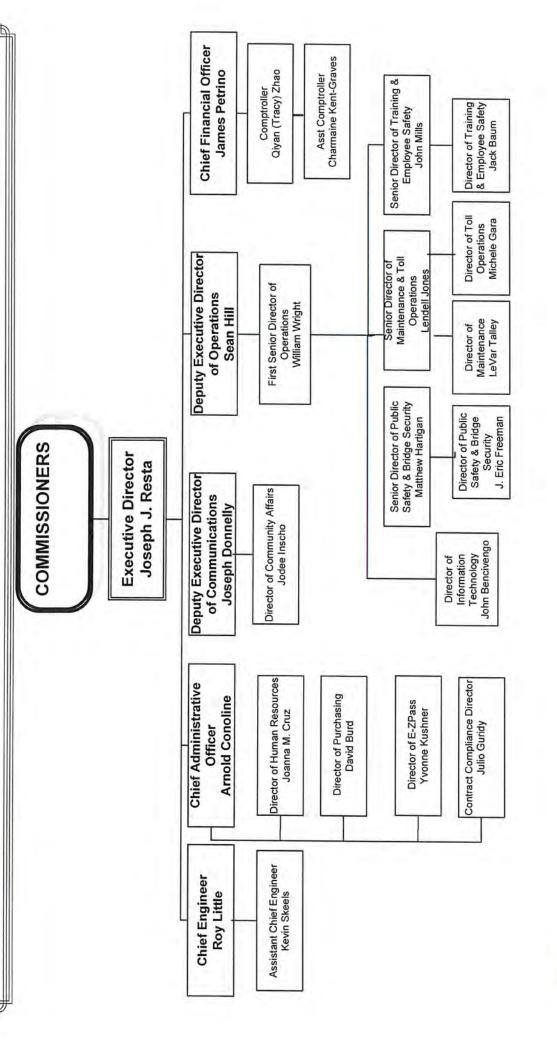

ROLL CALL

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting called the roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being three members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and five members present from the State of New Jersey.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman Lavery welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

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INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the public on items pertaining to today's Agenda. No questions were presented.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, addressed the meeting and said:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman, I will keep my comments brief today as we have to allow time for our public members to speak.

Today's agenda includes resolutions that preserve, provide ease of maintenance, and lengthen the useful life of our facilities.

For your consideration at our Portland Columbia and Delaware Water Gap Toll Bridge facilities is the Garage Floor Resurfacing Project. Identical to the project we completed earlier here at the New Hope Toll Bridge Facility; this project will prepare the existing floor surfaces, apply a moisture-mitigating epoxy, and finish with a urethane topcoat. This project re-seals and protects the concrete surface, makes it easier to maintain, and provides for a finish that lasts years.

At our Lower Trenton and Calhoun Street Toll-Supported Bridges, for your consideration today is a material purchase of $Trex^{TM}$ products to replace the sidewalk at these two bridges. We have had good experience with this product at other facilities, as it is resistant to weather, and doesn't split, check, or warp as wood planks do. The work for these projects will be completed with our own, very capable, maintenance forces.

Also, on today's agenda is the 2020 Renewal of our medical insurance plans for active employees and retirees. The upcoming resolution allows for the purchase of the various self-insured policies, and leaves time for the open enrollment period prior to the start of the plan on January 1st, 2020.

My comments today will conclude with mentioning the submission of the draft 2020 Operating Budget and draft 2020-2021 Capital Plan to Commissioners at the conclusion of today's meeting. Staff have been working on these drafts since August and have submitted them for your review, comment, and revision. Let me again thank our unpaid Commissioners for their time and commitment to the Commission; especially during the budget cycle that ends with passage of the budgets at our December meeting.

Mr. Chairman, this concludes my report.

INVITE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman Lavery invited any Comments from the public.

Executive Director Resta addressed Pat Caimano from State Representative Wendi Thomas' office and stated:

Do we have the video? We were told that a video was coming.

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Pat Caimano from State Representative Wendi Thomas Office addressed the meeting and stated:

Do you mean from Representative Thomas? We do have the video. I believe she sent it also to you, Mr. Resta. I have it on my phone.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

I believe we can probably broadcast the audio through the microphone, if that's suitable?

Commissioner Laurenti addressed the meeting and stated:

That would be acceptable.

State Representative Wendi Thomas addressed the meeting via a YouTube video and stated:

Good morning Commissioners. I am coming to you today via video because I am in Harrisburg doing the work of the people. I wish I could be there with you in person. As vou should be aware I have been advocating for equal treatment for Pennsylvania, they are residents and they are E-Zpass owners. Since April I have called, I wrote a letter, I did a public petition which got over eleven hundred signatures in a little over ten days and then I wrote another letter. Unfortunately none of my efforts have resulted in fair treatment for Pennsylvania. My hope is that, today after you hear from our commuters you will give the same discount that you give to the New Jersey E-Zpass owners to Pennsylvania E-Zpass owners. The current situation makes our residents ask me questions. They have asked me, does the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission have a financial interest in New Jersey E-Zpass? How do the Commissioners think it is reasonable to only give one of two states a discount? Do they realize that the E-Zpass owners don't even know, some of them they aren't getting the discount? Why is there a Pennsylvania Commissioner missing, is that why they aren't being fair? And finally the most common question I get asked is, does the Commission, why does the Commission repeatedly tell me go get a New Jersey E-Zpass. I sat on a school board for ten years, I certainly understand what it is like to have the public and others come and comment and ask you for things, but frankly I have been trying to work with your organization for almost six months, trying to get this decision to be fair for Pennsylvania as it is for New Jersey. I ask you; please vote today to do what is on your website and I quote "The Commission operates pursuant to a joint agreement enacted by two jurisdictional states of New Jersey and Pennsylvania." To me this says you work for both states, both their residents, and both their E-Zpass owners. Please be fair to Pennsylvania.

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Do we have other folks that want to speak? Please go to the podium. And we have a stenographer, so please state your name.

Dan O'Brien from State Senator Steve Santarsiero addressed the meeting and stated:

We, as well as Representative Thomas, along with Representative Perry Warren have been advocating for months for there to be fair treatment when it comes to New Jersey residents and commuters and Pennsylvania commuters. On August 29th of this year ourselves, Senator Santarsiero and Representative Perry Warren wrote a letter to the Bridge Commission, along to the PA Turnpike Commission asking how we can help to bring the two groups together to try to find a solution in order for Pennsylvania commuters who also have the ability to receive this discount, That's what we are asking, Understanding how the process works, we get that you have a relationship or partnership with the New Jersey E-Z Pass, so we are asking that you, along with the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, also build that relationship so we can ensure that all Pennsylvania residents have equal access to this discount, which would also help them in other areas in commuting in Pennsylvania. It's been close to two months since we sent that letter. We have not received a response, as of yet, so we are asking for a recent response to that request and if there is anything that our office, and I'm sure that Representative Warren as well, anything that we can do to help facilitate that relationship to ensure that there is equal treatment for commuters. Please reach out to us and we can do so. Thank you.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm a 20-plus year resident of Washington Crossing. The whole time I've lived there my wife has worked in New Jersey, so we use that bridge constantly, and I'm here to find out why, we as Pennsylvania residents, don't get the discount. You could easily say just go get a New Jersey E-Z Pass, but why should I? This is a service organization. You are serving the public. The traffic is overwhelmingly from Pennsylvania, so Pennsylvanians are being disproportionately treated differently than New Jersey residents and there is no legitimate reason, other than perhaps forcing, you know, people who live in Pennsylvania have Pennsylvania E-Z Passes. To buy New Jersey E-Z Pass which I guess is a financial benefit to your partner, the New Jersey E-Z Pass company, but it's not a benefit to the public. There is no legitimate nondiscriminatory reason, that I can imagine that you would not extend that equal discount to Pennsylvanians. We use that bridge commuting more so than Jersey residents do and to simply say, well, go out and get one of our E-Z Passes is you know, it's a callus and really pointless position to take. Because, again, there is no legitimate reason, other than financially enriching the New Jersey E-Z Pass company.

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Mr. Duffy, are you aware that you would save money if you got a New Jersey E-ZPass approved transponder and you took 16 or more trips over our bridges within a month?

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing, PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I also know that I will get a discount if you extended the discount to Pennsylvania E-Z Pass owners; correct?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Do you have a transponder with the Pennsylvania Turnpike?

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing, PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I do. That works everywhere up and down the river.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

And the New Jersey E-ZPass transponder would work in all the same places?

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

The Pennsylvania one works, but we don't get the discount because it was not originally purchased through the New Jersey E-Z Pass group. It's an E-Z Pass account that we have had for I don't know how long, since E-Z Pass has been around and we have not had the discount applied because it was bought in Pennsylvania. So, you would have to get all new transponders through New Jersey account to get that discount.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

That is correct, because we have contracts with a back-office provider, and we work in the toll industry, and historically the toll industry operates as a home agency-specific type of industry. If you have a Verizon cell phone and you see that Sprint has got a great deal; that they would give you four new phones and cheaper service; you can't just demand that Verizon should give you everything that Sprint has, you would shop competitively.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, who sets the discounts and the toll rates?

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The Commission sets the rates. We are the only agency that provides a commuter discount.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, you are the only ones that set the discount?

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

We are the only agency that has a commuter discount.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The Pennsylvania Turnpike doesn't have a commuter discount. The other agencies in New Jersey E-Z Pass Group do not have a commuter discount. We have the discount for our bridges.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

But you, as a Commission, should be able to extend the discounts since you set those rates?

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

We don't own the Pennsylvania Turnpike Authority E-Z Pass.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

If the Pennsylvania Turnpike would like to set up a back office so that we know who those people are and not charge us for it, then we would be happy to give that discount. However, we don't know who has those E-Z Pass transponders. It's their back office. They want to charge us to set it up, then we can't afford to do it, but it's up to Pennsylvania Turnpike to make that change, not us.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We have done an analysis.

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Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, you are saying that in order to find out whether you have 16 trips per month?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We have the data. We have worked with the Turnpike to get the data.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

But not the individuals. That must come from their back office.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

To find out who uses the bridge 16 times per month, that information will come from the Pennsylvania Turnpike?

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Okay. And the Pennsylvania Turnpike will not give you the names of the people that use?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

It's not just the names of the people. Essentially there has to be a back-office functionality built at the PA Turnpike that provides information on your car, your name, your plate, classification of your vehicle, and all the other attributes that is collected from the transponder as it goes through the readers, so it is much more than just a name. Do you have an active account? Is it backed by a credit card? Are there sufficient funds? There is all of that data that goes back and forth in that kind of millisecond read of your transponder going at speed.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

And if you were provided that information?

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

At no charge. We don't have the information; they are the agency that bills.

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We would need a resolution of the Commission to change the toll structure. But that is just the beginning of the process. The Commission must hold public toll hearings to change the toll structure. So, we would have to conduct the hearings; it's a total of six hearings, three on either side of the river.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

But if you have the information as to who uses the bridge with that frequency, is there any reason why you would not be able to extend the discount to them?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The discount can be extended to them today if they get a New Jersey E-Z Pass Group transponder, so it's not about the finances. We don't have a contract with the PA Turnpike's back-office provider. We do have a contract with another provider. Each agency has a contract for back-office services. We actually have folks with Ohio Turnpike transponders who also qualify with 16 or more trips. We don't have a contract with the Ohio Turnpike or their back-office provider. We do have a contract where we have it and our toll structure basically says that home agency transponder holders that have 16 or more trips in a month and have a noncommercial account get a commuter discount, that's what the toll structure says.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

You, obviously, know that, you see what the disparate treatment is between them?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We don't see it as a disparate treatment. I think it's been portrayed as a New Jersey versus Pennsylvania thing and it is entirely not that. It is essentially two companies that you are purchasing your service from, and you are electing to say that one company is unfair because you do not purchase the service from them.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

Mr. Executive Director, can you point out some of the other members, it's been portrayed here by the representative that this was a New Jersey-based prejudice against Pennsylvania. That is not the case here. As we have explained that there are other tolling authorities who are members of this, which the Pennsylvania Turnpike Authority is not a member. That's the reason why you are not getting your discount. They are not a member of that consortium. What are the others?

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

It's the Delaware River Port Authority, the New Jersey Turnpike, Delaware River Bay Authority, Cape May County Bridge Commission, New Jersey Transportation Authority, and Burlington County Bridge Commission.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

How many of those organizations issue E-Z Pass?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

They all do. All of them.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, it is all up to those Individual agencies?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

It's up to those individual agencies to, "A", provide a commuter discount. They don't. And, "B", to have a back-office provider administer it for them. So, they have their own home-agency privileges. DRPA I know has a senior discount, It's only for transponders issued through DRPA and through New Jersey E-Z Pass Group which is their contracted back-office provider.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, you are saying bottom line is in order to get any kind of discount, you would have to do that through Pennsylvania, or the home agency.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

In the tolling Industry, it's the home agency issuer where you would get the discounts that come forth out of the agency.

Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

But if you set the tolls?

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

There is no separate Pennsylvania toll and New Jersey toll. Tolls are tolls.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

Just like a phone. If you are not happy with it, switch it in. They will send you a new one and you'll get your discount. Unfortunately, it's portrayed here that the New Jersey people came up with some big scheme. This is even on both sides. Pennsylvania and New Jersey. To say that, you know, New Jerseyans don't use this bridge is totally unfair and I think, unfortunately, this has turned into somewhat of a political football, it's not. It's a contracting thing that the Commission does. It's been well-publicized, And, quite frankly, to say that we have not responded is not true. I think that, it's made that this is some type of political thing, it is not. I think this Commission has tried. Commissioner Janvey has researched this to no end and has tried to be as transparent as possible about this. I think what you need to do is, if you are not happy with your phone, you exchange it. If you are not happy with your toll transponder, exchange it. And you'll get the discount. That's it,

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

It won't cost you a penny more to travel on any of the Pennsylvania roads. If you substituted your Pennsylvania for the New Jersey E-Z Pass, you are going to pay the same amount that you pay except you are going to get the discount to cross our bridges. It's that simple.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We have other agencies with transponder holders, MTA out of New York, NY-NJ Port Authority, they have transponder holders that also qualify, but they have those transponders from their home agency because they get advantages there. There are other agencies, MTA is a perfect example of which, we have a differentiation especially at Scudder Falls between an E-Z Pass, a traditional E-Z Pass customer and a toll-by-plate customer. It is very much more expensive to process that toll-by-plate customer. If you go across an MTA bridge or through a tunnel and you have a New Jersey customer service center E-Z Pass or a Pennsylvania Turnpike E-Z Pass, you are charged a toll-by-plate rate because that's how they have their toll structure set up. So, if you, say, worked and wanted to commute by car to New York every single day, the most advantageous transponder would be to have an MTA transponder and there are folks that do that. There are folks that live in Pennsylvania that have MTA transponders. We have folks that live here that have a Florida Central Expressway transponder because maybe they want to drive in the wintertime and have advantages down there and keep their residence up here. So, it is really just a matter of choice.

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Tim Duffy, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you for your time.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I am a Washington Crossing Pa resident, and I have a Pennsylvania E-Z Pass. I listened to what just went out and my eyes are glassed over. What I know is I have an E-Z Pass. Why can't I get the same discount that a New Jersey E-Z person gets? Now, I heard all the arguments. Sounds like you have a contract with a third-party provider that does the billing. And I'm not sure what the details of that contract are, but it seems to me that my E-Z Pass is read by your readers that are on the Pennsylvania side of the bridge and that information goes to some third party, God knows where they are located?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Newark, New Jersey.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Okay. Newark, New Jersey. They read my information that was generated on the Pennsylvania side of the border and somehow, I end up getting discriminated against because I happen to have a Pennsylvania E-Z Pass. This does not make sense to me. Does it make sense to all of you?

Commissioner Christy addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes, but the Pennsylvania Turnpike is your issuing agency.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So what? So what? It's an E-Z Pass. I'm a Pennsylvania customer. This is a joint toll bridge commission. Joint I thought was Pennsylvania and New Jersey, so why don't both states get the benefit? I, frankly, don't understand the argument.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

I live in Pennsylvania. I get the benefit because I have a transponder through New Jersey.

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Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I don't think thousands and thousands of Pennsylvania residents ought to be forced to change their transponder and carry two transponders with them.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

You don't need to carry two transponders.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

You are forcing thousands and thousands of customers to change their E-ZPasses.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

We don't have the information. If PA Turnpike wants to set up a back office and provide us that information.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

You must have some kind of information if I am getting billed.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

No, we don't. They do. Who is billing you?

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I have no idea. All I know is I have an E-ZPass.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

You are being billed by the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

It's your reader that's reading it and your contractor is doing something with my information.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Sir, do you ever drive to the New Jersey Shore, Atlantic City?

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Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

All the time.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

And you get a bill for that?

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

But I get the same bill for that as a New Jersey resident.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Because your Pennsylvania Turnpike transponder is being read at another agency and the information is being sent to the Pennsylvania Turnpike and they send you a bill.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm fine with that, but because I'm paying the same as anybody else would be paying. What I'm not fine with is paying a different fee because I'm a Pennsylvania resident and using a Pennsylvania transponder, and by the way, the whole cell phone thing is bogus. We are not dealing with two different firms here. We are dealing with E-ZPass.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes, you are. E-ZPass is not the same company, it's not. There are different companies that manage those products just like Sprint, just like Verizon and just like T-Mobile.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The name E-ZPass is a trademark. It's not a company. It's just a collective of agencies there are 30 plus agencies like ours that are in the larger E-Z Pass network and it's, obviously, Mid-Atlantic and the northeast part of the company. It's not in Texas. It's not in Florida. It's not in Oklahoma,

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I spent my life in technology. We did business in 130 countries. We had to charge for our services in 130 countries. Not counties or state, countries, individual countries. It's a coding problem, guys. You set up your systems and you can change the coding. I don't understand. You must have some kind of information if you are able to bill me for crossing that bridge, then your contractor has to have something that tells them that when

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I go across that bridge and your equipment reads my transponder, they must have something to tell you that I'm a Pennsylvania resident.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm happy to describe to you how it works. So, your transponder has got a number that it's encoded in it. That number is associated with that transponder. It goes through and it's read. That number, none of your personal attributes or payment information or anything is read by that number. It's just a number. That number is basically one of the codes that is triggered to the Pennsylvania Turnpike. The numbers go to the Pennsylvania Turnpike. They know who you are, and they bill you.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Exactly. Listen to what you just said. My transponder is read. It's a number. But your contractor knows that it's a Pennsylvania number.

Commissioner Christy addressed the meeting and stated:

No. Your contractor.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, then, how do they know to send it to Pennsylvania?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Because the actual number, the sequence of the number is attributed to that agency.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

There you go. So they know it's a Pennsylvania number, so why don't, why can't you give me the same discount?

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

If the Pennsylvania Turnpike will set up a back office so that we know that information, which at this point we do not know and does it at no charge, then we would be happy to do it. And maybe the Pennsylvania Turnpike will then give you a discount also because they don't have a discount now.

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Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm having a hard time understanding. Your contractor knows that my number is a Pennsylvania number.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

But that's all they know.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Why can't they apply the same discount to that number?

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

Because they can't bill you.

Executive Director addressed the meeting and stated:

We don't know if it's a real account. How do we know if it's a real account?

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, maybe what you just said is the key here.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

They send that information to Pennsylvania and then my account gets debited by Pennsylvania and not your contractor?

Executive Director addressed the meeting and stated:

That is correct.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So that makes sense.

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Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

So, if Pennsylvania is willing to do it at no fee, then fine. Then it's just like you have the New Jersey E-ZPass. What I'm saying is maybe if they do that, they will also try giving a discount for the turnpike commuter which they don't, but we don't have your information.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Okay. So, there is always two solutions to a problem, and sometimes more solutions. So, I understand what you are now saying. My account, my E-ZPass account, is not being debited by your contractor? You being the Commission entered into a contract with?

Executive Director addressed the meeting and stated:

Our contract was a publicly procured contract that the provider that does the Pennsylvania Turnpike also competed in, their price was higher, they didn't get it.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, you entered into a contract with a company to process these payments?

Executive Director addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, your contractor, do they also send the information to the New Jersey authority that debits the New Jersey drivers?

Executive Director addressed the meeting and stated:

They send any transponder that's read, that number is read and because of the sequence of the number, it's sent to the appropriate back-office provider. So, if you are a home agency transponder, it will process that transaction. If it's an away agency transponder, it will essentially coordinate with that away agency and the away agency reconciles between agencies that you, as a Pennsylvania Turnpike customer, were charged this. Therefore, they will submit the toll to the appropriate back office,

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, does your contractor also debit those persons with New Jersey E-Z Pass or does another third party do that?

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

No. If you a New Jersey E-Pass group member, you are a home agency transponder holder and your account which is with that agency will be debited.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, the contract you have is with the New Jersey home agency?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Our back-office provider is a collective of agencies. It happens to be called the New Jersey E-Z Pass Group.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

It's not New Jersey specific.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

It's not a New Jersey State thing.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Could Pennsylvania use them as a contractor?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

If they had a contract with them, sure.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

If they bid on them, they certainly could.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

So, Pennsylvania E-Z Pass could contract was the same contractor that you contract with?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes.

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Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

I think therein lies the confusion. Somebody picked up that it was a New Jersey E-ZPass consortium and said hey it's a New Jersey versus Pennsylvania issue,

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I think you are reading more into it. To me, it's pretty simple.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The video said it was.

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

The video said it was.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

If you listen, the video made it seem like it was.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Which video?

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

The video that was played at the beginning of public comments, I don't think you were here for that.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I was over there. I couldn't understand what was going on. I couldn't understand it was a video, I could barely hear it.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm sure only one person can speak at one time. My name is Pat Caimano and I work for Representative Wendi Thomas, C-a-i-m- a-n-o, in due respect, this is not political at all. We are working together with other offices as well. It's a big issue of miscommunication. I apologize.

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Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Can I ask another question? When you issued this contract to your provider, what were some of the terms within the contract? Were the terms of the contract that the Pennsylvania people get treated the same as the New Jersey people?

Commissioner Ciesla addressed the meeting and stated:

If they have a transponder, yes. It's the same thing on the other side of the state like when Mr. Resta said, if you bought a New Jersey E-Z Pass through them, you're not going to get the discount from the New York people. You make a choice.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Did you advertise the contracts?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

To contractors that could provide Pennsylvanians and New Jersey residents with the same discount?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The toll industry has worked this way since E-ZPass was invented. There is always an advantage to being a home agency transponder holder. This is not new.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, I guess for me a home agency with respect to your bridges is both Pennsylvania and New Jersey. I mean, this is a joint toll bridge commission. This is a joint bridge commission; it is not a New Jersey bridge commission.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We are not the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

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Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

With all due respect, this should be directed to the Pennsylvania Turnpike because they need to provide the backup that is needed for us. I'm sitting here going, just buy a New Jersey transponder. You're going to pay the same price. You don't get any discount from the Pennsylvania Turnpike, so what's the big deal? It's like, we're American Express. You are Visa card holder.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Because you are asking thousands and thousands of people to change the way they normally live.

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

If the Pennsylvania Turnpike's back office would provide the stuff that we need and then you could get it, but we are the bad guy.

Commissioner Christy addressed the meeting and stated:

And the reason why they don't want to do that is they don't want to offer a discount,

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

Because they don't offer a discount on any other crossing that you use.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

We are offering you a discount. They aren't.

Commissioner Christy addressed the meeting and stated:

It's like getting a debit card and paying \$3 every time I use my debit card. Well, I'm at that bank and they are charging me \$3, why do I have that account at the other bank. Go to that bank, if that's where I live, why wouldn't I put that account there?

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Listen, I appreciate your time. I think I understand the problem much better than when I was up here. I do want you to understand you do have a perception problem. Okay. Unfortunately, the people that use your bridge don't understand the complexity of what you explained to me.

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Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

I think a lot of them do because a bunch of them have changed to the Jersey E-Z Pass,

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

I think they changed strictly because it was more expeditious for them to do that then it was for them to come to the Commission meeting and argue.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

They just simply sent the other one back ordered a new one.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing PA addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you very much.

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Please state your name again, Pat.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

Pat Caimano. Pat, C-a-i-m-a-n-o, And I work for Representative Wendy Thomas. As I said earlier, we are working together with a variety of offices and, frankly, this has been a lack of communication, or miscommunication because we were not given any of this feedback as to what the problem was or how to resolve it.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Pat, that's patently not true.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, I have a letter here.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

I have e-mails between me and you describing the situation, Just read them.

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Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

My point is not that it was an E-Z Pass problem with Pennsylvania, not the steps that we could be taking to correct the problem.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

That's not true.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, I don't, I'm sorry. I don't see that in the letter, but I appreciate being here today hearing all the steps from you. If we could have had a meeting, if we could have had a meeting one on one to go over this?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

I've had conversations with the representative one on one.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

That was the first phone call, and the answer was flat out no.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

That answer wasn't wanted.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

Monday morning quarterback. We are here now, you know, it's great to have this information and to go forward to kind of correct or resolve. We need to go back to Pennsylvania, and we need to determine what is needed.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

I would suggest to the representative that she contact the turnpike commission, find out if they will give a discount and then perhaps ask if they will give a discount on their bridges because in my area. I live in Bensalem, if they go to Willow Grove on the turnpike, it's \$1.40. If they gave the same discount for 16 trips, they would save, \$9 a month which is definitely, well, obviously, they are more expensive, so it would be more than they'd save here. Most of my residents do take the turnpike to go to Fort Washington, Willow Grove, King of Prussia. King of Prussia, if they go 20 days a month it's like \$160.00 So, maybe if they could get a commuter discount, it would be really good.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

I just want to point out to the public that the Commission's public relations staff for months prior to the tolling of this bridge that information was put out through social

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media, news, clips on YouTube, you name it, about this. So, this was no surprise that this was dropped on anybody. I'm relatively new here as a commissioner, but I know that this has been discussed since this issue came out, and I think our PR staff has been tremendous about getting this information out. I just want to make sure from the New Jersey side that there is this idea that New Jersey was the one that cooked this up to not include Pennsylvania somehow. I got to be bluntly honest with you, this is done on a fair basis. The problem is, that people get this mixed up that this is the New Jersey consortium on the E-Z Pass. That's the only thing that this whole thing has gone sideways on. If this was the PA or something else, we would not be standing here. It's just because we are part of this consortium. Had we been part of the PA Turnpike consortium, it would be a different story, but it's not. So, I would like to clear that up for the record.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

And, before we put in any toll change, we hold hearings. The representative nor you were at any of the hearings. We discussed all these.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

She may have not been in office yet.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, she was still a resident. So, we had what? Two people speak? We must hold these hearings up and down the river, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. There were plenty of explanations at that point.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

And I think we would be willing again if this needed.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

And we will have to.

Commissioner Komjathy addressed the meeting and stated:

Just for the public here, if you want, this place is open and I think what we will do is maybe every six months or so if just to give people updates on this, but E-Z Pass stuff has been out there. It's not like we hid anything or did anything.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, I have not read all of these details that you explained to me and shared with us.

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The process that's just described with toll hearings and any change to the toll structure was e-mailed to your office months ago.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

That was about the hearing and the process. Correct, but not in terms of the back office, the E-ZPass in Pennsylvania.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

I respectfully disagree. It was specifically written that way.

Pat Caimano from Representative Wendi Thomas' office addressed the meeting and stated:

Okay. Let's go forward. Let's work together and see how we go. I have more information now and I think that would be great to go forward and try to resolve this.

Commissioner Christy addressed the meeting and stated:

And the four Commissioners from Pennsylvania, don't let the five from New Jersey be done.

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

To pass anything you need 3 Commissioners from each state.

Dan O'Brien from Senator Santarsiero's office addressed the meeting and stated:

I do want to clear something up. My name is Dan O'Brien from Senator Santarsiero's office. I do want to commend the Bridge Commission for the work that they do with PR. I think a lot of this information has been out there. I did understand everything that you were explaining today. So did Senator Santarsiero. That's why us and Representative Warren are asking with the Bridge Commission and the PA Turnpike Commission to have these conversations. We know how the back offices have worked. That's why we are asking that you, first of all, how can we help to bridge those — that relationship to ensure that those conversations are happening, so that we can figure out a process to then ensure that people that own transponders through the PA Turnpike Commission and New Jersey are able to get access to it. So that's why we want to kind of bring that relationship together so that we can see how to best move it forward to create that process. Okay. Thank you.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing Pennsylvania addressed the meeting and stated:

How does the Commission derive its revenue? I know there's toll.

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Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The toll. That's it.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing Pennsylvania addressed the meeting and stated:

The toll information goes to your processor up in Newark. Your processor then sends something to somebody else that charges a fee. So, they send it either to a New Jersey processor or a Pennsylvania processor.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Or New Hampshire or California or whoever.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing Pennsylvania addressed the meeting and stated:

Now, does Pennsylvania and this other processor then send you the money? Where do you get the revenue?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We get the toll revenue from the other providers. Yes.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing Pennsylvania addressed the meeting and stated:

So, Pennsylvania sends to you my 1.25?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

The Pennsylvania Turnpike collects our toll from you. The Pennsylvania Turnpike based on a reconciliation, reconciles with us, that they are paying us your toll. They are your customer service provider.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing Pennsylvania addressed the meeting and stated:

Right. So, my \$1.25 is paid to you by the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Our back office provider does not take it directly from your account, because you do not have a home agency transponder, it comes to us when the two providers reconcile.

Joe Linus, Resident of Washington Crossing Pennsylvania addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm just trying to understand the mechanics. That's all.

Tim Thomas, Resident of Upper Makefield addressed the meeting and stated:

I'm a resident of Upper Makefield. I'm also on the environmental advisory committee. I just wanted to ask, the steel bridge Washington Crossing has been a great barrier because people are terrified of losing their side view mirror. With behavioral economics being what it is and people trying to avoid tolls, we are concerned about the bridge itself and also traffic into our township. I can say anecdotally there is more. I have not talked to the police yet; they are still compiling the data. Is there a long-time plan with the steel bridge? I mean, we love it. We like that it's small. We like that it's narrow, because it prevents people from coming over. But structurally, is there any long-term plans?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

There is a long-term plan for the bridge. We are in the very beginning stages to look at the potential replacement of the bridge. When we started Scudder Falls, it was probably 12 years from the time of concept to the time of construction, so even though it's a smaller bridge and, obviously, it would be a much smaller project, all of the environmental clearances that would have to be garnered before you can actually start work would all apply to Washington Crossing as well. But the steel structure does not last forever, so if that bridge is replaced, it's not basically going to be that Pratt truss that's 15 feet from the other Pratt truss. It is just not designed to today's vehicles and the federal highway standards.

Tim Thomas, Resident of Upper Makefield addressed the meeting and stated:

I agree. Do you think, so the historic architectural design will be kept in line?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

It's from 1904. There are several of our bridges that were built in 1904, based on the Pumpkin Flood of 1903 when a lot were washed out. It is unlikely that that same footprint and that same width would be reconstructed. It's essentially not permittable today.

Tim Thomas, Resident of Upper Makefield addressed the meeting and stated:

Looks-wise, will it be something pleasing to the eye?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Looks-wise it probably will not be a replica of the truss. It probably will be a different design, but certainly contextually sensitive. By the way, if there is a new bridge there, the pedestrian pathway would be on the correct side of the bridge for the Washington Crossing event on Christmas.

Tim Thomas, Resident of Upper Makefield addressed the meeting and stated:

Well, that's a plus. I think it's absolutely fantastic that there is a walkway/bikeway on the

Scudders Falls Bridge to get over to the other side. Fantastic. Thank you for all your work. Appreciate it.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you.

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

Anyone else from the public? Yes, sir?

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

Doug Anderson from Solebury. Basically, I have a question as to, is there going to be a collection center at this location to pay the tickets that you get toward the toll that are mailed to you?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

No. This is not a payment center, the payment is essentially through the customer service center routinely done on-line or by phone. We don't take cash or anything here. We have, obviously, a toll bridge here, but an E-Z Pass bill is not paid here. We don't have a walkin customer service center.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

Only in New Jersey?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

We have, if you only want to pay in person, it's in New Jersey, yes.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

And before this toll went into effect, there was no toll; right?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

On Scudder Falls there was no toll.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

So, the whole process was one of either going back to no toll or having a higher toll for Pennsylvania individuals?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

No. Having a toll for a non-toll bridge, that was the thing. It had nothing to do with

having a higher toll. Your toll is the same as anybody else's toll. To get a discount, however, you must be a home agency customer.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and stated:

And cross our bridges 16 times a month.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

16 or more times a month, not just Scudder Falls, any of our bridges.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

And you took into effect a lot of individuals who at random go across that bridge not going to work?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

That is the toll-by-plate functionality.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

Who chose not to go that way and to go back roads and not go to retail restaurants, et cetera, in New Jersey?

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

I don't really understand the question.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

In other words, you have an economic impact on businesses in New Jersey if you charge a toll that there was no toll.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Yes. We were 12 years in analysis through that, and it's actually all on our website, if you want to peruse that, but it's a voluminous set of documents.

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

The only reason I mention it is seeing different states that have put in different types of tolls with E-ZPass type of transponders, et cetera, how they have affected individuals. Like in Florida, for example, if you have a rental car and you don't pay the toll a head of time and it comes back to the Hertz rental or whatever. The toll is \$17, \$17.50or \$20 instead of a dollar. And that does have an impact. And you've already considered that?

Yes

Doug Anderson, Resident of Solebury Pa addressed the meeting and stated:

Okay

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you. Anyone else from the public?

Raymond Daikeler, Resident of Ewing Township addressed the meeting and stated:

My name is Raymond Daikeler. I'm a resident of Ewing Township in New Jersey. First of all, I want to commend the Commission for your choice of contractors for the Scudder Falls Bridge. The inconveniences have been minimal. They handled the road closures perfectly and they really done a neat job with that massive project. Even though it's going to take a long time, it's going to end up being very nice for us. On the other hand, the Washington Crossing Bridge, I would like you to take another look at the signage for the bridge. Oftentimes I go through the bridge twice a day. Oftentimes I'm held up because somebody with a vehicle too wide with a trailer or whatever is trying to cross the bridge and the guard quick turns on the red light, runs out and now the rest of us are waiting while they are backing this trailer up. The signage is inadequate and it's in the wrong place, By the time people see the sign, they are already committed to the road that leads to the bridge. There is a sign there that is on the road from New Jersey to the bridge. It's been damaged, so it's unreadable and hasn't been replaced for at least six months. So, I think we should have signs well in advance of the bridge so people know what the limitations are for the bridge and don't head down there and hold up the other folks who can legally cross.

Executive Director Resta addressed the meeting and stated:

Thank you.

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and stated:

Anyone else from the public? Hearing none, we will close that.

DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of October 28, 2019 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (September, 2019)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for September 2019 in comparison to the September 2018 traffic and revenue statistics. Total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month. It should be noted the Scudder Falls Bridge began toll collections on July 14, 2019.

Analysis of September 2019 / September 2018 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 21.08 percent was recorded at the Commission's eight toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 16.63 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 33.32 percent increase.

Analysis of September 2019 / September 2018 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 774,846 vehicles, or 23.12 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 81,745 vehicles, or 17.66 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 693,101 vehicles, or 23.99 percent.
- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's eight toll bridges for September 2019 was 137,559 total vehicles as compared to 111,730 total vehicles in September 2018.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the 11 vehicular toll supported bridges for September 2019 decreased by 739,694 vehicles, or 29.37 percent as compared to September 2018. It should be noted that the Scudder Falls Bridge converted from a toll supported bridge to a toll bridge on July 14, 2019.

Traffic analysis for 2019 YTD:

- Total YTD toll traffic for the eight toll bridges is reflecting a 7.75 percent increase for the
 first nine months of 2019 as compared to the same period in 2018. Toll Revenue is
 reflecting a 7.52% increase for this same nine month period.
- Westbound traffic on the eleven toll supported bridges is reflecting a 8.87 percent decrease through the first nine months of 2019 as compared to last year.

REGION REVIEW:

Southern Region

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) reflected an 8.08 percent increase for September 2019 when compared to September 2018 as the result of increases of 52,686 cars and 9,320 trucks. The new Scudder Falls Bridge began collecting tolls on Sunday, July 14, 2019. Total passenger vehicles of 670,587 and total trucks of 40,502 were recorded for this second full month of the SFB's operation as a toll facility. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), a decrease of 955 cars and an increase of 348 trucks combined to generate a decrease of 0.37 percent in total toll traffic for September 2019 as compared to September 2018.

Central Region

The I-78 Toll Bridge recorded an increase of 0.80 percent in total toll traffic for the month of September 2019 when compared to September 2018 as the result of the decrease of 10,532 cars and the increase of 18,189 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, combined increases of 5,360 passenger vehicles and 1,379 trucks generated a 1.54 percent increase in total toll traffic for September 2019 as compared to September 2018.

Northern Region

Portland-Columbia (PC) recorded a 1.53 percent increase in total toll traffic during September 2019 compared to September 2018 as a result of the increases of 219 automobiles and 1,409 trucks. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, the decrease of 11,369 passenger vehicles and the increase of 9,859 trucks combined to generate an overall decrease of 0.19 percent in total toll traffic for September 2019 when compared to September 2018. At Milford-Montague (MM), a decrease of 12,895 passenger vehicles combined with an increase of 739 trucks to produce a 10.33 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of September 2019 as compared to September 2018.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's eight (8) toll bridges for the months of September, 2019 and September 2018, and the year-to-date periods ending September 30, 2019 and September 30, 2018.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

Month of September 2019

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of September, 2019, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the Purchase Order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Director

The purchasing activities for the month of September 2019, culminated in the preparation and placement of 50 purchase orders in the total amount of \$427,221.40. For four (4) of these purchases, 13 price inquiries were sent out for an average of 3.25 inquiries per Order (13/4=3.25).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the period of September 2019 are shown below:

- ➤ One (1) Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$139,950.00 for ESS camera upgrades at Calhoun Street;
- ➤ One (1) Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$86,800.00 for ESS camera upgrades at Lower Trenton;
- ➤ One (1) Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$43,062.49 for the Cisco equipment Smartnet annual maintenance fee;
- Three (3) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$24,632.44 for monitors/TV's for the Administration Building at Scudder Falls;
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$19,450.00 to provide and install four (4) ESS workstations at the Administration Building at Scudder Falls.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

Commission counsel filed a civil complaint for the outstanding amount. Counsel for Transcom and Commission counsel representing Florio Perucci Steinhardt & Capelli negotiated payment.

JCV Trucking - September Settlement: DRJTBC will receive payment in the amount of \$100,050.00 representing outstanding tolls and a portion of fees for violation transactions from 2014-2018. The full outstanding toll in the amount of \$67,098 will be paid. \$32,952.00 will be applied to \$143,010.00 in outstanding fees. Commission counsel filed a civil lawsuit for the outstanding amounts. A hearing in Federal Bankruptcy Court was scheduled on September 24th which resulted in JCV's Chapter 11 Reorganization Plan and Disclosure Statement. Monthly payments will be paid in the amount of \$1,334.00 over 75 months.

Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

- 1. TransCore submitted the Commissioning Test report for the installation of the All Electronic Tolling (AET) system at the Scudder Falls Bridge. The document is currently under review by Commission staff and RK&K. Commission staff coordinated with Conduent and TransCore to allow for the NJ CSC to issue an incremental tag status file and for the in-lane toll system to receive and process it.
- 2. Commission Staff and TransCore meet monthly to review and discuss system operational and maintenance items. A weekly call also takes placed to briefly review system maintenance items for the week.

Activities for the E-ZPass Customer Service Center/Violation Processing Center

1. The new NJ Customer Service Center (CSC) is live and transactions for the Scudder Falls Bridge are being processed. The New Jersey Turnpike Authority (NJTA), as the lead agency, is facilitating all meetings with the other agencies and Conduent to manage the implementation of outstanding system elements. 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IBE PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission (Commission) established an IBE Program (MBE/WBE/SBE/DBE/DsBE/VBE) with a target of 25% for all Professional Services and Construction Contracts awarded by the Commission effective July 1, 2014. To date, the Commission has awarded sixty-two (62) contracts, with the IBE Program requirements. Currently, there are (39) active projects and (23) completed projects.

IBE Program Requirements

The Commission began using Elation Systems effective January 2017, as the online system for Payment Verification and Certified Payroll Reporting (CPR). All contracts awarded by the Commission to a Prime Consultant/Prime Contractor and their Subconsultants and Subcontractors use this service free of charge. Online training is available to vendors on how to use Elation Systems. The Contract Compliance Department and Elation Support Staff are available to assist all users.

The Contract Compliance Department (CCD) monitors, posts and reports data in regards to all payments. The CCD also reviews all Certified Payrolls submitted into Elation Systems.

The following are all mandatory requirements:

Company On-Line Registration:

- i. All Primes must register their company and activate an account in Elation Systems; and
- ii. All Primes must also ensure that all Subconsultants and Subcontractors register their company and activate an account in Elation Systems.

Payment Verification:

- i. Prime Contractors must post all payments to their Subconsultants and/or Subcontractors in Elation Systems; *and*
- ii. Prime Contractors and their Subconsultants and/or Subcontractors must confirm all payments received in Elation Systems.

Certified Payroll Reporting:

- i. All Prime Contractors are responsible for assigning someone from their staff with the responsibility to review, approve, and upload their CPR(s) on a weekly basis into Elation Systems; and
- ii. All Prime Contractors must also ensure that their Subcontractors upload their CPR(s) on a weekly basis into Elation Systems.

Prime Consultants / Contractors IBE Target performance will be displayed / available on the Commission's public website.

Contract Compliance Department Compliance Score Rankings Overview

The Commission through its Contract Compliance Department has instituted a Compliance Score Ranking that will be included in the Monthly Contract Compliance Report for all Professional Services and Construction Projects.

The Compliance Score Ranking is an ongoing summary of data presented on Active and Completed contracts, which includes the tracking of payments from Prime Consultants and Contractors to IBE Subconsultants and Subcontractors, and the Prime Contractors Workforce Utilization. The Scores will illustrate the progress and participation to meet the Targets by Prime Consultants and Contractors as part of the IBE program.

The complete and timely reporting of payments and certified payrolls to the Elation Systems by the Prime Consultants and Prime Contractors, and their Subconsultants and Subcontractors, will assist the Prime Consultant and Prime Contractor in tracking the data to meet their targets.

Accordingly, each Prime will also be given a final grade at the completion of each project. Additionally, the data will be uploaded onto the Commission's public website on a monthly basis. The Score(s) are factored using the following criteria:

IBE PAYMENTS

The payments by the Prime Consultant / Contractor to each of their IBE Subconsultants / Subcontractors will be calculated based on the criteria set by the Commission's 25% IBE Target.

WORKFORCE UTILIZATION

Workforce utilization contains 2 levels of scoring and documents the hourly employee utilization by workforce type, ethnicity and gender.

MINORITY, WOMEN AND SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission implemented a one-year Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) pilot program, with a 7% participation goal, and the Women Business Enterprise (WBE) pilot program with a 3% goal. These goals applied to consultants and contractors' participating in the Commission's Capital Program and were effective on September 1, 2008.

At its December 2008 Commission Meeting, the Commission revised the pilot program to specify a 25% Small Business Enterprise (SBE) goal to New Jersey assigned consultant contracts in lieu of the previously specified 7% MBE and 3% WBE goals.

At its December 2010 Commission Meeting, due to the success of the Commission's MWSBE Pilot Program, the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission adopted a resolution for permanent status of the Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) program, with a 7% participation goal, and the Women Business Enterprise (WBE) program with a 3% goal, and the Small Business Enterprise (SBE) program with a 25% goal. These goals apply to consultants and contractors' participating in the Commission's Capital Program.

The Contract Compliance Department continues to monitor, update and analyze the payments for the MWSBE diversity program.

• COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project – Updated detour maps for various MPT events related to project construction activities and demolition of the old Scudder Falls Bridge. Scaled back advertising efforts for E-ZPass at the new bridge now that tolling has been in effect for more than two months. Some advertising will continue through the end of the year. This will consist mostly of billboards. Weekly travel advisories continue to be posted and distributed, although mainline I-295 roadway and interchanges are devoid of peak-period restrictions for the foreseeable future.

I-78 Pavement Joint Rehabilitation Project — With the start-up of the Commission's job-order contract—the I-78 Pavement Joint Rehabilitation Project—a series of weekly travel advisories was established to raise public awareness of the construction and related overnight travel restrictions. The outreach has resulted in online, print and radio coverage. This short-duration project is expected to end late October or early November.

Ewing Library Bridge History Presentation – Prepared and deliver a 90-minute-long slide program on the history of the Delaware River bridges in Mercer County, including the current Scudder Falls Bridge Rehabilitation Project. Approximately 40 people attended the presentation, which included information about the Bridge Commission's origins and service mission. There was significant audience interest in the Scudder Falls project and the history of that crossing's establishment and legacy.

Apparent Crop Duster Flies Below the Riegelsville Bridge – The posting of a screen shot of an airplane flying beneath the Riegelsville Bridge on a social-media site ignited a flurry of media interest and an investigation by the FAA. Coordinated with security, executive staff and FAA to provide interviews to newspaper, online and television outlets from Lehigh Valley to Philadelphia.

SOUTHERN OPERATIONS & MAINTENANCE FACILITIES IMPROVEMENTS

Preliminary, Final & Post Design Services Contract No. C-519A

This contract is for Preliminary, Final and Post-Design Services for space utilization improvements at New Hope Lambertville Toll Bridge Executive Headquarters and the demolition and reconstruction of the Trenton Morrisville Toll Bridge Administration Building as identified under a Task Order Assignment for Space Utilization Program and Concept Study.

In accordance with the Commission's February 26th Regular Monthly Commission Meeting, this Contract was awarded to Gannett Fleming, Architects Inc. (GF). Accordingly; a Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed was issued to GF effective February 27, 2018.

A Kick-Off Meeting was conducted with GF on March 20, 2018, and a record room site visits to review and obtain existing records documents was conducted on March 27, 2018. GF is currently conducting existing condition surveys at the New Hope Toll Bridge Facility, contacting all existing public utilities and updating the Boundary & Topographic surveys at Trenton Morrisville site. Consultant continue to conduct users' meeting and updating the Space Utilization Program to serve the Commission's current operations and anticipated needs in the foreseeable future.

In connection with Resolution No. 4076-12-18 and the new real estate acquired to house the Commission's Southern Maintenance Facility, GF completed the Topographic Land Survey, Boundary Survey necessary to proceed with Lot Consolidation with Bucks County, Environmental Assessment Phase I, and currently working on Environmental Assessment Phase II. Screening for suspected Bog Turtles and other federally endangered species' was made on June 14th by the US Army Corp. of Engineers and found that the Project site is not considered a Bog Turtle Habitat. In lights of these results an environmental permitting pre-application meeting was held on June 20th with PADEP in attendance of the US Army Corps of Engineers as relates to a joint permit for wetland and storm water impact and mitigation as relates to the Southern Maintenance Facility at Langhorne. Another permit Pre-Application meeting was held with Bucks County Soil Conservation on September 26th in connection with the Southern Operations Facility at Trenton Morrisville.

SCUDDER FALLS BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Final Design Contract No. C-660A

During the September reporting period Michael Baker Jr., Incorporated (Baker) of Hamilton New Jersey continued to review and respond to various Requests for Information and submittals from the Contractor and the Construction Manager; and, attended Contract T-668A Progress Meetings, Schedule Meetings and various technical meetings involving design and field issues with the Contractor and CM/CI team.

Construction Contract No. T-668A

Trumbull Corporation of Pittsburgh, PA (Trumbull) was awarded the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Construction Contract T-668A in the amount of \$396,000,000.00 at the Commission's January 30, 2017 Meeting. The Commission issued a full Notice to Proceed on March 3, 2017.

Weekly Meetings continued between the Contractor and the Commission's Project team to discuss Project schedule, progress, and planning for ongoing and/or upcoming construction activities. Trumbull continued to submit Requests for Information (RFI's) and make required project submittals throughout this reporting period for ongoing and upcoming construction activities. To date there have been a total of 835 Contractor RFIs and a total of 1,397 Contractor Submittals. Trumbull and the Construction Manager (Hill/Jacobs) have also been coordinating on the Baseline CPM Schedule progress updates.

During the September reporting period Trumbull continued construction in work areas extending throughout the project limits in order to complete parallel activities on the project.

In **Pennsylvania**, during the September time period construction continued on: installation of the last sound barrier near Exit 8 Route 332; embankment excavation and grading, and drainage system installation along I-295 EB and at I-295 EB entrance Ramps B and R from Taylorsville Road, the Woodside Road and Taylorsville Road intersection re-construction; the installation of ITS and ESS systems/cameras along with temporary (staging) and permanent highway lighting adjacent to I-295 WB; sandblasting and painting of the Quarry Road Bridge over I-295, which was completed by the end of the month; demolition of the Phase 2 (remaining) Taylorsville Road Bridge superstructure and substructures; completed installation of the piers, pier caps, and abutment footing for the PA Approach Pedestrian/Bike Bridge; roadside landscaping erosion control measures at various areas; and, remaining punch list work for the Bridge Monitor/All Electronic Toll (BM/AET) Building.

On the Main River Bridge (MRB), construction operations continued with the demolition and removal of the existing Main River Bridge superstructure; demolition of existing, NJ land based Pier No 9 making way for new MRB Pier 6 construction. In-water work included trestle

finger installation off the main causeway work platform in NJ for construction of the new MRB Pier No. 5 in-water cofferdam. The contractor began mobilizing for the MRB downstream structures Pier No. 5 and Pier No. 6 cofferdams construction in NJ.

In **New Jersey**, during the September period work continued on the MSE wall construction, and started on the pier foundation underground shafts, for the NJ Pedestrian/Bike approach Bridge; demolition of the Stage 2 portion of the NJ Main Approach Bridge over Route 29NB, Route 175, and the Delaware & Raritan Canal; and, landscape grading, lighting and drainage along I-295 and the Route 29 interchange. In addition, the Contractor began to mobilize for the construction of the retaining walls adjacent to the I-295 SB entrance Ramp M from NJ Route 175.

Construction Management Contract No. CM-669A

At the October 31, 2016 Commissioners Meeting, the Commission awarded Contract No. CM-669A, Construction Management Services for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project to Hill International (Hill) of Philadelphia, PA for an amount not-to-exceed \$25,015,066.98. Hill was provided with Notice of Award and Limited Notice to proceed on November 2, 2016. Hill was then issued a Full Notice to Proceed on January 31, 2017, in parallel with the award of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Contract T-668A at the same meeting.

The Hill team continues to supply construction management personnel as necessary, monitor Trumbull's performance and progress, conduct bi-weekly progress meetings, oversee and coordinate the three (3) construction inspection firms, perform utility coordination in NJ & PA, perform schedule reviews, conduct bi-weekly scheduling meetings, maintain document control, perform health and safety inspections, adjust project staffing as required, address material testing and inspection plan requirements, prepare monthly contractor invoices and manage overall project budget.

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Construction Inspection of the Pennsylvania Approach
Contract No. CI-671A

This Contract is for Construction Inspection (CI) Professional Services for the PA Approach Roadway Improvements portion of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, Contract T-668A. TRC Engineers, Inc. (TRC) of Plymouth Meeting, PA was awarded this contract at the February 27, 2017 Commissioners' Meeting; and issued a full Notice to Proceed effective March 29, 2017.

During this reporting period with the completion of the cleaning and painting of the Quarry Road Overhead Bridge the full time Coatings Inspector left the Project. At the present time TRC is providing four (4) full-time inspectors for inspection of the work on the Pennsylvania Approach Roadway portion of the Project, with all working under the supervision of the Construction Manager. Additional Inspectors will be provided as the need arises based on the Contractor's schedule.

Construction Inspection of the Main River Bridge Contract No. CI-672A

This Contract is for Construction Inspection (CI) Professional Services for the Main River Bridge portion of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, Contract T-668A. WSP/Parsons Brinckerhoff, Incorporated (PB) of Lawrenceville, NJ was awarded this contract at the February 27, 2017 Commissioners' Meeting; and issued a full Notice to Proceed effective March 22, 2017.

During this reporting period PB continued to provide four (4) full time inspectors for inspection of the work on the Main River Bridge portion of the Project and also continued to provide one (1) full time inspector for inspection of the work on the Pennsylvania Approach Roadway portion of the Project with all inspectors working under the supervision of the Construction Manager. Additional Inspectors will be provided as the need arises based on the Contractor's schedule.

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Construction Inspection of New Jersey Approach
Contract No. CI-673A

This Contract is for Construction Inspection (CI) Professional Services for the NJ Approach Roadway Improvements portion of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, Contract T-668A. Gannett Fleming, Inc. (GF) of South Plainfield, NJ was awarded this contract at the February 27, 2017 Commissioners' Meeting and issued a full Notice to Proceed effective March 29, 2017.

During this reporting period GF continued to maintain the contract's full complement of five (5) inspectors to provide inspection and material testing for work on the New Jersey approach portion of this project under the supervision of the Construction Manager. Two of the current five inspectors are from GF's IBE sub-consultant, Churchill Consulting Engineers. One of GF's inspectors retired on September 3rd and was replaced with another approved GF inspector meeting the requirements of the RFP.

BM/AET BUILDING CODE COMPLIANCE INSPECTIONS Task Order Assignment No. C-703A-6

Utilizing the Commission's current Construction Management Task Order Agreement, this Task Order Assignment is to provide Code Compliance Inspections on as needed basis for the construction of the new BM/AET Building being constructed as part of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project. Said services will be provided by a Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry (PA L&I) Certified Third-Party Agency in the appropriate building trade categories and in accordance with the current Uniform Construction Code Inspection Procedures UCC-9.

Urban was issued Notice to Proceed effective August 6, 2018. UCC inspections have been performed on a periodic basis as determined by the classification of work being performed and will continue until building construction is complete in 2019.

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DESIGN MANAGEMENT CONSULTANT SERVICES T-668A CONSTRUCTION

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-2I

AECOM is providing DMC services during the construction of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, Contract T-668A, under this Task Order Assignment, which began on April 1, 2017. The DMC Services include support to the Commission in the following:

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT SERVICES

Final Design Services Contract No. C-662A

McCormick Taylor, Inc. (MT) was awarded this Public Involvement (PI) Contract at the Commission's September 28, 2015 Meeting, and issued Notice to Proceed effective October 29, 2015. MT's public involvement effort focuses on regularly communicating project activities to officials, stakeholders and the public, as well as informing motorists of near-term construction stage travel implications, performing public involvement initiatives and market research activities and development of discussion guides and analysis related the implementation of the new toll, and payment options related to All-Electronic Tolling. MT has finalized a new project specific logo and has created a new project specific website that went live on October 4, 2018. MT submitted a revised public involvement toll-implementation strategy and timeline to Commission staff for application and roll-out. MT continues to monitor the toll-free information line calls, compiling and responding to calls as well as project specific e-mails related to construction and toll implementation.

CPMC SERVICES – 2018 THROUGH 2021

Task Order Assignment No. C-502A-1M

Task Order Assignment 502A-1M, Capital Program Management Consultant (CPMC) Services for 2018 through 2021 began in April 2018. AECOM is currently providing two (2) part-time Project Managers to oversee and administer various design and construction projects that are being advanced in the Capital Improvement Program. During this reporting period, CPMC Staff continued to provide the management and oversight of the close-out of Professional Services Contract C-644A, CM/CI Services Contract CM-644A, and Construction Contract T-644A for the I-78 Roadway Approach/Transition Slabs Rehabilitation and the Rehabilitation of the Cedarville Road Overpass; management and oversight of Construction Contract T-707A for the New Commission Administration Building, associated CM/CI Contract CM-707A; and Resident Engineer services for the T/TS-734A-001 Job-Order Contract for the I-78 Roadway Pavement Joint Rehabilitation.

The design team also completed on site observations as needed. The design team developed and issued field bulletins and clarification for the contractors use as needed.

Joseph Jingoli & Son, Inc. facilitated the bi-weekly project status meetings and various field meeting as needed for the project. Jingoli continues to complete document processing that includes receiving and distributing project submittals and requests for information from the contractor. Review of schedule updates occur along with a report summarizing their findings that is provided to the contractor to address. Jingoli added their project punch-list items to the initial list that was prepared by the design team. Staff from the construction manager include the Resident Engineer and the Mechanical/Electrical/Plumbing Inspector, are on site as needed as field work by the contractor occurs.

Construction Contract No. T-707A

Project submittal items continue to be submitted by the contractor and are being reviewed by the design team along with various requests for information. Site work includes constructing a concrete pad for a Smoker Shelter that was purchased by the Commission. Landscaping the areas surrounding the building along with the parking lot islands is nearly complete.

Pressure testing of the IT Server Room passed. Building security elements are nearly complete with added access control elements remaining to be completed. Bracy Construction received the punch-list for the interior of the building and is currently working on completing those items. Bracy Construction is also working on the punch-list items fort the 1799 Building.

WASHINGTON CROSSING BRIDGE REPLACEMENT FEASIBILITY STUDY Contract No. C-715A-6

Pennoni Associates' activities included advancing identified alternatives as part of the study of the engineering and environmental feasibility of replacing the Washington Crossing Toll-Supported Bridge expanding upon previously identified alternatives as well as develop additional alternatives to include, but not limited to, realignment and profile adjustments.

Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) was issued Notice to Proceed effective April 1, 2019. A project kick-off meeting was held with GPI on April 3, 2019 with operations and supervisory staff in attendance. GPI will provide a part time Project Manager, full time Resident Engineer/Inspector and part time Scheduler throughout the duration of this task order assignment. GPI attended a kick-off meeting with the contractor (Magnum), conducted job progress meetings and performed construction management and inspection activities.

SALT STORAGE FACILITY - CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-611A

At the March 25, 2019 Commissioners Meeting, the Commission awarded Contract No. T-611A, New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge Salt Storage Building to Magnum Inc. of Warminster, PA for an amount not-to-exceed \$1,439,584.00. Magnum was provided with Notice of Award/Limited Notice to proceed on March 26, 2019 and a full Notice-to-Proceed was given on April 24, 2019. A kick-off meeting was scheduled with Magnum on May 3, 2019. Magnum has demolished the old storage shed and portions of the old salt storage building and is currently constructing the new building which is expected to be substantially complete in autumn 2019.

NEW HOPE-LAMBERTVILLE TOLL BRIDGE STONE VENEER

C-704A-2

At the end of March the breakdown of a section of the stone veneer at the east abutment of the New Hope – Lambertville Toll Bridge (Route 202) was discovered under an existing task order agreement. GPI Inc. was given the task to investigate the cause, and determine a solution for the issue. The consultant was given Notice to Proceed on 4/29/2019. The consultant went out in the field on 5/15 and 5/16/19 to access the condition of the stone veneer at both abutments of the NH-L Toll Bridge. A preliminary report was received June 7th, 2019. Report was finalized 7/15/2019. Preliminary design/repair documents received 8/9/2019, and reviewed by 8/23/19. Revisions to design documents received electronically on 9/13/2019.

UHLERSTOWN-FRENCHTOWN TOLL SUPPORTED BRIDGE REPLACEMENT OF NJ UPSTREAM RETAINING WALL

C-732A-1

The stone masonry retaining wall to the north of the Bridge Monitor Shelter in Frenchtown is deteriorated and in need of replacement. Arora and Associates, P.C. has been given the task to design a new retaining wall that would keep the appearance of the existing wall in mind. Arora was given Notice To Proceed on 8/16/2019. A Preliminary Design submission has been received 9/4/2019. Upon review by the Commission, the consultant has been asked to provide an additional design option, which would include acquiring additional property.

Commission staff coordinated with Conduent and TransCore to allow for the NJ CSC to issue an incremental tag status file and for the in-lane toll system to receive and process it.

As the Commission's General Engineering Consultant (GEC), Van Cleef Engineering Associates, LLC, (formerly Cherry, Weber & Associates) (VCEA) is providing Annual Inspection Services for the Toll-Supported Bridges in 2016. VCEA was provided with Notice to Proceed on March 23, 2015. On November 21, 2016, the Commission, via Resolution 3090-11-16, extended VCEA's contract to perform GEC services and inspections in 2017 & 2018. On November 19, 2018, the Commission, via Resolution 4045-10-18, extended VCEA's contract to perform GEC services and inspections in 2019 & 2020, the second and final of two 2-year optional extensions in the original contract.

A kick-off meeting was held on March 18 for the 2019 Toll Bridge Inspections at the I-78 Toll Bridge Maintenance Garage and attended by representatives from North, Central and South Regional Maintenance, the Deputy Director of Maintenance, Engineering, the Director of Tolling, the Senior Director of Maintenance and Toll Operations, and VCEA. Interim inspections of all required Toll-Supported Bridges are complete. Inspections have been completed at all Toll Bridges. A progress meeting was held on June 5 at the Easton – Phillipsburg Toll Bridge with attendees from VCEA, Commission Engineering Staff, and Maintenance. On August 12, VCEA performed a first cycle inspection on the new Scudder Falls Toll Bridge, Pennsylvania Canal Overpass, and Taylorsville Road Overpass. The Commission has received SI&A information from the bridge designer, Michael Baker, and is coordinating with VCEA to enter the information in the PennDOT BMS2 system. Sign retro-reflectivity testing will be performed in October. Scudder Falls will not be tested due to construction and upcoming replacement of signs due to construction.

The draft Maintenance report was submitted to the Commission on September 12 and has been distributed to Maintenance and Operations for review and comment. Review meetings will be held in mid-October with M&O, Engineering, and VCEA.

The draft Annual Inspection Report was submitted to the Commission on September 25 and is under review.

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving the Public Safety and Bridge Security Department:

Radio System

- During the month of September 2019, the radio system experienced trunking issues out of the Stockton Tower due to communications outage.
- During the month of September 2019, Public Safety and Bridge Security (PSBS) personnel, along with the NJ State Police and Motorola have been working with personnel who manage the Solebury and Stockton Towers to prepare for the extension of the Stockton Tower and installation of radio equipment at both sites. Currently we are waiting for required permits to be issued.
- PSBS received new mobile radios for the new Commission vehicles ordered to replace those taken out of service or reassigned.
- PSBS personnel alone, and in conjunction with the New Jersey State Police investigated various other DRJTBC radio issues both during and after normal working hours.
- PSBS personnel continue to work with the Regions and IT to update the Maximo radio inventory database.

Access Control System

- During the month of September 2019, PSBS personnel worked with General Supply (Commission's locksmith) to address various door lock issues.
- During the month of September 2019, the ACS database was audited and pictures were updated for employees and contractor cards. Various other employee ACS rights were updated and/or changed at the request of supervisors. PSBS has issued badges for the summer employees.
- During the month of September 2019, Schneider Electric performed preventive maintenance on all access control doors at the toll bridge facilities.

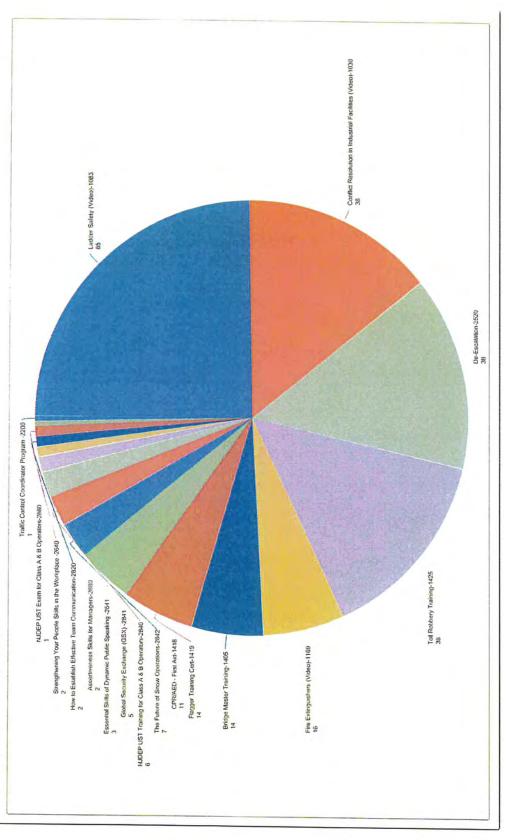
