. 90% of these trips are

expected to be by automobile. The increase in holiday travel this year is being driven by a stabilizing economy, improving job growth, rising incomes and lower gas prices. Our facilities and personnel are always at the ready to handle this busy travel season, please enjoy the safest of holidays and please drive carefully."

- "WHEREAS, The Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project is being advanced by the Commission in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA"), the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, and the NJDOT; and
- **"WHEREAS,** The Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project includes the replacement of Scudder Falls Bridge and the reconstruction of 4.4 miles of I-95 roadway in Pennsylvania and New Jersey, including improvements to the NJ Route 29 Interchange; and
- "WHEREAS, The Commission proposes to replace the existing Scudder Falls Bridge with a new wider bridge that includes three (3) travel lanes and adequate outside and inside shoulders in each direction and additional auxiliary lanes to accommodate entry and exit from the adjoining interchanges, including the NJ Route 29 Interchange within NJDOT's

jurisdiction in Ewing Township, Mercer County (hereinafter referred to as the "Project"); and

- "WHEREAS, The Project also includes highway improvements necessary to transition to the existing six (6) lane section of I-95 extending approximately 1.5 miles east from NJ Route 29 to the Bear Tavern Road (County Route 579) Interchange, as well as improvements to the NJ Route 29 Interchange (NJ Exit 2) in New Jersey that consist of the reconfiguration of the interchange, the addition/modification of the acceleration and deceleration lanes, and the providing of adequate spacing of the ramp merges with the I-95 roadway; and
- "WHEREAS, The Project also includes a Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility across the Delaware River that will interconnect the recreational facilities on each side of the Delaware River and the two Canal parks and would provide a regional pedestrian/bicycle connection; and

- "WHEREAS, The MOU would authorize the Commission, its contractors, and agents to access NJDOT State highway right-of-ways to perform any work associated with the Project, subject to providing prior written notice to the NJDOT; and

I think people probably believe out in the public that we actually get some sort of federal money or state money, and the reality is we do it all in the tolls that we collect, and I think we do it better than any other agency in the tristate area, and I promise we probably do it better than any other agency in the country. I'm very proud of the work that goes on here. It is not what people think it is. And we should all be proud moving forward as to what it has become and what it will be and can't wait to cross that Scudder Falls Bridge one day. So I just want to say thank you to everyone and wish you all the best."

#### Vice Chairman addressed the meeting and said:

"I would like just to say on behalf of Pennsylvania Commissioners that in the brief time that I have known you it has been a pleasure to serve with you. I can appreciate the difficulty in sitting as the chairman and all of the challenges that both you and I face with respect to our Governors and so forth and so on. And I can tell you this, that before I took this position, everyone that I spoke to because I did my due diligence in terms of what I was getting involved in, they all spoke highly of you, but what they all said was that you're a man of conscience and that you try your best to always do the right thing, and I think that your job is far more difficult than mine. The political waters are just different, obviously, and I think you have navigated them with integrity based on what I've seen and heard, and I

would agree that this Commission under your stewardship has done a remarkable job, and you take a significant amount of credit for that, and so you should be commended and thank you."

I really have appreciated just for the steady, even hand that you deal with things, and it's been a really -- I don't say this lightly, it's been inspirational to see how well you moderate issues and have had a sensitivity and a consistency and a reliability, which is unusual, and a joy to see you been a part. So thank you. And I also appreciate the concept of triple entendre as a Navy guy of navigating the deep waters here since where, you know, we have bridged deep waters -well, sometimes -- and just done a really admirable job. 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## DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of December 21, 2015 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (November, 2015)

**Summary:** The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for November 2015 in comparison to the November 2014 traffic and revenue statistics. In addition, total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month. Total toll revenue and total toll traffic have now reflected increases for fifteen consecutive months.

## Analysis of November 2015 / November 2014 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 5.66 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 4.89 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 7.80 percent increase.

## Analysis of November 2015 / November 2014 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 202,382 vehicles, or 6.60 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 16,205 vehicles, or 3.84 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 186,177 vehicles, or 7.04 percent.
- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for November 2015 was 109,019 vehicles as compared to 108,710 total vehicles in November 2014.
- Total recorded westbound traffic at the eleven toll supported bridges for November 2015 increased by 49,979 vehicles, or 1.66 percent as compared to November 2014.
   Average daily westbound traffic for November 2015 at these bridges was 84,360 vehicles as compared for 82,695 vehicles for November 2014.

## Traffic analysis for 2015 YTD:

- Total YTD toll traffic for the seven toll bridges is reflecting a 4.14 percent increase through the first eleven months of 2015 as compared to the same period in 2014.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the eleven toll supported bridges is reflecting a 1.49 percent increase through November of 2015 as compared to 2014.

## **DISTRICT REVIEW:**

## District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) reflected a 9.17 percent increase for November 2015 when compared to November 2014 as the result of increases of 57,968 cars and 1,592 trucks. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), an increase of 5,351 cars and a decrease of 119 trucks combined to generate a 3.21 percent increase in total toll traffic for November 2015 as compared to November 2014.

## District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge recorded an increase of 5.44 percent in total toll traffic for the month of November 2015 compared to November 2014 as the result of increases of 43,370 cars and 7,446 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 31,902 passenger vehicles and 2,280 trucks generated an 8.60 percent increase in total toll traffic for November 2015.

## District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 5.27 percent increase in total toll traffic during November 2015 as a result of the increases of 3,382 automobiles and 1,618 trucks compared to November 2014. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 39,007 passenger vehicles and 3,200 trucks generated an increase of 5.77 percent in total toll traffic for November 2015 as compared to November 2014. At Milford-Montague (MM), the increase of 5,197 passenger vehicles combined with the increase of 188 trucks to produce a 5.47 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of November 2015.

## **E-ZPass** Penetration Rates

## STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of November 2015 and the eleven month year-to-date ("YTD") operations of fiscal year 2015 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,174,627 for the month of November. For the 2015 fiscal period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$49,817,204 or 98.50% of the YTD operating budget.

Most of the expense line categories are within their normal line item budget. Overtime Wages exceed the YTD budget by \$37,936 or 11.9% primarily due to the high level of adverse weather activity for the first three months of 2015. Unemployment compensation is \$17,369 or 42.1% ahead of the budget. It is anticipated that Overtime and Unemployment expense will exceed the budget for the operating year.

Regular Employee Healthcare is currently \$390,740 or 4.7% ahead of budget due to higher than anticipated expense for 2015.

EZPass Maintenance Expense exceeds YTD budget by \$40,681 or 3.8% as the cost of maintaining the current in-lane system is higher than originally anticipated. EZPass operating expense exceeds the YTD budget by \$663,651 or 16.0% as a result of unanticipated increases in CSC rates. It is anticipated that these two line items will exceed their full year operating budget.

There were no unusual expenses or charges during the month of November.

## MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

## **NOVEMBER 2015**

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of November, 2015, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 57 purchase orders in the total amount of \$174,508.78. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 47 price inquiries were sent out for 15 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3.13 per order (47/15=3.13).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the period of November 2015 are shown below:

- Six (6) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$53,587.50, for guiderail repairs and replacements at Commission facilities.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$28,669.68, for vehicle life extension repairs for a 2007 Sterling Truck located at the I-78 Toll Bridge Facility.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$10,871.50, for an ESS video storage server.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$6,742.50, at the request of the Contract Compliance Department, for the LCPtracker System.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$6,456.70 for janitorial supplies at the request of Operations for our New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge Facility.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

#### **CSC/VPC Pre-Migration Collection Accounts:**

As a result of pre-migration collection efforts from January through November, LES Duncan Solutions reports \$121,966.79 collected in outstanding tolls and fees. #### ELECTRONIC TOLL COLLECTION PROGRAM MONTH OF NOVEMBER 2015

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

#### Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

- 1. Xerox and TransCore continue to perform preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Commission Staff met with Xerox and TransCore to review maintenance activity for the month.
- 2. Commission Staff issued a purchase order to Xerox for the 2015 Spare Parts/Consumables. The spare parts have all been received and Commission Staff completed a review of the inventory.
- 3. Xerox technicians are supporting the Commission with the emergency generators replacements and electrical service repair at the Portland-Columbia, Delaware Water Gap and Milford-Montague Toll Bridges.
- 4. The agreement was executed and a notice to proceed was issued effective October 27, 2015 for the Electronic Toll Collection System Replacement Design, Build and Maintain agreement. A project kick-off meeting was held along with our first biweekly project status meeting. TransCore submitted a draft Program Management Plan and review comments were compiled and provided to TransCore to be addressed. A draft Software Development Plan was submitted and is under review. A project SharePoints site was established for the transmission and storage of electronic project files.

#### Activities for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center

- 1. A quarterly NJ E-ZPass Customer Service Center operations meeting took place at the New Jersey Turnpike Authority.
- 2. The Commission executed the agreement with the NJTA, Xerox and other agencies that participate in the NJ Regional CSC and returned it to the NJTA. Commission Staff participated on a project status meeting for the new CSC/VPC with NJTA and the other agencies.

#### General Electronic Toll Collection Program Activities

1. Mr. Stracciolini participated in the IAG E-ZPass Executive Management Committee and Policy Committee meetings.

- 2. Mr. Stracciolini served on the Non-toll Opportunities subgroup for the IAG. This subgroup is preparing a policy and procedure document that provides a method for the IAG to follow for non-toll opportunities, such as use of the E-ZPass transponder system at parking garages or drive-thru services.

In November, the Contract Compliance Department in coordination with the Purchasing Department completed the purchase of the LCP Tracker program that is necessary for the tracking and reporting of the construction projects certified pay payroll and workforce utilization. The department also scheduled training sessions with a representative of LCP Tracker to take place during the end of November and through the month of December.



#### SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT FINAL DESIGN SERVICES

FINAL DESIGN Contract No. C-660A

Michael Baker Jr., Incorporated (MBJ) of Hamilton New Jersey was issued the Notice to Proceed effective March 11, 2015. A Kick-Off Meeting was held on March 19, 2015 with a separate Executive Session and Technical Session being held. The latest Progress Meeting was held with Baker on November 10<sup>th</sup> to review the status of the contract and progress of the work completed to date. Baker progress submittals made during the month of November included the following; the re-submission of the Preliminary MPT and Construction Staging Plans/Report; the 60% PA Noise Walls Contract Plans; the revised Draft PA Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility Technical Memo; the Draft TS&L Report for the PA Pedestrian/Bicycle Ramp Structure; the PA Noise Walls Geotechnical Report; the Revised NJDEP No Net-Loss Reforestation Application Package; the Draft Mussel Survey Work Plan; the Final Lighting Warrant Analysis Technical Memos for PA and NJ; and the Final PA Route 332 Ramp Analysis Technical Memo. Each of these documents are being reviewed by Engineering and DMC Staff. The draft meeting minutes for Progress Meeting No. 8 were also received and are being reviewed and commented on by Engineering and DMC staff.

TRC Engineers, Inc. (TRC) was awarded this construction contract at the Commission's May 2015 Meeting and Notice to Proceed was issued effective June 18, 2015, and began their field work on June 22<sup>nd</sup>. #### DESIGN Contract No. C-663A

Pennoni Associates, Inc. (Pennoni) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective July 28, 2015. This Contract is for professional traffic engineering services for a pre-construction traffic study required prior to construction of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, in accordance with the Interagency Agreement (IA) dated April 30, 2012 between the DRJTBC, PennDOT and NJDOT. This study will serve as the baseline for purposes of determining the traffic diversion impacts from tolling the new Scudder Falls Bridge. As prescribed in the IA, the study area includes bridge crossings, various County and State road networks, intersections and interchanges that may be affected by the tolling of the new bridge. The scope of services includes traffic counts, data collection and traffic analysis.

The Pennoni team has completed the traffic data collection portion of this project. They have compiled the traffic count data for the various intersection, interchange and highway segment counts and have performed quality assurance verification of all the data. The team is analyzing the data and developing the traffic model. They are also in the process of preparing the Pre-Construction Traffic Study Report.

The Capital Program Management Consultant (CPMC) services are being continued under this Task Order Assignment, which began in March 2015. AECOM is providing one (1) full-time Project Manager and one (1) part-time Program Area Manager to oversee and manage various design and construction projects that are being advanced in the Capital Improvement Program. CPMC Staff are currently providing management and oversight of other CPMC assigned projects and have developed the RFP for Contract C-644A, I-78 Roadway Approach/Transition Slabs Rehabilitation and the Rehabilitation of the Cedarville Road Overpass. The RFP was posted on the Commission's website on October 21, 2015. The submission date for proposals is December 2, 2015.

AECOM performed an assessment of the Commission's existing Wide Area Network (WAN) infrastructure, future needs and identified alternatives to provide a more robust and cost efficient system that supports both the ESS and internal DRJTBC network requirements. AECOM is developing performance specifications to be used by the Commission in soliciting proposals from various communication solutions providers.

The AECOM team revised Exhibit B for the draft MOU with NJDEP, NJDOT and the NJWSA for the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility in accordance with comments received from NJDEP – Green Acres. Exhibit B identifies the ROW jurisdiction for the various parties to the agreement. The public involvement work under this Task Order Assignment was completed in early August. All of the remaining DMC public involvement activities are now being completed under Task Order Assignment C-502A-2G.

#### DMC SERVICES FOR MANAGEMENT AND OVERSIGHT OF FINAL DESIGN

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2G

AECOM's Design Management Consultant (DMC) Services are being continued under this Task Order Assignment that was authorized on January 16, 2015. The DMC services being provided under this Task Order Assignment include management and oversight of final design for the project through award of the Scudder Falls Bridge construction contracts. The DMC Services also include support to the Commission with the following: agency coordination, ROW acquisition plan development, ROW acquisition process coordination, environmental permitting, public involvement support, and coordination of necessary agreements with outside agencies. This DMC Task Order Assignment will cover DMC services through final design and award of the main Scudder Falls Bridge Project construction contract.

Environmental permitting agency coordination continues as well as preparation of the USACE and PADEP permit application packages, including all back-up documentation. Coordination was also ongoing with NJDEP - Green Acres regarding the back-up documentation required for the final application package for the Parkland Diversion Permit, and the draft Memorandum of Understanding for the maintenance and operation of the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility. The final NJDEP - Green Acres application was submitted for review and comment in mid-August. Initial comments were received from NJDEP regarding the application and those comments were addressed in a revised application package submitted on October 7, 2015. We are awaiting confirmation from NJDEP - Green Acres that our final application package has been deemed complete. Additional comments were received from the USACE on the Revised Jurisdictional Determination (JD) Plans and these comments are currently being addressed by the DMC. Work progressed on the conceptual design of the PA Wetlands Mitigation Site. The Conceptual Plan and back-up design narrative was submitted to the PADEP and USACE for review and comment on November 25, 2015. The agreements with Evergreen Environmental for the NJ Wetlands Mitigation and the NJ Riparian Zone Mitigation were fully executed during the month of October. A check in the amount of

\$66,400 was forwarded to Evergreen Environmental on November 25, 2015 to secure the initial 0.166 wetland bank credits for the NJ portion of the wetlands mitigation.

The ROW acquisition process continued during the month of November, including coordination between Commission staff and the Commission's NJ and PA Legal Counsel. At the March 2015 Commission Meeting the Commissioners provided authorization, in the form of a Resolution, for the Right-of-Way Acquisition process. The necessary appraisals for all of the various property acquisitions in Pennsylvania and New Jersey have been completed. Various offer letters have been sent out by the Commission's Legal Counsel to the property owners. The Commissioners, at the September 2015 Commission Meeting, approved the purchase of Parcel 20-030-084 and authorized the Executive Director to negotiate various other property purchases contingent on the owners being willing to sell. An agreement was reached with the owner of Parcels 20-030-083 and 20-030-096 for the purchase of property along Woodside Road and River Road. An offer was made on the Morris property which was rejected by the owner. Mr. Morris is currently in the process of obtaining his own appraisal to determine his own value of the property. In November the PA Legal Counsel forwarded an offer letter to the owner of Parcel 20-027-007 along Woodside Road for the partial taking that is necessary for that property. The owner has agreed to the Commission's offer and an agreement of sale is being finalized.

DMC Staff are coordinating and overseeing the performance of Contract T-661, Geotechnical Boring Contract for the SFB Project that was awarded at the May 18, 2015 Commission Meeting. The boring work began June 22<sup>nd</sup>. All work under the initial phase of the boring contract was substantially complete on November 24, 2015. The latest Progress Meeting for Contract C-660A was held on November 10<sup>th</sup>, 2015. A technical review session was held with Baker and the Commission's Toll Systems Integrator (TransCore) on November 10<sup>th</sup> to review technical issues and requirements for the AET Facility design. The Consultant's Design Schedule Update No. 4 was also submitted and is currently being reviewed.

At the September meeting The Commissioners authorized the Executive Director to execute Utility Agreements with PSE&G Gas and Electric as well as Verizon for engineering services associated with impacted utilities in NJ. The Agreements have been submitted to PSE&G and Verizon for their review.

Under this Task Order Assignment (TOA) the Consultant, Dewberry Engineers Inc. (Dewberry), prepared plans for deck repairs on the Scudder Falls Bridge. The existing deck is deteriorating and needs interim deck repairs to provide a satisfactory riding surface until the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge is constructed. All work, deck patching and line striping, was completed on August 24, 2015. Now that the repairs are complete, as part of the contract, the Contractor is retained on an on-call basis for the following two (2) years, with an additional 1-year option, to repair new potholes as they develop. Final Invoice has been received and processed. A Task Order Agreement Modification will be processed to close out the project.

#### CONSTRUCTION Contract No. TS-677A

Sparwick Contracting, Inc. (SCI) was awarded this construction contract at the Commission's May 2015 Meeting and Notice to Proceed was issued effective June 23, 2015. All construction work, including the Type 1, 2 and 3 spall repairs, bridge restriping, and site demobilization was completed by September 8, 2015. Invoice No. 2, which paid for all work completed to date, has been processed. SCI will now provide on-call and emergency spall repairs for the next two years on an as-needed basis as part of their construction contract.

#### CONSTRUCTION INSPECTION Task Order Assignment Contract No. C-627B-3

This is a Task Order Agreement Assignment (TOA) to French and Parrello, Associates (F&P) for construction inspection services associated with the TS-677A Scudder Falls Toll-Supported Bridge Interim Deck Repair Project. F&P's inspection services consisted of a full time Assistant Resident Engineer (ARE) during construction. F&P completed their inspection services with the completion of the construction work in late August and has submitted the final as-built drawings, which completes this TOA effort. The final invoice was submitted and the close out modification is being processed. Once this close out modification is fully executed, this TOA will be closed.

The Louis Berger Group (LBG) was issued Notice to Proceed effective July 13, 2015. This assignment is for Inspection and Final Design Services for work at the cantilever sign structure located on the main river bridge that was struck by an oversized vehicle. LBG has provided final design documents and is currently performing post-design tasks associated with the assignment.

This assignment is for Inspection and Final Design Services for work at the span 1 fascia girder located on the main river bridge that was struck by the T-566A contractor. Intercounty Paving Associates, LCC (IPA) was awarded this construction contract at the Commission's February 2015 Meeting; issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective February 25, 2015; and issued Notice to Proceed effective March 26, 2015 upon the approval of IPA's insurance. IPA's Preliminary Schedule and Health and Safety Program (HASP) have both been submitted and are under review. IPA has also begun submitting RFIs. A preconstruction meeting was held on April 9, 2015 and field work has commenced and proceeding on schedule. Substantial Completion was achieved on October 23, 2015. A final inspection was performed on November 13, 2015. Remaining punch list items have been completed and the contract is in the process of being closed out.

WSH continues to submit their contract required submittals along with Requests for Information (RFIs) as needed and participates in the Contract Bi-Weekly Schedule Update and Progress Meetings and also as needed Pre-Activity Meetings.

The audit shall provide a basis for long term energy planning oriented toward a present value of net zero expenditure with respect to the projected cost savings preferably within ten years but not exceeding 20 years.

A kick-off meeting was held with Joseph Jingoli & Son, Inc. on April 21, 2015. The Consultant collected as-built drawings, placed Data Loggers to collect energy use data trends during one month period at various locations within each site and concluded site visits and surveys on May 20, 2015. The Consultant is currently preparing energy models at each location using information obtained from Data Loggers that were collected by June 25, 2015.

A Draft Concept Study Report identifying proposed energy conservation measures was received July 23, 2015 and a report review meeting was held with the Consultant August 27<sup>th</sup>. Commission comments were shared with the Consultant and a Final Report incorporating Commission comments was received on September 23, 2015.

Final Invoice was received on November 10<sup>th</sup> reflecting completion of consultant's scope of services at 16% below the budgeted amount. This Task Order Assignment is being closed.

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving the Electronic Security and Surveillance Department:

#### Radio System

- During the month of November 2015, ESS personnel continued working with Motorola and the New Jersey State Police to upgrade the Commission's radio system to 700 MHz/P25 and utilize the GPS feature in the new radios installed in District III.
- ESS personnel arranged for various radio installations and repairs during the month of November 2015 and are working with Purchasing to determine the location of the radios for the new Mack trucks.
- ESS personnel alone, and in conjunction with the New Jersey State Police investigated various other DRJTBC radio issues both during and after normal working hours.
- ESS personnel continue to work with the Districts and IT to update the Cartegraph radio inventory database.

#### Access Control System

- During the month of November 2015, ESS personnel worked with General Supply (Commission's lock smith) to address various lock issues and install a new sub-master system for the new area at Trenton-Morrisville that will be assigned to Human Resources.
- In November 2015, ESS personnel created ID badges for new employees and consultants. Additionally, ESS continued making "Essential Employee" ID badges for current employees.
- During the month of November 2015, the ACS database was audited and the system was purged of invalid employee and contractor cards. Various other employee ACS rights were updated and/or changed at the request of supervisors.

- During the month of November 2015, Schneider Electric started the installation of the new ESS Primary Control Center at the New Jersey State Police Regional Operations Intelligence Center (ROIC).
- During the month of November 2015, ESS personnel, along with Engineering continued to meet with Sentinel Consultants regarding the I-78 wireless renovation project.
- During the month of November 2015, ESS personnel worked with Engineering to design the new I-78 maintenance facility.
- During the month of November 2015, ESS personnel met with Engineering reference the new Scudder Falls facility.
