ROLL CALL

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting called the roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being five members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and four members present from the State of New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Vice Chairman Ahmad welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Vice Chairman Ahmad addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the public on items pertaining to today's Agenda.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, addressed the meeting and said;

"Thank you, Mr. Vice-Chairman, and good morning, before I get into my remarks, I want to let everyone know that the Commission has been on Yellow Alert Status since last week's terrorist strikes in Brussels, Belgium. All of our personnel have been instructed to be on a heightened sense of awareness and report any suspicious activity to our Primary Control Center or the officer in charge at our toll bridges;

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"Moving to today's agenda, we have a series of developments to update you on regarding the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. On March 15, we hosted a project outreach session in Ewing, N.J. The event consisted of two parts, a New Jersey-oriented open house that featured an updated eight-minute informational video and a display of 22 separate graphic/information boards depicting the project's design, scheduling and staging elements. This was followed by a public hearing on proposed tree removal work expected to begin after October 1st on the New Jersey side of the bridge and a corresponding reforestation plan to compensate for the removed trees. The event attracted 96 attendees and the feedback we've received has largely been positive. All of the materials from the session have been placed on the web for further viewing. Also the public record on the proposed reforestation plan is to remain open for 60 days, ending on May 16th. This was the second project outreach session we have had in recent months. As you may recall, slightly more than 260 people attended a Pennsylvania-focused open house held in Lower Makefield Township, Buck County, back on Dec. 3rd. We expect to conduct further outreach as the project moves forward in the months and years ahead, for example, we are trying to set up a forum in April where we can announce the outcome of additional noise readings recently collected along I-95 in Lower Makefield. Also next month, we are planning to provide an informational presentation to business owners and corporate executives in Mercer County, N.J. Finally, later in the spring, we hope to be in a position to hold hearings on a proposed toll schedule for the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge once its first span is completed in 2019;

"The advanced tree clearing work along the Pennsylvania I-95 approach to the bridge is progressing toward this Thursday's substantial completion date, The actual felling of trees was completed earlier this month. The contractor has since been involved in chipping, removal and clean-up activities. As you may recall, this first stage of tree clearing is confined to 15 acres of the highway right-of-way in Lower Makefield Township between the Taylorsville Road Interchange and the Newtown/Route 332 Interchange. This work will enable us to begin installing noise abatement walls at designated locations along the bridge's Pennsylvania I-95 approach later this spring. For a future agenda, consideration of a contract award for construction inspection services of the noise wall installation work will be forthcoming. We hope to award that noise wall construction contract soon so the work can begin later in the spring and get completed before the end of the year. Moving upriver, we recently completed the installation of larger, more heavily anchored concrete protection blocks in front of the manned toll booths at our I-78 Toll Plaza. These so-called "bumper blocks" serve to protect the plaza's structural supports, tolling equipment, and – most importantly – our toll collection personnel from vehicular accidents and errant drivers. The need to replace these important toll plaza protection devices was identified in the wake of a tractor trailer accident at the facility on February 9. The truck veered into one of the old bumper blocks, completely severing it and knocking one the toll plaza's lanes out

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of service for an extended period. In the course of planning repairs, it was determined that each of the plaza's bumper blocks needed to be raised in height and strengthened with reinforced anchoring to the plaza's foundations. It was imperative that we take this proactive measure because our I-78 Toll Bridge handles some of the highest interstate truck traffic volumes of any toll facility in the country. Moreover, we anticipate that I-78 truck traffic will increase in coming years as shipments to the Port of Newark/Elizabeth – and by extension to the Lehigh Valley warehouse parks – rise once the Panama Canal widening project reaches completion in the near future;

"In closing, I want to mention that we have a special presentation planned for our former chairman David DeGerolamo today. David was committed to the Commission service mission and its employees. Only a handful of individuals have managed to serve on the Commission longer than David did. Even fewer were privileged to preside for a longer tenure as the agency's chair. While David's prime responsibility was to serve on behalf of New Jersey residents and toll payers, he always will be remembered as an individual who understood and appreciated the Commission bistate dynamic and he was appreciated and kind. His record of accomplishments as chairman is unparalleled. Establishment of Electronic Security and Surveillance, Compact Authorized Investment and Contract Compliance Departments and Programs design. The implementation of Express E-ZPass/Open Road Tolling facilities at I-78 and Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridges. Removal of toll gates at all seven toll plazas, approval of a \$285 million bond transaction in 2007, rehabilitation and resurfacing of our I-78 New Jersey and Pennsylvania approach roadways, completion of the environmental documentation process for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, a process that culminated with the issuance of a pivotal Finding of No Significant Impact from the Federal Highway Administration. Scour remediation and substructure repairs at 15 of the Commission's 20 bridges under a single 2-1/2 year initiative and lastly -- but not least -- the execution of comprehensive rehabilitation projects at 10 separate bridges, Riverton-Belvidere, Trenton-Morrisville (Route 1), Milford-Montague (Route 206), Centre Bridge-Stockton, Calhoun Street, Riegelsville, Upper Black Eddy-Milford, Delaware Water Gap (I-80), Lumberville-Raven Rock and Easton-Phillipsburg (Route 22);

"David's impact will continue to be felt in the months and years ahead as we continue to advance the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project to full construction status in 2017. For example, in about three months or so, we will expect to conduct six separate hearings on a proposed toll schedule for that replacement bridge. Those hearings are the result of a toll adjustment hearing policy adopted under Mr. DeGerolamo's leadership in 2013;

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"In closing, I want to point out that more than 160 individuals have served as Commissioners since the agency's establishment in 1934, of these, none ever presided over as much tangible progress as Mr. DeGerolamo during his nine years in the chairman's post'

"Mr. Chairman, this concludes my March update."

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"WHEREAS, the Commission constitutes a public corporation instrumentality of the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; and

"WHEREAS, the laws of the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania do not apply to the Commission unless complimentary legislation is enacted in both States and approved by Congress; and

"WHEREAS, the Commission nevertheless maintains a practice of receiving bids for ordinary goods and services, consistent with the laws of the State of New Jersey and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; and ordinarily awards such purchases after a public bid to the lowest responsive bidder; and

"WHEREAS, the Commission has entered into a contract with Xerox State & Local Solutions, Inc. to perform maintenance on the Electronic Toll Collection system; and

"WHEREAS, a highly orchestrated spare parts/consumables program and a high state of equipment reliability is required to maintain high lane availability on a 24/7 basis; and

"WHEREAS, Xerox State & Local Solutions Inc. is the only vendor who can provide the necessary spare parts/consumables support and replacement equipment compatible with the existing ETC equipment to maintain the ETC system at peak performance levels so as to minimize any disruption in toll revenue; and

"WHEREAS, legislation previously enacted by the respective States, which was never approved by Congress, would permit the Commission in such a circumstance to enter into a contract with Xerox State & Local Solutions, Inc. without the requirement of public bidding; and

"WHEREAS, his term of service at the Commission spanned the administrations of multiple Governors -- Democrat and Republican; and

"WHEREAS, Commissioner DeGerolamo became the Commission's Chairman on November 27, 2006, a position he maintained with distinction, aplomb and vigor until his retirement; and

"WHEREAS, he guided the Commission as its Chairman for nine years, one of the longest leadership tenures in the Commission's 81-year history; and

"WHEREAS, his previous public service experience as Phillipsburg Council President proved of tremendous value to the Commission across a wide range of professional disciplines, including administration, governance, finance and community relations; and

"WHEREAS, he played a key role of advocacy and support in the execution of the most expansive Capital Improvement Program in the Commission's history; and

"WHEREAS, he fostered cooperation and communication among Commissioners and stakeholder communities; and

"WHEREAS, his even-handed manner, collegial demeanor and perseverance earned him the admiration and respect of all those he worked with in Commission affairs; and

"WHEREAS, he leaves the Commission with a vastly improved network of transportation assets, an enhanced organizational structure, and a strengthened array of financial metrics; and

"WHEREAS, his steady leadership advanced the Commission's public service mission; now, therefore,

"You know, it is kind of funny to think back as to how I actually introduced myself to the Commission some 16 years ago. But first and foremost, I want to thank everyone here today. I want to thank the current Commissioners, the administrative staff, Executive Director Resta, Deputy Executive Director Sean Hill and Chief Engineer Roy Little, as well as everyone else that's included in that, the governor's office representatives and all the attorneys. I appreciate everything, and I'm humbled by the words, but I will tell you this. You know, sometimes I think the true value and worth of a person, of a man, is to understand that you need to have those people around you that are actually smarter than you, and more capable than you because truly the guidance that they give you is what makes you a better leader. Gaetan Alfano is here today, Bill Hodas, Frank McCartney, George Alexandridis, Frank Tolotta because, quite frankly, when I came on this Commission, those were the people who I looked to for the most guidance. They are definitely an accomplished group of individuals. They are very smart and understanding group of individuals, such as what you have here with you today. We have moved forward as a Commission in many ways. And from an administrative staff standpoint, we have added Executive Director Resta, Sean Hill, Roy Little, and today they are the ones that give guidance to all the Commissioners, and I think make this Commission a better place than what we left it when I first started. So I would be remiss to think that all those accolades are truly for myself because the reality that is the gentleman that are sitting on the back wall, deserves those accolades much more than myself because they truly are the ones that guided me along the way and provided me the insight to understand what I was doing. So thank you to all of you, This is very special. It truly is the most special group of people that I've ever had to work with professionally, and I do miss you. I do have some conversations from time to time with different people to at least keep my fingers in it and my mouth moist with interest in what's going on, but you are a great group of individuals, each and every one of you as Commissioners and as executive staff altogether. So it's important that you continue to do all the good things that you do. You know, it's also interesting, too, it goes back before I got on the Commission, I thought it was this big political patronage, you know, just turn and crank, and it all just happened and the reality is, we are not that. We are not every other agency in the State of New Jersey or Pennsylvania. We are different. We do it better, and we will continue to do it better under your guidance. And I would also be remiss, whenever I couldn't get Frank on the phone or I couldn't get Joe on the phone or Sean on the phone or I needed something, it could have been a weekend, it could had been a weeknight. there was always a person that I could go to. Wendy Reading. And wish I had an administrative assistant working for me in my work place that was as tremendous and as terrific and as providing as Wendy Reading. And I thank you, Wendy, for everything you have done for me and everything you have done for this Commission and the people that you serve as well. Thank you.

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Former Vice Chairman Gaetan Alfano addressed the meeting and said:

"Okay. So what does that tell you that this guy will not talk about himself? He really is humble. He's a terrific leader and I think David will not talk about himself. He won't take any credit. He will take the credit and distribute it elsewhere. I mean, you really are, David, a special person who has for many years lead a very special group of people here. And you achieved something that I think is so sorely missed in today's political and professional environment, and that is the ability to achieve consensus. No matter which state we came from, what our backgrounds were, whichever party was in power at a particular time, whoever the governor was or whatever our, political meetings or affiliations may have been, it really made no difference. Sometimes it might have taken a little longer, but ultimately what we accomplished was always in the best interest of the public and in the best interest of this Commission and, David, it is solely because of your leadership. For that, I thank you and I was honored to be able to serve on this Commission with you all these years. Thank you."

Former Executive Director Frank McCartney addressed the meeting and said:

"I used to work here. David, we first met in Phillipsburg. There was a public hearing after we did a minor toll increase back in the early 2000s, and David showed up to express his interest in the Commission and his concern for the amount of the toll increase, and little did I know, in a few years he would be serving as chair. But when I left here in 2012, I was presented a number of really nice plaques and remembrances, but one that I find very special is where the minutes of this meeting back in 2001, I believe, it was, reflected David DeGerolamo's strong opposition to the toll increase and to the capital program. And there was a post script that David wrote in it, he took it all back. He became a co-conspirator. David, thank you for your leadership. With you and Bill and Gaetan and the entire staff here and those who retired, folks, carry on. This is a great Commission, and I think one of the best in the bi-state area, so good luck and thanks again, David."

Former Commissioner Hodas addressed the meeting and said"

"It's been a while. Commissioners, Joe Resta, staff, Dave, it's an honor to have served with you for ten years. You and Gaetan and Frank McCartney a division of people that helped the Bridge Commission to move forward. You implemented many programs that makes these bridges safer and safer every day to meet the requirements of today's market with cameras, generators, many things that were implemented during your time. It was an honor to serve with you for ten years, and it's my pleasure being here. Thank you."

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Commissioner Laurenti addressed the meeting and said:

"To reiterate Commissioner Alfano and Commissioner Hodas, who I had the pleasure to serve under, as I said, I went outside, it's old home week out there. It's more fun out there than sitting here and doing the business, but you all set a very high standard. It is with great honor that I have served with all of you. I view you as my mentors and hope that I will do as well sitting in this seat as when I served with all of you and appreciate all of your hard work. And just want to pick up Gaetan and your comment, David doesn't draw attention to himself. Always behind the scenes trying to do the right thing for the traveling public for the Commission for the many employees and it really has been a great honor and a pleasure. Thank you"

Commissioner Stanley addressed the meeting and said:

"Well, I have to say something. David is a joy to work with. And I came on this Commission, and it was quite a stretch for me, very different sort of thing for me to be doing. And I heard that the chairman had a differing political background than I, and I thought uh-huh, this could be trouble. So I came here and even before I met him face to face, he had the grace to call me and just check in and see how things were going and give me a little background. And I came to find out that this man is extremely even handed. That he is -- you know, I was expecting more partisan sort of a thing between us, and I never experienced that. I thought he was always the picture of grace. I came to find out that you are not partisan as much as you are multi-partisan. And then I thought, no, that's not even right. You are partisan for this Commission and what's the best thing for this Commission and astonishingly what you came to show was that what's best for this Commission is also typically what's best for the users of our bridges. And I am continually astonished at how you managed to convey that, and portray such a gracious -- I'm not even going to say humble. I like the word aplomb that was used in here. We'll all have to go home and look it up, but I know it is apropos. But anyway, thank you, David, for making me feel a part of this Commission and helping me to understand and particularly for your partisanship, if you will, for this Commission."

Commissioner Van Vliet addressed the meeting and said:

"David, I like to thank you so much for seeing you in action as far as diplomatic relations with people taking a situation that could be explosive at times and calming it down, taking it through fruition for the betterment of the Commission or whatever other reason we dealt with on the outside. David and I go back for a few years before I was appointed to the Commission. I really wished I had more time here to observe how he handled things and negotiations. Were I came from, it was pretty much confrontational a lot of times and two people would harden up in positions and not

We didn't know a lot and maybe sometimes we spoke out of turn, but you listened and for that I thank you, and you are missed."

Commissioner Siptroth addressed the meeting and said:

"I, too, David, want to thank you. Even though we only had eight months to work together, and you certainly helped us, and I think Pam already spoke on the issue, adjusting ourselves from coming from being past employees here and then becoming Commissioners. I also want to acknowledge Commission Alfano and Commissioner Hodas for their time that we worked together while I was in the state house, so I do appreciate that, and, Mr. McCartney and Mr. Tolotta, as we worked together on the Commission itself. This is a great place, not only to be a Commissioner, but also to be employed, and we find that today in executive session on another issue, that there are sympathetic ears and as a past employee, I certainly appreciate that. Thank you and thank you for all your service."

Commissioner Grace addressed the meeting and said:

"David, what can I say? Normally we sit here and we talk about issues and whatever we talked about, you always made me and everybody here feel welcomed. You never made us feel out of place, but I listened to your speech and, you know, every good leader surrounds himself with competent and smart people. But when you look at the other side of that, there is somebody sitting in my seat, there is always a mentor they can look up to, and you are one of them. So when I look at that right there, that's the elite on the bench. Usually it's the bench warmers looking from this way. I look up at every one of you and say thank you. Thank you for everything you did. It was a pleasure serving with you. Good luck."

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Vice Chairman Ahmad addressed the meeting and said:

"Well, Dave, I accolade everyone's sentiments. I just have to say thank you. When I came on as Vice-Chair, and it was no secret, the first time I had ever heard of this Commission was when I got a call from the Governor's office saying I'm the Vice-Chair. And I said, "What the heck?" I didn't know what I was getting myself in to. You know, Jersey, there is a different governor, and now am I going to get thrown in to some political situation and what have you. - Immediately I was impressed with you because you weren't political, but you were political because this is a political animal. It's very difficult to be in this thing, and maintain a sense of integrity. But, more importantly, understanding that it's not about all the political noise, but about real people who are traveling across these bridges and so forth and so on, and you did not get lost there. More importantly, the only way to effect those individuals is to have some type of practicality, and your job -- and I immediately told you, was way more difficult than mine. You know, our Governor says, this is the new bench, but you guys have a whole different dynamic, and you were able to navigate through that for a very, very, long time, for years. That says a lot about you as a person. I am grateful to you for making the transition for me just seamless.. It could had been totally different. You know, you could have been a totally different person, and I would have been, you know, looking like some crazy person, and the Governor would have been what's going on? Why are the bridges falling down? So I really appreciate it, and sometimes, you know, trees fall in the forest and no one hears them. And so you will be missed and are missed. Thank you."

Commissioner Starace addressed the meeting and said:

"David, not to make this last any longer, but it was a pleasure getting to know you, and I'm sure I will see you on the other side of the bridge sooner than later."

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and said:

"Dave, it is tough being on the phone because you can't see who is ready to jump in, so I think I'll just go ahead and jump in here. If it wasn't for the fact that I go to my mom and dad's every Easter, I would be there in person. And I feel bad that I can't be there to honor you today. I just want to say that it was a pleasure serving with you the brief time I was a Commissioner while you were Chairman. We have known each other a lot of years. You were a great Chairman. You are a great person and, more importantly, to me, you are a great friend. And I treasure your friendship and look forward to asking you Bridge Commission questions with some regularity. So thank you."

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and said:

"David, if I may, I apologize for having mislead you slightly for today's events because the former Chairman pretty much said 'I'm not going to come if you do anything', so I do apologize for that. I thank you for your commitment to this Commission and your supportive and sometimes nurturing relationship that you've had with me. It has helped me in whatever success that I've had here, and I will not forget your guidance. Thank you."

INVITE ANY FURTHER COMMENTS

Vice Chairman Ahmad invited any further Comments. No further comments were presented.

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DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of March 28, 2016 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (February, 2016)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for February 2016 in comparison to the February 2015 traffic and revenue statistics. In addition, total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month of February.

Analysis of February 2016 / February 2015 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 11.74 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 10.96 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 14.08 percent increase.

Analysis of February 2016 / February 2015 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 330,385 vehicles, or 12.87 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 40,471 vehicles, or 10.84 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 289,914 vehicles, or 13.21 percent.
- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for February 2016 was 99,930 total vehicles as compared to 91,700 total vehicles in February 2015.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for February 2016 increased by 180,965 vehicles, or 8.32 percent as compared to February 2015. Average daily westbound traffic at the 11 toll supported bridges for February 2016 was 81,225 vehicles as compared to 77,663 in February 2015.

Traffic analysis for 2016 YTD:

- Total YTD toll traffic for the seven toll bridges is reflecting an 8.63 percent increase through the first two months of 2016 as compared to the same period in 2015.
- Recorded westbound traffic on the eleven toll supported bridges is reflecting a 2.49 percent increase for the first two months of 2016 as compared to last year.

DISTRICT REVIEW:

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for February 2016 reflected a 12.51 percent increase as the result of the increase of 73,782 cars and 303 trucks when compared to February 2015. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), increases of 13,208 cars and 668 trucks combined to generate an increase in total toll traffic of 11.22 percent for February 2016 as compared to February 2015.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an increase of 12.94 percent in total toll traffic for the month of February 2016 compared to February 2015 as the result of increases of 71,225 cars and 25,978 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, the increases of 39,094 passenger vehicles and 2,880 trucks combined to generate an 11.59 percent increase in total toll traffic for February 2016.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced an 11.85 percent increase in total toll traffic during February 2016 as a result of increases of 8,047 automobiles and 1,331 trucks compared to February 2015. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, the increase of 71,722 passenger vehicles combined with the increase of 11,182 trucks to generate an overall increase of 13.88 percent in total toll traffic for February 2016 as compared to February 2015. At Milford-Montague (MM), increases of 12,836 passenger vehicles and 129 trucks combined to produce a 16.79 percent increase in total toll traffic for the month of February 2016.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of February, 2016 and February, 2015, and the year-to-date periods ending February 29, 2016 and February 28, 2015.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled **"Budget vs Actual"** covering the month of February 2016 and the two months year-to-date ("YTD") operations of fiscal year 2016 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$4,574,276 for the month of February. For the 2016 fiscal period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$9,115,446 or 83.22% of the YTD operating budget.

All of the expense line categories are within their normal line item budget except for Overtime. Overtime Wages exceed the YTD budget by \$9,343 or 10.1% due to the of adverse weather activity during January 2016. This expense item is anticipated to come into line with the budget during the next several months.

There were no unusual expenses or charges during the month of February.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

FEBRUARY 2016

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of February, 2016, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month culminated in the preparation and placement of 51 purchase orders in the total amount of \$423,619.60. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 8 price inquiries were sent out for 24 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3.0 per order (24/8=3.0).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the period of February 2016 are shown below:

- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$146,923.20 under the 2016 approved Capital Equipment Budget for a John Deere Backhoe for the Portland-Columbia Toll Bridge Facility.
- A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$87,512.00 for ESS System Repairs/Upgrades at the Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge Facility. This is due to a vehicle accident and an insurance claim has been submitted.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$38,250.00, for the USGS Agreement for river gauges at four Commission locations.
- Two (2) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$35,174.14, for the Commission's tower lease agreements for Districts I and II.

The following items were recently initiated, accomplished or performed during the above noted month:

Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

- 1. Xerox and TransCore continue to perform preventative maintenance for the electronic toll collection system and violation enforcement system. Commission Staff met with Xerox and TransCore to review maintenance activity for the month.
- 2. We have worked with TransCore to procure several overhead laser scanners and toll attendant touch screens. Both of these devices are end of life and no longer readily available. Therefore, we purchased several units from TransCore and they have been turned over to Xerox for storage in our spare parts inventory.
- 3. TransCore submitted the final Software Design Plan, QA Plan and Staffing Plan. TransCore facilitated b-weekly project status meetings, System Configuration Workshops and Reports Workshops with Commission Staff. Draft submittals that were received and being reviewed this month include the draft engineering plans and draft Business Rules document.

Activities for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center

- 1. The the design of the new NJ Customer Service Center (CSC) is underway. The New Jersey Turnpike Authority (NJTA), as the lead agency, is facilitating all meetings with the other agencies and Xerox. The new CSC is expected to go live in February 2017.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT February 2016

COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Commission Informational Video for Website Redesign – Communications Department reviewed first version of Stokes Creative Group video to promote the Commission on the soon-to-be completed redesign of the Commission's public website. The video is based on a script rewritten by Communications in an effort to highlight the agency's major personnel units, its ongoing capital improvement efforts, and its strong financial metrics in advance of this year's anticipated bond offering for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project. The review required retrieval of additional digital photographs from the Communications Department's archives and detailed outlines of time signatures, photo placements and item swaps. With further reviews and modifications, the video should be ready for early March. The video will be featured on the Commission's public website once its redesign is completed.

Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project – Worked with the engineering department, project team, design engineers Michael Baker Inc., Stokes Creative Group and public involvement consultants McCormick Taylor to prepare for New Jersey-focused project open house and no-net-loss public reforestation hearing on March 15 in Ewing, NJ. A series of activities and work-product reviews were conducted including establishment of a new easier-to-remember information hotline number – 855-I95-SPAN – and rewrites of a stakeholder invitation letter and public notice. Other work included the issuance of a press release for the March 15 hearing, revised posting updates on the Commission's website and the project website – www.scudderfallsbridge.com.

2014 Annual Report – The completed 2014 report was posted on the current website in a manner consistent with prior annual reports. Completed the report's contents page and photographer information. An additional historical photograph will be inserted into the report once it can be acquired from archives in Philadelphia. The one alteration ideally will coincide with the public availability of redesigned website.

Media Consultant/Public Relations – The technical evaluation of firms proposing for the next three-year media consultant/public information retainer was revised after oral interviews were conducted by the procurement's Technical Evaluation Committee in early February. The findings were presented to the Senior Selection Committee and the Commission approved a resolution for the highest scoring firm, Bellevue Communications Group, at the February 29 meeting.

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Community Affairs Report

February 2016

The following Community Affairs activity took place during February:

Scudder Falls Participated in ongoing plans for the March 15 Project Open House and Reforestation public hearing. Provided updated local officials list to McCormick-Taylor for mailing of meeting notice.

Meeting with the Mid-Jersey Chamber of Commerce tentatively planned for April 12, to include a presentation on the project.

Participated in conference call with New Jersey DEP official regarding Delaware & Raritan Canal parkland easement acquisition and public comment. As per K. Skeels, no community interaction necessary at this time.

Knowlton/Columbia salt issue

Participated in review of response to resident's RTK request regarding the salt issue. J. Resta advised "Low Salt Zone" signs that had been placed on Commission property by the Township have been removed. I have received no response from the township to that action.

Phillipsburg Slope Stabilization:

Reviewed plans and documents for the Phillipsburg Slope Stabilization. Met with Town Clerk Victoria Kleiner and Police Chief Jim Faulborn to advise of ramp closure. Confirmed adjacent property owners and sent written notification of work to be performed. Received phone call from Richard Frinzi, concerned about drainage ditch in back of his property. Forwarded to C. Harney. Engineer met on-site with Mr. Frinzi; he is satisfied.

Tree service identified one tree that needs to be removed, just over the property line. I reached out to property owner Alexander Curtis. After looking at it, Mr. Curtis gave his approval to remove tree.

Riverton-Belvidere Attended meeting for RB Critical Members Strengthening project. Extent of community impacts will depend on which option is chosen. All options involve single-lane closures. The main area of concern will be noise. Spoke to Municipal Clerks of Belvidere and Upper Mount Bethel about inspection and survey crews on site.

Central Jersey Transportation Forum

Attended meeting of Central Jersey Transportation Forum at Mercer County College. Focus of meeting was public transportation and rail service in the area. They might be interested in a SF update in the future.

Pike County Road Task Force

Attended meeting of the Pike County Road Task Force. Presented final 2015 traffic count statistics. Spoke with National Park Service Facility Manager Bill Tagye, who indicated the increase in their visitor numbers for 2015 were in-line with our traffic counts.

Emergency Vehicles Received an email from Allamuchy First Aid Squad (via NJ Asm. DiMaio's office) regarding toll violations they routinely receive at the DWGTB (I-80). Captain Lou Caruso represented the squad follows the proper protocol of calling ahead and using the lane as directed by the bridge personnel. He is concerned about receiving the violations, and the multiple phone calls needed to have violations dismissed. (They have been calling the main E-ZPass customer service center, not the Commission.)

> Yvonne Kushner reviewed and dismissed the violation in question, in addition to two violations that were received in the following weeks. In reviewing the procedures and the violations with S. Hill and J. Clark, it seems each violation is due to different reasons: mechanical failure, bridge personnel error, weather conditions, squad error (traveling too fast.)

> Mr. Caruso attended a meeting of the Warren County Emergency Services Officers' Association, where several other squads had the same concerns. He told then to call the Commission directly instead of E-ZPass customer service. As per Warren County Public Safety Director Frank Wheatley, the squads are appreciative of having a Commission contact to assist them with this. They have asked about the possibility of "non-revenue" transponders, as the Turnpike and Parkway provide. I advised that the Commission does not issue any transponders.

J. Resta shared previous correspondence from Sen. Santarsiero with a similar request. I am researching other agencies' policies and will follow-up with full report.

Photography Policy At J. Donnelly's request, I researched photography policies of other transportation agencies. Of those with policies posted on their website, most have limited restrictions on photography for personal use, provided the individual is not trespassing in a restricted area or impeding the flow of vehicular or pedestrian traffic. All commercial use requires permits.

Host Communities

Attended "Meet the Mayor" event for newly-elected Phillipsburg Mayor Stephen Ellis, hosted by the Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce. Met Mayor Ellis and Chamber Director Alison Pickel; intend to follow-up with both for more involved conversations. Mayor Ellis' plan to re-vitalize the town include business development on North and South Main Street, a raised boardwalk along the river and more interaction with officials in Easton.

Met Trans-Bridge Bus Lines President Thomas JeBran. He would like to discuss the possibility of using the Northampton Street Bridge for crossings of localized jitney-sized buses on a regular basis, as they did during the E-P rehab project construction.

While in District III for Pike County meeting, visited the municipal buildings of Montague, Milford and Dingman Township to introduce myself. Staff there had no concerns to report.

Misc. Customer relations

Barbara Auber of Arizona asked for permission to scatter her parents' ashes off the Washington Crossing Bridge when she comes east in November for a family wedding. Her father always joked that he was so old, that he crossed the Delaware with George Washington, so she thought it fitting to have that be his final resting place. As per Sean Hill, we do not have a specific policy for this, and would only require a use permit if they are impeding the flow of traffic or pedestrians, which they will not be. Whether or not DEP has regulations concerning putting ashes in the river is out of the Commission's jurisdiction. I will reach out to her in the fall to confirm her plans.

Received email via website from Jerry Horan, owner of Centre Bridge Inn, concerned about upcoming construction/closure of Rt. 32 north of the bridge, and the increase of speeding since there is only sporadic bridge monitor coverage at the bridge, and then only on the New Jersey side. Forwarded his concerns about Rt. 32 to PennDOT community affairs rep Charles Metzgar. I will visit Mr. Horan to listen to his other concerns.

LOWER TRENTON TOLL-SUPPORTED BRIDGE APPROACH ROADWAYS IMPROVEMENTS

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. TS-639B

Mount Construction Company, Inc. (Mount) was awarded this construction contract at the Commission's January 2015 Meeting and Notice to Proceed was issued effective March 9, 2015. Mount reached Substantial Completion on September 3, 2015 and all closeout documentation, including the final PSE&G invoices, have been received. Mount's final invoice and close out change order are being processed.

LOWER TRENTON TOLL-SUPPORTED BRIDGE TRENTON MAKES SIGN CONCEPT STUDY

DESIGN

Contract No. C-628A-5

Dewberry was issued Notice to Proceed effective February 22, 2016. A project kick-off meeting was held with Dewberry and their subconsultant, The Lighting Practice, on March 3, 2016. The designer is proceeding with required tasks. The concept report will investigate newer technologies to effectively light the sign and is expected in early May 2016.

SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT FINAL DESIGN SERVICES

FINAL DESIGN

Contract No. C-660A

Michael Baker Jr., Incorporated (MBJ) of Hamilton New Jersey was issued the Notice to Proceed effective March 11, 2015. The latest Progress Meeting was held with Baker on February 9th to review the status of the contract and progress of the work completed to date. As of January 31st, Baker is reported to be approximately 60% complete with 58% of the budget expended. The Baker progress submittals made during the month of February included the following: Design Schedule Update No. 7, Draft Letter Report for Ramp M Access to I-95 Northbound, NJ No Net Loss Reforestation Application Package, and the revised alignment for the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility Ramp Structure connection to the Main River Bridge. In addition, Baker made the following 60% design submittals: Main River Bridge (Steel and Concrete Alternates), Package A (PennDOT and DRJTBC Jurisdiction) Roadway Design, Package B (NJDOT Jurisdiction) Roadway Design, Highway Lighting Design Reports for PA & NJ, PA Traffic Signals Design Report, Construction Schedule, Geotechnical Reports (Main River Bridge, PA Structures and NJ Structures), Draft Incident Management Plan, Draft Transportation Management Plan, and the Construction Cost Estimate. Each of these

submissions is being reviewed and commented on by Engineering and DMC Staff. The draft meeting minutes for Progress Meeting No. 11 were also received and reviewed by Engineering and DMC staff.

On-Board Review Meetings were held with Baker on February 1^{st} and 2^{nd} to review the 60% Design submittals made in January. A meeting was also held with Jacobs on February 3^{rd} to coordinate the redesignation of I-95 in the area of the SFB Project and the signing changes associated with the redesignation to I-295. Field Meetings were also held with the various PA and NJ impacted utility companies to review relocation schemes.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT SERVICES FOR THE SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Construction Management Contract No. CM-664A

This Contract's Award to Greenman Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) of Lebanon, NJ was approved at the February 29, 2016 Commissioners' Meeting. Subsequently GPI was issued their Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective March 1, 2016. The Contract's Kick-Off Meeting is scheduled for March 3, 3016.

Michal Baker Jr. Inc. recently submitted the 60% Design level drawings and engineers estimate for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project under the C-660A contract. As part of their base scope, the GPI team will expedite the constructability review and independent engineers estimate preparation for these 60% design documents.

SUBSURFACE BORING AND SAMPLING CONTRACT FOR SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Construction Contract No. T-661A

TRC Engineers, Inc. (TRC) has completed all of the Contract Phase 1 boring work, which included borings for the noise walls, the main river bridge, the sign structures, the retaining walls, the approach bridges and the pedestrian/bike bridge, and also the taking of pavement cores and bulk sampling. TRC reached Contract Substantial Completion on November 23rd, two weeks ahead of schedule. TRC is now into the contract recall phase in case as the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Final Design progresses additional borings are required. This recall phase ends with the Contract Completion date of May 18, 2016.

PRE-CONSTRUCTION TRAFFIC STUDY FOR THE SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

DESIGN

Contract No. C-663A

Pennoni Associates, Inc. (Pennoni) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective July 28, 2015. This Contract is for professional traffic engineering services for a pre-construction traffic study required prior to construction of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, in accordance with the Interagency Agreement (IA) dated April 30, 2012 between the DRJTBC, PennDOT and NJDOT. This study will serve as the baseline for purposes of determining the traffic diversion impacts from tolling the new Scudder Falls Bridge. As prescribed in the IA, the study area includes bridge crossings, various County and State road networks, intersections and interchanges that may be affected by the tolling of the new bridge. The scope of services includes traffic counts, data collection and traffic analysis.

The Pennoni team has completed the traffic data collection, the base modelling of the regional traffic network and they have finalized the Pre-Final Pre-Construction Traffic Study Report. The Report was submitted for review on January 30, 2016. Commission comments have been returned to Pennoni and the Final Report is scheduled for submission on 3/9/2016.

SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT SERVICES

The DMC services being provided under this Task Order Assignment include management and oversight of final design for the project through award of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project main construction contract. The DMC Services also include support to the Commission with the following: agency coordination, ROW acquisition plan development, ROW acquisition process coordination, environmental permitting, public involvement support, and coordination of necessary agreements with outside agencies. Environmental permitting agency coordination continues as well as preparation of the USACE and PADEP permit application packages, including all back-up documentation. The Joint USACE/PADEP Permit Application Package for the portion of the project within the Commission's jurisdiction was submitted to the PADEP on February 29, 2016. Coordination has also been ongoing with NJDEP – Green Acres regarding the final application package for the Parkland Diversion Permit, and the draft Memorandum of Understanding for the maintenance and operation of the NJ Pedestrian/Bicycle Facility. NJDEP – Green Acres requires another 30-day public comment period as part of the application process. The comment period will be from March 6th through April 7th. We are still awaiting preliminary approval of the Revised Jurisdictional Determination (JD) Plans that were submitted to the USACE on December 11, 2015. The PA Wetlands Mitigation Site Design was completed and is being submitted to the PADEP and the USACE as part of the Joint Permit Applications.

Meeting of March 2016 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

The ROW acquisition process continued during the month of January, including coordination between Commission staff and the Commission's NJ and PA Legal Counsel. The Commission closed on Parcel 20-030-084 at 1140 Woodside Road during the month of January and now owns that parcel. A closing date of April 30, 2016 is anticipated for Parcels 20-030-083 and 20-030-096, at 185 River Road. The Berger proposal was received on November 18, 2015 and negotiations held on November 24, 2015. Proposal was resubmitted on December 3,2015. Based on clarified scope and negotiations the fee was reduced from \$319,959.87 to \$204,398.9. Notice to proceed was given on December 15, 2015. Kick off meeting was held on January 15, 2016. Existing plans were transmitted to Consultant in order to start construction plan preparation. Consultant conducted field visit to all five bridge sites February 18 & 19, 2016.

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving the Electronic Security and Surveillance Department:

Radio System

- During the month of February 2016, ESS personnel continued working with Motorola and the New Jersey State Police to upgrade the Commission's radio system to 700 MHz/P25 and utilize the GPS feature in the new radios installed in District III. Funding was approved by the Commissioners at the February 29, 2016 Commission Meeting to complete the acquisition and installation of the entire radio system upgrade. The process is continuing.
